Mayoral Message

I welcome the opportunity to contribute to this edition of the Ringwood Community Guide because we know that the majority of the community see it as a valuable means of communication to them by Council.

The threat of the amalgamation of municipalities has led to a closer relationship between Councils in our Outer

Eastern Region. It has shown that Local Government can unite with a strong common stand when it is required. We intend to foster this.

Independent, non political Local Government is essential if we are to use decision making at local level to the best advantage, not to thwart the elected State and Federal Governments but to gain the best possible services.

The Council has also developed a good working relationship with our Parliamentarians. This has been to the benefit of all Ringwood Residents. We need to broaden our thinking past the borders of our own municipalities. Communication is extremely important so it is essential we maintain a good information exchange with the citizens in our City. We need to know what you think and I am certain you wish to know the aims of the Council. Our Community Plan was completed with the involvment of the community and this has enabled us to ascertain what residents saw as their needs. It also gave the community the opportunity to understand Local Government to a greater degree. This Plan will now be used as a resource document for future planning of services.

Another successful project was the Youth Outreach Program and Junior Council Meeting. These exercises have encouraged our Youth to take an interest in Civic affairs.

The Environmental Effects Study has begun on the Ringwood Bypass Road. It is essential that an alternative access around the District Centre be provided as through traffic on the Maroondah Highway is creating havoc particularly at peak times.

The planning of our District Centre is also in progress. This is a Plan to cover the development of the Centre to the year 2000. Planning is necessary to ensure orderly development designed to meet the needs of the Community. Council has recently extended the provision of Children's Services, the most recent being the Holiday Care Program and activities. This has been very successful and the demand once again exceeded the service.

It will be a busy year ahead and the Council will, with the assistance of our Citizens, continue to keep Ringwood a nice place to live.

My husband and I both extend our best wishes to you and your family for the coming year.

Less meetings has enabled new and challenging work to be tackled, in addition to, being able to spend more time keeping in touch with community needs.



From the Chief Executive

1987 Local Government - Who Cares?

This time last year I suggested that Local Government in Victoria was at the crossroads as the State Government began the process of implementing its policy to substantially reduce the number of municipalities in the State. Reaction to that process has varied from "who cares" to "we will fight it all the way".

Your Council, after taking every opportunity to participate with the Local Government Commission, had reluctantly, but unanimously, agreed that the options proposed

for the City of Ringwood were totally unacceptable, and almost completely ignored the submissions that the Council has made to the Commission.

At the time the State Government decided that it would abandon its restructuring program, the Council had resolved that it would be pursuing a NO CHANGE approach as far as Ringwood was concerned.

The Council's overlying concern is "what is best for Ringwood and the Ringwood community", and to particularly keep the LOCAL in Local Government. Some of the real pluses of Local Government include:

- Local people can best judge the needs and opportunities of their own areas.
- Local Government is the focus of local opinion.
- Service delivery is the driving force of Local Government.
- The opportunity for the close inter-relationship between individuals, the many voluntary community groups, the 'Market Place', Councillors and the Council's workforce in the daily life of the community.
- Local Government is able to use the skills of people becoming available through early retirement.

Access to a Power of General Competence to Local Government often inhibits innovation, and generates frustration for Councillors as they strive to respond to the dramatic changes that are occurring in so many areas, together with the changing expectations of the community.

Emerging out of the Community Plan for Ringwood, developed out of very close consultation with the Ringwood community, is "Ringwood – The Services You Need In A Quality Environment". This vision reflects the Council's commitment to do its best for the community it represents, and in this the Council has the total support of its workforce.

Aquatic Centre

Ringwood's upgraded Aquatic Centre, since its opening at the beginning of August, has immediately enjoyed tremendous success. Despite experiencing one of our coldest winters for some time, attendances averaged over 9,000 persons per week during its first month of operation.


Without doubt there are many people whose lifestyles have changed because of their regular swimming, which has been encouraged by the heated, enclosed pool and, particularly, the comfortable atmosphere resulting from the ozone method of water treatment.

