FROM THE ASSISTING PRINCIPAL

'On the cusp of the twenty-first century, we find ourselves charged with the responsibility of preparing young people to thrive in a world characterized by rapid and accelerating change, an amazing explosion of information choices, and an urgent need for people and nations to build healthy relationships and work together for worthwhile ethical purposes' (Dalton & Anderson 1997)

There has been a significant response throughout Australia and the world to statements such as this. Education as it was 20 years ago is no longer relevant for our young people and it is vital that schools take up the challenge to provide learning that is appropriate to today's world, challenging and engaging. Norwood has responded to this challenge in many ways. In 2001 the Curriculum Committee undertook a significant review of aspects of the delivery of the Year 7 curriculum for 2002 and significant changes were suggested. Thus, it has been a very different experience for our Year 7 cohort this year, with each core team of teachers forming a Professional Learning Team who have integrated aspects of the curriculum and used a range of thinking tools and ideas to promote a positive learning environment. There has also been a range of parent activities such as a Pancake Breakfast, a 'Hatchet' Night and a Year 7 Parent Night, to encourage families to become part of the 'Norwood Community'. The response to these initiatives has been very encouraging.

There has also been much effort throughout this year to research the best practice for teaching and learning for our students in Years 9 and 10 to further challenge and engage them. It is anticipated that 2004 will bring further improvements to the learning opportunities of our students at these levels, to seek to provide them with the best possible skills to become 'tomorrow's adults.'

Most senior school students continue to demonstrate maturity and leadership skills that will equip them well for roles in the world. To those leaving this year I sincerely wish you well in whatever they choose to do. Remember to keep in touch with your friends from school and I hope some of you will venture back to connect with teachers and the College.

Throughout this year I have been so impressed by the commitment and organization of students. For example, over \$11 000 has been raised from a student initiated Chocolate Drive. This is a fantastic achievement and one that speaks so much about our students and their commitment to projects for the College. Students have met in SRC groups to ascertain the ways they wish to spend this money. This is only a small aspect of student leadership at Norwood. Our students make valuable suggestions to a whole range of student issues, represent the College at many community events, organize many activities throughout the year and conduct many other fund raising activities. Some of the student activities that all make up part of the 'Norwood Year' include regular meetings of student committees as well as the formals, Sports Trivia Night, Social Service "Hire a Hand" day, student Talent Quest,



camps, sports days and the Debating, Music and Drama activities including the production "Copacabana". Thank you to the students and staff who contributed so much to all these events.

I encourage all students to consider participation in some of these out of the class activities. They are a way to make new friends, learn new skills and also to contribute to the wider community of Norwood.

On reading our Charter I am challenged by the College's ambitious aim to 'develop a shared vision for its future' (page 4) and am reminded that 'Visions are powerful mental images of what we want to create in the future' (Parker 1990:2, page 2). I am confidant that, working together we can strive to develop a shared vision for the Norwood community that will assist in providing the best opportunities for our students to become young people able to thrive in and actively contribute to tomorrow's world.


As the formal came to an end, some were ready for bed, while others had a big night planned. Overall it was a satisfying night for all.





CAREERS REPORT

Although this year my new role as career coordinator presented me with many changes and challenges, it has been one of the most rewarding since I can remember.

First challenge, H'mmm, the careers room was going to be problem. Students came in pairs to see me. The long and narrow corridor, prior to entering the room, was less than inviting. Thanks to Mr Castles and Mr Edwards, renovations were organised.. Walls, windows, shelves and doors were relocated. The changes were great! The end result was a room less enclosed, more visible and directly accessible from the B corridor. An area was housed with comfy chairs that changed the environment. It also proved popular for the lunchtime "regulars" who initially found a place to avoid being sent out of the corridors, but over time, taking an active interest in the career material around them.

There is such a huge amount of information available on career options and my background in computers lent itself to making use of information technology to assist in finding useful information. The careers room had a new computer and printer installed for student use, to assist students in searching and matching their interests to possible careers. Career Voyager vocational software was trialled this year, which proved useful for most of the eighty students who accessed it, particularly the year 12 students. The Internet can now be used extensively for finding career options. All TAFE and Universities have produced web sites that provide up to date information about courses available as well as opportunities for contact via email. In addition to this a basic web site on the college intranet was set up to assist students in their career quests.

