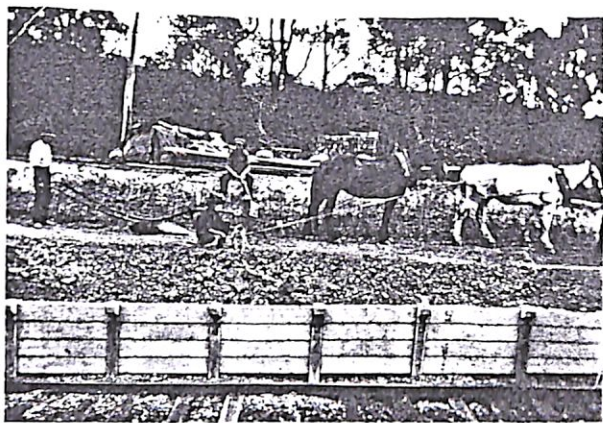
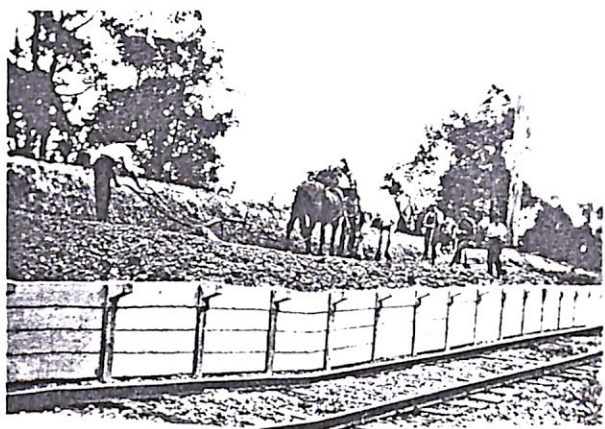



Dear Mr. Wieland,

Thank you for your letter of September 8th. I was interested in hearing from somebody else with the same unusual surname, but I fear that I may not be able to help you much. My grandfather was Carl Georg Wieland who was actually born in Palestine. He was part of the community known as the Templars (or Temple Society) which also migrated at about the same time as the Lutherans (or Temple Society) but went to Palestine. They began as believers but very soon deteriorated to sort of a unitarian situation. I do not have much contact with the paternal side of the family as my parents have been separated for 16 years. The migration to Palestine was, I believe, in 1856 and therefore I doubt that my grandfather was a direct descendent of yours, although there may have been related in other ways. I was actually born in Germany and migrated out here with my parents as a young child in 1952.

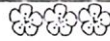

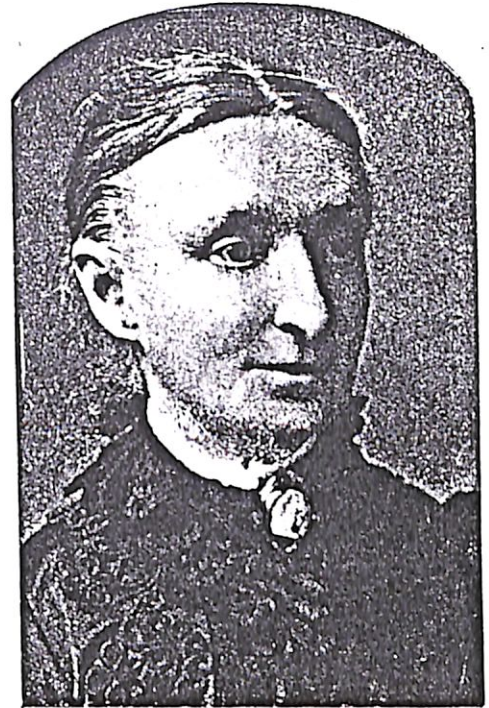

HISTORY of the church at Bayswater dates back 31 years. In the year 1871 Gospel meetings were commenced, and for two years the little band met in a bark hut. The services were conducted by Mr. Ball, who baptised Bro. and Sister Schultz. Just about this time Bro. Finger, of Hawthorn, came among the little flock, and the meetings were taken to Bro. Schultz's house. Bro. Finger baptized 10 others. Two years passed away, and then the meetings were removed to Bro. Peck's house, and continued there until the new chapel was built. From the starting of the cause up to the opening of the present chapel

there were 12 baptisms, 11 others coming in from sister churches making in all 23. From this number there were six deaths and seven removals, leaving 10. This little band struggled on, with occasional visits from Bro. Finger. Up to this time the church was not associated with the Churches of Christ, but when T. Clements and family came in among them, he brought the matter before the Conference, which received the church into the Union. Soon after Bro.

