Successful Subdivision of Church Land. MAIL 30/1/24
 Messrs. Knight and Harwood, in conjunction with Mr. J. B. McAlpin, subdivisional experts, on Saturday conducted a sale of shop sites at the corner of Pratt street and White Horse road, upon which St. Paul's Church of England stood. The prices realised were satisfactory. £12 a foot was accepted for the corner block, £10/5/ for another, and £10 per foot for the remainder. All six blocks of 20 feet frontage were disposed of, and the total proceeds amounted to £1245.

Whilst A. Holt was engaged in directing operations during the transfer of the porch of St. Paul's Church of England, which was being hauled from the White Horse road site to join the nave and chancel that had preceded it to Ringwood street, his foot was run over by the wheel of the bogie. The victim was fortunate in escaping severe injury, for had it not been for the heel of the boot, his foot must have been badly crushed. Dr. Langley attended to the sufferer, and ordered his removal to the Melbourne Hospital. On examination it was found that whilst no bones were broken, the foot was much wounded. INDUCTION SERVICE.

On Thursday evening last the Rev. C. J. T. Martin was solemnly inducted as vicar of St. Paul's Church of England, Ringwood, by the Archbishop of Melbourne. Dr. Harrington Lees, who was assisted by a number of visiting clergymen. The ceremony, which was a solemn and impressive one, was witnessed by a large congregation. Appropriate hymns were chosen for the occasion, and all present heartily joined in the singing, which was led by an augmented choir, led by Mr. J. W. Barrett. His Lordship delivered a very solemn and earnest address to the congregation, in which he urged them to unite and assist their vicar in the discharge of his parochial duties, and in all matters appertaining to the welfare of the church. The Archbishop referred at length to the good work Mr. Martin had done at Romsey, where his ministry had been a blessing, and where he was loved and esteemed by his parishioners.

During the service the Archbishop solemnly dedicated two memorial slabs which have been erected in the church. The service was very impressive. The first memorial bears the following inscription: "To the glory of God and in loving memory of George Malloes, who died 3rd April, 1924. A faithful worker in this church, and for five years secretary to the vestry." On the second the inscription was: "To the glory of God and in loving memory of Elizabeth Bray, beloved wife of Geo. Bray, who died 19th August, 1924."

A welcome was also extended to the new vicar, who thanked them for the reception accorded him. He hoped they would remember the words of the Archbishop, and stated that unless he had their help and confidence his work would not be a success. He had been very happy in his last parish, where he had spent two years and nine months. With their help he would endeavor to extend the Kingdom of God in the parish.

RINGWOOD NOTES. 7/10/98

On Sunday, Sept 25, the Rev. W. H. Brett, principal of the missionary training home, Balachava, preached to a crowded congregation in St. Paul's Church. Mr Brett was once in charge of this district, and much to promote goodwill between the different denominations.

On Wednesday last a very successful coffee social in aid of the Church of England Sunday School was held in the Ringwood Hall. The night was beautifully fine, and the hall was fairly well filled. The chair was taken by the minister of St Paul's. The following programme was submitted:—Overture on piano, Mrs Block; this lady is only a recent arrival at Ringwood, and has already proved a great help to those providing musical entertainments. The next item was a dialogue by seven girls, entitled "A Precious Pickle," this was well applauded. Recitation, "Papa's letter," Miss Myrtle Barnes. A pianoforte solo was nicely rendered by Miss Eva Bell. Song, "Still I love thee," Miss Jane Maggs. Song, "Bonnie banks of Loch Lomond," Miss Annie Brown. Duet, Mrs Pridcaux and Miss Polly Maggs. "We've gone to the Savoy." The song "Pardon came too late," by Mrs Wadeson, was much appreciated. Mr Swindon sang two songs during the evening, "Pierrot" and "My Sweet-heart when a boy." A pianoforte duet by Master and Miss Boyland followed; a song, "He wipes the tear," a dialogue by the Masters Swindon, and recitations by Miss Myrtle Barnes and Mr Cecil. The piano was kindly lent by Mrs Sweeny, and Mrs Block acted very efficiently as accompanist. Supper was handed round by the ladies.