A large number of Norwood students aim to continue studies beyond year 12 and hope to enroll in University or TAFE higher education courses. In July, the annual Tertiary Information Service (TIS) event was held at the Lilydale campus of Swinburne University. In many cases this started "the ball rolling" for year 12 students to begin the task of working out which courses to apply for enrollment next year. The search continued with the numerous Open Days held on the weekends by tertiary institutions to advertise their course offerings. Some students don't intend to do further studies. Many of them took the opportunity to have interviews with Chris, Lee or Mel of KYM Employment Services to help them with their options.

In the last week of Term 2, Year 10 students undertook work experience in a work place of their own choosing. During the week, a large number of teachers volunteered to visit, resulting in most students being seen. Feedback from teachers was very positive and many commented on how they enjoyed the opportunity to see students in a different setting. Employers also expressed similar sentiments about student conducted and attitude. Following the work experience program, many Year 10 students and parents attended the annual Career Think night held in the college library where representatives from Box Hill TAFE, Swinburne University, Australian Catholic University and KYM Employment Services spoke about Apprenticeships, TAFE, University and work options.

Throughout the year a number of events were advertised in the College Compass and Year 12 Careers Newsletter. The Eastland Career Expo held at the shopping centre was again well received with more than five thousand people attending during the two and half hour event. Many Norwood students and parents availed themselves of the opportunity to obtain literature about available options.

A number of students have been considering other options apart from higher education studies. In September, twenty interested students in Years 9 - 12 went to an Apprenticeship/Traineeship Exhibition at the Croydon Campus of Swinburne TAFE. It was a worthwhile opportunity for some to find out about how and when to enroll in pre-apprenticeship courses.

During the year, a number of students expressed interest in hairdressing. To cater for this, students visited the Hair and Beauty Department of Box Hill Institute. For some, it cemented their goal to undertake an apprenticeship when the left school.

I have a lasting impression of the outstanding conduct displayed by Norwood students at the excursions attended. At the TIS event where the sound reception was poor, students strained to hear, rather than "turn off". At the Apprenticeship exhibition the preliminary talk began quite noisily because of student behaviour from other schools. Norwood students just sat and listened. It became noticeably quieter when the lollypops strategically provided in showbags, were discovered.

Next year will no doubt have its challenges and I look forward with pleasure to working with students in pursuing their career options.





This was an interesting introductory year for the 30 new cadets in the Victorian Youth Development Program associated with Training Ship Norwood. The year started with sail training at Mordialloc and Black Rock Yacht clubs, which was challenging and for some a bit daunting to control craft that seemingly had a mind of their own. Rigging and de-rigging the boats while learning the names of the parts of the boats, rules of the road (on water) and controlling the craft around a triangular course while managing various wind directions and strengths taught the cadets that small boat sailing has many intricacies and is definitely not a pleasure cruise. Sailing skills and ability was enhanced through participation in a 3 day sailing camp at Eastern Beach in Geelong with extremely variable conditions and new craft to sail and adapt to. For some the "on the edge" strong winds were the highlight of this trip whilst for others it was the feast at Smorgys on Cunningham Pier.

The wearing of uniforms was a relatively smooth transition although the Ceremonial White Shorts are definitely not favourites amongst the cadets. 




Another successful year in Mathematics at Norwood! Students were again very positive in their approach to Maths, with some outstanding work being completed at all levels.


A special note of congratulations to Aaron Moyes of Year 7 who received a Prize in this year's Australian Mathematics Competition. A very rare honour, and one well deserved.

