

From the Chief Executive

Challenging Future Ahead

During the preparation of Council's Community Plan some years ago, the matter of traffic was identified as a major concern. There was little doubt that in terms of Council responsibilities, it is probably the issue which troubles residents most.

During 1989, it is expected that the State Government will announce its plans for the extension of the Eastern Freeway as an arterial road from Doncaster to Ringwood. Alone, this will substantially increase the traffic congestion in the shopping centre. Council has argued very strongly that the bypass proposed along the Mullum Creek Valley is the most appropriate option for reducing existing and future congestion along Maroondah Highway.

The bypass and arterial road to Doncaster are seen as vital to the success of Ringwood as a Regional Centre and to enhance the quality of life for its residents.

The State Government's planning strategy for managing retail and commercial development throughout Melbourne has provided a great opportunity for Ringwood residents. The policy translates into facilities which will serve a regional population approaching 400,000 available in our local area. Council, in managing the development of the area, is taking steps to limit the adverse impact of these major facilities on Ringwood whilst recognising the regional responsibilities it has under the State Government policy.

Already, Council has adopted a District Centre Structure Plan. This plan identifies strategic concepts and sets objectives for:-

- traffic circulation

- community and leisure facilities

- carparking

commercial development

- pedestrianisation and open space

- urban design

Areas within the District Centre have been identified as strategically appropriate for specific uses such as:-- specialty shops

 offices - entertainment

Areas have also been set aside to conserve existing residential uses.

Council has adopted broad strategic objectives for each use to guide development of a detailed planning scheme amendment.


The amendment is expected to be available for public comment during the early part of 1989. Council will welcome submissions on its proposals at that time.

Council's vision, Ringwood - The Services you Need in a Quality Environment, is at the forefront of traffic and District Centre Planning. The blending of substantial retail and commercial facilities into a quality environment without causing adverse impacts, creates a real challenge for the Council and its community.

The Ringwood Community Plan

The Ringwood Community Plan is the result of a process undertaken jointly by Council and community representatives in 1985/86. It is a blueprint for the development of Ringwood to the Year 2000. The plan sets out the directions in which to go and the steps that are necessary to provide residents with the services and environment they need and want. The Mayor of the day summed up Council's moves at the time. "Ringwood is a good place to live, and the challenge facing all of us to preserve the things that make it good without losing touch with the society around us"

The Community Plan is helping us to do this. It provides Council with a solid framework around which to plan services, facilities and programmes, within the constraints of the resources available to fund them. The nature of the process, planning step by step over time, emphasises steady growth rather than spectacular leaps (with the danger of equally spectacular falls).

We have moved on approximately 20 months since the Community Plan was first adopted. There are few people today who are unaware that government spending reductions at federal and state levels have cut into local government finances while the economic constraints have hardened. Now more than ever Council needs to look carefully at all its activities and services and be sure its priorities are right. With the Plan as a guide, we are in a better position to make the right choices.

The original planning process had recommended that each year of the Plan should be reviewed to keep it on target, see what had and hadn't been accomplished and make allowances for changed circumstances.

In the first review of the Plan Council called together the original five project teams, augmented by some new members. The teams looked at the achievements of the first year against what was set down and replanned for a fourth year in the light of this.

The 1988 to 1990 Plan reflects the financial circumstances of the times. New or pending government legislation and changes in policy and funding guidelines at that level, have meant some rethinking and adjustments to the time scales for achieving major objectives.

Guiding Principles

When Council developed the plan it did so with some guiding principles in mind which run through each of its five programmes. These principles or philosophies bear stating here, because it is Council's commitment to these which will help Ringwood to become and remain the quality environment which we all want.

This can only be done well if we all work in partnership. Council, all levels of government and the community. Council is committed to this approach and will do whatever is in its power to involve and communicate with residents.

