## From the Principal

2003 has been a year of extremes of emotions for our College community. We have shared in a number of tragedies affecting our students and staff. In contrast, we have relished in wonderful successes achieved by our student body.

The College community has grieved for the loss of a number of our parents, ex-students and Peter Dudley our beloved teacher and colleague. We have supported each other throughout these difficult times and as a result become stronger as a community. Through Peter's death, it has again been shown the impact that teachers have on their students. The large number of parents and students who attended his memorial service, the significant donations to his Family Trust and the willingness of both our current and ex-students to organise and participate in a memorial concert are heartwarming examples of the support our community can offer to its members.

During the year, our students have achieved magnificent successes in a number of areas. Our Unit 3/4 VCE results set a new benchmark for success at Norwood. In sport we have also established new highs in both individual and team sports. The College was awarded the Eastern Metropolitan Region's award for Outstanding School Achievement in Physical and Sport Education and was also the Eastern Zone Athletic Champion (both for the first time ever). Additionally, we won State Championships in a number of sports. Students throughout all year levels have achieved high academic results, individual personal achievements and accolades from within and outside the College. There have also been significant successes in music, debating, acting and leadership. I believe that our students enjoy their learning and grow personally from participating in the many and varied activities available at our College.

In 2003 Norwood has continued to grow as a preferred college for local students. As a result, due to the constraints of our site and facilities, we will be limited in our total student number from 2004 and beyond. A site ceiling of 1100 has been established by DEST.

This year Norwood farewells a number of teaching staff who have made a significant contribution to the education of students in Victoria and in particular at Norwood. We farewell John Wise, Allan Carter, Jan Howard, Pauline Kallaur and Robin Parker who, between them, have contributed 144 years to the Department of Education and Training, including 74 years to Norwood Secondary College. Norwood also farewells long serving support staff, Lorraine Bateson and Tricia Kristensen. We thank all of these people for their contribution and commitment to the education of young Australians.

Thank you to Geoff Castles and Jenny Mason for their support to me over the last 12 months, to the ancillary staff for their positive attitude and hard work with students, staff and parents and to the teaching staff for all their efforts with the students to improve student learning and embrace teaching and learning initiatives.

My thanks to the Yearbook Committee; Tim Allred, Becky Thatcher, Claire Annunziata, Kirsten Fry, Fiona Steart, Erin Taylor, Andreea Sasarman, Kate Nolland, Zuhal Zaher, Suzanne Faulkner and to Mrs Greenfield for all their work and efforts to coordinate and produce this record of 2003 at Norwood.

# A Tribute to the GREAT Mr. Dudley 29/1/58 - 18/7/03


How does one define greatness- is it being wealthy, being pre-eminent, at the pinnacle of one's career, being famous? If that is the definition of greatness then Peter Dudley would have shirked the title. Rather his being **great** in the eyes of all who knew him came from his modesty, sincerity, and helpfulness. Peter Dudley was a great human being-an inspiring teacher, a supportive colleague and wonderful husband and father to his wife Jo and sons Christopher, Luke and Josh. He was also a major contributor to the life of Norwood Secondary College for 21 years.

I remember as clearly as yesterday, the day he arrived at the school in 1982. I had been at the school for one year and was the youngest member of staff. When I walked into the staffroom on the first day back at school in 1982 I was introduced to this 'spunky' new art teacher. From that day onwards Peter and I became firm friends. He became an integral part of the Art department, bringing with him diverse skills and expertise. Peter had completed a major study in ceramics and became our own resident expert. Any questions to do with how to throw pots on the pottery wheel or how to fire the kiln, or how glazes responded to different temperatures were answered by him. Not only did he possess a fantastic knowledge in the Ceramics area, he had also completed a Design qualification. Within a couple of years Peter was teaching Graphic Communication to V.C.E. students (pretty amazing when this was usually reserved for teachers with far greater experience). Peter's wonderful ability to pass his knowledge onto students and guide them to achieve their best was evident year after year as his students scored very high marks in their folios- often in the top 10% in the State.