Clements joined the brethren it was decided to build a chapel, Bro. Weiland offered a piece of ground, which was accepted, and an appeal was made, but only £25 was raised. Two of the brethren lent what was required to finish the building. By the aid of Bro. Clements and son, with the help of some of the brethren, the chapel was finished. The building was opened on 3rd November, 1898, with a debt of £80. Since then £20 has been paid. At the time the chapel was opened

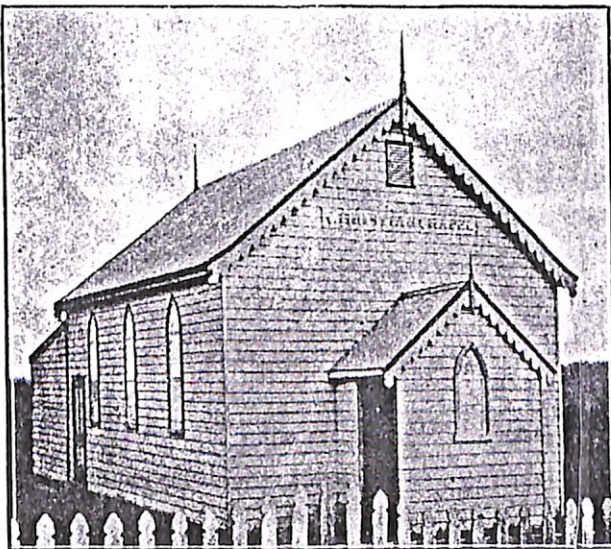

there were 18 members. Since then there have been three additions by faith and obedience and three by letter. They have lost one by death and one by removal, leaving 22 members. Since the opening a Sunday School was started—12th November, 1898. They have had as many as 35 children, but the average is 18. T. Clements, junr., is Superintendent of the School. T. Clements, senr., has carried on the preaching with the help of occasional visits from the city, especially from Bren. Finger and Bardwell.

