The early years.

Greensborough Inter Council Church was established with an ecumenical meeting called by concerned members of the Greensborough Minister's Fraternal on <u>May 23 1989</u>. The inaugural meeting on <u>17th September</u> <u>1989</u> at Greensborough Uniting Church expressed unity of the Churches and a strong Christ based mission statement. At this meeting members discussed a Draft Constitution .It was decided to charge an annual fee of \$75, this was updated to \$100 in 1990.Fees were to be set aside to begin the G.I.C.C Emergency Fund.

> The Churches involved were -New Life Centre (Apostolic) Greensborough Anglican Church, Greensborough Church of Christ, Saint Mary's Catholic Church, Saint Thomas Catholic Church, Lutheran Church Greensborough, Watsonia/Macleod Uniting Church, Greensborough Uniting Church

Greensborough Baptist Church joined as an observer for about two years before accepting full membership.


The Greensborough Salvation Army was interested participants.


The Greensborough Inter Church Banner was made in 1993 by Sandra Bishop from St Thomas' Parish and first displayed at the Australia Day Celebrations the following year. The Banner's logo's represent the nine churches involved with G.I.C.C. and is proudly displayed in the different churches during the year.



From its inception the Greensborough Inter Church Council (G. I. C. C.) has been involved in the many Community activities. The G.I.C.C. members firmly believed that by participating in Community events it would show to the public the unity of the local churches. G.I.C.C became accepted and gained a healthy reputation in the community.

<u>1990</u> saw the first G.I.C.C. Stations of the Cross, which was held at 1pm on Good Friday. The name was later changed to the Way of the Cross. This truly Memorial Service was a holy and meaningful way for all the Churches to combine their Easter celebrations. The Way of the Cross began its journey behind the shops in Main Street Greensborough. The service opened with a combined Churches prayer. The crowd then followed the 'cross' (transported by a light vehicle, usually driven by Jim Beard) along Main Street to Grimshaw Street ending in Memorial Park Greensborough.

There were seven stops en route to Memorial Park Greensborough. A different Church led each stop. While walking in between the stops the crowd present sang hymns.



Not all the Clergy felt the same about this occasion. Rev G. Sells from All Saints Anglican Church wrote to the members of the G.I.C.C. (letter dated <u>12/2/96)</u> stating that he had concerns about the content of the Way of the He wrote that he withdrew any formal Cross. participation of any of his parishioners in this event. After an Executive Committee meeting, the secretary Rosie Bray was instructed to answer Rev Sells letter saying that the Way of the Cross would proceed as usual that year and that G.I.C.C. Members were sorry that the Anglican Church would not be joining them, and asked him for suggestions that could be considered at the next meeting. Letter was sent 18/3/1996. The Anglican members had mixed feelings about the instructions from their Minister and many attended and took part in the combined churches worship that Good Friday.

The first Progressive Dinner was held in <u>November 1990.</u> Minutes written <u>December 11 1990</u> tell that this event was a great success and this should be an annual occasion for all to mingle and meet each other.

The Progressive Dinner has continued and each year it has been hosted by three G.I.C.C. Churches each November. In this time members of the various churches formed very good friendships and each meal was well attended by church members and also the general public. Some of these dinners have been better than others, but always good fellowship. As the food was largely donated the Progressive Dinner Committee was careful to keep the admission price at an affordable cost. This was much appreciated and proved successful. Monies collected added to the G.I.C.C. Emergency Funds.

<u>23/24/11/1991</u>, the G.I.C.C. became involved with the Watsonia Festival, hosting a stall that sold Australian trees and shrubs. These were supplied by the Scripture Union and sold at a minimum price to cover costs. The stall did a very good trade mainly due to Heidi Beard and Mat Bray who were good sales people.

Members of G.I.C.C. were asked to help and partake in the Scripture Union Klomp Club which was a Christmas Holiday Youth Program held at the Uniting Church and Anglican Church each year. The members of G.I.C.C. helped in the various activities until the Klomp Club was 'shut down' by the Scripture Union in 1999. Many of the G.I.C.C. Members were already involved in of the Community Christmas Carols, which had its beginnings pre World War Two. The first Community Carols was held in the front garden of Dr Edward Cordiner Grimshaw Street Greensborough. When the Shire of Diamond Valley was dismantled in 1994, and it later merged into the Banyule City Council (1995), a Community Committee led by Carols Coordinator Rosie Bray, organised the Community Carols. (For the next 15 years). There was a name change at this time to Festival of Family Carols. The Banyule Council granted the G.I.C.C. \$500 a year to pay for expenses. An offering was taken up and given to a needy charity.

The Committee was very careful to continue the Carols for the people and there was care not to build the event on a personality---**it was every ones carols**.



