Mr. Pitt replied in a few well-chosen words on behalf of himself and his wife, and great cheers were given him. At the close of the evening the usual service was held in the Chapel, seats in the front being provided for the Governor and Lady Carmichael and Captain Hope, A.D.C. Archdeacon Crossley, in the name of the Archbishop, handed Mr. Pitt his License as a Diocesan Lay Reader, and also admitted Mr. H. K. Vickery (Lay Reader) and Mr. Alexander Patrick (3rd engineer of s.s. "Star of New Zealand") as members of the Seamen's Guild. Hearty cheers for the Governor were given as he and Lady Carmichael drove away in their motor car.

A welcome was accorded to Mr. and Mrs. Pitt by the Port Melbourne workers at the Concert held at the Institute on the 25th, and another Reception was given at the Williamstown Sailors' Rest on the following Thursday, when the Williamstown Committee and workers had an opportunity of showing their hospitality to the new arrivals.

By the kindness of our host and hostesses and the members of the Elsternwick Ladies' Harbour Lights Guild, 82 sailors and a party of workers were most hospitably entertained. The usual Football, Cricket, and Sports were vigorously promoted. Mr. Clarke had a huge bonfire lit to celebrate the occasion, and round the dying embers, vociferous cheers were given to our host and hostesses. Prizes for successful competitors were distributed at the Institutes on Australian Wharf and at Port Melbourne respectively, at the grand entertainments there provided at night. The hearty services which brought the proceedings to a close were not the least enjoyable part of a well-spent Eastertide.

The holiday on "Eight Hours Day" was spent at Brighton, where the Rev. E. A. Crawford and Mrs. Crawford gave us the use of their schoolroom and paddock, and also their personal assistance. We had a party of 62 sailors on this occasion, and although the weather in the early part of the afternoon was wet and threatening, it cleared sufficiently for a well-contested football match and other sports; and a capital photograph of the group was taken, with St. Andrew's Church for a background. Before leaving the schoolroom, ringing cheers were given for Mr. and Mrs. Crawford and the other helpers, to which Mr. Crawford replied in a few kind words, saying how pleased he was to see the sailors enjoying themselves.

A jolly party of 25 proceeded down the river on board the mission boat "Southern Cross," and spent a capital afternoon of sports and games at Williamstown.