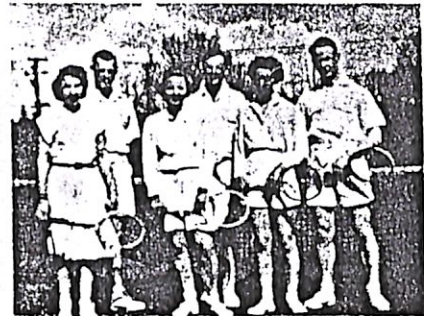

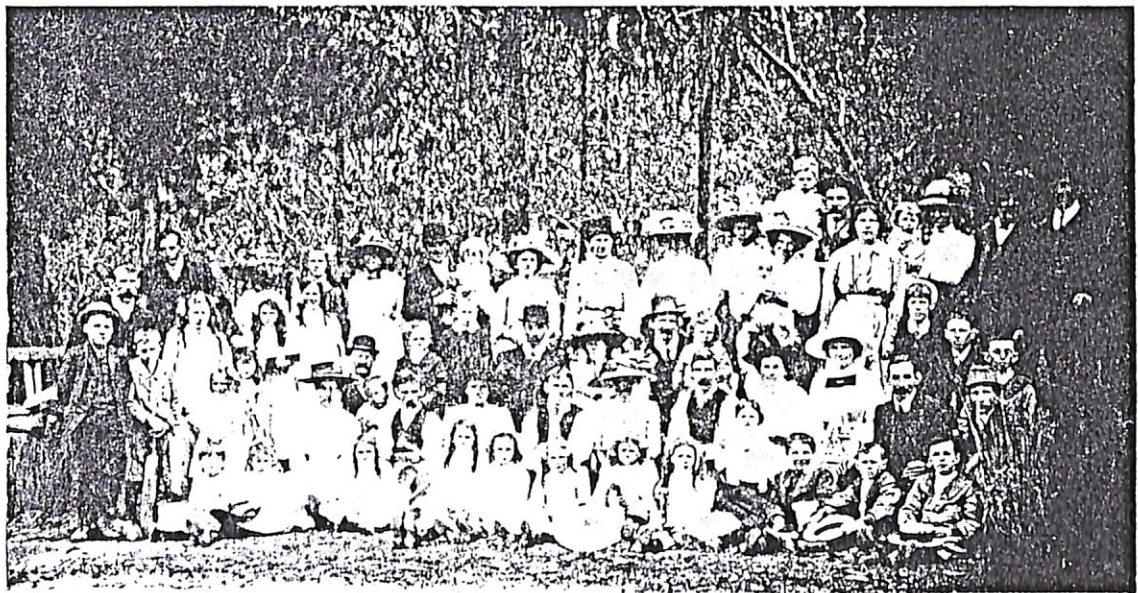

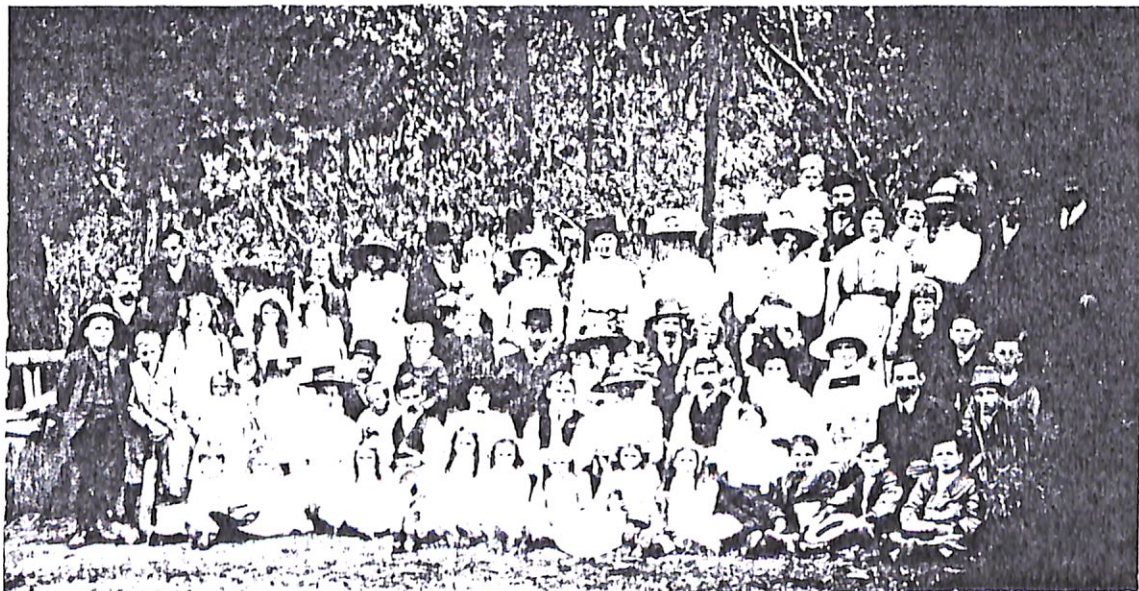

Many peoples come to Knox

AS we witness the continuing influx of new residents to the C of Knox, you will also have noticed the large number of different European nationalities represented.

British, German, Austrian, Dutch and Italian families almost equal the number of Australian-born families moving into this area.

A recent survey of one class at a high school in Knox revealed 12 separate countries as the birthplace of the parents.

Yet a study of the history of Knox reveals that this present influx is only one of a number of waves of migrants who have settled in Knox since the mid-1800's, and

these migrants have generally come from many different countries.