- The Library has again been an incredibly busy place, the usage has been up in every category imaginable. Class use, student researching and Year 12 usage has increased while recreational use is very high with an average of 100-150 students using library resources at lunchtime and many before and after school.
- The Library Staff's plans to move all the class sets in the main library into the back room in compactuses was completed at the end of 2001. At the end of Term 1 new tables and chairs were delivered and the newly available space was ready for the 29 computers that were delivered early in Term 2. The old reference centre desks were replaced with attractive lowline shelving, which gave better access and more space in the classroom area. In Term 4, 10 extra new computers replaced the older computers. The server for the library was upgraded and new workstations for the library staff were provided. The library catalogue system, Bibliotech, was also upgraded this year.
- In Term 2 the school was allocated a Government Grant of \$5500 to purchase library books. We were able to purchase many books that would have been beyond our normal budget.
- In Term 3 the school community became involved in the Herald Sun book Token competition. Enthusiastic students collected over 5000 tokens. 8C were the overall winners and 7G the Year Seven winners. The two classes have selected the books to go into the library and book plates will be placed in all of the books acknowledging the efforts of these two classes.
- This year for Book week Book Feast we ran a number of competitions with small prizes on a daily basis and a book voucher and a large block of chocolate for the weekly winner. Winners were from all Year levels.
- The Library's Intranet site has continued to develop; more faculties have lodged assignments on the Library's Intranet page that the Library staff have then researched, adding relevant, credible sites and books to the assignment for students. Students are able to access information without wasting time on undirected searching. The library staff has also added information on how to use different search engines effectively and tips on how to search the web effectively and efficiently. A large number of pathfinders have been placed on the Intranet site in both Middle School and Junior School covering topics such as Bushrangers, Explorers, the Renaissance, Tourist destinations in Australia and Endangered Animals.






Our youngest team cannot be praised more highly. Their dedication to training and to improving their technique, as well as their friendly attitude has made the season most enjoyable for all involved.

SCIENCE REPORT


HERE ARE SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2002

Norwood Secondary School is a Science in Schools (SiS) Research School, the purpose of which is to develop and trial a model for improving science teaching and learning. As part of this project, Year 9 students investigated 'Light' earlier in the year. They discovered the positive impact that Australian scientists have had in third world countries and how the work carried out by the Fred Hollows Foundation relies on cutting edge Australian science and technology.


Norwood Secondary School students participated in the first Fred Hollows Schools Day that was held on the Foundation's 10th Anniversary, Tuesday 3rd September.

Showing how Science makes a difference to the world, inspired students to support the Fred Hollows Foundation.



Congratulations to Andreea Sasarman of 11F for gaining a Science Fellowship Award.

The fellowships provide students with the opportunity to develop and implement meaningful real-life projects in a science, engineering or technology-based industry or organisation, with scientists and engineers as their mentors. Students receive a Fellowship Award and grant of \$1,000 each, in recognition of their achievements in and commitment to science.

All year 8 students visited the Melbourne Museum to enhance their study of Earth Science. They visited the Dinosaur exhibition and learnt more about the geological and biological history of the earth. Following the tour of the Museum, students watched the IMAX movie "T-Rex". This was a great opportunity to experience the life and times of the 'dinosaur age'.

SOSE KEY LEARNING AREA


The SOSE KLA came into being as an entity at Norwood this year. What had previously been History, Geography and Commerce Faculties was merged into one unit. Much has been done to ensure the child will not be stillborn but will thrive, with discussion ranging over a number of whole school matters, such as the Middle years of schooling, and the proposed radical changes to the Middle School curriculum in 2004. While KLA members come from diverse backgrounds, and have interests that are at times quite different, it has been clear to me this year that we have been able to put aside our individual differences and keep a sense of the school's, and in particular the students' interests at heart. In fact there have been examples in meetings of KLA members opting against a policy because, even though it would have been attractive to the KLA, it may not have been for the greater good of our students.

It is with this sense of the professionalism of our teachers, that we record with regret the retirements of two of our longest serving staff in David Webb and Gavin Broderick. David was for many years the Careers teacher at Norwood, but as well as that he taught History and Politics, and I for one will always be grateful for his performances both as quizmaster, and as an officer of the Rum Corps, at History Faculty Open Night displays. Gavin presided for many years over the vast stores of Geography materials at Norwood, and is an ever-reliable source of information on where to get something, and how to use it. 2002 has not been a year for huge excursions in the SOSE KLA. With all the changes going on it has been a year of reorganisation and adjustment. Nevertheless, the Year 7students got to go to Haining Farm as always, to see life away from ubiquitous technology as we picked our way through the cow meadows.

