# **PROGRESS AROUND THE SCHOOL 1985**

During the year the facilities sub-committee with School Council and a number of other people developed or renovated areas of the school. Some of this work has been accomplished with Education Department help; however, School Council has expended a considerable amount of time and finance towards many of the following items:

(a) Resheeting with asphalt and then surfacing with "flexipave" the tennis courts area to form four excellent tennis courts as well as two netball courts. This area looks splendid indeed with its colourful green courts, red surrounds and yellow and white lines.

(b) Reclamation of the old trampoline area by filling in the pits and surfacing an area slightly larger than a tennis court with a concrete slab. This has created a superb hard surface which has been very much appreciated by both students and staff for the conduct of a whole host of ball games.

(c) Construction of a room to be used by parents for meetings, discussions and simply relaxation. This room is adjacent to the general office area and its completion is due by the beginning of next year.

(d) The conduct, by the P.T.C.A., of a special effort, to raise monies for a class set of computers. This effort was not as well supported as we would have hoped; however, it has raised about \$3,500 which is a quarter of the way towards its objective.

(e) Completion of the pine-log fencing around each garden and lawn throughout the school. This has created not only a pleasant atmosphere for the school, it has provided an abundance of casual seating for our many students.

(f) Permission and funding from the Education Department have been given to commence a student bus terminal on the school's property with access from Great Ryrie Street. The completion of this project is eagerly anticipated.

(g) Tenders have been called by the Public Works Department to renovate the school's three portable classrooms.

(h) Application has been made to the Education Department for the external maintenance of the trades block as well as for an internal repaint and decoration of the total school. Council is hopeful of a positive response to this request as the school has not had total internal maintenance for over twelve years.

(i) Numbers of minor repairs and renovations made during the year by the school maintenance staff. Many thanks to Mr. R. Hoare, Mr. H. Budge and Mr. A. Hassell.


#### THE CIDER DECIDER


Two barrels, A and B, each contain some cider. Barrel A contains more than Barrel B.



#### **CIRRICULUM BOARD ACTIVITIES 1985**

The Curriculum Board is a sub-committee of the school council and is responsible for all the curriculum planning and changes in the school.

Most of the planning this year has been developing year 12 courses for 1986.

This is a big change for Ringwood Technical School. Next year will be the first year that this school has had year 12 courses. A lot of discussion has taken place with Swinburne College of T.A.F.E. to establish this school as an annexe of that College, and we will now be able to offer Applied Science students the opportunity to complete T.O.P. here. Technical year 12 courses in a variety of trade areas, Foods, Textiles, Building, Automotive, Electrical and Engineering have also been offered, and Business Studies are offering Group 2 H.S.C. studies in Secretarial and Business Studies.

A number of teachers have put in many hours work in planning courses which will offer a wide range of options for students.

The Curriculum Board also has planned to improve Bike Ed for students, and next year year 7 students will undertake a course which will be much longer, and go into a lot more detail. Students will have field days and will use bicycles purchased by the school especially for this program. Staff have been undertaking In-Service Education programs to prepare them for running this course.

The 20 bicycles and safety helmets were obtained from a grant of money from the Blue Light Disco organization.

There are big changes in how years 11 and 12 will be organized and what they will be studying in the future and the Curriculum Board will be very busy in helping to make those changes in Ringwood Technical School.

With the recent additional responsibilities given to Councils comes the opportunity to devise and develop the curriculum taught within the school. The curriculum development in accord with the Government guidelines is accomplished within the school by the School's Curriculum Board.

The Curriculum Bord is another sub-committee of Council consisting of the Council's Policy Committee, parent members acting in concert with six elected staff under the chairmanship of Mr. Michael Bradley, and it is the body which has been mainly responsible for the preparation for the school's Year 12 in 1986.

During the year, School Council had the opportunity of selecting from a large number of applicants a person to fill a vacant Vice-Principal position.

As a result of Council's recommendation, I am pleased to record that the Education Department has appointed Mr. Michael Bradley to the position of Vice-Principal "B". Naturally, Mr. Bradley will continue to co-ordinate the curriculum of the school, whilst Mr. Alan Bedggood (our Vice-Principal "A") will administer the school's operating procedures.

I am pleased to report that the Council has functioned in a most efficient and harmonious manner. The amount of work accomplished with regard to the general running of the school, the careful budgeting of finances, the care, maintenance and development of the building, surrounds and equipment, combined with the enthusiastic manner in which the school's curriculum has been developed, demonstrates for all to see the worth of this Council and its members.

# Staff vs Students Footy Match Coach to be sacked Ymer urged to resign

Football remains very much in the news at the moment with the imminent sacking of long-term Ringwood All-Stars coach, "Jumping Jimmy" Ymer. After an inglorious display where the team was totally annihilated by a more committed, disciplined and slightly fitter combination his head is very much on the chopping block. He looked a most disconsolate figure as he trudged from the ground after the match.