The diving pool, with its 2 x 3 metre and 2 x 1 metre springboards, is constantly in use and the Over-Fifties group is in full swing.

The pool is open from 6.00a.m. to 9.00p.m. Monday to Friday and 8.00a.m. to 9.00p.m. Saturday, Sunday and Holidays, except for Christmas Day and Good Friday.

A further attraction is the recent opening of the kiosk, currently being operated for Council by private enterprise, and offering a range of drinks and food, both hot and cold, prepared on the premises.

Swimming and diving clubs are operating and use by schools has increased significantly because of all-year-round use and the increased water area.

Because of the fact that the pool did not open until the beginning of July, which is only three months before the end of its financial year, Council determined that entrance charges would not be increased until the 2nd February 1987. Until then the charges are as follows –

Adults – \$1.20 Juniors – 0.70

Schools – 0.50 (between 9am – 3.30pm)

Lockers – 1.00 (refund 0.50)

Pensioners – 0.60 (Aged &/or Invalid Only)

Spectators – 0.60 Persons wearing bathers will not be

allowed a spectator ticket.

Spa – 2.50 per half hour
Sauna – 2.50 per half hour
Combination – 3.00 per half hour
Concession Tickets – 100 = \$50; 50 = \$25.

1 ticket admits one junior
2 tickets admits one adult

But on the 2nd February they will increase to remain in keeping with charges at the neighbouring Nunawading pool and will be as follows –

Lockers -0.60 + 1.40 deposit

Ringwood District Centre

For some months now, work has been proceeding on the preparation of a Structure Plan to guide the development of Ringwood as one of the 14 Nominated District Centres for Metropolitan Melbourne.

A Working Group comprising representatives of the Council, the Ministry of Planning and Environment, the Ministry of Transport, and supported by specialist consultants, has been collecting essential base data, including community input prior to the preparation of a draft Plan, to which the community will be invited to react. Some of the key objectives of the development of the Plan include:

- Encouraging effective use of land and buildings within the District Centre.
- Encouraging appropriate entrepreneurial activity by the City of Ringwood for the benefit of the community.
- Defining the boundary of the District Centre.
- To enhance the general amenity, both within and around the District Centre.
- To provide a pleasant shopper environment.
- To encourage appropriate landscaping within the Centre.
- To encourage retail frontage on ground floor premises in the core of the shopping area.
- To provide for the location of a range of office uses appropriate to the role of the Centre.
- To encourage the State Government to give the District Centre a high priority in future consideration for the location of State Offices, Federal Offices, and Regional Offices of Statutory Authorities.
- To encourage the establishment of those light and service industries within the Centre which are supportive of the retail and commercial facilities, but which do not adversely affect the amenity of the locality.
- To identify, provide the opportunity, and to encourage the location of appopriate community facilities and services within the Centre, including the areas of recreation and culture.
- To encourage and facilitate residential development above commercial premises to maximise the use of the Centre.
- To encourage increased density residential development on the larger sites in the Centre, and increased residential density on the periphery of the Centre.
- Provide for a balance of convenient and safe traffic systems within the Centre, to maximise the utilisation of public transport and to make provision for carparking for commuters, employees, shoppers, etc.

The Working Group also has the responsibility of overseeing major projects for the Centre, which currently includes the Coles Myer proposal for an \$80 million redevelopment and expansion of the Eastland Centre.

Ringwood By Pass Road

Although progressing more slowly than the Council and the Ringwood community would have hoped, the State Government has now initiated a significant and very important phase associated with the construction of a by pass of Ringwood.

Work has commenced with the preparation of an Environmental Effects Statement for the concept, a standard Government requirement for a project of this nature. The preparation of the Statement is being directed by a Liaison Committee comprising representatives of the Road Construction Authority, the Road Traffic Authority, the Metropolitan Transit Authority, the Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works, the Ministry for Planning and Environment and the City of Ringwood. (The Cities of Doncaster & Templestowe, Nunawading, and Croydon have also been invited to join the Liaison Committee).

