### CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT 1978/79.

When I took over the chair vacated by Dennis Minnett in May last year, I was not aware of the giant personality behind the man. Nevertheless, with careful steps I have started along the road so admirably marked out, and little by little have become more hopeful of dealing with some of the tasks ahead,

My first move was to go overseas in July and August and it was not until October that the business of chairing D.A. started to take on some shape. With the immense help of D.C. David Graham and the executive, a start was made to study the financial set up of the groups in the Ringwood D.A., and it was, I believe, a successful move. We all learned that each group handled the money-raising problem differently and in all cases successfully achieved their aims. It would seem though that there is room for considering a standard fund raising procedure throughout D.A. but maybe that should be a future project.

In December, an excellent joint meeting was held to study and comment on the future role of D.A. and where we can improve its operation. This has to be followed up in the next month to see if any significant improvements have occured.

I must admit I have been somewhat disappointed at the lack of support by the Groups to the monthly D.A. meetin gs. I had hoped that those meetings would be an exhilarating meeting of minds and ideas with the one aim - to further the Scouting Movement and, above all, to help our young people. Try and make future meetings fully represented and feed in to D.A. exciting thoughts and ideas.

Early this year, one of our Groups, 2nd Ringwood, lost their club rooms in a fire lit by unknowns. A wave of sympathy went through the Distric t and help was offered from all sides. Let us hope that this old and active group soon has a permanent home.

It was with some astonishment that subsequent to a comment I made in Council, that I received sharply worded criticism of this Scout Hall, and it appeared to me that this may be the tip of the iceberg. I therefore as k all groups in this International Year of the Child 1979, to thoroughly look at your position in the Community, be critical of the state of your clubrooms and the ground around them, and above all go out into the streets meet all the neighbours and sell the Scouting Movement. Ask them for their views and opinions, get to know them and appreciate their grievances. Scouting has occupied a unique position if our society for many years - don't destroy it by being careless and unthinking towards others.

In conclusion, may I call on all parents to support the groups in every way and not leave it to the usual few. Work hard, have a successful year, and thank you for your support in 1978.

This year has been a mixed one for the Scout section. A full program of activities starting on Saturday afternoon gave more time to straighten up the camp craft side of things and this paid off in the standard of camping.

Our Water Activities Day was also well attended and an interesting comment was that every year the ability and confidence of the boys is noticeable.

Our biggest all-out effort as a District was the Year of the Child - Ringwood Family Fun Day in w hich we endeavoured - along with the Cub and Venturer Sections and the Guides and Brownies, to stage a demonstration to the public on what Scouting is all about. Despite the damp start, I think we succeeded.

lst Ringwood Rovers again organised a Lightning Football Premiership and this year 2nd Heathmont winning the day from 6th Ringwood with both teams getting some assistance from 4th Ringwood.

Cohen Shield this year saw 27 Patrols entered, an increase on last year's 24 Patrols. They found the competition very keen and aquitted themselves very we 11.

#### DISTRICT VENTURER LEADER'S REPORT:

This has been a mixed year in which some units have achieved a lot and some units have done virtually nothing. The achievements depend to an enormous extent upon the availability of trained and active Leaders in the units. In the last couple of months the leader situation has taken a change for the better and we can hope for better results next year. In saying this, I must give credit to those people who stood in and did so much to keep units together during the year.

We gained only one Queen's Scout during the year - Robyn Wilkins of 4th Ringwood.

The number of Venturers has again risen and stands at one hundred and three at the last count. Once again the increase has been to a large extent the result of girls joining rather than larger numbers of boys coming up from the Troops. This, of course, presents the problem of the dilution of Scouting skills in the units.

The major event of the year was the 5th Australian Venture and the District was well represented.

About forty per cent of the District's Venturers attended this year's Hoadley Hide at which the overall numbers were lower than last year. It is a pity that all units were not represented as the experience gained each year assists the first timers in the next Hide. Of the nine teams fielded, two became runners up for the Hide.

In December a Unit Chairman's meeting was held to discuss with chairmen and prospective chairmen, the functions of the Unit Council and the running of the Unit. This will be continued on a regular basis.

Two Initiative Courses were held during the year. These were set up by 1st Heathmont Rover Crew. Without the work put in by the Rovers we would have been unable to run these courses owing, simply, to the shortage of Leaders. In thanking the Crew for their assistance, I must add that I hope we may call on them again next year.

A number of Venturers attended a very interesting weekend last May run by Cheltenham, Bentleigh and Brighton Districts. This was a First Aid Instruction and Major Disaster Exercise organized and run by professionals. - 9 -

Venturers have again assisted at Ringwood Day.

This year has seen the starting of 2nd Ringwood Venturer Unit which means that every Group now has a Unit. I know that I do not need to point out to Groups that each Unit should have a V.L. and an A.V.L. if it is to operate well over a long time - but I will!

I feel that the District is getting a good footing for a successful year to come. Our numbers are up again, Leaders are coming forward and we should do well.

Finally I must thank the other members of the District staff, the G.L's and the Leaders, Warranted and un-Warranted, who have kept the Units operating during the year. Above all, thanks to the Venturers for being Venturers.