Problems began for the little man in early August when the original date for the game had to be rescheduled, after he caught his index finger in a helicopter propeller. The new date was a lunchtime, late in September. His late arrival to the ground on this new date did nothing to quell the nervousness of his players who were quoted as being "toey as Roman sandals".

It was now that he made two monumental mistakes which totally ruined any chance the team had of victory. He allowed the students to play with 23 players to the staff's 18, where in previous years the ratio has always been reversed (although it must be said in all honesty that the staff very rarely play with as few as 23!). If that wasn't enough to show that Ymer can no longer handle the pressure his appointment of umpires was. Mr. A. Bedggood, a known "student sympathiser", never looked like giving the staff a free kick, while Mr. A. Carbery was obviously inexperienced and unaware of the little techniques and subtleties which are such an important part of the teacher's game.

The game was a nightmare for the staff from the very start. The students out-ran, out-kicked, outhandballed, out-thought and out-scored the demoralized staff combination. Coach Ymer tried desperately to swing wholesale changes but, without his runner, who he had forgotten to arrange, his words of wisdom fell upon deaf ears. He was a lone figure waiting for the easy ball in the forward pocket.





The plight of the staff was made worse by the defection of its top players to the Basket Weaving Club. Household names such as "Hand Bag" Madigan, "Fang" Farrugia, "Tennis Anyone" Dunwoodie and "I'm not an animal" Preuss were sorely missed. While their dissatisfaction with Ymer's coaching was well known, and their bitter hatred of him as an individual legendary, some quick administrative negotiating behind the scenes may have secured new contracts with these players.

It now appears certain that "Jumping Jimmy" will not be coaching in 1986. But can a replacement be found from wthin a team whose only high point in the game was when "Kommo" floated across the back of the pack and pulled down his first screamer since the '67 season?

Stewart has the credentials, although his ignorance of handball is a worry. Massingham has the enthusiasm. All of his time on the field is spent asking directions to the nearest brick wall. His lack of finesse and general stupidity will probably go against him. Mrs. Byrne and Mrs. Barton, two new recruits to the team, are firm believers in fostering team morale. They subscribe to non-stop talking to team mates (and the opposition) throughout the match. B.K. Knox could be a dark horse and take the job in a non-playing capacity. He has vast experience in coaching a team of individuals with mixed abilities and personalities. The only question mark over him is his temperament. A lifetime following the "black and whites" indicates that he may not have the nerve for the job.





Ringwood gained 19 first places, six seconds and 15 thirds out of 50 events.



# **Mousemobile Derby Report**

#### IF AT FIRST YOU DON'T SUCCEED

The first problem was my mousemobile frame snapped into three pieces so I made another frame! It snapped because I tried to stop rolling resistance with oil which weakened the balsa wood. I then had to get another mousetrap because the other one fell apart. My next problem was I had to make bigger wheels. But with bigger wheels the rolling began to slow, so I greased the axle with grease because the balsa wood didn't absorb the grease as much as the oil, so it didn't weaken it as much. I then put a longer arm on it. I had to bend the arm a bit, because when the mousetrap had gone over, the arm rubbed on the left front left hand wheel. That is why I bent it slightly to the right. I then put bigger wheels on it which were 105mm radius.

It worked well on the mechanical room floor but it wouldn't run well on the floor in the hall. Because we ran out of time I couldn't do any more modifications. The only problem that it still had was that it ran crooked. Overall, I enjoyed making the mousemobile because it was a new experience.

#### THE MOUSEMOBILE DIARY

The first problem I encountered was that the mousemobile would not move! When I oiled the axles and wound it up again the mousemobile moved, but not very far. I then filed the wheels and smoothed them so there was not as much rolling resistance. My wheel size was 100mm radius. I soldered washers to the axles so that the wheels ran straight. But that was not the case at first. The solder stuck to the frame, but after I unsoldered them they rubbed against the frame causing rolling resistance.

The front wheels were out of alignment and the mousemobile turned to the right. I corrected this and the mousemobile ran straight. My lever was 210mm long. I first tied the string to the axle but this proved not to be good. So I attached a hook to the axle and put a loop in the string. I then hooked the string onto the hook and wound it up. The mousemobile moved about 17 metres. I then filed away the scrap solder that had run down the axle, and was causing friction, which was shortening the distance of the mousemobile.

My mousemobile was 450mm long and 70mm wide. My axles were made out of brass rodding with a diameter of 3.2mm. The lever was soldered to the mousetrap. The weight of my mousemobile was quite high. I finally got the alignment right. My mousemobile now went straight.

After I filed the axles and attached the hook the mousemobile went 24 metres. The hook allowed the string to let go before all the string had wound off the axle . . . allowing it to roll on more. Before it would stop because it was tied onto the axle.