Peter also was very interested in film and video. Once again this interest enabled him to support Rosemary Homersham in the running of the Media area. We would always see Pete on sports days walking around taking shots of everyone. This year he created a video of students involved in peer support activities. He taught the staff how to use the digital camera and how to scan images. Another area where Pete excelled was in his knowledge of computers and their application to the design field. He taught the staff how to use Corel Draw and Corel Paint. It was wonderful the way he could show students how these skills could be applied to a real design brief when he was asked to design footy jumpers for the Ansett Cup a number of years ago. Peter also taught Woodwork and Metalwork. Pete was also heavily involved in publicity for the College. Over a number of years, he designed the new fridge magnet, the old school jacket, school magazine covers, certificates, display board signs, anything and everything to do with College productions...and the list goes on.

Duddles was a **great** teacher- just ask the students that have had him over the years. His qualities as a human being (he exuded the Christian qualities that were so integral to his life) are what impressed all those he came in contact with. His willingness to assist, to give of himself, his compassion, his mild temper, his sense of humour made Peter Dudley a very special man and I count myself lucky, as do the other members of the Art department, (Helen Greenfield, Patrick O'Connor, Glenda Danger) to have had the privilege to have worked so closely with and shared our lives with him for 21 years.

I drove past a church the other day and on the sign outside it said "A Man Who Walks With God Finds His Destination".... Peter did just that. He was a credit to this College and to his family. We will sorely miss him.


#### **College Captains**

#### **VYDP: Australian Navy Cadets**



Now the school has a focal point, a place where students can meet for a prefects' investiture, a careers information night, to produce a play, or just for badminton or Phys. Ed.


The staff has used it for drama classes, choir and orchestra and the new "Culture Period" for Form 3.


Norwood was able to have a Gymnastics Club and to hold the Concert and Social "at home."


We have a new role in the community: to lend the Hall to others, such as the district's primary schools for their music festivals.



# **English**

Another school year has flown past and as always it is with sadness and joy that we watch another group of Year 12 students graduate and set off to make their way in the world.

As always the students of Norwood are a pleasure to work with and the standard of work that is produced never fails to impress. This year I have seen some excellent work on *The Gathering*, in particular, the PowerPoint presentations that explained the events in the novel were innovative and very enjoyable to view. Year 9 students also showed great inventiveness in an assignment they were set by a teaching student. They were split into groups and asked to read a story, which they then had to present in visual form so that viewers could understand what was happening. The responses really impressed upon me the high quality of students we have at this school. Work produced by our students can be viewed on the school intranet.



Norwood students again performed very well in the AIM test. Results again were very favourable when compared with schools around the state. Many of our students also participated in The Australian Schools English and Writing Competitions. Again our results showed that Norwood students are as good as any around Australia.

This year again saw our students attend several performances. Year 12 students attended a screening of *The Third Man* and a performance of *Dedipus* Rex. Many students commented upon how their understanding of the texts had been improved by attending these excursions. *Romeo and Juliet* was again well received by Year 10 students whilst Year 8 students again benefited from a performance of *The Hurting Game*, a play that examines peer relationships.





## **Artist In Residence**


Norwood was indeed fortunate to have STAX, as our College Council funded Artist In Residence, for the duration of May, this year. STAX began playing the didgeridoo in 1997, after receiving one as a gift and is now a seasoned teacher, maker and performer. The program enabled him to work with students from Year 7 through to Year 12, across many Key Learning Areas including Technology, Art, Music, History, Mathematics, English, Science, Geography, Drama and Physics, and with a quarter of the staff. Three Year 8 classes were chosen to manufacture twelve didgeridoos, some from hollow logs STAX had collected on a trip to Darwin. Only hand tools were used to fashion the logs such as a draw blade, spokeshave and rasps. The students were able to gain an understanding of what it is like to work with bark, under-bark, Sap Wood, Heart Wood, various grains, glues, varnishes, sandpapers and beeswax. The didgeridoos were decorated with hand ground ochre paints or by burning designs into the surface. Some wonderful drawings now have pride of place on these unique pieces of art. STAX presented the finished didgeridoos to the College and they now form part of our permanent art collection.