The primary objective of the study will be to identify and recommend the location and form for an access controlled by pass road of Maroondah Highway through the centre of Ringwood, between Mt. Dandenong Road and the vicinity of Burwood Avenue, generally following the existing Road Reservation included in the Melbourne Metropolitan Regional Planning Scheme, and/or land already owned by the Road Construction Authority and the Melbourne Metropolitan Board of Works.

The community will be kept informed through regular bulletins and displays, together with ample opportunity for community response to the completed study.

Council Finances

Council budget for 1986/87 provides for expenditure totalling \$14,421,000.

In drafing the 1986/87 Budget, Council was again aware of a number of factors which were beyond its control which had a significant impact on the funding required and in turn, the level of rate revenue raised. Items such as Council's contribution to the Metropolitan Fire Brigade which has increased by 20.9% in 1986/87, the continual involvement of Council staff to comply with what was a State responsibility in respect to tree clearing near power lines. This item is estimated to cost Council \$110,000 in 1986/87.

It should also be noted that recent changes in some Government charges must also be reflected in Council's budget. Telecom call charges increased by 12.5% and Australia Post charges by 9.1%. With Council now being liable for Energy Consumption Levy, it has been necessary to allow a 9.0% increase in all gas charges throughout the budget. These are just a number of factors which Council must accept and consequently are reflected in the ultimate amount of the Rate Revenue required.

Rates

An early payment of rates incentive scheme will again operate in Ringwood for the 1986/87 financial year.

All residents who pay their rates IN FULL by Monday, 15th December, 1986 will be eligible to win a series of prizes. First prize is a seven day holiday for two at the Gold Coast, donated by A.N.Z. Travel.

Second Prize is a Kincrome 206 piece tool wall cabinet – donated by Patterson Cheney Ringwood. Third Prize is a Gold Pass donated by Ringwood Supergym. Fourth Prize a camera donated by Ametco Travel.

Prizes have all been donated and no cost is borne by Council. Benefit to Council will be the increase in revenue, early in the new financial year, which will decrease the amount of overdraft and allow for increases in short term investments. Last financial year the scheme proved to be of value in its initial year of operation.

Rates in Ringwood are based on site value of the property and for the 1986/87 financial year the general rate was set at 2.3308 cents in the dollar of site value for the property. This means in percentage terms the rate will increase by 9.58%.

Rates are due and payable by 10th April, or, if paying by instalments – first instalment no later than 31st December, second instalment no later than 28th February, third instalment no later than 31st May, fourth instalment no later than 31st August.

Any payment received after the above dates will attract interest penalties of 17.25% per annum, calculated from 10th December, 1986.

Deferment of Rates

The Council may, upon the application of any person who is liable for the payment of any such rate and who, in the opinion of Council, is in necessitous circumstances, defer the payment of the rate and the interest for such time as the Council thinks fit. The amount unpaid and the interest theron shall remain a charge on the property. Application forms available on request from the Rate Collector.

Pensioner Rate Assistance Scheme

Ratepayers in receipt of a pension and who are holders of a Pensioner Concession Card are eligible for a rate remission of up to one half (50%) with a maximum of \$135.00 off Municipal General Rates and \$67.50 off Municipal Sanitary Charges (where applicable) on the ratepayer's sole or principal place of residence which is used exclusively for residential purposes. Ratepayers who have received a rebate for the year ending 30th September, 1986 and who are still eligible will automatically have the rebate deducted from their rate notice. Persons who have recently become eligible can complete the required application form at the Rate Office. Applicants are requested to produce their Council rate notice and their concession card when making application.

Local Area Traffic Management

Because of the inadequate road capacity of Maroondah Highway, a large portion of traffic has, over recent years, been by-passing the Highway by travelling through the streets in the Southwood area bounded by Heatherdale Road, New Street, Canterbury Road and Maroondah Highway.

Residents in that area, being concerned at the loss of amenity in their streets, agreed to work with Council in developing means of controlling speed of traffic, as well as reducing traffic volumes.

