




### ENGLISH

Like the language itself, the English department at Norwood never stands still. As we move towards the implementation of the new Australian Curriculum in 2013, changes started filtering through.

The structure and history of English, together with cultural links to our language, became a new focus. In text study, we've expanded our vision to look at how a text may be transformed from print to a digital version and how the viewer perceives it.

Graphic novels have enhanced our reading program, combined with many new novels for Literature Circles in years 7 & 8. Short inquiries were run in some year 7 classes to allow students to work at their own pace.

In the middle school students were involved in their own projects and preparing for VCE. Senior school stu-


dents focussed on their three areas of study – text response, language analysis and creative writing.

Students at all levels continued to engage in lively discussions, explore ideas in writing and create intriguing stories

This year Norwood fielded a D grade and an A grade team in the Debater's Association of Victoria Ringwood draw. Despite some great debating, they didn't progress to the regional finals, although A grade came agonisingly close.

Later in the year, Norwood fielded two more teams in the Junior Secondary program. There was many a lunchtime and an after-school sacrificed by students, so arguments and oratory could be fine-tuned.

We look forward to doing it all again next year!



### MATHS

All Year 7 students along with six students from Years 8 participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition held in August this year.

The following Year 7 students received Distinction Certificates: Daniel Wright, Tim Van Der Wolf, Nicholas Francis, Angela Haviland, Jasmine Hall, William Francis and Simon Reichelt along with Nicholas Mutton from Year 8. Forty Credit Certificates were also awarded.

The Prudence Award was awarded jointly to Caitlin Evans and Taryn Randell of Year 8. Both students answered a creditable ten questions in a row correctly!

The ICAS Mathematics competition was another challenging competition which attracted interest from many of our most capable Mathematics students. Distinctions were awarded to James Bromilow, Daniel Wright,

Isobel Decru, Cassie Hennessy & Jasmine Hall from Year 7; Thomas Fowler, Bonnie Krisohos, John Marmarou & Claire Murray from Year 8; Renee Einsiedel & Jack Barowski from Year 9 and Zoe Cant, Heath Mays & Kane Parsons from Year 10.



We are enriching the Years 7 to 9 Mathematics curriculum by incorporating inquiry-based learning which involves students working in groups to investigate a question.

During Semester 2 this year, Year 7 students enthusiastically completed

an inquiry to work out an itinerary and budget for accommodation and travel either internationally or within Australia given certain constraints. Some great trips were planned. Perhaps they will give some families some good ideas!

The Year 7 students used their computers throughout the year to enhance their learning by undertaking web-based Mathematics activities, as well as Mathletics and this inquiry.

Year 8 students participated in a Mathematics incursion this year. There were many different interactive stations set up that involved solving real-life mathematical problems such as building bridges, estimating amounts, gears and their ratios, logic puzzles and balancing weights.

Students were enthusiastic and enjoyed the break from regular class-room activities.


### SCIENCE

The Science department had a successful year in 2011 with record numbers of students entering the International Science Quiz and the Australian Chemistry Quiz. Many students achieved credits and distinctions with Thomas Fowler of year 8 achieving a High Distinction.

With respect to opportunities of excellence, Mr. Coffin organised a year 8 boys and a year 8 girls team to represent the school in the Aurion Victorian Bridge Building Competition at science works as well as year 9 students Jonathon Wilson and Renee Einsiedel successfully applying for the Rotary Victoria partnership Science Outreach Program for students to attend a tertiary institution for a week, attending lectures and practical requirements during their September holidays.

Miss Hope supervised an excursion of 6 advanced science students to GTAC in Parkville for advanced molecular biology activities.

Miss Pearsell and Mrs Bromage also organised 22 advanced science students to attend an intensive Biotechnology hands on research day at Box Hill institute as part of National Science Week.



Learning activities in year 7 - 10 classes ran very well with plenty of audio visual, ICT and practical classes to supplement their text based work with the addition of the year 7 IMAX excursion for forces and classification, the year 8 Scienceworks excursion for life from the past, year 9 stream studies and year 10 epidemic modelling excursion with Bacteria Bandit activities at the University of Melbourne.

As we are writing this, our year 12 students are currently doing their science exams and we wish them all the luck, and hope they have some fond memories of all the Science department activities, excursions, shows and opportunities they have enjoyed since 2006.






### INVESTITURE




In May, as is tradition, the school throws its doors open to the public and the prospective students (and their parents) of the years ahead.

The turnout again in 2011 was wonderful, with record numbers of inquiring families and a great display of current student work and the Norwood life.








































### KAHLIA WILSON FUNDRAISER

























### CENTRAL AUSTRALIA TRIP

RC: Starting with Year 9, part of my role is to keep a profile around the school. It's where I get a chance to introduce myself to students for the first time. 


Another busy year, another round of experiments and discoveries in the Science department.

With a bigger cast and more complex songs to master, it was a real challenge for both the veterans of last year's 'Wizard of Oz' and for the ex-









cited newcomers, but they succeeded beyond all expectations.






















### THE ARTISANS OF NORWOOD






























### YEAR 12 CELEBRATION DAY