On the day of the Mousemobile Derby my mousemobile went 20 metres. The frame was constructed of tin and was soldered at the joints. The mousetrap was bolted to the frame. I corrected the alignment by driving two new holes and unsoldered the axle washers and positioned them in the new holes. Then I soldered them back onto the axle and tried it again. This time the mousemobile ran straight.

#### THE MOUSEMOBILE DERBY

When I first made my mousemobile my first problem was that it wouldn't start! I then made a wider rear axle with washers soldered onto it to stop the axles from slipping. The first axle was not wide enough because the wheels rubbed against the frame.

When I designed the mousemobile I wanted big drive wheels to get a lot of drive on each rotation. I also wanted a long lever to get my wheels (which had a 20 cm diameter) to go around many times. The lever had enough power to make the mousemobile start but wouldn't go the full distance because of too much friction. First of all I put the string further down the lever so instead of having 18 cm leverage I had 15 cm leverage. It went then, so I tried oiling the axles. I also filed off excess solder and it then worked well. It was then that I discovered that it didn't go straight. I then tried measuring the distance from axle to axle. Finding it wasn't correct I redrilled holes and after a couple of tries it went pretty straight. Another problem that I encountered was when the mousetrap was about three-quarters of the way down the string would slip off the axle therefore losing three or four turns. To solve the problem, I soldered a bit of wire on the handle and looped the end of the string around the wire so that the mousemobile would get full distance and the string would slip off at the end, therefore letting the mousemobile roll on at the end.

I saw that the mousetrap had too much power for the 20 cm wheels which took the mousemobile about 20-25 metres. I then made wheels out of plywood which were 250mm. When I first started with them the width of the wheels was too wide so I filed the ends of the wheels to a point. I then got 23-27 metres.







## MARGARET SPARKES (nee Beanland) Ringwood Technical School, September 1959 to November 1985

Margaret Sparkes began her working life with Ringwood Technical School on the 14th September, 1959, when she took up the position of Assistant Secretary to the School.

She was the office staff of the newly formed first coeducational Junior Technical School in Victoria.

The School Principal at the time was Mr. Gordon Veitch, and the School office was located at Lilydale, as there were no completed buildings for Ringwood Technical School. The boys were housed at Ferntree Gully and the girls at Box Hill Technical Girls School (later to become Whitehorse and now part of the Box Hill College of T.A.F.E.).

When the school buildings were adequate, the school, together with the office staff, moved in. To Margaret came the responsibility of setting up the books, office procedures, etc.

I'm sure Margaret well remembers the day of the official opening of the school and the official guests' chairs gradually sinking in the soft new asphalted surface.

Mr. John Heard became the school's Principal in 1962 and Margaret was to work with him for many years.

As the school gew so did Margaret's office staff. Firstly she had the assistance of a junior typiste, Miss Annette Vowles, and then in 1963 the office staff became three when Mrs. Evelyn Rutledge joined the staff as a clerical assistant. As the volume of work increased with the growth of the school so did Margaret's staff. At the time of her retirement the office staff had increased from one person to 3.69 persons.

In 1970 Margaret took some leave of absence and journeyed overseas. It was during this period that she changed her name from Beanland to Sparkes. Margaret and Ron were married in Scotland during the early part of 1971 and later in that year they journeyed back to Australia, Margaret to share Ron's responsibility in raising four young children.

In February 1972, Margaret returned to Ringwood Technical School, again as Registrar, to work once more with Mr. Heard and later with Mr. Frank Haig, Mr. Don Boyd and since 1978 with Mr. Brian Knox.

The early days of Ringwood Technical School were not easy — a hot office to work in during summer, no air-conditioning, not even blinds to keep the heat out. To have cheques signed created problems; many of the early councillors and their wives will well remember Margaret buzzing around Ringwood in her little Morris Minor to obtain signatures for the ancillary staff pay cheques.

Some of Margaret's colleagues of the past are gone — Mr. Veitch; Mr. Heard; the first President, Major-General Beavis; Mr. Frank Roach; caretaker for many years; Mrs. Marj Kirk, Vice-Principal; and probably others too many to list.

Margaret has seen teachers come and go, rise from teacher to Principal. She hs seen students come in as first year littlies to later meet them as mature married adults who have succeeded in life, and become parents themselves.

Margaret takes with her memories of the school that few share. The speech nights in the old Ringwood Town Hall, the talent quests, the fetes, the fund-raising activities of the school to build a sports oval and a hall, the paper drives, the bread boards that the boys made in woodwork and sold all over Heathmont and Ringwood, Miss McClure's marmalade, so many memories that have gone to make up the history of Ringwood Technical School.

Margaret has been part of them all.

Margaret, the School Council of Ringwood Technical School thank you and honour you for the dedication you have given to this school.

May every happiness be yours in your future life.




## **To the Future Ringwood Technical Students**