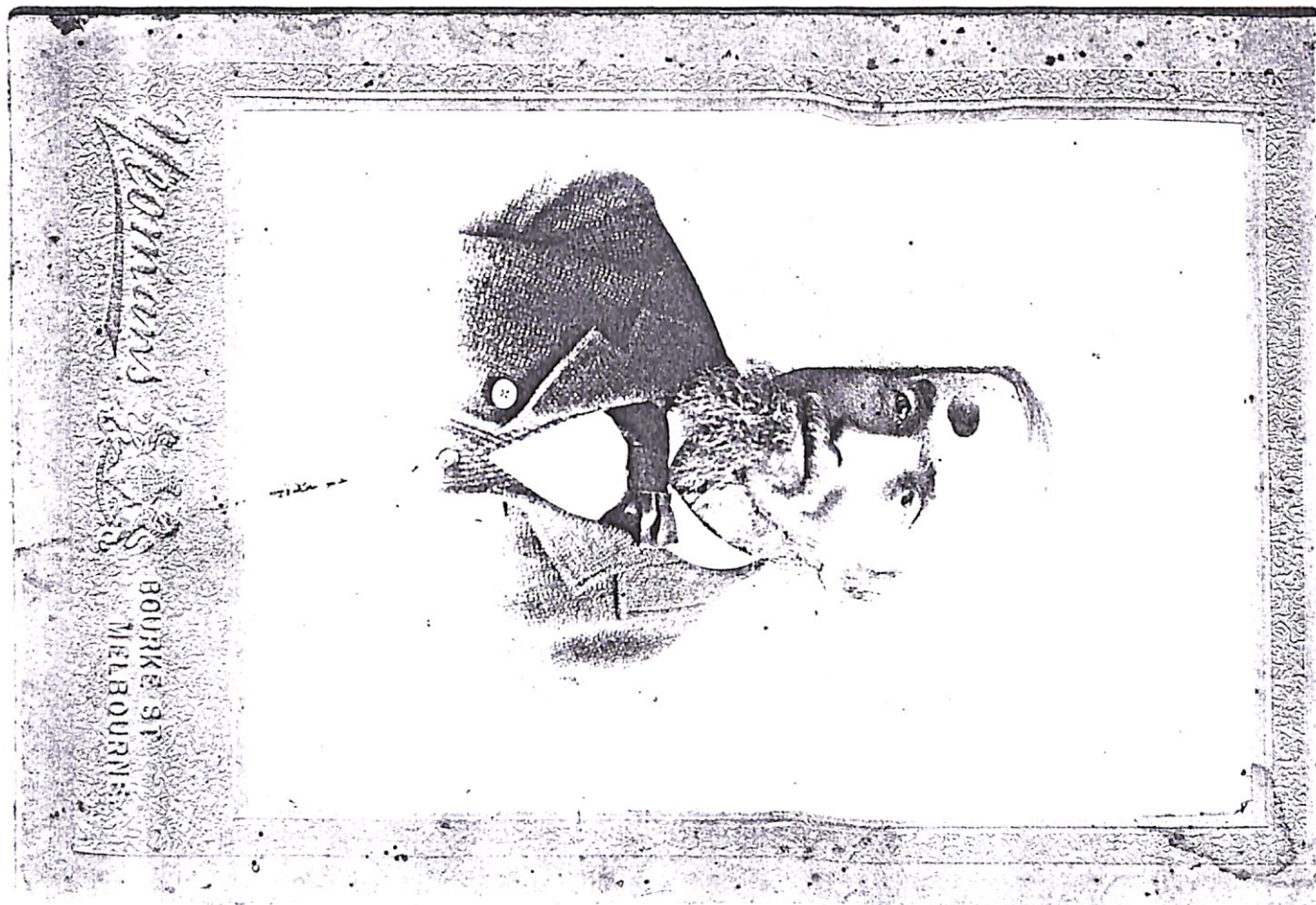
After the early pastoralists, many of whom were Scottish farmers, like the first white settler in Knox, James Clow, the pioneer settlers began to select land in the 1860's after the great goldrushes. Among these were many Germans, most of whom arrived in the colony in the 1850's, and they settled the Wantirna and Bayswater areas in

particular. The influence is reflected today in the large number of streets named after these families, names like Pach, Sasse, Zeising, Kleiner, Piergrosse, Neuman, Mau, Finger, Schul, Albrecht, Schooling and so on. Many descendants of the German families remain in the area, though some cases with anglicised spellings, as a result of the Great War. The Pach family, for example, is now known as "Peck", and the Neumann's became "Newman".

Another influx of Europeans occurred after World War One. Many Italian families came to Scoresby in the 1920's — the Zarr, Pepercelli, Ajani and Muratore families figure prominently in community life there between the wars. The Alberni brothers from Spain were responsible for the opening of the brussel sprout market in Sydney during the depression years. Many of these families are still operating orchards and market gardens in the Knox area. A browse through the Ferntree Gully cemetery will clearly show the influence of the Italian families in Knox from the earliest days.