Allan Carter's Year 8 English class investigated the myths and legends of the Dreamtime and then wrote many delightful and entertaining stories of their own, which they also illustrated. In the Music classes the students were taught to play this ancient wind instrument, producing a haunting and captivating sound.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank STAX for his outstanding contribution to our College program. Your visit, enthusiasm, talent and love for the didgeridoo has indeed enriched us all and we now have a dozen fabulous mementos as a constant reminder of a sensational residential artist at Norwood.



# **Technology Studies**

This year the Technology Department has taught a wide range of units including Textiles, Woodwork, Metalwork, and Plastics at the Junior levels. It has been a very busy year for our staff and students who have designed and built a wide range of models from aluminium boxes and wind chimes in Junior classes to cabinets chess tables and home entertainment cabinets in the senior classes. These classes have given the students a taste of the various types of Technology areas available at Norwood and the students have been very enthusiastic and hardworking in their Technology class.

The year 11 and 12 V.C.E. Design and Technology Studies classes have made a wide variety of products and have shown that they possess high levels of skill and good design sense. The students have completed a range of projects including tables, cabinets, and chests of drawers. The Year 11 class began the year by making a cabinet with a drawer and have then produced a range of their own models using their practical skills and some very creative designs during the year.

The year 12 Design and Technology students have produced some work of a very high standard. This has included two very well finished T.V. cabinets and some one off designs for cabinets and furniture. These projects were built and designed for a client and involved over coming some very difficult practical problems to produce the final solution.


The Middle school students have continued to build tables, stools, and models of their own choice in Woodwork and have gained valuable skills in the process. They have also produced coffee tables and designed cabinets and shelves to suit their own needs.

In Electronics the Middle school students have built electronic sirens, flashing units, two-tone doorbells, and other circuits using integrated chips. Their soldering skills have improved greatly and they have produced some excellent work.

The Middle school students in Metalwork have built models ranging from silver plated candle holders to copper tankards and steel cricket stumps and have enjoyed developing their skills during this production time.

The Electronics students in the of V.C.E. Systems and Technology course have been busy building on their knowledge of circuits and systems and the students have then used their knowledge to build house alarms, upgrade computers, build remote controlled cars and put electronics systems together.

In conclusion the Technology Studies Department has had a very busy and enjoyable 2003 and our students have produced excellent models and learned valuable skills in projects ranging from garments in Textiles through to circuits in Electronics.

#### V.C.E Food and Technology



## **Health Education**

There has been a range of learning experiences provided to the students studying Health Education related subjects from Years 7 – 12.

At Junior School students look at a number of factors related to change in their lives and the associated decisions that may have to be made that may affect health. Drug Education is one part of the curriculum - Year 7 students look at the use of tobacco and the Year 8 students examine issues related to the use of alcohol and cannabis in today's society. A new unit about health issues in developing countries sparked the interest of Year 8 students. As part of this unit the students contributed to gift boxes to be sent to children/young people in need in a developing country.

Health Education at Middle School incorporates a number of different units. All Year 9 students complete a semester of Health Education. Ms Hobbs and Mrs Bato guide their students through a number of innovative activities to assist the students in making decisions to enhance their health. Speakers throughout the semester provide a different perspective on some of these issues. The AFL 'Players in Schools' program and The Jean Hailes Foundation sexuality workshops were enthusiastically received by the students.

A response from SAM, a Year 9 student, to the issue of body image.

'Today, teenagers all around the world share one thing in common - the need to have the right image. To 'get' the right image, you need to be aware of many different things. You need to know exactly what to wear, exactly what to say, exactly how to act. If you don't know exactly what to do, then your peers make you feel as though your life is not worth living. Having your own opinion about things is usually not an option. Someone somewhere in the world makes all the decisions for you. Someone somewhere can influence you to do almost anything, just to

gain the right image.

But why do we even want the right image? Why on earth does anyone want to be popular? Because we want to be COMPLETELY accepted. Completely accepted by everyone. We want to be known of in every school. We want to have the busiest and best social life imaginable. It's in human nature to want to reach the top in everything. And popularity is the top of the teenage - social-chain. And in order to get to the top of this chain, we need to have the right image.