Measures taken will be equitable and fair to all. In strained times there is always pressure for people who use services to pay a greater share of the cost. Whatever level of cost is set will vary from service to service but will not be such as to discourage people from taking advantage of what is offered or needed. Residents' voices count because this is a democratic partnership. Wherever possible or appropriate, opportunities will be provided so that residents' views can be considered.

A very successful and productive relationship exists between Council, the Ringwood community and business and other groups. We hope that the operation of processes such as that which saw the Community Plan develop will build on this relationship. Ringwood can only improve by it.

Dual Occupancy

In November 1985 the State Government introduced the concept of dual occupancy to apply across the State. Simply stated this allows construction of a second house on a block of land (where all the guidelines are met) without a special permit. Literally two houses where only one was allowed previously.

Ringwood's policy is to advertise to adjoining property owners all dual occupancy applications which need a Planning Permit and to place a notice on the site. If any objections are received these are considered by Council when the time comes to determine whether a permit should be issued. Ringwood ranks fourth out of all metropolitan Councils in the total number of dual occupancy dwellings approved in the period January 1986 to March 1988.

Council recently took a sample of both dual occupiers and their neighbours to see how acceptable dual occupancy developments are in Ringwood. Properties looked at included both those which did and didn't need a Planning Permit. The results are being analysed at present and will form the basis of any future policies in this area. We want to make sure that dual occupancy development meets our high planning standards and are what residents want.

Residential Development Provisions

In the latter part of 1987 the State Government released the draft Residential Development Provisions for Victoria for public comment. Where we live, the size of the block of land, the type of house we can build and where it must be placed on the block of land are some of the many concerns at present strictly governed by existing building and other regulations. The Government framed the draft Residential Development Provisions to provide greater diversity of housing and to reduce its cost.

In the Government's view the present housing standards and density controls no longer meet the needs of a changing population with smaller households. Nor do they make the best use of the existing urban development and available services. Under the draft Provisions the Government wanted to reduce the size of residential blocks of land, which would potentially allow much greater development than was the norm in Ringwood.

Council was one of many municipalities throughout the State which objected strongly to these proposals. We were concerned that the proposals were to be adopted across the State without recognising geographic regions and environmentally sensitive areas.

After reviewing the many submissions received, the Minister has now modified a number of the proposals contained in the draft document and introduced them as guidelines for a two year trial period. Councils now have the opportunity to choose whether or not to adopt all or part of the guidelines and those areas within the residential zones of their municipality where the guidelines may be used. After the two year trial period a review will take place on the operation of the guidelines, to assess whether or not to include the Provisions in planning schemes.

The areas of most interest to Ringwood residents will be those which control the subdivision of land and the placement of buildings on that land. We want to make sure that where the new Residential Development Provisions apply to development in Ringwood, they are appropriate for the area. The rights of neighbouring residents and others who are affected by any development must also be looked after and you may be sure that opportunity will be given for comment wherever the new Residential Development Provisions are to be followed.

Ringwood Bypass

The daily traffic flow on the Maroondah Highway through Ringwood is almost synonymous with frustration, delay and congestion. Our environment suffers and our local streets become clogged with cars trying to beat the congestion on the highway. Council, both Government and the Opposition, and the community support the construction of the Ringwood Bypass road, to take through traffic and its problems away from our city.

Earlier in the year the Ministry for Planning and Environment established an independent panel to hear submissions and make recommendations on the amendments to the Planning Scheme and the Environmental Effects Statement that concern the Bypass. In the course of the hearings the panel inspected the proposed route of the Bypass (along Mullum Creek). In its own submission to the panel hearing the City of Ringwood strongly supported the construction of the Bypass along the Road Construction Authority's recommended route i.e. along the Mullum Creek.

The panel is expected to make its recommendations to the Ministry of Planning and Environment early in December 1988. Although the construction of the Bypass is a project in its own right, its planning and placement affects traffic control and development generally of the district centre.

Ringwood District Centre

The district centre is important for Ringwood's future development. It will improve existing opportunities in many areas. An entertainment precinct, office development with increased employment, and shopping facilities which residents are accustomed to finding in larger centres like Box Hill, Doncaster and Chadstone, are just some of these.