Year 12 Geography students took a field trip to Lilydale Lake Reserve to observe the use and management of a local recreation resource as part of their VCE studies, Year 11 Legal Studies students went to Barwon Prison for the day, to see the outcomes of punishment within the legal system, Year 11 History students saw a terrific display and heard from a member of the Vietnam Veterans Association, the ever popular Middle School unit "Out on Your Own" included planning a trip to the CBD, incorporating a visit to a range of sites using different types of transport, and Year 8 students had a visit from the Australian Electoral Commission, to find out how elections are run in Australia. In addition to this, other Middle School Business Studies classes visited a supermarket to see what prices were like for branded as opposed to generic products. We are still looking for Margarine in 25 gram blocks, and a generic brand pumpkin! We do know however how to sell hot donuts and pizzas, as our Small Business class proved in semester 1.

STUDENT WELFARE REPORT

An exciting and rewarding year working in the area of student welfare has just flown by! One of the highlights has been getting to know many more students from Years 7 to 12. It's been a pleasure working with students, assisting them to work through different issues and helping them to feel better about themselves and more optimistic about the future. Adolescence is a time of sorting out identity, relationships and values. Coping with change and managing stress are extra demands during this time.

Norwood has been working hard to enhance the well-being of all our students. It has been a year of great achievements in this area as a range of programs has provided students with opportunities for personal growth and challenge. Students at each year level have participated in activities that have increased their connection to the school, assisted their learning and helped them to develop as healthy, secure and resilient young people.

It has been rewarding to be involved in the organisation of the Peer Support Program for Year 7 and 11 students and the introduction of the VCE Supportive Friends Program, as both programs make a significant contribution to developing positive relationships and a co-operative learning environment. Feedback from our fifty-seven Peer Support Leaders emphasized the rewards gained from assisting Year 7 students to feel more knowledgeable and comfortable in their new environment and Year 7's enjoyed the games and discussions that helped develop positive new relationships with peers and senior students. Students trained as VCE Supportive Friends reported a growth in their own confidence, communication and knowledge of help-seeking skills and the importance of directing friends to support services when concerned about their well-being. We appreciate the maturity and commitment shown by students in these programs and acknowledge the positive impact they have on fellow students.

We have offered groups to Year 7 students that developed communication and problem solving skills and a series of stress management and meditation workshops for senior students. During Term 3, Dr Chris Moodie, a local General Practitioner, spoke to all Year 11 students about issues related to mental health, sexual health and drugs including alcohol. His informative presentation emphasised a preventative approach to health care, by addressing questions developed by students and providing current data on health issues. He

encouraged students to care for themselves and their friends and to use services in the community as sources of information and support.

For the second year, a Health and Well-being Day was organised for Year 10 students. Students participated in a range of workshops based around issues of physical, emotional, social and sexual health. Workshops were facilitated by staff from within the school and facilitators from external agencies. Workers from Maroondah City Council Youth Services, Eastern Access Community Health and many other community organisations were impressed with the involvement and co-operation of our students.

The day provided information and interactive activities that promoted a strong, optimistic message about healthy choices to our students. Once again we



aimed to increase student awareness of the range of information and support services available and strengthen links between the school and the community.

During September an evening for parents of junior students was held in partnership with Croydon Hills, Warranwood and Kalinda Primary Schools and Parkwood Secondary College. The evening was facilitated by Christine Daicos, who talked to parents about <u>Maintaining</u> <u>Resilience in the Adolescent</u>. This thought provoking workshop provided an overview of the recent research in the area of resilience and highlighted many practical strategies for assisting our young people to become socially competent, with a sense of autonomy and purpose. Chris outlined ways to develop problem-solving abilities in adolescents and the importance of caring relationships and involvement in family, school and community activities. Personally it was a tremendous experience working with local schools to organise a night that provided information, support and a chance to share experiences and was an excellent opportunity for the College and families to work together to promote decision making and problem solving skills which are so important for our young people.

