



## FLASHBACK WEEMALA 1975



In 1975. Norwood welcomed to its teaching ranks some of its most well-known and long-serving staff: Pam Webb, Krissy MacLellan, Helen Greenfield, and Danny O'Connor.

The school was still finding its identity and, much like today, new buildings and renovations were underway.



Literature and art was a big focus of the time, as was the threat of a nuclear winter - in fact a whole page of the '75 Weemala debated the pros and cons of this revolutionary nuclear energy.

Four decades later, at the advent of new green energies, we can look back and see how far we as a school and society have come.

### MR. ANDREW SLOANE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Ancient Greek philosopher Heraclitus of Ephesus noted, around 500BC, that "Change is the only constant in life". The wisdom in his epithet remains true to this day. While the essence of Norwood has continued through 2015, there have been some significant changes to many aspects of the College. Some of these changes have been quite visible and others less so. The celebration of student achievements, for example, has become a formal part of each semester and parents of the students being recognised are included in the events at school.

We developed a significant program for Year 9 students in conjunction with Deakin University which sees our students learning and working at Deakin for a full week. Feedback from the students was overwhelmingly positive – all felt they were treated as university students....not Year 9. Students in Year 10 and 11 have, in increasing numbers chosen to study a VCE subject above their year level. The Music program continues to grow and thrive.

We are nearing the moment when we will have a design for our Gymnasium. We trust that most of the items on our 'wish list' will be able to be incorporated into the new building. Having waited 58 years to have a purpose-built PE and Sport space, the College deserves to have one that will meet our needs into the future. Construction will take place during 2016 and the site is being cleared of portables over the Christmas break.

Our next goal is to complete our Master Planning for the construction of a revitalised Norwood Secondary College. It is a long-held goal to have It is particularly appropriate to pass facilities that complement the outstanding programs and teaching that are a feature of the College. The moment when the process commences is nearing.

The nature of schools sees staff change over time. We saw the retire



ment of some long-term and valued members of staff during 2015. Jenny Mason commenced at Norwood in 1990 and was an Assistant Principal from 1998. Her contribution to the College during her 26 years was immense and her relationships with staff and students endure beyond her retirement.

Three highly valued staff will join Jenny in retirement, at the end of 2015. Paul Bartholomeusz, who commenced at the school in 1988 when it was known as Norwood High School, Anne O'Donoghue, who joined Norwood Secondary College in 1989 and Harbans Sekhom, who joined Norwood in 2013, following 10 years at Parkwood Secondary College will all say their farewells at the end of the year. The College community has benefitted greatly from the contributions of these staff and they will be sorely missed by students and colleagues, alike. We wish all a long and productive retirement.















After such a busy and rewarding year, the Presentation Night is a wonderful way to close 2015 and recognise the outstanding academic achievements of Norwood's students.


