

The Mission to Seafarers Biennial Conference 2001

The Victorian Mission to Seafarers hosted the 2001 Mission to Seafarers Conference in November this year. The venue was set in the beautiful countryside just out of Daylesford at Rutherford Park Resort.

The auspicious opening to the conference came from the Mission to Seafarers new Secretary General, Canon Bill Christianson, preaching at St. Paul's Cathedral, Melbourne on 4 November for the Navy's annual service.

As the conference special guest, Canon Christianson delivered the keynote address to the eighteen MtS delegates from ports Mr Lawrence Whiting was the inaugural observer from the Apostleship of the Sea. Dr. Chris Whitaker, Managing Director of the Melbourne Port Corporation spoke in detail about the changes in Australian shipping over the next three years. Enlivened by the spirit of the conference, a new council was established to carry out the conference's exciting new directions. The pace of change in shipping is affecting seafarers' missions around the world. While there are still many questions and no easy answers, there is a greater awareness of the needs. In response to the conference, the Mission to Seafarers' in Australia has taken the first steps to address these needs.

The Mission's sincere thank goes to all those who contributed in the organisation of Conference 2001 including the presentations, accommodation arrangements and driving as well as many other tasks.