Another prominent pioneer family was the Ingwersen family, who originally came from Denmark. One of their early relatives is mentioned in the

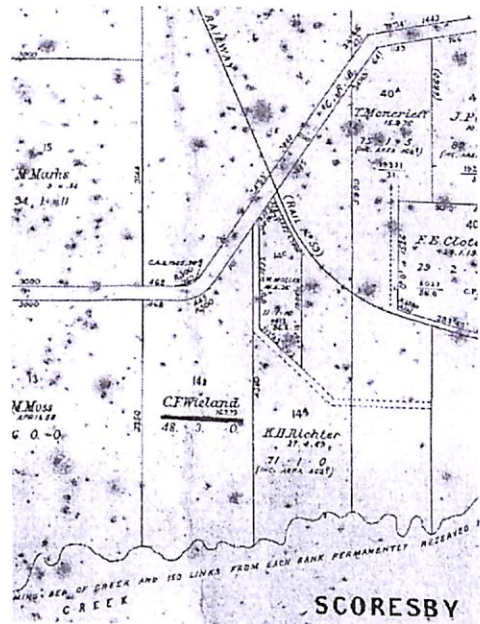
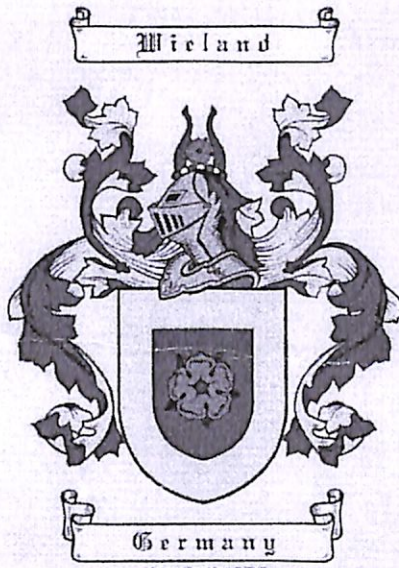



aforesaid, do hereby grant unto the said Carl Ferdinand Wickland all the rights and capacities within the said Colony of Victoria of a natural-born British subject, except that of becoming a member of the Executive Council of the said Colony, and subject to the provisions set forth in the said recited Act.

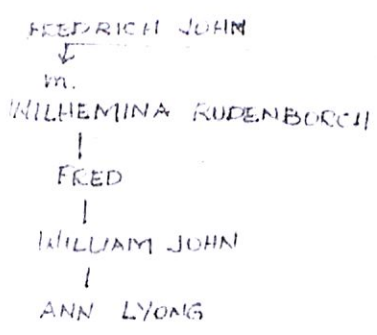

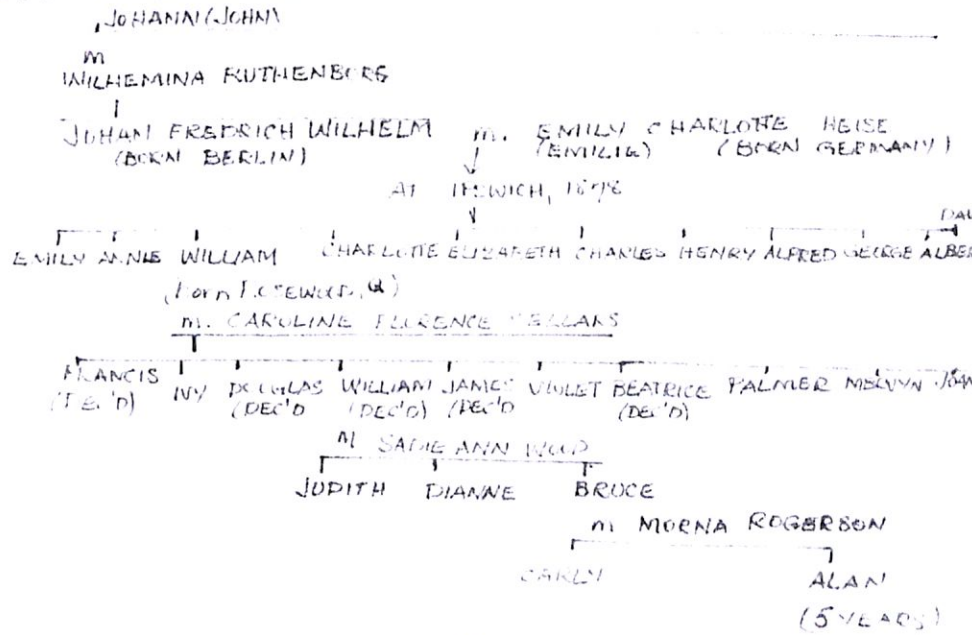

Dear Pat & all.