Because of its importance, Council has taken great pains to consult with and inform its community at every opportunity.

We have reached the stage now of detailed planning for each of the precincts that the district centre is to include. These will be incorporated in an amendment to the Ringwood Planning Scheme, which will be placed on public exhibition early in 1989, for further comment from the community.

In the interim, the District Centre Working Group, which includes representatives of the Ministry for Planning and Environment, the Ministry for Transport and the City of Ringwood, is continuing with its work on the district centre. An important part of this work is a detailed traffic study. This started in October 1988 and the group expects the final report to be presented to Council in February 1989.

This study is looking at the present traffic volume and what is expected in the future. It will put forward a number of possible ways development could proceed, to help Council to decide on which is the best for the district centre and for Ringwood.

Budget


The budget for 1988/89 is a most responsible approach to meet the demands of our City.

Just over \$20 million will be spent for the new financial year, but this 21.5% increase in expenditure has been achieved with an increase of only 9.2% in rate income. Council has placed a large amount of funds in reserves. These reserves are rather like savings which are used when we need to replace an item. For instance, when a Council vehicle needs to be replaced there is money within a reserve to do this. By always keeping enough money aside for this purpose, large fluctuations in your rates can be avoided.


Major works are financed in much the same way that most individuals buy their homes i.e. through a loan. Council is close to needing to use only 20% of its rate revenue to pay back these loans. This is accepted in local government circles as an ideal rule of thumb for settled municipalities like Ringwood where the rate base is no longer growing.

The new work which Council has financed in this budget includes such projects as the extensions of Local Area Traffic Management Schemes (\$58,000), Manson Reserve Pavilion (\$271,000), and an extension at Lionsbrae (\$150,000). Many smaller but still important projects will also be covered and of course, all our existing amenities and programmes will also be maintained.

Building Control

Victoria's comprehensive Uniform Building Regulations govern what is and isn't allowed when it comes to building standards, type of structure, their location within the boundaries of your land and many other associated concerns.

These controls are not made lightly and look after the health and comfort of all. All buildings, demolition work, additions and alterations, outbuildings, swimming pools and front boundary fences must be approved by Council's Building Surveyors Department. In fact, the wide range of projects which need approval makes an enquiry with the Department a sensible precaution before starting work on any building or other structure.

A visit to the Building Department before committing yourself to a particular design will provide you with all the necessary information regarding what is permissible on your property and will save you valuable time in getting plans approved and work underway.

Council staff make a number of inspections during the course of the building construction and on completion to make sure that the work is up to standard. It is important to note however, that you or your agent are responsible for making certain that the work being done is in accordance with your contract and meets the required standard.

If you have any queries, the Building Department is open to the public between 8.30 a.m. and 12 noon Monday to Friday and from 5.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m. every Monday evening.


Town Planning

To most people the term 'urban environment' conjures up a picture of houses, shops, offices and other buildings, highways and traffic. Town planning is about the use and development of all land and the buildings on it so that our urban environment is as far as possible a pleasant one and does not override the benefits given by the natural environment. The planning schemes and statutes control what can be built and where and attempt to balance the total environment so that you do not live cheek by jowl with factories, privacy between neighbours is maintained and open space provided for communities to breathe.

The Melbourne Metropolitan Strategy Plan, the City of Ringwood Planning Scheme and Council guidelines provide the guidelines for town planning in Ringwood. Council's Town Planning Department is responsible for ensuring that development takes place in accordance with these roles.

The Planning Department provides advice and recommendations to Council on a wide range of planning related matters. These include re-zoning, development applications, new planning legislation, development of planning policies and Planning Scheme amendments.

Our Planning Officers are much in demand by the community for the information and advice they can provide on any number of planning matters. During 1987/88 enquiries averaged 200 per week on such topics as lodging objections for appeals, land use zoning, development application requirements and interpreting the Planning Scheme.

