FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Congratulations are extended to all members of the 1999 Yearbook Committee, led by Mrs Helen Greenfield, for their efforts in producing this Yearbook - an important part of the tradition of Norwood.

Norwood has seen further changes during the year. The most significant staffing change occurred in May when Mr Charles Coleman, Assistant Principal since 1992 and staff member for approximately twenty three years, retired. Mr Coleman played a major role in the planning of improvements to our facilities, particularly over the last few years.

Facilities have been improved this year, with the upgraded area for Year 12 study, computer suites to enable increased use of computers in many subject areas and in the Library, and the roof extension on the Canteen. Plans are under way to replace the computers in B3 (one of our three classrooms of computers) at the start of 2000 and to increase the number of classrooms that have computers available for student use. It is pleasing to hear of and see some of the project work that students are presenting using the learning technologies available at the College.

Student support is essential for the success and future development of Norwood. We are very proud of the large number of students who participate in the activities and opportunities that are offered. Many successes in environment activities, sport, music, drama, debating and Student Representative Council (SRC) activities are reported in this Yearbook. Congratulations to all students who have participated, and many thanks to staff and parents who have assisted with these activities.

Fundraising is only one aspect of the work of the SRC and Social Service Committee. The extension to the Canteen is a good example of the results of student fundraising. The SRC contribution towards this project was greatly appreciated by the College Council. Plans for 2000 include improvement to the area outside the Year 12 common room and to the area between the portables and the multi-purpose courts. We are seeking student input to the planning of these projects.

I recently watched an inspiring video called 'Rudy'. The true story was about an American student, Daniel Ruettiger, who had been told all his life that he wasn't good enough, wasn't smart enough or strong enough. But Rudy had a dream and he was not going to let anybody or anything stand in his way to become a Notre Dame football player. Rudy became a winner because he would not quit. One coach of the Notre Dame Football team stated 'Ability is what you're capable of doing. Motivation determines what you do. Attitude determines how well you do it.' The importance of attitude is the topic of 'A Winning Attitude', a book by John C. Maxwell. He states that the attitude is an inward feeling expressed by behaviour and can often be seen without a word being said. Our attitude determines our approach to life; it determines our relationships with people; is often the only difference between success and failure; and our attitude at the beginning of a task will significantly affect the outcome of the task.

The importance of the team effort and doing your best at all times were messages in the video about Rudy. I urge Norwood students to strive to do their best.

It has now been five months since I retired from the Department of Education and lost my formal ties with Norwood Secondary College. Twenty four years ago I arrived at

this school as a newly appointed Senior Teacher (Science and Maths) and the special received responsibility coordinator of year 10 students. In subsequent years I was involved in the exciting curriculum changes associated with the establishment of the Middle School elective program. This also saw the first cumbersome administrative use of computer technology to track student courses and progress; a process that we see well established in schools today. Throughout this period I have experienced the highs and lows of teaching biology, science and maths to many students all with different talents and personalities. On reflection this has been wonderful and rewarding time, which

finished with eight years as a college administrator at the Assistant Principals desk. Of my thirty-five years as a teacher I find I have spent more than half that time at one school, Norwood; and I am not alone in this achievement with some current staff exceeding this longevity. Why did others and I stay so long? My guess is, because Norwood

has developed a tradition and an environment, which offers a great deal to its staff and its students. It provides a supportive and rewarding environment to those prepared "to have a go".


To all at Norwood I wish you well for the future, and thanks for the memories.

The Chaplain's Final Chat

Thirty years is a long time in anyone's language.

Take Norwood Secondary College for example. In 1969 it was just eleven years old and in some ways a very different place to what it is today.

There was no drama centre in which students could study drama and music.

There were no multi-purpose courts for all weather use.

There were no computers to assist with their academic learning.

But for the first time, there was a Chaplain.

At the time the decision to appoint Mr Des Shinkfield as Norwood's first chaplain was a courageous and somewhat radical step. No doubt some expected it to be a short-term experiment that would quickly fizzle out. But the Norwood Chaplaincy has stood the test of time. This year we have celebrated its 30% anniversary in several ways, with one of the highlights being a dessert and coffee function held at the College in September.

