What of the costs of uniforms. Marilyn Lane, leader of Reds team tells "It varies . . . but with most clubs the girls supply their own boots which cost about £5 and the blouse. skirt. jacket and cap are either provided by the club, or the cost subsidized."

And Sandra, "Uniforms can cost up, to £20, but usually it's about £15".

They all say "Money is not the slightest worry to even the younger girls ... particularly when! they know they're high stepping it to fame, and their town is going with them."