Parks and Gardens

Ringwood is only a small city but it contains over 102 Council provided and maintained parks, gardens and playgrounds.

Council recognises that our lovely tree filled environment and spacious parks are a major asset to our city. In this coming year it will spend over one million dollars throughout the parks system to preserve and enhance our public open spaces so that they are even better for all to enjoy.

Whether your taste is in active or passive pursuits there is something for everyone in the many opportunities offered. Fishing, horse-riding, basketball, football, soccer, cricket, athletics, golfing, netball, jogging, skateboarding, exercising, bike riding or just plain lazing about enjoying a barbecue or picnic with your family are just some of these.

One of the highlights of the last year was the establishment of the Kalinda Urban Forest Park in North Ringwood. The four hectare site was given to the people of Ringwood by the State Government and the project was funded jointly by the Council, the MMBW and the Local Government Department.

Health and Environmental Services

The Council's Public Health Service is primarily involved in making sure that our community's health and wellbeing is maintained at a high standard.

Health Surveyors routinely inspect all premises which handle, manufacture, prepare and sell food for human consumption.


From the small corner store to large food manufacturers, all food premises are checked for cleanliness, labelling of foods, storage and protection of food, control of temperatures, pest controls, personal hygiene of the food handlers, refuse storage and anything else which affects the food we eat. To make certain of this, Health Department officers regularly buy and analyse samples of various foods. If any prohibited additives and ingredients are found, legal action results. All your food related complaints, whether a suspected food poisoning, food containing foreign objects or adulterated foods are thoroughly investigated by our health surveyors.

Another of their responsibilities is the prevention of communicable or infectious diseases and the organisation of immunisation sessions to combat these.

It is crucial that children are immunised for their own and the community's health so that killer or disabling diseases are wiped out.

Immunisation is available against Whooping Cough, Diphtheria, Tenanus, Poliomyelitis, Measles and Mumps and Rubella (German Measles). Sessions are held twice a month in the afternoons and an evening session is held once every two (2) months. Dates and times for the immunisation sessions are available from the Health Department at the Council on 870 4311.

And, did you realise that Council Health Surveyors also regularly inspect hairdressers, acupuncturists, chiropodists, ear-piercing establishments and beauty salons to ensure that correct sterilisation and hygiene standards are maintained, again for your protection.

Ringwood Aquatic Centre

The excellent facilities and extensive range of activities being conducted at the Aquatic Centre has ensured the continuation of the high level of patronage at the Centre. Attendance figures reached 560,000 in this second year of its operation.

Set in the midst of beautiful Jubilee Park, this indoor, full Olympic sized and heated swimming and diving complex is arguably the best pool in Melbourne. It is the only one of its size which uses ozone instead of chlorine for water treatment.

Activities offered include both strenuous and more relaxed pursuits. Recreational and fitness swimming, swimming lessons, school classes and Vicswim Learn to Swim programmes, water aerobics, Fabulous Fifties groups and Bronze Medallion classes are just some of the opportunities offered. Water polo, diving, scuba diving, triathalon, diving and synchronised swimming clubs and groups regularly train and use the Aquatic Centre facilities and welcome enquiries from interested people. And of course, after that work out, there is the opportunity to relax in the Centre's sauna and spa.

In May 1988, Council conducted a User Preference Survey at the Aquatic Centre to find out what its patrons did and didn't like. The survey also gave the respondents the opportunity to tell Council what sort of improvements, if any, they would like to see in its future development.


The level of satisfaction with the Centre was extremely high with all but a handful of the respondents rating it as good to excellent.

Recent improvements to the entrance foyer and the installation of automatic doors has increased and stabilised internal air temperatures and greatly improved patrons' comfort. Future work on the agenda to make the Centre even better includes the provision of seats in the foyer and retiling the external toddlers pool.

The Ringwood Aquatic Centre has in the past two years been chosen as the venue for major swimming or diving competitions, due to its excellent facilities. Continuing this trend, the Centre will host the Victorian Amateur Diving Association's State Diving Championship in February/March 1989.