Just a short note thanking you for letter & Christmas card, also the paper - the latest today. Did you all have a good holiday break? I was sick - after church Christmas Day - laid down most of the day and couldn't eat anything - but it passed the next day - these things "come to pass". Then about 5 weeks ago I fell off a chair - stood on it - too much one side hurt my back for around 4 weeks - but that too "came to pass" and am OK again. How have you all been keeping - except for tiredness though long hours at work!! and how are your eyes? Ray is not himself yet, can hardly walk - his leg and body muscles are seizing up and uses his wheel chair more, but he doesn't complain much and gets around as best he can - potters around his ride or mowers his truck and jobs around the place - but tires very quickly, sleeps all night and good part of day, as I do only her "drugged up". Her lost a lot of weight - which he could afford to have done - was around 15 stone!! Still goes to hospital once/twice a week for tests.

Well our summer weather is really crazy - last week we were all in their 30°. This week around 20-22 - I have a fire pump - also electric blanket at night to start off with. The cool weather is kind to the garden - everything including lawn, grass, green and trees/shrubs etc have grown really well. - Some trees (not mine) are showing signs of yellowing for autumn already!!

Our fever was off for day one day last week so I left my bus to train, then out to the Zoo for day. I really enjoyed myself, my fare, admission fees and lunch and home again, only came to \$7.50!! "a cheap day". The government have just introduced a cheap daily fare anywhere on trains buses & trams for just \$1 for the over 60's. One had to register at local station issued with a yellow plastic ticket like "medicare" which one shows on demand or when one gets on the bus, train, tram etc. Many thousands have already - 26,000 I think (since 1st Jan) have taken advantage of scheme, and more people are using the airports. (I believe they are also going to bring in an even cheaper fare for off peak, for turnist bring about to "senior citizens" today. I play piano for the

opening exercises. In warm week we go by bus (for only \$2) up to "Barroga" on Murray River. Its a 12 hr day - lots play the polka (which I doubt) and supper (at a discount) a delicious hot meat in the most elaborately surroundings. Its the R.S.L. I think.

Then around April we go 7 days to nights - on another cheap trip to NSW including Canberra & days in the autumn. I really enjoyed my Adelaide trip - a lot of time doing research on your great grand father, the latest discovery (enclosed photo stat copy) was that he arrived in Adelaide at age of 21 yrs travelling 3 months in barque "HELENE" 204 tons, leaving HAMBURG Germany Oct 18th 1856. There were only 10 or 11 "cabin passengers" the others rest including grand father (known by his 2nd name) in vent / steerage that means according to my dictionary - a place between decks forward of the great cabins, usually reserved for inferior class passengers. 4 years lapsed before he arrived in Melbourne 1860 - refer to your sheet. I was given the name of a North Terrace Lutheran church Archives Dept - which I have since written

to for information. If he was a keen "Lutheran" he
could have attended services there or surrounding
areas. - (Awaiting reply.) He married when 39 yrs.
So I still have to find in 4 years. And I think that
is about all. I discovered whilst staying at
Hahndorf a service pensioner now 76 yrs went to
school with 3 Wickham brothers. I also enquired at
Port Adelaide museum for mariners, but the surname
didn't register on the computer. I also enquired at
Mooronta - 168 miles from Adelaide (- no luck) and at
Angaston in a cafe where I had "a light snack" the
waitress attended the local Lutheran church and gave
me the name of city address. Also enquired at the
Adelaide library where I got the latest information
at Angaston they had at the local municipal centre.
(A modern place) births, deaths & marriages of people
from early 1850^s to 1902. Very interesting.
Well this is all for now it's 10 PM and bed time.
My writing is getting worse than at the beginning, so
must stop. Keep well & smiling.