Gaining the right image is simple enough. You need to know the right people, wear the right clothes, listen to the right music, watch the right TV shows, have the right house and live in the right area. You usually need to be wealthy (or be able to fool people into thinking you are wealthy). You need to be smart, but be an average student who can make smart comments. You need to be one thing, and

also its opposite. Getting the exact right image is actually impossible.

The 'image' is of perfection. But if no one is perfect, then how can someone obtain this image? If someone tries desperately to get the right image (which is also ever changing) and don't succeed, then they are labelled a 'try-hard' and are forced to keep this stigma forever. If you stuff up when trying to get the right image then you are labelled, and that label will never leave. Image is ever changing. Image changes because fashion changes. Or does fashion change because image does? Who first influences us? Who first decides what is and is not fashionable? Who first

makes all our decisions for us? Just so that we can fit in? When will we make our own free choices, free of the opinions of those who consider us inferior? When will we be free to be ourselves?"

More that half of the Year 10 students had the exciting experience of practical driving as part of the Driver Education unit. Groups of students are taken to METEC for their off-road driving experience. This practical experience, provided by Neville Leone of Road Skill Driving School, compliments the classroom curriculum perfectly. Mr Peter Matthews, a local mechanic, willingly gives of his time to instruct students about basic car maintenance and what to look out for when purchasing a used car. The Victoria Police and a TAC video called 'Muck-up Day' present the students with very graphic representations of the huge impact of road trauma.

## **Health Education**

The Year 10 studying 'Health in the 21st Century' examined health issues facing the Australian community. Examples of issues include homelessness in the Ringwood area, and ethics related to medical procedures. The Child Development students have a number of experiences to remember. The excursion to Mitcham Private Hospital often sticks in their mind as the students get to see the birthing units, the nursery and a placenta. An innovation this year has been the opportunity for the students to spend some time at a childcare centre where students can observe the various stages of development of the under 5's. Norwood wishes to thank Georgina from Creative Play, Early Learning Child Care Centre and Carol from North Ringwood Community Children's Centre for providing the Year 10 students with this experience.

The VCE students (all 85 of them) have been working hard all year participating in a range of learning activities and preparing for SAC's. The Year 12 students now look at the foods that they are consuming a little more carefully – 'now what nutrients are in this?' they have a greater understanding of the Australian Health Care system and health issues facing Australia and the developing world. One of the highlights for the Year II's is the 'Baby Think It Over' program

'By doing Health and Human Development Units 1 & 2, I had the privilege of taking part in the 'Baby Think It Over' program. The program was set up to provide an insight for young adults, as to what it would be like if they were to have a baby. Now, I'm not the 'maternal' type of person, but having to look after the baby really brought out that side of me. Don't get me wrong though, the baby was a nightmare at times; crying all hours of the night for ridiculous amounts of time; the hand cramps I got from holding the 'damn' key in it's back, and having to juggle the baby and books at school. But in saying all this, I would gladly do it again. Some might think that's crazy. It was one huge learning experience that you just can't get unless you have a baby, and I think everyone should think about doing it. How else can you appreciate the responsibilities of a young parent?



# Languages Other Than English (LOTE)

Last year I started my survey of LOTE at Norwood by mentioning the tragedy in Bali. A year on we are still living with the aftermath of this event but can be happy that gradually things are returning to normal. We have not organised a Bali tour this year but, hopefully, next year we shall feel confident enough. Our students gain so much from experiencing the language they learn, in the country where it is spoken, that teachers of Indonesian are keen to re-establish contacts and tour again.

On a happier note, our Middle School Indonesian classes enjoyed tasting Indonesian food in their classes, while the Year 10 Indonesian students went to Camberwell to Melati Restaurant and enjoyed Balinese food in an authentic setting.

The French students did go overseas last year to Nouvelle Calédonie. The students discovered the joys of speaking French in a real environment and spent a lot of time enjoying the sun and the beaches. We are currently investigating the possibility of going next year, possibly early in the year to accommodate more senior students. ## **Maths**

Students in 2003 were again exposed to the cerebral joys of Mathematics. Year 7's gained insights into the powers of algebra, through to Year 12's who discovered that some numbers are imaginary, some are complex, and the rest are surreal. They also had the thrill of investigating the cooling rates of baby bottles!