So whether you want to take a little gentle exercise and relax in the spa, join a group of other like minded people in an aquatic sport, or come to watch your children learning to swim or enjoy the water with them remember the Ringwood Aquatic Centre is **your** pool, funded and maintained by your Council. Come along and use it. Opening hours are long – from 6.00 a.m. to 9.00 p.m. weekdays, 8.00 a.m. to 9.00 p.m. Saturday, Sunday and public holidays.

Your Rates

Your rates are assessed each year. In Ringwood the amount you pay is based on the value of your land regardless of the building on it. This amount, multiplied by the rate in the dollar, is what you pay. This year the rate is 1.5295 cents in the dollar and the minimum you can pay has been set at \$325.00.

Council is required by the State Government to revalue all land in the city every four years. This year is the first year of the current cycle with the figure based on the market value at 30th June 1986. You may not agree with the value now put on your land. If you wish to object, the reverse side of your rate notice tells you how to go about this.

Rates are due for payment on the 10th December each year. If you chose to pay the whole amount as a lump sum, you have until the 10th April to pay. If you chose to pay by instalments, one quarter of the whole amount is due by the 31st December and the next three quarters in turn by the 28th February 1989, 31st May 1989 and 31st August 1989.

The Local Government Act requires penalty interest to be paid on all rate payments received after the due date. As a ratepayer, the onus is on you to make sure that your payments reach Council on or before the due date.

Rates can now be paid at any bank in Australia. A bank lodgement form is attached to the rate notice for this purpose. The ANZ Bank will accept these payments free of any transfer fee. Other banks may charge a fee for this service.

Pensioner Rate Assistance Scheme

All eligible pensioners may claim a rebate of up to 50% on their rates, to a maximum amount of \$135.00.

To claim this rebate you must be able to produce documentary evidence, for example, a current concession card, to support your claim. Please contact the Rates Office at the Civic Centre if you think you are eligible for a rebate. The staff there can tell you the evidence you need and help you to claim.

In all cases the address of the property for which the rebate is claimed must be the same as that as shown on the concession card or other documentary evidence of eligibility.

If you received the rebate for the year ending 30th September and are still eligible you will automatically receive it off this year's rates. If your circumstances change so that you are no longer eligible for the rebate, please notify us. If you don't and still claim, you could be liable for a penalty.

Deferment of Rates

Council has the authority to defer the rates for people whose circumstances make it impossible for them to make the payment when it is due. This means that any unpaid amount will remain a charge on the property until improved circumstances allow repayment. Interest is payable on these charges.

If you are unable for any reason to pay your rates by the due date, please contact the Rate Collector. Early notification could save you embarrassment and additional expenses of penalties and legal costs.

Rules to Protect You

Mention the words 'Council By-laws' or spot one of the By-laws Officers on patrol and many residents automatically think of parking fines, complaints or restrictions of various kinds.

lust take a minute to think of some of the benefits which we often take for granted but which are protected by these local rules.

Dog Control is a good example. Council By-laws require all dogs over the age of 6 months to be registered with the Council by the 10th April each year. It is important that the dogs are registered and wearing their registration disk, so if they stray and are picked up by the ranger they can be quickly identified and returned to you. Dog owners must keep their pets on their property and not let them run freely in the street. This is important so that they do not become a nuisance or a danger to others. On the spot fines apply to dog owners who let their pets wander outside their homes. These are as follows:

- dog wandering at large in the daytime	\$100
- dog wandering at large in the night-time	\$200
- failure to register a dog	\$200
- at large in a shopping centre, an additional	\$50
Registration fees are as follows:	
- unsterilised dogs	\$20
- sterilised dogs	\$10
TO STATE OF THE ST	

- a 50% reduction applies for dogs owned by pensioners holding a pensioner concession card.