All these programs, and many more organised by Year Level Co-ordinators and individual teachers, provided the foundations of our preventative approach to developing student social health and personal well-being.

Norwood continues to benefit from the Support Services of Barbara Wilson-Brown, our school psychologist and Virginia Donald and Robyn Reid, our two social workers. Each of these support staff visit the school at different times of the week and are available to discuss issues with parents that affect the education of their children and to work with students who require counselling. It has been a privilege to work with such a talented and committed group of people.

During the year, via the college newsletter, Compass, I have highlighted many resources which may be useful to parents and students. I would encourage families to access information from websites and use community resources, which can provide recreational opportunities and support services for parents and young people.

Thanks to every staff member for your flexibility and wonderful support. Best wishes to all our students, especially our departing Year 12 students.

HEALTH EDUCATION

Health Education incorporates a number of different subjects at Norwood.

Driver Education continues to be a very popular study with the Year 10's. While most of the classes are theory based, the students particularly look forward to their practical driving experiences. During the semester, the students have the opportunity to go driving with Road Skill Driver Training at METEC - an off-road driving centre in Kilsyth. The College really appreciates the continuing support of Neville Leone of the **Road Skill Driver Training.** A number of guest speakers also complement the classroom curriculum. Mr Peter Matthews, a local mechanic, speaks to the students about basic maintenance of a car and what to look out for when purchasing a used car. The Victoria Police gave a presentation to students about road safety. One particularly effective video the students watch is called 'Muck-up Day'. This video, based on a true story, gives a very graphic representation of the huge impact of road trauma.

At the Junior School level, students study Home Economics and Health Education. In Home Economics they examine the influences on food choice and basic nutrition. In their practical classes they prepare a number of nutritious products. In Health Education a range of issues related to adolescence are studied. Sexuality, Drug Education and Relationships form a basis for the curriculum.

At Middle School all students have a semester of Health Education in Year 9. Our very successful program has incorporated a number of activities to reinforce class theory. Once again, Norwood participated in the 'Players in Schools' program sponsored by the TAC. The program involves a number of players from an AFL club speaking to students about positive and negative risk-taking. Mandy Hudson from the Jean Hailes Foundation ran an interactive workshop with each class, looking a number of issues related to sexuality. Some classes designed and produced their own board games based on the major topics studied. The students were then involved in assessing each group's board game by playing the games and rating against criteria.

Health 2000, a Year 10 unit examined a range of health issues affecting the Australian community. A guest speaker from **REFS** (Ringwood Extended Family Service) explained about the issue of 'homelessness' in the Ringwood area and what services are provided by REFS. The **Australian Kidney Foundation** provided a speaker to educate students about organ donation and the ethical issues associated.

The particular highlight for the Child Development students was the excursion to **Mitcham Private Hospital**. Students tour the birthing suite and nursery. One aspect of the excursion that tends to stick in their mind is the sight and feel of a fresh placenta.



This year there were seventy-five students studying Health and Human Development at VCE level. The Year 11 students participated in the 'Baby Think It Over' program. Each student was required to look after a 'baby' for 72 hours. This required them to get up several times during the night to care for their 'baby'. Although the students tend to be tired and cranky by the time they hand the 'baby' back, they and their parents agree it is a very worthwhile program. One parent comment was as follows 'It gave us an opportunity to 'remember'

and discuss things that would not have come up otherwise'. During Term Three, **Dawn Rowan**, a renowned family counsellor spoke to the Year 11's about relationships. Dawn gave the students a lot of food for thought and hopefully this will have a positive impact on the future relationships of the students.

The Year 12 classes became very knowledgeable about nutrition, the Australian Health Care System, growth and development across the lifespan and genetic and environmental influences on health and development. Health in the developing world is particular interesting aspect of the curriculum and opened the students' eyes to health issues facing the world.


HEALTHIER NATION SYMPOSIUM 2002


Middle School Foods Technology



TECHNOLOGY STUDIES REPORT


This year the Technology Department has taught a wide range of units including Textiles, Woodwork, Metalwork, Plastics and Home Economics at Year 7 and Year 8. It has been a very busy year for our staff and students who have designed and built a wide range of models from money boxes and pencil cases in Year 7 to cabinets, coffee tables and electric guitars in the senior classes.