CONCERT AND SOCIAL AT RINGWOOD.—The ladies' bazaar committee of St. Paul's, Ringwood, were responsible for a very successful concert in the Ringwood hall on Wednesday evening. Amongst the items on the programme were the following:—Song, "The Warrior hold," well rendered by Mr Ellis; duet, "What are the wild waves saying," Mr. Pridcaux and Miss Polly Maggs; song, "A hundred fathoms deep," Mr Ambrose Brown, this number being specially applauded by the young men of the audience; Miss Annie Boardman sang a song, the name of which the chairman failed to announce; "Yeoman's Wedding song," Mr Ellis; recitation, Miss Elsie Davies; song, "Always take mother's advice." Apologies were received from many friends who were deterred from coming by the wet weather. The ladies' committee (Mesdames Wilson, Pridcaux, Black, Shanks, Savage, Wadeson and Swindon) assisted by the young ladies, then handed round refreshments. After supper, the young men provided a short but amusing programme. The chairman, on behalf of the ladies committee, thanked all who had assisted. ST. PAUL'S BAZAAR, RINGWOOD. 9/12/98

The bazaar to raise funds to fence in the new church was opened by Cr Taylor, M.A., of Lilydale, on Friday Dec. 2nd. Mr H. Dacey Cecil (minister of St Paul's) remarked that he was very pleased Councillor Taylor had come among them. He had shown great self-denial and zeal for the interests of the church by coming so far to assist the Ringwood people on such an exceedingly hot afternoon.

Cr Taylor said that he was glad to be present on such an occasion. He looked at it first as a pleasure, and then as a duty which he owed to their beloved Church of England to help in any way possible. Objections were often taken to bazaars which he could not hold with. A grand opportunity was given to those who had the interests of the church at heart to exercise their taste and skill on her behalf, and so help financially. On these occasions one met many friends and neighbors in a social way which certainly was a great advantage in a scattered district. Councillor Taylor then made reference to the different stalls, remarking that the ladies had shown splendid ability, skill and taste in their work. It gave him very great pleasure to declare the bazaar open, and to wish it success.

The Ringwood Hall was nicely decorated for the occasion. Along each side there were fancy stalls. That on the right was in charge of Mesdames Pridcaux (the energetic treasurer, to whom the bazaar owed much of its success) Wadeson and M'Dermott, assisted by several young ladies. Mr M'Donald, of Richmond, had gone to considerable trouble in erecting Corinthian columns to aid the attractive appearance of the stall. The stalls on the left were in the care of Mesdames Wilson, Savage, Black and Dawson, and were nicely and tastefully laid out. All the stalls showed abundance of fancy articles, photos, shells, pictures, etc., besides a splendid array of clothing. The refreshment stall was in the capable hands of Mrs Block and Mrs Swindon (Box Hill). The evenings being very warm these ladies were kept busy.

A striking novelty was the Christmas tree in the centre of the hall. This held some dozens of fancy toys, and was in the hands of the Sunday school girls who were, in reality, too numerous to mention.

Miss Annie Boardman, a Melbourne lady, had charge of the flowers. Bashful young men were promptly attended to, and assisted in their choice of a buttonhole for 2d.

The "fishpond" was in the care of Miss Sarah Wilson and Master Ben Dawson. The humours of the situation seemed to appeal to them very much, and they were able to dispose of many pretty "fish" of all shapes, colors and sizes.

During the evening music was rendered by Mrs Block and Miss Mitchell and pupils, and by Constable Tait and several other gentlemen. In another room Mr Harry Black held the foe at bay by keeping the shooting gallery in good going order; he deserves great credit for the interest taken in this

sport by the young men.