Council also has a By-law which limits to two dogs the number which can be kept without a permit on your property. Please call Harold Slaughter, Council's Ranger, on 870 4311 if you have any animal related questions or problems.

Incinerators, Barbecues and Fires in the open are another important example where Council By-laws protect our environment. This By-law is a fairly tough one. It was introduced to meet the growing community concerns regarding pollution of the atmosphere and the general nuisance caused by uncontrolled burning.

It details the type of incinerator construction allowed, restricts burning on the ground without a permit, prohibits burning on three days of the week, and bans burning on declared smog alert days and, naturally, total fire ban days.

Specifically this means burning is:

- Prohibited on Fridays, Sundays and Mondays.
- PERMITTED ON TUESDAYS, WEDNESDAYS, THURSDAYS AND SATURDAYS BETWEEN 10.00 A.M. AND 3.00 P.M. ONLY.
- Prohibited on smog alert and total fire ban days.
- Prohibited where the material gives off an offensive smell or smoke and ash.

Penalties are severe for people who disregard these restrictions - anything up to a fine of \$1,000.

Please check with the By-laws Officers if you are unsure.

Other local rules protect our personal safety. Although Council issues fire hazard clearance notices and rigidly enforces them, it encourages owners to keep their properties in a hazard free state at all times. Common sense and respect for the environment and your neighbours safety dictates this course of action. But if you have any problems. Councils Proper Officer, Graeme Hargreaves, can supply further details on 870 4311. Residents must also keep the streets and pathways passing their properties clear of bushes and tree foliage to a height of 3 metres above the ground. Otherwise pedestrians, particularly those who are elderly or visually impaired, are in danger from branches around their head and face.

All of us are aware of George Lowry and Dale Stagard. Council's Traffic Officers. who are constantly on patrol throughout the municipality. Receiving a parking ticket is an unpleasant experience but one which gives teeth to the parking rules made for the safety of all. Blocking clearways and dangerous and illegal parking near schools for example are bad driving practices which put other motorists and children at risk.

No one can miss the School Crossing Supervisors. Affectionately known as the lollipop people, they carry out a most important role within the Community in helping children to cross the streets with safety on their way to and from school. Motorists at school crossings must stop when the supervisor and/or the children are on the crossing. They may not carry on through the crossing until everyone is off the road and onto the footpath. The crossing supervisors report offending motorists. This leads to prosecution in court and the possibility that the motorist's licence may be cancelled.

Maternal and Child Health Service

This free health service is provided by qualified triple certificated nurses at Ringwood's four Maternal and Child Health Centres (formally called Infant Welfare Centres) and through home visits.

The health and well being of all children is of enormous importance for the future of society. The service helps to set parents on the right road, provide an early warning system for possible health problems and takes some of the anxiety out of coping with a new baby.

The nurses monitor children's growth and development up to six years of age and give residents information and advice on the health of both mothers and children. Immunization programmes, hearing and vision checks are arranged for each child, and, if necessary, referrals to specialists and other community health and support services.

The Centres also have an educational role. Parents can learn individually and in groups about a wide range of child related concerns such as infant and toddler feeding, child behaviour and temperament, and how they can best deal with special concerns such as night waking, toilet training, sibling rivalry, discipline, aggression, food faddism and meal time battles.

New mothers already living in Ringwood are contacted by the Maternal and Child Health nurses soon after coming home from hospital. If you have moved into the area we invite you to visit and enrol at the Maternal and Child Health Centre nearest to you. Their addresses are located within the large Community Services section at the rear of the Guide on page 51.

Services for Children

The health and well being of all families in the Ringwood community are Council's concern. We recognise that our community's future rests with today's children. Our services and the policies behind them are based on this belief. Council provides various programmes to help families with children from the cradle, through preschool years, school days and holidays and into young adulthood. Through family day care schemes, child care centres, after school care and holiday programmes, Council supports families in looking after their children and gives parents options in their choice of quality care.

