Another successful year completed with a very high standard of football being displayed. A standard throughout the competition one would have hoped for but not really believing it could be achieved.

The respective Divisional 1st XVIII Premiership Teams were:

1st DIVISION MITCHAM
2nd DIVISION MULGRAVE
3rd DIVISION UPPER FERNTREE GULLY

To those clubs, officials, players and supporters goes my unqualified and sincere congratulations for a most successful season.

The year behind us was completed with a great deal of pride, but started off in a most questionable manner with a number of anomalous registrations being detected with the resultant loss of Premiership Points and the inevitable fines.

A point gained from these irregularities was the introduction of the new type Registration Card. A system that does away with the re-signing of Juniors to Seniors and hopefully eliminating the ineligible player. It is the type of registration I believe should have been introduced long ago. Just because a player was too old to play on his Junior Registration Card should not prevent him playing with his club in Senior ranks. The ridiculous rule of having to re-sign, this time as a Senior to me bordered on outrageous non-discretion.

Season 1979, like past years has had its problems but with the dedication given by all parties, solutions for the betterment of the League have been achieved. When problems arise it requires concessions by all parties to reach a satisfactory result and this once again has been the reasoning behind decision which have had to be made this year. Such decisions on many occasions have not been easy to arrive at or announce but once announced they have been accepted in the name of the League.

This year, like others, has seen a number of 'Fines' being issued. They have been issued against breaches of the League Rules. Rules which the very Clubs who have breached them have assisted in having written into the book.

These rules, and in particular, the 'Phoning of Scores' are continually being breached. They have been inserted to enable the proper functioning of the League and ironically, the same clubs appear on the fines each year. The issuing of these fines is not a pleasant task but to be mercenary about this unpleasant chore is that it brings extra money into the League and this we can certainly do with.

A new addition within the League this year has been the Marketing Division. This has been set up primarily to enable Club's to purchase their requirements at the best possible price. Unfortunately, not all clubs avail themselves of this service. But those that did trade with us received the benefits of lower prices.

The management of this section has been more than a headache with added demands on the staff. In particular, the added bookwork that was expected would have meant, if carried out, extra staff, and extra staff naturally means extra finance. Finance being something which is always short would have meant a further Levy on Clubs. Something which would be an added burden to clubs was not in my mind, therefore shortcuts were taken to allow this section to proceed at the expense of myself.

If this section is to continue and prosper it will require more participation from Clubs and assistance by way of another member of the staff. The League has grown and is continuing to grow and with the advent of professional operation by our Clubs much greater demands are being placed on the League staff. If we were to do all that some Clubs expect of us, two extra staff could be employed but in the light of added costs, I sometimes wonder the folly of such a move.

As I pointed out last year the Marketing sections of the League will be a success if all Clubs support our activities. It will certainly fail if we are not prepared to support our own ventures. We cannot expect the majority to prosper if a minority only give their support. We no doubt have been criticized by some for trying to help others but in today's professional attitude towards sport it requires the co-operation of all if we are to succeed. It would be very easy to sit back and do nothing but the person who does nothing, receives nothing back in return. It is my sincere belief that this section is a must if all are to prosper.

Our most Junior Teams who participate in the Sunday competitions on a social basis once again had another most successful year. With a total of 18 teams competing this year in Under 9's and Under 11's, we saw an increase in participation and involvement. With this segment we were able to provide the kindergarten section of our League with a most valued teaching area where the players were not only taught the skills of our game but were able to put these skills into operation on the playing field.

Both sections held their Lightning Premierships at the end of July, the venue being the Yarra Glen Football Club ground. The main oval was divided and marked out for three games. The three playing areas were played on simultaneously and over 540 boys participated each day, a truly heartwarming sight. The Yarra Glen Football Club are most sincerely thanked and are to be congratulated for their part on both days. The Under 9 Section was won by Chirnside Park and the Under 11 Section was won by Ringwood.

The Under 13 Section again this year was divided into two sections, East and West with 22 teams in total competing. There were 12 teams in the Eastern Section and 10 teams in the Western Section.

The standard of football displayed in this section has been of a much higher standard this year, due mainly to the boys coming out of the Under 9 and Under 11 Sections. Club's fielding Under 9s and Under 11s have in most cases ready made footballers when they enter the Under 13s. There has been a request from a number of clubs to form a Social Under 13 Section to allow the large number of players available to participate in organised sport. This social division is additional to the existing Under 13 Sections.

At the completion of each of the Under 13 Section Finals both Premiers played off for the title of Under 13 Champions. In this game, Mooroolbark and East Burwood played off with East Burwood being the Under 13 Champions for this year.

Once again in Third Division we were faced with the devastating Bye with only 13 teams. This position was aggravated further with the Juniors in this Division by the withdrawal of one Under 15 team before the season started and by some Clubs not fielding other juniors throughout the year at varying times. This is certainly a problem area and one which is not easy to rectify.