Norwood's Mathematics teachers once again worked 'above and beyond' to provide outstanding service (and PATIENCE) to their students. Below is a summary of Mathematics Week, as submitted by Mrs. Schroder.

'Last week the College celebrated Maths Week and numerous activities were on offer to enable students to test their Mathematical prowess. There were Problems on the Daily Notices each day in Senior, Middle and Junior School categories, with the first neatest, correct entry drawn receiving a prize.

The Year 7 students excelled themselves in creating colourful mathematical posters. These will be judged later this week.

The Year 8 students participated in a "Sale of the Century" knockout quiz. Teams of three students from each form solved mathematical problems in their heads, with the first correct answer within the 15-second time limit earning the points. As two points were deducted for incorrect answers, the scores fluctuated markedly. 8B and 8G won their heats and 8G came out overall champions. The chocolate prizes were well appreciated.

The Chess competition proved extremely popular with over 40 students competing during lunchtime each day. The overall winner was Michael Cousins (Year 8) and runner up was Kris Truman (Year 7).

A mini Lotto competition ran each day. All staff and students chose three numbers between I and 20. Three numbers were drawn out of a hat each day. If your numbers came up, you won a prize. Out of a school population of approximately 1100 people, there was only one winner on only one day! This exercise was useful in pointing out to the students just how difficult it is to win the real Tattslotto. Overall a lot of fun was had, and hopefully a greater appreciation of the Mathematical Learning area was attained.'

The most recent Nevanlinna award winner, Madhu Sudan (the Mathematics 'Nobel' prize) was linked to his work on the insights and advances in applicable techniques in such different areas as computational complexity, efficient (randomised) checking of proofs, programs and polynomials, approximation algorithms, NP-complete optimisation, and error-detection and error-correction algorithms in coding theory. If this sounds 'irrelevant' or 'pointless', then consider these consequences; better and faster processors for your computers, cheaper and better and faster components for your cars, stereos, televisions etc. better software for designing, manufacturing, including quality control, more accurate weather forecasting faster and electronic data transfer.

# Information Technology

The Information Technology students from Year 7 to Year 12 have produced a diverse range of products. These students had an opportunity to use a wide selection of software and the digital cameras and scanners were also used extensively.

The Year 7 students put together some very informative PowerPoint Presentations stressing the importance of Road Safety. The Year 7's also created some professional looking business cards and bookmarks which they had great fun laminating. The students used Excel to complete graphs for a maths project based on data collected from their physical education classes. A number of students were also involved in creating the Year 7 Snap Shots of Norwood Presentation for Open Night. Numerous lunchtimes were spent perfecting the presentation and these students should be very proud of their efforts.

Middle school students had the opportunity to manipulate figures, create clever formulas and graphs using Excel. While others developed simple databases and managed to create queries and reports for imaginary organisations. FrontPage was used as the basic tool to develop a series of team websites on topics selected by the team members. Creative, educational and entertaining children's picture storybooks were produced using PowerPoint. These picture books were presented to Ringwood Heights Primary School for their use. Another group of student's created a variety of publisher products, including CD covers, laminated business cards and 2004 calendars to use next year and an extensive series of educational flashcards for students in East Timor. The programming students were responsible for all manner or clocks, quizzes, auctions and games to test on their unsuspecting friends.

The VCE students completed numerous SACs either individually or as part of a team. Websites with clever animations and imaginative photo manipulation were the favoured choice for students in Information Technology while the Information Processing and Management students were more concerned with written components of the sites. A small band of dedicated Year II students spent two lunch times a week for most of the year developing the SWISH site. The site stemmed from Claire Snowdon and Cherrie Hjorth's desire to provide students at the college with as much information as possible about issues that were important to them in a format that was accessibly and appropriate to their needs. With this in mind Alan King, Jaye Hadlum-Jones, Dale Hughes, Damian Ciccotelli, Benn Pollock and Adam Tyson-Brown set about putting the site into reality. This was a great team effort that the boys can be well pleased with. The Systems students spent time pulling computers apart and putting them back together again, as well as setting up a network, analysing and designing systems and programming a variety of projects.