For those who are not sure of the differences in care, family day care is a service where children are cared for in selected private homes under Council's supervision. The home environment and the limited numbers (four preschoolers including the care givers own), combine to provide a set up which parallels the child's own family. This service caters for working parents providing regular care, part time, emergency care and care before and after school.

A Federal Government subsidy is available to reduce the cost of care for those of limited income. Council's Family Day Care Co-ordinator, Christine Nealy, can give you more information. Just telephone her on 870 4311.

The Knaith Road Child Care Centre in Ringwood East provides full day care for 35 preschool children from 7.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. each weekday. The staff team is headed by the Co-ordinator, Jenny Johnston, and a number of other trained staff. Fees at the Centre vary according to your income. If you have any enquiries, please telephone the Centre on 870 6966.

Works Depot

The Council headquarters for its works staff is situated at 381 Maroondah Highway opposite Mines Road. It contains the dog pound, workshop, equipment and materials store, and office amenities for the 45 employees who carry out both maintenance and construction work for Council's roads and buildings. As the city is now almost fully developed, the depot's role has changed with more emphasis being placed on maintenance work than new construction. Included in the works staffs' numerous maintenance duties are:

- Asphalt patching, footpath and kerb and channel replacement and line marking of roads and footpaths
- Cleaning of pits and drains and removing tree roots from drains
- Clearing Council litter bins and cleaning public conveniences
- Repairs and painting of Council buildings
- Keeping all plant and equipment from the smallest chainsaw to the largest earthmoving machinery in good working order

Road works scheduled for 1988/89 include:

- Major repairs and strengthening to Wantirna Road between Canterbury Road and Haig Street
- Resurfacing of the Canterbury Road/Wantirna Road intersection
- Reconstruction of Great Ryrie Street between Kitson Street and Bedford Road

Services and Opportunities for Older Adults

Council and the community together provide a comprehensive range of services for our older adults and other residents who, through age, disability or illness, have difficulty managing at home. For large numbers of frail elderly residents, the help and stimulation provided by Council, community groups, church organisations and volunteers, means that life is richer and that dignity and independence are maintained.

Council's Domiciliary Care Co-Ordinator is Jenny Kappely. Please call her on 870 4311 if you have any queries. She will be happy to talk to you.

Home Help

This is available for the frail and disabled to help them to continue to live independently at home. Home help may also be provided to families when the mother is incapacitated or following a confinement. Meal preparation, shopping, laundry and day-to-day cleaning can be done. The cost is based on a simple means test. Telephone Jan Giles on 870 4311 with your queries.

Meals On Wheels

Ringwood's Meals On Wheels service delivers home-style meals to people who are unable to cook for themselves due to illness or age. Our meals, which are cooked and packaged in a Nunawading Regional Meals On Wheels kitchen, are served on Monday to Friday. Recipients need a doctor's referral for home delivered meals.

Older adults who want to, can eat in one of our Meals On Wheels dining rooms, located in the Ringwood and Ringwood East Senior Citizens Clubs. Reservations for the dining rooms must be made in advance by phoning 870 6757 after 9.30 a.m. Monday to Friday. We are able to cater for special diets, diabetics, low fat etc., in addition to our regular menu.

Meals are delivered by volunteers, using their own cars, who are reimbursed with a 5 litre petrol voucher every time they drive. Rostering is on a weekly, fortnightly or four weekly basis. If you would like an opportunity to be a volunteer and so help in your community, please call the supervisor Wendy Plant, on 870 6757 between 9.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

Home Handyman Service

This is a home maintenance and odd job service for pensioners. Jobs undertaken include window cleaning, cleaning of spouting, repair of fly wire screens on windows and doors, minor repairs and fitting of handrails.

Library Services for our Senior Citizens

The aim of this service is to bring the older adults out of their homes and at the same time make it possible for them to enjoy the excellent library service in Ringwood. Volunteer drivers call for their passengers at their homes between 10.30 a.m. and 11.00 a.m. and take them to the library. Normal type, large print and talking books are there for them to select from. The Red Cross ladies prepare tea and coffee and sandwiches for them to enjoy as they catch up on the news with their fellow passengers.

