The Singalong-Songathon was a great fun idea, and thoroughly enjoyed by the song singers. It will raise \$220 - \$250 for the Project, and is a certainty to be repeated next year, no doubt with a little more notice. Messrs. Coburn and Bates are to be commended for an original and novel idea.

From the VICAR'S Desk

We congratulate them on the step they have taken. We pray that they may grow in the Spirit and in the knowledge and life of Jesus Christ.

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Let me say thank you and a few more words about the wonderful response on our Thanksgiving Day on Sunday, 19th August. Those of you who were not in church during the first three Sundays of the month will know nothing about it. So, as it has been so unique in my experience, and possibly for many others, I feel led to spell it out.

First, it had become clear that each week the offerings of the corgregation were about \$100 short of our budget which we undertook for our programme last year. Secondly, we were in debt to the tune of \$1,400.

We felt that this was not a time for negative thinking. There were too many positives about for which we could be thankful. We had raised the level of giving by 30%. We have an assistant curate who is not only receiving training but also performing a most valuable ministry. Since last October we have seen the commencment of the G.F.S. (The first thirteen Juniors were admitted on August 12th). The St. Paul's Hymn Book has been put together and is in use. The Christian Music Group has grown and is arranging some of its own music. A number of people are visiting at the Manvantara Rehabilitation Hospital and Day Centre, and other individual "shut-ins". In addition to already existent Bible Study groups, further groups for study and growth in Christian life are meeting on Wednesday, Thursday, Tuesday and Saturday evenings. Last week a Tuesday morning group, (10.30 am) began at the house of Margaret Francis. Then there is the Garden Group and the S.L.E.O.S. support group.

For all this new growth there is ample opportunity to give thanks and praise. We said as much when we broke the news on 5th August.

Well, what were we to do?

The Finance Committee felt that, as an act of thanksgiving, there should immediately be made a special offering, over and above the usual collection, to wipe out the debt of \$1,400. (I must confess that my mind went to the story of the Scotsman who came to evensong in the Anglican church, then rushed out of church just after the Creed because he had seen in the prayer book "First Collect, Second Collect, Third Collect"). Well, the announcement was made the next Sunday, (12th August) and the offering was made on the 19th. The Lord blessed us and the Special Thankoffering (\$1,567) removed the debt, while the regular offering was not diminished. I was reminded of the Children of Israel who, when asked to contribute to the repairs of the temple "brought their offerings joyfully."

WHY DID THIS APPEAL SUCCEED IN THIS WAY ?

I believe that the guidelines we used were Scriptural, based on 2 Corinthians 9: 6ff. First, There was no pressure, or "visitation" or "Programme". The need alone was held up. Secondly, there was frankness about the need, and the congregation was invited to pray about it, discuss the challenge if they wished with one another, and <u>make up their own rinds as to what God was asking each individual</u> to do. Thirdly, we required that those who made an offering did this joyfully and willingly, ("God loves a cheerful giver"). This was spelt out to the extent that if anyone felt that he or she was being co-erced, or didn't really have his heart in it, then he should forget it and refrain from contributing. Likewise if the Lord was to say in someone's heart "This is not for you", then that person was not to feel guilty or embarassed.

Add to this the fact that we had committed our decisions last October to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. If we believe that the outcome is the answer to that prayer, then we could have confidence that God, who provides all, is able to move in the hearts of people to provide what is needed. For all these reasons I believe the faith of those who made the first moves was confirmed in the outcome.

For the same reasons, I believe that He will move the hearts of people in the matter of their weekly offering to cover the gap of \$100 per week. Indeed, there is already the evidence that this has begun to happen.

THE ASHLIN TRACK This is the name by which the Vestry decided that the Bush Track should be known as a tribute to Mervyn Ashlin, through whose inspiration and effort it has come into being. Our thanks to those who have helped with spade, sinew and sweat. We now have a number of inter-connecting tracks which will provide a leisurely stroll of over fifteen minutes. Len Size has mapped the area. Phil Smith is writing a study of the trees, shrubs and points of interest.

Thanks also to those who keep supplying trees for planting throughout the bush. Now that the spring is upon us, don't miss the opportunity for a stroll and a picnic.

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THE PEAKES GO NORTH-WEST Lyn and Brenda Peake are taking off to Kununurra in North-West Australia on a working holiday. They are going in response to an advertisement in last month's "SEE". There they will be helping in the restoration of the Vicarage, helping both with Lyn's building expertise and supervising the parish voluntary workers. For the past three years they have been steadily working around the parish gardens and helping Mervyn on the track. We pray them every blessing as they go on this "holiday". I am told Lyn has "retired". Retirement certainly does not mean inactivity. Here is an example of what it means - the freedom to choose when, where and how one will work. Congratulations Lyn and Brenda.


MOTHERS' UNION