Since 1995 it has been my privilege to be Norwood's Chaplain and share in five years of our Chaplaincy story. It seems like only yesterday that I arrived: excited, expectant but somewhat apprehensive and insecure as well. Now as I look back I am able to reflect with pleasure on many good memories. I recall classes in which

students responded to my teaching, of chatting to many students at recess and lunchtimes and of organising guest speakers and musicians for student's assemblies. I also recall with great satisfaction the many times when my role as a friend, pastoral counsellor and spiritual adviser has made a positive difference in the life of a student, staff member or parent.

This will be my last year as Chaplain at Norwood and as I depart I would like to thank the many people and supporters that have made my work possible. I would especially like to acknowledge the support I have received from our Principal, Margaret Ockwell, the Norwood College Council, members of our Chaplaincy Committee, Maroondah City Council and the many supporting Church congregations and individual supporters in the Ringwood area.

Many people have assisted me over the last five years but three people deserve a special thank you. The first is my wife Tracey who has not only produced our Chaplaincy newsletter, Connexions, but has also borne the brunt of looking after our two young sons Justin and Daniel. The second is friend and colleague John Wise whose personal support and outstanding job as Chaplaincy Treasurer has eased my troubled state of mind on many occasions! The third is Chaplaincy chairperson Joy Riley whose dedication and hard work has ensured the success of many of our fundraising efforts.

Chaplaincy is a Christian ministry and as a "religious" person I have been called by a variety of different names; Mr Chaplain, Charlie, the Rev and the Reverend to name a few.

But one student particularly stands out in my memory. One day on seeing me he burst into acclamation:

I believe in God.

Now this was something new. I have been told all types of things in my years at Norwood but never have I had someone confess so openly to a belief in God. So I hope you can forgive me for having been a little bit suspicious. Something told me that I was being had!

Next time I was determined to be ready. I didn't need to wait very long.

The words came out in an even more strident tone as if shouted from a mountain top.

I waited just a second and then I answered: "Jarrod (not his real name) it's good that you believe in God, because one thing I do know is that God believes in you."

I don't really know if Jarrod believes in God or not. As a Chaplain I obviously hope so. But although what we believe in is important it is also important to have someone that we respect and love believe in us. If over the last five years my support, encouragement and belief in just one student, staff member or parent, has made a lasting difference I will leave Norwood a happy man.

Thanks for being a part of my life over the past five years. Next year I will be commencing an appointment as minister of Belmont Church of Christ in Geelong.

This will be an interesting new challenge and one that I am looking forward to. But I will always be grateful for the friendships that I have made and for all the things that I have learnt in my time here at Norwood.


mention. Hopefully we will be meeting again in the same room next year for some earnest work.



Talent Quest


Friday August 27th, 1999





Resource Centre report

The Resource Centre has continued to be an incredibly busy place. New technology has meant differences in work practises and different emphasis on our services to students and staff

Technology

This year we have seen many changes in technology. Early in the year while the upgrade to Windows NT and new cabling was put in, staff and students had to cope for some time without much in the way of computer resources. Both students and staff were very patient and thanks to the new laptops for staff we at least had some access to CDROM and the Internet via the two Teacher Librarian's laptops. However all the new cabling and work on the computer system has now meant that our library catalogue Bibliotech is now available through the College Intranet on any computer in the school. Students no longer have to come to the Resource Centre to search our catalogue. We have also received a new photocopier, a Xerox Able 1250, this machine is very quick and has many additional features such as a special setting for Photographs. It also now acts as our printer for the computers.

Bibliotech

We have now had our new computer catalogue for a year and are very pleased with it. As it is a Windows program it is accessed through PC's which means that Word, PowerPoint and other software programs can also be accessed on these machines. It also means that we can now catalogue Internet sites and that students can do a search in our catalogue and find all the material we have on the subject including Internet sites. They can then click on the Internet address and go directly into the net. As year 7-11 students only have access to the Education Cache and Year 12 students have full access to the Internet we are cataloguing sites in two ways. Sites that are not on the Education Cache are called web pages and sites that are on the cache are called Education Cache. Again the catalogued Internet sites are accessible from any machine in the College. This is very useful because we have taken the time and the effort out of searching the web for students.