Shopping Bus

Youth Outreach Programme

This important Council programme puts a Youth Outreach worker into the community to help young people and to put them in touch with services and opportunities which exist for them.

Council's Youth Outreach worker, Craig Dodson, makes contact with young people at schools, clubs and other places in Ringwood where they meet. Craig tries to make young people aware of the opportunities that exist within the community, so that they may make the most of these resources. He is also available to provide support through basic counselling and/or direct referral to more appropriate agencies if necessary.

Craig is there for all young people. Many have specific needs i.e. they may be unemployed or without shelter or looking for information for a good way to spend their leisure time. He is also available just to have a chat over a cup of coffee or to talk about the possibility of organising a camp or other activity. In other words, for good as well as bad times.

Garbage

Ringwood's comprehensive household garbage collection service has had a very successful first year. The proliferation of waste materials in today's packaged consumer societies is a constant and expensive problem for all councils. Ringwood's approach has been to provide an extended service on the one hand to help residents get rid of the normal accumulation of rubbish and on the other to encourage them to recycle and conserve valuable resources. There are few restrictions on the type of rubbish which the service will collect and also few rules governing the package of the rubbish. Where these are made there are sound safety or other reasons to be considered.

The garbage service operates as a weekly collection. If you are unsure about the collection day in your street, Shirley Somers at the Civic Centre on Ext. 261 will be able to tell you.

WHAT WE WILL COLLECT

Household Garbage:

Household garbage includes animal and vegetable food wastes, packaging materials, plastic containers, tins and broken china and glass, cold ashes wrapped in newspaper and other household waste.

This must be placed in a bin of up to 86 litres capacity. There are no restrictions on the number of bins each household can put out.

Garden Waste:

Garden waste includes grass cutting, seeds, leaves and plant matter, small pruned branches but **not** hot ashes.

This **must** be placed in a bin of up to 45 litres in capacity. As with the household garbage there are no restrictions on the number of bins each household can put out.

Larger trees and shrub prunings must be trimmed to no more than 1.5 metres in length and securely tied in bundles capable of being handled by one person. Please place these neatly next to your garbage bins.

Indestructible Rubbish:

Indestructible rubbish includes items which an ordinary household might accumulate and discard over time. Some examples might be old tins, scrap metal, broken furniture and household appliances, garden tools and equipment.

To ensure the safety of children, you must make sure that all locks on refrigerators or other cabinets are destroyed or are no longer in working order.

Please place any rubbish in this category neatly next to your garbage bins at the usual weekly collection time.

WHAT WE WILL NOT COLLECT

- 1. The garbage service covers households only and does not include industrial or business premises. No waste from these premises will be collected.
- 2. Builders' rubbish as a result of the demolition or erection of a building will not be collected by this service.
- 3. Plastic bags of rubbish will not be collected unless these are placed in a bin as injury can result from unseen sharp objects in flimsy bags.
- 4. Large containers will not be emptied. You must observe the maximum bin sizes 86 litres for household waste and 45 litres for garden waste.
- 5. All car parts including engine blocks, bodies and axles.
- 6. Waste oil of any kind.
- 7. Dangerous chemicals.

ARTICLES FOR RECYCLING

A door to door collection service is provided for glass and for waste paper.

Glass

Glass bottles and jars including beer, wine and soft drink bottles are collected on a weekly basis on your collection day. Place the bottles neatly inside your garbage bins, preferably in a bottle bag, but **not** in cardboard boxes. If you haven't got a bottle bag Trans Waste can arrange one for you. Just telephone on 873 5977

Waste Paper:

The Salvation Army collects newspapers, magazines, phone books, flattened cardboard, etc. for your nature strip each month on the dates set out on their information cards. Papers must be bundled and securely tied but **not** in plastic bags or cardboard boxes. If you're unsure of the collection day for your street ring the Salvation Army on 419 7833.