Before the season commenced, we did have 14 teams in Third Division and all looked well but before the games got underway, Whitefriars were forced to withdraw because of the lack of administrators. This was most unfortunate for us but was for the better because of the uncertainty of weekly games. I am of the opinion that a permanent Bye was better than a week by week proposition.

The Finals Series just past were a success in all ways for the League and their Clubs. The portable Ticket Box used at Boronia and Bayswater grounds was a resounding success. Not only did it facilitate the handling of money but we were able to admit people to the grounds much quicker. I believe it is essential that we build another box to enable the use of them at each ground.

To Mrs. Barclay, Assistant Secretary of the League, and Mrs. Taylor and Steve Mason, my grateful thanks for your participation with the League. All requests were not always agreed with but nevertheless they were duly carried out and for this goes my sincere thanks. Staff are sometimes like Clubs, they do not always agree with decisions but when decisions were made they were accepted in the name of the League and for that I thank you on behalf of all Clubs.

To all Club Officials, Players and Supporters, I extend my sincere and humble thanks for your co-operation and friendship.

To the Independent Tribunal, Players Accident Fund, Permit Committee and Umpires Appointment Board, my personal and sincere thanks for a most difficult assignment carried out with pride and dexterity.

To the President and Executive Committee Members of our League, I can but simply say with humble voice 'Thank you all' for your guidance and tolerance. I am indebted to you all for your assistance and tolerance.

To the many hundreds of people who have given of their service, advice and guidance to me in my capacity as League Secretary, I will be forever grateful and I have been proud to once again serve you as your servant.

CONGRATULATIONS

The President and Executive Committee members of the League extend sincere congratulations to all teams who have won Pennants this year.

The full list is as follows:

1st Division

1st XVIII MITCHAM Finished the home and away games on top of the ladder one clear game ahead of their nearest rival. They had a comfortable win in 2nd Semi Final with an equally comfortable win in the Grand Final.

2nd XVIII SCORESBY This team held top position in the ladder for all but 2 games during the Home and Away series. They had a comparatively easy win in second semi final. In the Grand Final, they showed they were deserving of top place.

Under 17. CROYDON Finished the home and away games on top of the ladder by two clear games. In their two finals appearances played the same team to end the season still on top.

Under 17. NORTH RINGWOOD What a finish to the season for these boys. They finished the home and away series in third position. In the first semi final they were defeated, but due to the rules not being adhered to a "replay" was ordered and the boys subsequently went on to win the game that counts, and brought yet another Junior Pennant to their club.

2nd Division

1st XVIII MULGRAVE After four lonely years as runners up this team finally broke the drought and won what appeared to be, for them, the elusive Pennant. Finished the home and away series clearly on top of the ladder. However, during the final series they gave their supporters some heart flutters, but when the final siren sounded to end the year, they were clear winners and gained entry to First Division.

2nd XVIII MULGRAVE The 1979 season completed yet another most successful year for this team with their win in this section. It gave them 5 Pennants in a row. What more could the players and their supporters ask for. The home and away series ended with this team in second position. Their two finals appearances resulted in comfortable wins and set the stage for another of their teams.

Under 17. MULGRAVE The home and away series completed saw this team in second position on the ladder. In their two finals appearances they played the same team with the end result being a Grand Final win. Reflecting back, this win set the pattern for a great and memorable day for their club.

Under 15. BORONIA These boys ended the home and away series on top of the ladder by three clear games. Playing in the second Semi Final they managed a win over their old rivals, Bayswater, and thus putting them into the Grand Final. In this game they again played Bayswater, but came out this time a most comfortable winner. The 1979 season ended for this team not knowing the feeling of having been defeated at any stage during the year.

3rd Division

1st XVIII UPPER FERNTREE GULLY After a disappointing season in 1978 and their relegation back to Third Division, the club set their target as the 1979 Premiership Flag. At the completion of the home and away series they were two and a half games clear on top of the ladder. In the second semi final victory was gained by a mere 2 points. However, in the Grand Final they gave their supporters great heart by completing the season with an easy win and promotion back to Second Division.

2nd XVIII UPPER FERNTREE GULLY Like their club's 1st XVIII they ended the home and away series on top of the ladder. In their remaining two finals games, they showed their supremacy and went on to take another 1979 Pennant for their Club.

Under 17 MONTROSE Season 1979 home and away series completed saw this team in second position on the ladder, however only percentage separated the two top teams. In the second semi they suffered defeat by a fairly large margin. In the prelim final they showed their true colours with an easy win. In the Grand Final they reversed the second semi result and gained another Junior Pennant for their Club.