The ICT Teaching Team have enjoyed the opportunity of working with the IT students of 2003. The learning experience has been a two-way situation from teacher to student and student to teacher. We have learnt a great deal from the students throughout the year and we look forward to learning more next year.

### Careers

This year started off with the task of contacting all students, mainly those in Year 12, who had left Norwood last year. It was enlightening to hear about the various destinations of students. E.g. from joining Camp USA in Dakota for six months, starting a Hairdressing apprenticeship in Ringwood, moving to Sydney, enrolling in RMIT's Journalism course, visiting relatives in Greece, seeking full time work, studying Human Movement at the University of Ballarat, beginning a Ski instructors' course at Latrobe University (Mt Buller campus), doing an electrical pre-apprenticeship to working part-time in a chicken shop. Reviewing where students were six months later, it was pleasing to hear that nearly all of those who were originally unemployed at the beginning of the year had now obtained full time employment. Almost everyone who had commenced University or TAFE studies or apprenticeships was still continuing.

A number of excursions were organized this year, particularly for students considering options other than higher education studies. Visiting the Swinburne Apprenticeship Expo, the Plumbing and Electrical departments of Box Hill Institute and Holmesglen TAFE taster program gave participating students an insight into what it would be like to study a trade at a TAFE.

The visit to Deakin University by a group of Year 11 and 12 students interested in Teaching and Health Science courses was an "eye opener" for many. Realizing the vast size and layout of a University campus was a new experience.

A careers afternoon was organized in June for Year 12 students to investigate their career options. To cater for different interests, representatives from the Australian Defence Force, Victoria Police, Apprenticeships Victoria and University and TAFE faculties in Engineering, Health Science, Criminal Justice, Hospitality, Teaching, Computer Science, Arts, Business, Design and Hospitality spoke to students. In many cases this started "the ball rolling" for some to begin the task of working out what they intended to do the following year.

A large number of Norwood students aim to continue studies beyond year 12 and enroll in University or TAFE higher education courses. In July, the annual Tertiary Information Service (TIS) event was held at the Lilydale campus of Swinburne University. The search continued with the numerous Open Days held on the weekends by tertiary institutions to advertise their course offerings.

In the last week of Term 2, Year 10 students undertook work experience in a work place of their own choosing. During the week, many teachers volunteered to visit, resulting in most students being seen. Feedback from teachers was again very positive with many commenting on how they enjoyed the opportunity to see students in a different setting. Employers also expressed similar sentiments about student conduct and attitude. Following this program, many Year 10 students and parents attended the annual Career Think night held in the college library where guest speakers covered University, TAFE, VCAL and apprenticeships options.

Throughout the year a number of events were advertised in the College Compass and Year 12 Careers Newsletter. The Eastland Career Expo in August was again well received with more than five thousand people attending the two and half hour event. Norwood students and parents again availed themselves of the opportunity to obtain pamphlets and advice from eighty organizations about available options.

In order to assist students to work out their career goals and the steps necessary to achieve them, Year 10, 11 and 12 students were individually interviewed this year. Many students had particular career interests. Joining the Police Force, becoming a Teacher, Psychologist or Carpenter were the most popular vocations. Those unsure of their career interests had the opportunity to do the Career Voyager Vocational Testing program, which based on their interests, provided suggestions of some vocations worth investigating.

I thoroughly enjoyed working in this role this year, and look forward to continuing to do so next year.

# ICŢ

2003 has seen a number of exciting developments in the ICT area at Norwood. Many of these have been hardware based, and have improved the experience for students through better resolution and speed across the network.

At the very start of the year staff and students had two fully refurbished computer labs to use in rooms BI and B3. 56 new desktop computers were installed in these rooms, which were much faster and versatile than the older computers.

Unfortunately these new computers still took a long time to log in. To fix this, a long awaited network upgrade was undertaken to give network traffic a much fatter pipe to travel. This allowed a lot more data to travel between the servers and the computers in the same amount of time, so all computers across the college received a significant boost in performance.

The new computers in the Resource Centre and BI/B3 also have sound and USB sockets in the front. This has meant that students may use headphones more easily, and can also use USB memory sticks for the first time. These are very handy gizmos, which act like a portable disk drive. They are much more reliable than floppy disks, and can hold a good deal more data than a floppy. This means that students with large PowerPoint presentations, or assignments with large graphics files can be brought to and from school safely and reliably.