The Committee, consisting of residents, South Ward Councillors and staff worked through the problems utilising a system of street hierarchy developed initially by Council, and subsequently produced a proposal involving eight one-way angled slow points and a number of splitter islands, in addition to load limits, on all streets linking New Street and Wantirna Road.

One of the particular problems the Committee was required to handle was the unusual nature of the area requiring New Street to handle industrial traffic, generated by the area west of New Street and, in particular, some large SEC vehicles which had no alternative but to utilise Sylvia Grove and the south end of Maidstone Street because of the lack of head room under railway bridges and the steep approach to Heatherdale Road at the west end of Molan Street.

All these slowing devices have now been installed and traffic speeds and volumes will continue to be monitored to ensure their success.

While it is unfortunate that we suffer from insufficient arterial road space, it is heartening to see the co-operation demonstrated by this exercise between residents, Councillors and staff.

Town Planning

The Council is the Responsible Authority for the administration of the Melbourne Metropolitan Planning Scheme in Ringwood. With the exception of developments on Council land which are dealt with by the Minitry for Planning and Environment All Planning Permits for development within the municipality are issued by Council. Most uses and developments not including single detached houses require planning approval in some form.

The Town Planning Department provides advice and recommendations to the Council on a wide range of planning related matters including rezoning, development applications, new planning legislation, development of planning policies and Planning Scheme amendments.

Much of the Planning Officer's time is also spent giving information and advice to rate payers and other interested persons on such matters as lodging objections for appeals, land use zoning, development application requirements, Planning Scheme interpretation and subdivision.

The Town Planning Department is open between 8.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. Monday to Friday and between 6.00 p.m. and 8.00 p.m. on Monday evenings and staff are available for enquiries regarding all planning related matters.

Building – General Information

Building Approval is required for all buildings, additions, alterations, outbuildings, swimming pools, demolitions and fences where they abut upon a street. Dividing fences are a civil matter between the adjoining property owners.

the set back from the side boundaries for dwellings, is governed by the height of the walls and there is a minimum set back of 7.6 metres from the front boundary.

A new dwelling has a minimum of five inspections by the Building Department during the course of its erection.

It is required that footpath levels be obtained from the City Engineer's Department prior to buildings being commenced to determine that proper access to the property can be obtained.

Information regarding Regulations governing buildings can be obtained from the Building Surveyor's Office on 870 4311.

Council Elections

Elections are held in the municipality on the first Saturday of August each year. It is COMPULSORY for almost all residents to vote in Council elections and postal voting is available.

Check with the Civic Centre on 870 4311 towards the end of July to see if there is an election in your ward. Sometimes only one candidate will stand in a ward and as a result there is no need to hold an election.


Incinerators

Council in 1984 passed a By-law to govern the use of fires in the open, incinerators and barbeques. This was done to meet the growing community demand that the use of incinerators should be prohibited on at least two days a week.

The By-law implemented is a fairly tough one. It details the type of material from which an incinerator may be constructed; prohibits the usage of incinerators on three days per week; provides tight restrictions upon burning material on the ground in addition to requiring such burning to obtain a permit; permits the use of gas and electric barbeques at all times provided they are located at a sufficient distance away from property boundaries; and totally prohibits the use of incinerators on days declared to be high air pollution potential by the Environment Protection Authority.

In respect on incinerator usage the By-law makes the following provisions:

- i) Usage of incinerators prohbited on Fridays, Sundays and Mondays.
- Usage of incinerators restricted to between the hours of 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

- iii) Usage of incinerators prohibited on days declared to be high air pollution potential as forecast by the Environment Protection Authority.
- iv) Residents are prohibited from burning waste such as leaves, rubber, chemical, fabric and paint within the incinerator as these matters produce an exceptionally offensive odour.

Any person found contravening the provisions of the By-law may be liable to a penalty of up to \$1,000 (one thousand dollars).

Any resident wishing to find out further information concerning the By-law should contact the By-laws and Traffic Department on 870 4311.

In summary, burning off is PROHIBITED on -

Fridays Sundays Mondays

Burning off is only allowed on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday between 10a.m. and 3p.m.