It was decided to hold an Australian Day Celebration and Worship Service on January 26^{th} as it fell on a Sunday that year (26/1/1992). The venue was then called the Diamond Valley Shire Common, now called The Diamond Valley Outdoor Performance Centre at the Diamond valley Complex. This first event was reasonably well attended and the guest speaker was Mr Warwick White. A similar event was held the following year, (1993). The speaker was a member of Greensborough R.S.L.; however the event it was a victim of Melbourne's weather and it poured raining all day. This dampened every ones plans for the following year.

Correspondence was received to arrange Chaplains for the T.A.F.E. College Greensborough. Unfortunately this project fizzled out before it could get started.

Joint assault to help the jobless

HE Greensborough Interchurch Council and employment and training rough Church of Christ, groups came together last week to fight unemployment.

The churches, under the banner Churches Net-working for Job Seekers, held a job seekers expo at the Valley Central shopping centre.

The 12-hour exhibition featured the Northern Metropolitan TAFE. North-East Consumer Support Service, Life Centre services, Citizens Advice Bureau, Skill Link, Job Link, Mature Action.

Youth Access and Skill Seekers. Co-ordinator of the pro-

ject, the Reverend George Warren, of Greensbosaid the expo was a success.

"We had a lot of people coming to each display and asking questions and clarifying issues," he said.

Mr Warren said the common concern was unemployment.

"So many people are out of work and have been for a long time and cannot get back into the work-force," he said.

"The people who came to us are still trying." Mr Warren said many

people were unaware of their rights to welfare and retraining.

"Some people think they have to be out of work for 12 months before they can be retrained."

Mr Warren said more than 30 people enrolled in the job-seeking register.

Mr Warren hopes the job expo will become a regular event.

The co-ordinator of the Diamond Valley-Eltham Citizens Advice Bureau, Ms Janet Oppy, was happy with the expo.

"There is still a tremendous number of people who don't have any idea what is available in the community," she said.

"It heightens people's awareness of what is available.'

Project co-ordinator of the Eltham-Diamond Valley Skillshare Program. Mr John Martin hopes the expo helped the unemployed.

"I thought it was successful in terms of informing the public about ser-




Members were sorry to say farewell to Fred Dixon who after 7 years as treasurer retired due to ill health.







HEIDI ANNEMARIE BEARD OBITURY. Rosie Bray

A Lutheran Funeral Service was held at St Mary's Catholic Church on Friday May 21st for Mrs Heidi Beard who died on May 17th after a long illness.

Heidi was a foundation member of the Greensborough Inter Church Council and a staunch believer of ecumenicalism. It seemed fitting that, as her own church Calvary Lutheran Church was under construction and could not be used for the funeral service that her farewell would be from St Mary's where she made regular visits for events organised by the Greensborough Inter Church Council.. Pastor Pietsch from Calvary Lutheran Church said "this was a symbol of the great co-operation between the churches and church unity and fulfilled her faith and belief in Church unity". The Service was led by Pastor Pietsch and assisted by Pastors Koch and Zwick, former Pastors from Calvary Lutheran Church. The organ was played by an old friend Eric Collver, Father Kevin McIntosh paid tribute to Heidi for her loval work as an officer bearer and committee member for Greensborough Inter Church Council. Heidi had a wealth of friends and many people travelled long distances to say a fond farewell to their friend. Heidi's interests were spread over a number of different areas and she touched many people with her practicable wisdom and kindness. Mingled with the tears people had their own memories of a lady who was always cheerful.

Heidi Annemarie Beard (Sager) was born in Hamburg Germany in 1939 and she had recollections of that time of nights spent in air raid shelters, queuing for food and blackout during the bombing. She learnt to knit at this time, so could always knit in the dark.

The Sager family arrived in Melbourne in 1954, and Heidi would tell stories of eating her first banana -- and hating it-- and watching the coronation of Queen Elizabeth 11 in a store window.

Heidi and her sister Elki joined the Fairfield Rowing Club and Heidi was selected in the Australian rowing team for the Rome Olympics. A very proud time for her to compete for her new country Australia.

Returning from Rome, Heidi married Jim Beard and they settled in semi-rural Watsonia, where there were only dirt roads. Six children followed with Heidi and Jim joining a large number of church and local committees as running a trucking business. Busy days for the Beards ??

In the early 1990's Heidi was diagnosed with breast cancer, but she was determined to attend her old High School reunion in Germany in 1995, coming back to Australia with wonderful tales of renewed friendships.

Heidi was such a humble person that she did not tell her children or grandchildren much about competing in the 1960 Olympic Games in Rome, so when asked to take part in the Olympic Torch Relay at the Olympic Village in August 2000, she initially said no. After much thought Heidi decided that she owed it to her grandchildren to take part in the relay, to give them some sense of history. However it was not until the night before the event that she found out that it was she who was chosen to light the cauldron. Give the task Heidi carried the torch high and did the job well.

Heidi had a wealth of friends and her memory will live on in her husband Jim, chilren Tim, Peter, Julie, IInda, Doug and Ralph and the extended family.

The family tribute sums it all up-A life well lived. A women well loved. Now in God's care.
