"JUDGE" RUTHERFORD AND "JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES."

Bishop of Ballarat's Open Letter.

Jehovah's Witness, March 31, 1937. Sturt Street, Ballarat

Dear Sir,—On Easter Monday you called at my home and left me two books by "Judge" Rutherford. I promised to read them and comment on them. I have kept my promise, and I have also read much else that has come from "The Watch Tower." You asked me to read them together with the Bible. I have done so. You told me that in them I would find only Bible Truth. Your assertion is not correct, for I have found the following statements:—

"God is a solitary Being from eternity, unrevealed, unknown. This is entirely contrary to the teaching of the Bible as you will see if you read St. Matt. 28:19, St. John 10:30, St. John 14:7, St. John 14:9:—

"Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost."

"I and the Father are one."
"If ye had known me, ye would have known my Father also: from henceforth ye know him, and have seen him."

"Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and dost thou not know me, Philip? he that hath seen me hath seen the Father; how sayest thou, Shew us the Father?"

Next I find this statement: "The Holy Spirit is not a Person." This is contrary to St. John 16:13 and 14:26:—

"Howbeit when He, the spirit of truth is come, He shall guide you into all truth: for He shall not speak from himself; but what things soever He shall hear, these shall He speak."

"But the Comforter, even the Holy Spirit, Whom the Father will send in my name, He shall teach you all things."

Another statement is that "Jesus Christ was a man—neither more nor less. His existence ended on the Cross." This contradicts St. John 1:14 and 10:18:—

"And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us."

"No one taketh it away from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again."

Then I find it states that "Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead in his manhood."

This most dangerous statement is a denial of one of the foundation truth of the Christian Religion, as you will see if you read 1 Cor. 15:4, St. Luke 24:39, Romans 6:9:—

"And that he was buried; and that he hath been raised on the third day according to the scriptures."

"See my hands and my feet, that it is I myself: handle me and see; for a spirit hath not flesh and bones, as ye behold me having."

"Knowing that Christ being raised from the dead dieth no more; death hath no more dominion over him."

I could give many more instances, but these are sufficient to prove that the teaching of The Watch Tower and of Jehovah's Witnesses is quite contrary to the Bible.

You also stated to me "Judge" Rutherford did not interpret the Bible; that he simply quoted it and gave Bible Truth. The above quotations show that this is not true. I would ask you if the following is not interpretation:—

I would ask you if the following is not interpretation:—

"'Beast' is a symbol of Satan's organisation . . . of which Great Britain forms a part. The British Empire is the seat of his beastly organisation." I also read this interesting bit of interpretation: "The Great Whore' is the so-called Christian Religion."

My dear sir, I assure you that for you personally I have nothing but the kindliest feelings, but I must most strongly condemn the literature which you are distributing and seiling. It is not, as you claim, Bible Truth; it is most bigoted and dangerous error. You left me a booklet called "Uncovered" in which "Judge" Rutherford purports to deal with the teachings and claims of the Roman Church. This book is dangerously misleading on account of "Judge" Rutherford's profound ignorance of theology and his gross misrepresentation of Bible Truth. It is obvious that the booklet is written to arouse curiosity and to appeal to religious prejudice with a view to securing big sales. As an attempt to deal with the Roman Catholic position it is worthless.

The books are so full of dangerously misleading matter and are such
a contradiction of the Bible that I
feel they should be destroyed. But
as they are not my property I could
not honestly do otherwise than return
them to you. But as these books
are being taken from door to door
and people have complained to me
of the persistence of those who are
trying to sell them, it is my intention to publish this letter as a warning to the unwary.