By-Laws/Traffic Regulations

Caravans/Mobile Homes

Permanent habitation of a caravan or mobile home is only allowed once a permit has been obtained from Council. Twelve months is the MAXIMUM period allowed under a permit and such permit will NOT be renewed.

Further details may be obtained from Council's health Department.

Dogs

All dogs (aged six months or over) must be registered with the Council by 10th April each year, or upon reaching the age of six months.

Residents are reminded that the owners of dogs found wandering at large (not under effective control by means of a chain, cord or leash) during the daytime, may be issued an "on the spot" fine of \$25.00

Other "on the spot" fines that may be incurred include:

Dog wandering at large between sunset and sunrise \$50.00 Failure to register Twice the Registration Fee

German Shepherd Dog outside owner's premises and not muzzled or under effective control

\$50.00

Council also has a By-Law which limits the number of dogs which can be kept. Further details available from Council's Ranger, Harold Slaughter, on 870 4311.

Fire Hazards

It is your responsibility to keep your property free from fire hazards. Council issues clearance notices in accordance with Section 695 of the Local Government Act and rigidly enforces them. Further details can be obtained from Council's Proper Officer, Graeme Hargreaves – 870 4311.

Foliage Overhanging Footpaths

Owners or occupiers of properties are required under the provisions of Section 559 of the Local Government Act 1958, to keep all streets and footways clear of all foliage up to a height of 3 metres above the pavement surface.

Traffic

Council's Traffic Officers George Lowrie and David Enderby are frequently seen throughout the municipality enforcing the clearways along the Maroondah Highway, and the parking restrictions applicable to shopping centres. Their primary function is to ensure free vehicle flow, access throughout the municipality and continual turnover of vehicles in car parks.

Parks

Ringwood Parks and Gardens offer a wide and varied activities for you and your family.

There is walking, cycling and fishing or you can enjoy a B.B.Q. picnic. There are playgrounds to swing and jump, slide and climb, enjoy some of the beautiful native plants of the area in our bush reserves, or why not throw a frisbee, kick a football or play a game of cricket. You could fly that kite or play some tennis, what about a game of golf or a swim in the pool, or you can ride a horse at the Horse and Pony Club or just stroll through some of our beautiful parks and enjoy their peace and tranquility.

The previous twelve months have seen many changes in your parks, the walking and cycling path system has been extended by 4 kilometres, major landscaping at the rear of the Ringwood Lake is nearing completion. Many thousands of trees have been planted throughout the Municipality and additional play equipment has been installed.

Health

Council's Health Department promotes a highly successful PREVENTATIVE HEALTH CARE program for the benefit of the public.

Food Standards

Council's Health Surveyors are responsible for controlling standards in premises used for the sale, manufacture and storage of food to ensure that these premises comply with the structural and cleanliness standards in the regulations.

Samples of food and drink are procured for analysis to check that products meet the required standards. Food labels are also examined.

Inspection Services

As well as checking standards of food delivery vehicles, food shops, cafes, restaurants and food factories; regular inspections are made of special trades, hairdressers, chiropodists, beauty parlours, acupuncture and ear piercing establishments.

Accommodation standards in motels, hotels and boarding houses are checked. Inspections are also made of public buildings for fire prevention.

Rats

Council engages a rodent control contractor who regularly services trouble spots in streets and other public areas. Residents experiencing the nuisance of rats on private property may obtain rat bait free of charge on application to the Health Department.

Pediculosis

PARENTS SHOULD CHECK CHILDRENS HAIR AT LEAST WEEKLY

Head lice have been prevalent throughout most parts of the world since 1976. Infestation can occur in any person, irrespective of occupation, personal cleanliness or hygenic conditions.

Head lice can only survive on a warm human scalp. They are not transmitted from or to animals. Head lice can be seen in the hair with the naked eye, but more often the diagnosis is made by detecting their eggs attached to hair shafts. The adult lice are about 2 mm long and similar to fleas. The female lives for about a month during which she lays about 140 eggs very close to the scalp. These eggs (also called nits) hatch within 7 to 8 days. They are firmly attached to the hair shaft, unlike dandruff which is freely movable.