On Saturday night the attendance was again good, £3 4s. being taken at the door. Splendid business was done by the ladies who were very energetic in their efforts to please. Several valuable articles were won in art unions, amongst which might be mentioned paintings by two Ringwood young ladies—Miss Annie Boardman and Miss Block, and beautiful cushions made by ladies of committee.

An amusing dialogue was given by half-a-dozen young men who went to considerable trouble to borrow their friends' clothing for the occasion.

The piano (a new one kindly lent by Miss Mitchell) was again in requisition. Amongst other items were songs by Miss Davies, of Lilydale, and recitations by Miss Dight, of Richmond. Miss Davis is the possessor of a splendid contralto voice, and her singing was greatly appreciated.

It was a surprise to many ladies to hear that there was a pickpocket in the room, but the presence of a capable officer—Constable Tait—acted as a check, and only some lace articles were taken. The light-fingered gentry were strangers to the neighborhood.

On Monday evening the bazaar was continued, when final efforts were made to raise the required sum. The guardians of St. Paul's wish to publicly thank all the ladies and gentlemen who rendered such valuable help. The amount cleared by the sale of gifts will be known later on.

At St. Paul's Church, Ringwood, on Sunday, Feb. 20, harvest thanksgiving services were held. In spite of the fact that the harvest has been very poor in the district, many thank-offerings were sent in. The result was that the church was beautifully decorated, the work being mostly done by the lady members of the choir, who showed great taste in the arrangement of the ferns, flowers, fruit, and vegetables. In the evening the church was crowded, many friends of other denominations being present, showing that a true Christian spirit of "love to the brethren" pervades the district. The guardians of the church desire to specially thank Miss Boardman (the organist), who has done such faithful and consistent work for the church for a long time past, and the conductor of the choir, Mr G. Williams. The way in which the choir led the musical portion of the service showed that they are already benefitting by his careful and able instruction. 

CHURCHS

Particulars are very difficult to obtain regarding the early days of Church History and information gathered from early sources is exceedingly meagre.

St. Paul's Church of England - Ringwood

It would appear that the first church service was held in a small wooden building erected in Mt. Dandenong Rd., opposite the Club Hotel, in the early 70's and served as a place of worship until 1915.

In these early days the Church Services were conducted by students from Melbourne, and as there was no train service on Sundays, the Student Preachers usually were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Wilson, whose home was near the Antimony Mine.

Miss Wilson, a daughter, recalls that the Students often used of Sundays, a horse and buggy supplied by her father for visiting the people, and occasionally the Rev. Father Hennessy accompanied them when calling on his parishioners.

During the years of worship many concerts and bazaars were held to raise funds for church purposes.

One notable fete, in aid of St. Paul's Church Funds, was held on 8th Dec. 1922, in the roomy and expansive grounds of Mr. T.P. Young, J.P., in Warrandyte Rd. The fete was opened by Her Excellency, Lady Forster, and £100 was raised.

The Sunday School Anniversaries were always well attended and on one occasion 92 prizes were distributed. The rapidly rising increase in church members made it necessary to consider erecting a new church.

The Vestry decided to secure a site nearer the Ringwood Railway Station and accordingly purchased a block of land on Whitehorse Rd. at the corner of Pratt St.

The building of the Church was commenced early in 1915 and was completed in April of the same year. The New Church was dedicated by the Archbishop of Melbourne on 24th April, 1915, and later a new hall adjoining the church was completed. (It is interesting to note that the original wooden building on Mt. Dandenong Rd. is now occupied as a residential dwelling on the original site.)

During the years that followed it became evident that the site occupied by the church was becoming unsuitable for many reasons and that it was desirable to secure land in a more convenient position. Capt. E.T. Miles, who had previously bought land in Ringwood St. with the old State School building thereon, offered it for sale. The Vestry accepted his offer and in 1924 the church was moved from White Horse Rd. to its present position in Ringwood St.
