

efit. (If this approach is used, the material must be gathered independently of each person involved).

** As A.A.C. Cubs, I shall be responsible for the co-ordination of the project and all information is to be forwarded to me as it is recorded. I shall also be available to Districts if they require further information or assistance.

In concluding I would emphasise the following points:-

- . The results of this survey will be of National interest.
- . It is not to be used as a reflection upon section leaders.
- . The end result will provide the Association with documented facts.
- . The survey is being conducted at the request of the Branch Commissioner.
- . East Suburban Area, as one of the largest Metropolitan Areas in the State must provide its share of the requested information.

Already we know of several Groups participating for the first time. J.O.T.A. posters for all Groups have been issued to Districts for distribution.





3. UPDATED TRAINING SYSTEM - 1979

1979 will herald a new look to the five stage adult leader training scheme in Australia. As a result of extensive reviews of the current system, the National Leader Training Council have introduced the following changes to the pre-warrant training system, effective as of January 1, 1979.

<u>STAGE 1.</u> $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours. This will cover the Aims and Principles of the Movement, Leader Commitment, Training, Youth Pressures and Needs, the Reason for Scouting and will give an informal opportunity to discuss problems and receive information on the leaders section.

STAGE 2. The District conducted Field Day plus the section meetings and visits will become the normal way that this training is conducted. The area covered in the field day remains the same; technical skills appropriate to the section, the group system, typical metting nights etc.

<u>STAGE 3</u>. This stage is to be conducted in two parts - one day, then a weekend. The one day will cover Programme Planning, the Award Scheme, Games and Section Methods. The weekend, normally a fortnight later, will cover the same topics already in the course but with more emphasis on practical activities, a segment on fundamentals and an opportunity for leaders to take part in a typical section meeting. Without fuss, without ceremony and completely spontaneously, boys themselves began forming Scout Troops all over the country.

From all quarters news of these Scout units, their adventures and difficulties, poured into the office of Baden-Powell had to establish to cope with enquires.

There is no need to talk of the way in which Scouting spread throughout the British Commonwealth and to other countries until it was established in practically all part of the free world.

Even to those countries where Scouting as we know it is not allowed to exist, acknowledge freely that they use its methods for their own youth training.

As inspector-General of Cavalry, B.P. reached the top of the tree as a Cavalry Officer.

The Baton of Field Marshal was within his grasp, but he retired from the Army in 1910 at the age of 53 on the advice of H.M. King Edward VII who prophesied that he would do more valuable service for his country with the Boy Scouts than anyone could hope to do as a soldier!

Thus it was that all his enthusiasm and vitality was directed to the development of Scouting and it's sister Movement, Guiding.

He travelled to all parts of the world, wherever he was most needed, to encourage their growth and to give them the inspiratton he alone could give.

In 1912 he married Olave Soames who was his constant help and companion in all this work and by whom he had three children - Peter, Heather and Betty.

Olave, Lady Baden-Powell, was known throughout the world as World Chief Guide until her death in 1977.

The first International Scout Jamboree took place at Olympia, London in 1920. At it's closing scene, B.P. was acclaimed unanimously as Chief Scout of the World.

(Successive International gatherings, whether of Scouts, of Rovers or of Scouters, have proved that his was not an honorary title, but that he was truly regarded by them all as their Chief.)

The shouts that heralded his arrival, the silence that fell when he raised his hand, proved beyond any doubt that here was one who had captured the hearts and imaginations of his followers in whatever country they owed allegiance.

The way his voice carried out, without modern scientific aid, to the furtherest Scout in a large crowd was in itself an inspiration.

B.P.'s life will be continued in the next issue of the Area Bulletin.

At the 3rd World Jamboree, held in Arrowe Park, Birkenhead, to celebrate the 21st Anniversary of the publication of "Scouting for Boys", B.P. was created a Peer.

He took the title, Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell.

Gilwell Park, England, being the International Training Centre for Scout Leaders.

Scouting was not B.P.'s only interest for he excelled at Pigsticking and Fishing and favoured Polo and Big-Game hunting.

He was an excellent black and white and water colour artist and took an interest in cinephotography and sculpture, exhibiting a bust of John Smith, the colonial pioneer, in the Royal Academy in 1907.

B.P. could draw with both his left and right hands and sometimes he would write with his right hand and sketch with his left hand at the same time. 12 - EAST SUBURBAN AREA BULLETIN, MARCH 1979

B.P. wrote no less than 32 books, the earnings from which helped him to pay for his Scouting travels. As with all his successors he received no salary as Chief Scout.

He received honorary degrees from Edinburgh, Toronto, Montreal, Oxford, Liverpool and Cambridge Universities and the freedoms of the Cities of London, Guilford, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Bangor, Cardiff, Hawick, Kingston-on-Thames, Poole, Blandford, Canterbury and Pontefract and in cities in other parts of the world.

In addition 28 Foreign Orders and decorations and 19 Foreign Scout Awards were bestowed upon him.

With it all he was modest. The honours were always attributed by him as the deserts of those who followed his ideas in their work with boys themselves.

Such a life might well seem full to overflowing. Every minute of B.P.'s life was "Sixty seconds worth of distance running".

Each new adventure was the subject for a book. Every happy incident or thought, every fine landscape might be the subject for a sketch.



In 1938, suffering from ill-health, B.P. returned to Africa, which had meant so much in his life, to live in semi-retirement at Nyeri, Kenya. No man ever deserved a rest more than he, and EAST SUBURBAN AREA BULLETIN, MARCH 1979 - 13 none found it more difficult to curb his energies. Sketches and books still came from his restless hands.

The Chief was "Called to Higher Service" on January 8th, 1941, at the age of 83. He lies in a simple grave at Nyeri within sight of Mt Kenya. On the headstone are the words, "Robert Baden-Powell, Chief Scout of the World", surmounted by the Boy Scout and Girl Guide Badges. His memory remains for all time in the hearts of millions of men and women, boys and girls.

It is for those who are, or have been, Scouts and Guides, to see that the two Movements he so firmly established for all times as living memorials to their Founder.