These classes have given the students a taste of the various types of Technology areas available at Norwood and the students have been very enthusiastic and hardworking in their Technology class.

The year 11 and 12 VCE Design and Technology Studies classes have made a wide variety of products and have shown that they possess high levels of skill and good design sense. The students have completed a range of projects including tables, cabinets, and chests of drawers. The Year 11 class began the year by making a cabinet with a drawer and an inlaid chess-top using thin veneers, they were then given the opportunity to design and build their own model.

They have produced a range of their own models using their practical skills and some very creative designs during the year. The year 12 Design and Technology students have produced some work of a very high standard. This has included two very well finished electric guitars and some one off designs for cabinets and furniture. These projects were built and designed for a client and involved over coming some very difficult practical problems to produce the final solution.



The Middle school students have continued to build tables, stools, and models of there own choice in Woodwork and have gained valuable skills in the process. They have also turned bowls on the wood lathes and designed cabinets and shelves to suit their own needs.

In Electronics, the Middle school students have built electronic sirens, flashing units, two-tone doorbells, and other circuits using integrated chips. Their soldering skills have improved greatly and they have produced some excellent work.

The Middle school students in Metalwork have built models ranging from a small carry box, go-cart frames to motor bike stands and skate board grind poles and have enjoyed developing their skills during this production time.



The Electronics students in the of VCE Systems and Technology course have been busy building on their knowledge of circuits and systems and the students have then used their knowledge to build house alarms, upgrade computers, build intercoms and put electronics systems together.

In conclusion the Technology Studies Department has had a very busy and enjoyable 2002 and our students have produced excellent models and learned valuable skills in projects ranging from garments in Textiles through to circuits in Electronics.

ICTS – THE YEAR AT NORWOOD

2002 has brought about a huge increase in the Information & Communications Technology opportunities available to staff and students.

Some key events included:

- 1. The introduction of a new interactive intranet (eWorkspace).
- 2. Extension of the Virtual Classroom system to nearly a thousand students.
- 3. Participation in the ICT Achievers Program, culminating in Kristian and Alex showing work at the Melbourne Exhibition Centre.
- 4. Making the intranet and Virtual Classrooms available to the college community 24 hours a day from anywhere on the Internet.
- 5. Wiring of the A wing to provide network access for classes.
- 6. Provision of a network point at all desks in staff common rooms.
- 7. The delivery of 32 new ACER computers, which have been deployed in the resource centre and LOTE suite.
- 8. On-Line auction of "end-of-life-cycle" equipment.
- 9. Introduction of reports updating from home.
- 10. Making the library catalogue and resource centre web site available to families from anywhere on the Internet.
- 11. Introduction of a message board for Norwood's past students.
- 12. Total upgrade of the library software.

The most significant of these is the new intranet. Improved communication is a goal of the staff, and the intranet provides a means for sharing of all manner of resources, and an excellent mechanism for interacting with student and providing feedback on work. Over the past six months staff have been putting many resources on the intranet in preparation for the 2003 school year. The new intranet, which is available to all staff, students and their families, provides a safe structure for communication between classes, individuals, Teacher/Student interaction and for collaboration and discussion on a variety of topics.

For the intranet to be used effectively at Norwood, teachers need to be able to access the college network easily. To make this as easy as possible, all teachers' desks have been fitted with a network access cable to allow their laptop to be used at the desk. Most classrooms also have an access point. This allows both teachers and students access to the full range of software available on the Norwood network using the trolley of laptops that is available to be booked for any class.

2003 looks exciting as well, with the advent of access to home directories from home over the Internet, an intranet upgrade, room upgrades and more. Most importantly though, our equipment is ready to be used as a communications mechanism to broaden the learning opportunities of our students, and to involve the family and home environment more in student learning through Internet access to college resources. Teachers have spent considerable time in Professional Development this year and in preparing new opportunities for learning next year. We look forward to expanding our role in the community with ICT's.