Children's Book Week





LOYE REPORT 1999




John Nicholson, LOTE Coordinator

1998/99 Indonesian Teacher/ student Exchange Program

They all asked me billions of questions about Australia as well as Afghanistan and India. I made many close friends at school whom I still write to!

I also visited the two famous temples, Barabodur and Perambanan which were located at the Yogyakarta. I went to the famous Pangandaran beach and to a few villages that were all located in Bandung. All the exchange group got together at the Hyatt hotel where we had our christmas lunch together. We al so went shopping afterwards at a big shopping centre named, "B.I. P."

My only complain would be why was this trip so short. I wish it was for at least six months!!

I had the time of my life. I would highly recommend anyone to participate in this exchange program.


figure and record it in contour and tone. These drawings formed the basis for students folios and provided additional pieces to use at interviews for Tertiary courses.



J got through CAJI, and gained the desired mark (just as well!).


CAJ2, the writing folio did not prove to be quite so much of a panic, although

The Middle School students have continued to build tables, stools and models of their own choice in Woodwork classes and have gained valuable skills in the process.




Norwood's Motoring Women

HISTORY 1999

It has been a busy but relatively stable year in the History faculty, with an overall continuity, which is very pleasing. We welcomed Mrs Homersham and Mrs Brown into the faculty and renewed acquaintance with Mr Rogers, who has greatly added to our puzzle making and solving abilities. In addition, a number of student teachers, including Ms Boyle and Mr Lonie, added to the variety of teaching styles on offer at Norwood.

Students have been introduced to a variety of new materials, which have been used from Junior through to Senior school. Year 7 and 8 students have had access to new videos, CD-ROMs, the Internet and new written texts in the preparation of their assignments, as well as more traditional sources of interest in the History Faculty, such as the opportunity to produce 3-d models. Middle school students have been challenged to rethink their interpretations of a number of histories, including their own Australian History, as well as the histories of Asia and America. Seniors have studied both World War II and Vietnam in modern History. In year 12, students investigated both the nature of Revolutions and the Australian political system.

Norwood's history excursion took our Year 7 students to Geelong, where they viewed an outstanding travelling exhibition from Leyden in Holland, on Greek, Etruscan and Roman antiquities. The quality of the pieces on show was well worth the trip to Geelong. Year 8 students were privileged to be able to see and hear a performance by the Early Arts Guild of Melbourne. This highlighted medieval costume, music and dance. Professional and delivered with warmth and gusto, the show 'Dressing Up Queen Elizabeth' was an eye opener for a number of our Year 8 students. A special thanks to all those teachers who accompanied students on the trip to Geelong (especially Mrs Shears without whom the trip may never have eventuated) and thanks also to those teachers who helped supervise the Early Arts Guild Show.

Within the limits of budgetary constraints, students and teachers have been able to keep in touch with recent developments in learning technologies relevant to our historical studies. The CD-Roms CASTLE EXPLORER, CAESAR 2, JOURNEY INTO EGYPT, and ANCIENT LANDS have added a new dimension to studies in the Junior school, the education department's EDUCACHE has recently been made available to all students.

Turning to the work our students have produced, the Open Night held in May was a showcase for the talents of History students at Norwood. Posters, models of castles, cottages and gold panning devices were on display together with other productions. Many parents commented on the quality of work produced by our students. A special thanks to David Carne and Jason Hill for their assistance on the night, and also to the staff who helped set up the display, in particular to Mr Webb for his conducting of a most entertaining quiz on the night.

History week, held in August, produced an outstanding display of posters on a historical theme and many students warmed to the task of participating in the History Week Family Quiz. Congratulations to Zuhal Zaher, Amy Jordan, Luke Colenso and Nicole Kelly for their excellent posters and congratulations also to Jaye Hadlum-Jones, Jonno Reynolds, Pune Thomas, Chris Jones, Andrea Sasarman, Stephen O'Keefe and Dacha Smith for their results in the Family Quiz.