The commonest sites for eggs are behind the ears and across the back of the head. Unhatched eggs are oval, off white in colour with dark centres and are laid closs to the scalp surface.

Lice feed by biting and sucking the human scalp for blood. This bite causes the itch which people with head lice may experience.

Major Construction Work 1986/87

Ringwood Street

Ringwood Street is to be widened between Loughnan Road and Nelson Street to provide for a pavement width of 12.0 m. Acquisition of a 2.5 m. wide strip of land from the properties on the east side is nearing completion. Relocation of fences and Telecom service alterations are in progress.

Funds from RCA and Council revenue will be used to reconstruct the road pavement over the next two years.

Estimated Cost \$1.1 million

Haig Street

Haig Street reconstruction will commence late 1986. Conventional road pavement will be constructed from each end of Haig Street and be terminated in two court bowls approximately 50m apart. The bowls will then be linked by a narrow brick pavement designed to give access to the abutting properties and yet discourage through traffic.

Estimated Cost \$140,000

Parkwood Tennis Club (Quambee Reserve)

Construction of four entoutcas tennis courts is nearing completion. The newly formed tennis club is to construct a log cabin type club room during 1987. The project is funded from Council's "third-third-third" program. Total Estimated Cost \$103,000

Warrandyte Road/Mullum Mullum Creek Culvert

Stage 1 of the replacement of the old bridge in Warrandyte Road next to the library has been completed. This comprised construction of 19.6 m of triple cable culvert to the east of the bridge to accommodate a bypass road which will be used by the traffic whilst the bridge is replaced.

Demolition of the bridge and construction of the remaining 28.2 m of culverts will be completed by April 1987.

Total Estimated Cost \$710,000

Vandalism

Almost on a daily basis across the whole Metropolitan area, the community is aware of a range of acts of vandalism involving both public and private property.

Vandalism in Ringwood costs the ratepayer thousands of dollars each year. While the Council has its properties insured, it is required to bear the first \$500 of every claim in which vandalism is involved.

Has the stage been reached where the Council should be mounting a "Dob a Vandal" campaign?

The Ringwood Police, on telephone 870 6377, would be quickly on the scene if you advise them that vandals are in action.

Children's Services

Family Day Care is a service where children are cared for in selected private homes under Council supervision. The home environment and the limited numbers (four pre-schoolers including the caregiver's own) combine to provide a set-up which parallels the child's own family.

This service caters for working parents and can provide regular part-time care for parents to enjoy a break for their own recreation. The charge for this type of care is \$1.50 per child per hour. Emergency care and care before and after school can also be catered for.

A Federal Government subsidy is available to reduce the cost of care for those with limited incomes. Enquiries to the Family Day Care Co-ordinator, Christine Nealy, 870 4311.

The Knaith Road Child Care Centre in Ringwood East provides full day care for 35 pre-school children, from 7.00a.m. to 6.00p.m each week day. The staff team is headed by the Co-ordinator Jane Rawnsley – and includes a variety of trained staff.

Funded under a Commonwealth/State agreement, the Centre is managed by a community-based committee made up of parent users, interested residents and Council representatives. General meetings are held quarterly on the first Thursday of March, June, September and December and are open to all interested people. Fees at the Centre vary according to income.



Domiciliary Care

Meals on Wheels

Ringwood's Meals on Wheels service delivers home-style three course meals to persons who are unable to cook for themselves due to illness or age. Our meals, which are cooked and packaged in the Nunawading Regional Meals on Wheels kitchen, are served Monday to Friday. Recipients need a doctor's referral for home delivered meals.

Senior Citizens who desire to can eat in one of our Meals on Wheels dining rooms located in the Ringwood and Ringwood East Senior Citizens Clubs. Reservations for the dining rooms must be made in advance by phoning 870 6757 after 9.30a.m. Monday to Friday. We are able to cater for special diets, diabetic, low fat, etc. In addition to our regular menu.