Microsoft keep bringing out new operating systems, and Norwood has had to carefully weigh each of these up with its needs and current infrastructure. Windows 98, Millennium Edition, Windows 2000 and Windows XP have all been released since Norwood set the operating system used on the computers at the College. Norwood has been using Windows NT.

In order to fully benefit from the network and hardware upgrades, the college computers had the operating system upgraded from Windows NT to Windows 2000 in the Term 3 break. Mr Markham and Mr George spent many, many hours preparing for this major upgrade, and student response on the first day back in term 4 made every hour worthwhile. USB memory sticks and web cameras now work properly, and the speed is phenomenal. The games (Pinball in particular) have proved distracting for some students though!

In Term 2, builders came in to refurbish the computer suites into our current computer pods. This involved upgrading furniture and windows to allow safer use and better supervision. Music received an upgrade and a new small lab area was established in the Portables block. Some of these spaces have a printer installed, and next year all pods will have printing available. The level of vandalism has been disappointing in the last half of the year, with some students damaging equipment in the pods. When the equipment damage stops, we look forward to putting higher quality computers in these areas.

Finally, three new servers have been introduced which will speed up the network performance even further. This will allow the new software titles (Swish, Paint Shop Pro and Animation Studio) to perform better for our students in 2004. One of these will act as a terminal server for the C5 computer room.

The college intranet has been a pivotal aspect of ICT use at Norwood Secondary College this year, with staff and students contributing many resources and swapping assignments, grades and feedback. We look forward to even more involvement with the intranet across the college next year.

## **Student Welfare**

Norwood continues to work hard to enhance the well-being of all our students. This year has seen the development of further programs and practices to increase student learning and help students develop as healthy, secure and resilient young people. It has been a year of great achievements as a range of programs has provided students with opportunities for personal growth and challenge. Students at each year level have participated in activities that aim to increase their connection to the school and boost confidence and competence in problem solving and decision making skills.

The Peer Support Program helped develop positive new relationships between peers and senior students. Due to the efforts of Peer Support leaders, Year 7 students felt more knowledgeable and comfortable in their new environment and learnt more about each other and how the school works. More senior students trained as VCE Supportive Friends, increasing their knowledge of help-seeking skills and directing friends to support services when concerned about their well-being. We appreciate the maturity and commitment shown by students in these programs and acknowledge the positive impact they have on fellow students.

We have offered groups to Year 7, 9 and 10 students building communication and conflict resolution skills and a series of stress management and meditation workshops for senior students. Year 8 students participated in activities with elite athletes who encouraged students to believe in themselves and achieve their dreams.

Year 10, 11 and 12 students participated in activities related to mental health, sexual health and drugs including alcohol. Informative presentations emphasised a preventative approach to health care and provided current data on adolescent health issues. Students were encouraged to care for themselves and their friends and to use services in the community as sources of information and support.

Currently we are organizing a forum for Year 8 and 9 students and their parents on Party Safe for Adolescents. Norwood, Parkwood and Maroondah Secondary Colleges are hosting this evening with speakers from the region providing information and strategies on how to host a safe party and issues around teenage drinking. It is a great experience working with local schools to organise nights that provide information, support and a chance for the College and families to work together.

All these programs, and many more organised by Year Level coordinators and individual teachers, provided the foundations of our preventative approach to developing students' ability to make safe and healthy choices.

We have been fortunate in having a great team at Norwood to support students, families and staff. We have been pleased to welcome Mike Enticott, a full-time youth worker who began in late Term I, and Kylie McGregor, a psychologist from Student Support Services. Together with Virginia Donald and Robyn Reid, both social workers, they have been developing supportive relationships with students through involvement in different groups, activities and individual counseling. These workers can assist Norwood students in a range of ways so we encourage parents and students to let us know of concerns.

Thanks to every staff member for your flexibility and wonderful support. Best wishes to all our students, especially our departing Year 12 students.

Both Seniors and Juniors had one win, one draw and one loss at zone, both narrowly missing on playing in the Eastern Zone Grand Final- another excellent result.