Overall it has been a successful year in historical studies at Norwood. The number of students opting to study History in Year 12 next year augurs well for an even better year in 2000.



Health Education

Ms O'Donohue, Mr Beane, Ms Paten and Mrs Greenfield joined the Health Education faculty this year. In 199 all the Health Education staff organised lots of different activities for the students to assist in their learning.

Mr Ware, Mr Beane, Mrs Beach, Mrs McLellan and Mrs de Kam covered a wide range of topics for the Year 7 & 8 students. Families, sexual development, values, body image, drug education are just some of the many aspects of the Curriculum Standards Framework for Health Education.

The Year 9 students were especially lucky as they had some AFL players come to talk to them about positive and negative risk taking. Blake Caracella and Damien Hardwick from Essendon and David Bourke and Scott Turner from Richmond form part of a 'Players in Schools' program run by the TAC. The year 9 students also had a guest speaker Mandy Hudson from the Jean Hailes Foundation to run some activities and discussion groups about sexuality and associated issues. Mandy challenged the students and left them with lots to think about when considering their own sexual behaviour.

The Year 10 students in Health 2000 examined a range of health issues facing the Australian community.

The Year 11 Human Development students participated in the 'Baby Think It Over' program that the school has run for the past 3 year as part of the Families unit. During this program students are to be totally responsible for a computerised doll for at least 48 hours. The doll is programmed to cry at different intervals (day and night) and students are required to tend to the 'baby' which can take up to 35 minutes at a time. The idea of the program is to give the students some idea of the responsibilities of parenting. Most students found this to be an enjoyable if not frustrating experience especially at night when they were woken from their precious sleep.

This particular group of students also had lots to think about after an enthralling talk by family counsellor Dawn Rowan. Dawn spoke to the students about the importance of healthy relationships, our emotions and self-esteem and how they can affect behaviour all through our life.

The Year 12 Human Development and Health Education students spent a considerable amount of the year thinking, dreaming and having nightmares about those dreaded CATS. The Human Development students can now look at what they consume with a more critical eye and the Health Education students will now consider the current and future health status with more awareness. I wish you all the best for your future studies, careers and family life.

Maroondah Driving School was once again very supportive of the Driver Education program at Norwood. The Year 10 students have the opportunity in Driver Education to have some experience in an off-road setting provided by the Maroondah Driving School and METEC. Geography Department Report 1999

Ably assisted by Mr Belle, Mrs Howard, Mr Needham, Ms Snowdon and Mrs Williams, our students completed another interesting year in Geography.

In year 7, we had a field trip to Lilydale Winery at Seville and Haining Dairy Farm at Launching Place. This was to study two very different types of farms in the Yarra Valley, and see how their inputs, outputs and processes varied. Back at school, we planned an overseas trip and found what foods, features and fun we might experience. We looked at Australian environments, and discovered how desert landforms develop. Having researched, via computer databases, how desert creatures survive, we 'invented' our own desert creature with special adaptations. A study of Antarctica completed our topics for the year.

Our year 8's studied oceans, looked at a threatened species- the Koala, and completed a map walk in their own suburban street while comparing it to an inner suburban Melbourne Streetscape. "Using water wisely" was also an important topic in a year when water restrictions looked a possibility.

Middle School Geography depends on what unit you choose (or were able to get into). So some of us studied endangered animals and visited Melbourne Zoo to see facilities provided for animals in captivity. Other students had an opportunity to visit Toolangi State Forest to study the use and management of our timber resources. Others used computer databases to research features of countries in Central and South America, or used a simulation exercise

on CD-ROM to suggest ways of cleaning up an oil spill, in the unit on "Coasts". Students in the "Bright lights and Businesses" unit visited the top of the Rialto to look at Melbourne's changing skyline, followed by an investigation of different land uses across Melbourne's suburbs.