Meals are delivered by volunteers, using their own cars, who are reimbursed with a 5 litre petrol voucher every time they drive. Rostering is on a weekly, fortnightly or every four week basis. If you would like an opportunity to be a volunteer and so help in your community, please call the Supervisor, Mrs. Wendy Plant, on 870 6757 between 9.30a.m. and 2.30p.m.

Home Handyman Service


Library Service for our Senior Citizens

Joint Use of School Buildings by School and Community

Norwood Primary School is the most recent school in which the Council has been involved in modifying or extending existing school facilities, so that their use can be extended beyond normal school activities, to the benefit of the wider community.

Two standard class rooms have been modified, suitable for small groups, (carpetted, tea-making facilities, access to separate toilet facilities.)

As the result of joint involvement, the following facilities are available:

Southwood Primary School Eastwood Primary School North Ringwood Primary School A hall and small kitchen facilities are available for hire for small group gatherings, committees, weddings, church use, etc., outside normal school hours. Southwood and North Ringwood halls have polished timber floors and Eastwood is fully carpeted.

Maroondah High School Community Centre

Designed to meet the needs of the students of the High School and the communities of Ringwood and Croydon, the facilities include a theatre seating 225 persons which is fully heated, a working stage measuring 10.7 x 8.3 metres and a proscenium of 10.7 x 3.8 metres high – there are additional change rooms, committee room and a kiosk. The gymnasium-hall, based on basketball court size, may also be used as a public function venue being equipped with PA system and seating. In addition, incorporated is a meeting room for small groups of up to 40, a small kiosk, showers and toilets and the general types of facilities which may be used in conjunction with the activities on the adjacent Ainslie Park Oval.

Bookings

Bookings for the facilities may be made by contacting the relevant school office.

Recycling

Two of our community recycling groups recently reported that a number of medicine bottles containing unused medicines were put out for collection. Residents must be particularly careful to ensure that anything placed on the nature strip for collection does not contain substances which may be dangerous should they fall into the hands of young children.

A further desirable practice when putting rubbish out for collection is to ensure that plastic bottles have their lids removed to enable the compaction trucks to crush them.

Littering of Streets

Litter bins, placed at strategic points around the municipality are, from time to time abused by persons dumping bags of household rubbish. Because of its bulk, a bag of rubbish prevents the bin being used for its proper purpose.

It is presumed that the offenders are not Ringwood residents as there is a more than ample weekly garbage collection.

Garbage Collection

From all accounts the current garbage collection for Ringwood is proving very satisfactory, including as it does, the following –

- the number of bins for household waste sufficient to satisfy the needs of that household;
- a half-size bin of garden waste;
- indestructible rubbish;
- recyclable material, such as bottles and papers.

However, we are always trying to improve on our service and, accordingly, ongoing consideration is being given to other options for incorporation in the next garbage contract due to commence on 1st October, 1987.

A desirable practice when putting rubbish out for collection is to ensure that plastic bottles have their lids removed to enable the compaction trucks to crush them. It would be of further assistance if residents are so able, to crush the containers before they are placed in the rubbish bin.

It is important to remember that with regard to timber being put out for collection, logs or sections greater than 75 mm in diameter are liable to cause significant damage to the collection trucks and this is the reason why some residents are occasionally informed that material greater than that size cannot be collected.

Paper Recycling

Council has accepted an offer from the Salvation Army to carry out a regular 4-weekly pick-up of waste paper from nature strips throughout the municipality. The service is planned to commence on 1st January 1987 and will be preceded by distribution to every letter-box in Ringwood a calendar setting out days for collection which every 4 weeks will coincide with the normal garbage collection day.

It is important that newspapers be tied in bundles for ease and speed of handling and, equally important, that they not be placed in plastic bags.

While this service will replace the collection currently being provided by our garbage contractor, it will complement the collections of paper carried out by Scouts, other community groups and local Salvation Army.

In accepting this proposal Council recognised the substantial saving in tipping fees which will result if every resident makes use of a paper recycling service.