At VCE level the year 11 Geographers studied aspects of changing coastal environments. They also looked at the contrasts in living conditions in overseas countries and within Melbourne. In year 12 we looked at the use and management of tropical rainforests and National Parks- with a visit to Dandenong Ranges NP to develop a future plan of action for one of their picnic grounds. In second semester, a local issue-"How should a piece of land in Vermont South, set aside as the site of the Healesville Freeway, be used?" provided a challenging CAT topic.

In September we celebrated Geography week at Norwood with daily quizzes, activities and the "Great Geography Knowledge Competition" to select the champion form at years 7 and 8.

Careers Report 1999

I see many students from all levels of the school, particularly with a view to selecting subjects appropriate for tertiary and TAFE courses after a successful VCE. It is pleasing to see students at Middle School begin to take an interest in the planning of their future careers. Perhaps the "Career Think" evening, organised by Mrs Webb, had something to do with this interest. The vast majority of our exiting Year 12 students still apply through VTAC for tertiary or TAFE places and the vast majority receive offers for places. One interesting pointer, perhaps, to future trends is the increased numbers of Norwood students who apply to TAFE through VTAC. One possible reason for this may be an increased awareness of the need for vocational training in order to obtain work, and often, the more theoretical tertiary courses are combined with TAFE courses to make graduates more attractive to employers. Other causes may be the rising costs of a tertiary education and the need to earn money at an earlier age.


Many more students are undertaking VET (Vocational Education and Training) as part of their VCE studies and the revised VCE will enable VET students to utilise their VET results in a more beneficial manner. We had roughly 20 students in Year 11 undertaking VET courses in 1999, some of whom will continue into Year 12. One of our 1998 VET Hospitality, Nova Barrios, has completed a Certificate III in Hospitality during her final year. This will give her an advantage when applying for work or for a tertiary hospitality course.

Our Year 12 students attended the annual TIS (Tertiary Information Service) information session at Yarra Valley Grammar where further valuable information was gathered regarding post secondary options. Visiting speakers attended Norwood for our VTAC application evening and students also had the opportunity to attend the Maroondah Careers Group "Future Options" night at Eastland.

The Maroondah Careers Group, of which Norwood is a member school, has been fortunate to have Natalya from KYM Employment Services visit us on Monday mornings to talk to students about future career choices. Natalya has helped many students shape their ideas about options and she also assisted some 10 students complete a PET (Pre-employment Training) course.

Overall, Norwood students have plenty of opportunities to explore career options and students should take advantage of these opportunities.

Norwood Secondary College is a member of Schools for a Sustainable Future.

We have been very active in running environment projects, which are nurturing positive attitudes among students and the community. Pictured above students are taking part in testing of Mullum Mullum Creek as an activity of the Stream Watch Program. Stream Watch is just one of the activities of the Norwood Environment Club.

Greening the Grounds

Students are involved in planning new gardens, growing plants, and maintaining existing areas. They have a small fenced area where they maintain an organic vegetable garden and hot house. Much of the produce ends up in the sandwiches that students purchase at the College canteen.

Waste and Energy

As a School for a Sustainable Future, we are finding ways of reducing the College's impact on the environment.

- The students and teachers are encouraged to use the paper and cardboard recycling bins, located in all classrooms and offices. Once a month Visy collects this waste for recycling.
- A new recycling program, established in Term 3 1998, reduces our organic waste by using a large Worm Composter. Currently we are composting around 50 60 kg of food scraps per week, that students and staff deposit in specially labelled bins. Our Environment Club students collect these bins daily and feed the worms once a week. We estimate that over 2000 kg has been composted since its inception. The giant worm composter is only half filled!
- The senior students of the Environment Committee are currently undertaking an energy audit and preparing an Energy Management Policy so the College can become an Accredited Energy Smart School.

Stream Watch

Streamwatch is a schools and community water quality monitoring program that is about taking an active interest in our local waterway. Students from our environment club regularly check the water quality of Mullum Mullum Creek. They have been trained, during their lunchtimes, to test for pH, turbidity, dissolved oxygen and identifying macro-invertebrates.