Under 15 UPPER FERNTREE GULLY Season 1979 saw this team going through undefeated. At the conclusion of the home and away series they were on top of the ladder by a clear margin. In their two finals appearances, they were not really troubled by the opposition and the Grand Final saw yet another Pennant for their Club.

Under 13 East MOOROOLBARK Finished home and away series in second position on ladder. In second semi final they suffered defeat by less than two goals. In the Prelim Final gained a win by ten points and in the Grand Final had a most convincing win.

Under 13 West EAST BURWOOD Season 1979 again saw this team win an Under 13 Pennant. The home and away series saw them on top of the ladder by a mere two points. They were defeated in the Second semi final. In the Prelim Final, they had an easy win, winning by 48 points. The Grand Final was a replay of the Second Semi Final with East Burwood winning the big one by 20 points to make it two Pennants in two years.

Under 13 CHAMPIONS EAST BURWOOD For the second season in a row this team played in the East v. West Championship game. Unlike 1978 season they went on to win this game by the very big margin of 83 points.

The two competing teams in this section, i.e. East Burwood and Mooroolbark had won their respective Pennants and both had earned the right to play in this game. On the day East Burwood proved beyond doubt that they were the better side and are justified in being declared Under 13 Champions for season 1979.

Under 9 and Under 11 Sections

This section of the League again grew in numbers, both team and player wise and overall was a resounding success. This year at our League's Annual Presentation Night, the inaugural 1956 Gilbert Chandler Medal was presented back to the League by Mr. Trevor Collins who was playing with Box Hill/Surrey Hills United when he won the medal in 1956. Mr. Collins presented the Medal back to the League for historical records and we are indebted to him for his gift.

TROPHIES The President, Executive Committee and all members of our League offer their sincere congratulations to all Trophy winners for Season 1979.

SIR GILBERT CHANDLER MEDAL, won by JOHN CUNNINGHAM of the VERMONT FOOTBALL CLUB. This is John's second year at Vermont. He had previously played with Melbourne, Noble Park and Prahran Clubs. John won this award by the narrow margin of one vote from four other players. He received 14 votes and his four rivals each received 13 votes. One of these players was from the same club. Along with the Sir Gilbert Chandler Medal, John won a Watch donated by John Anderson, Jewellers of Main Street, Croydon and a Silver Tray donated by W.D. & H. O. Wills.

PAUL EDIE MEDAL won by JOHN SMITH from the BAYSWATER CLUB. John has played all his football, both junior and senior, with the same club and is a local product winner. He commenced playing with Bayswater in 1971 in their Under 17 Section. He has been a senior player since 1972. John also won a Watch donated by John Anderson, Jewellers of Main Street, Croydon, and a Silver Tray donated by W.D. & H.O. Wills.

PERC JAMES MEDAL won by JOHN HARROP from the MONTROSE FOOTBALL CLUB. This is the second year in a row that John has won this trophy. John has had a successful year as Coach of the Montrose Football Club and his record as a player is impressive. He has previously played with Collingwood, V.F.L. 1969-70, Northcote V.F.A. 1971-72, Croydon E.D.F.L. 1973-1977 and then to Montrose. John, like the two other Medal winners, also won a Watch from John Anderson, Jewellers of Main Street, Croydon and a Silver Tray donated by W.D. & H.O. Wills.

MALCOLM BLIGHT MEDAL for Best Under 21 player. This Medal was donated by the North Melbourne Football Club and is presented to the Best Under 21 years of age player in our League. This year the medal was won by PETER CASTILLO from the SCORESBY FOOTBALL CLUB. This was Peter's first year as a senior player having won the League's 1st Division Under 17 Best and Fairest Award in 1978. In the Senior Best and Fairest Voting, Peter received 11 Umpires votes. Peter came to Scoresby juniors in 1977 from the Lyndale Junior Football Club.

Season 1979 saw the introduction of three new Medals for each of our Under 17 Best and Fairest Winners.

1st DIVISION MEDAL was donated by the Essendon Football Club and is known as the John Coleman Memorial Medal. There is also a Perpetual Trophy with this Medal, and it is known as the John Coleman Memorial Perpetual Trophy.

2nd DIVISION MEDAL was donated by North Melbourne Football Club and is known as the John Jenkins Medal.

3rd DIVISION MEDAL was donated by Carlton Football Club and is known as the Keith McKenzie Medal. A Perpetual Trophy was also donated by Carlton, and this is known as the Keith Mckenzie Perpetual Trophy.

The two Perpetual Trophies are held by the League and the respective winners' names are recorded each year. They will be on display at the League Office throughout the year.

JOHN COLEMAN MEDAL Medal was won by KEVIN WALSH from the NORTH RINGWOOD FOOTBALL CLUB. Kevin has played with North Ringwood since 1974 and has been invited to Essendon for Season 1980.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Nothing is successful in the world of sport without the co-operation of the News Media. This year, whilst coverage was small, we at least were worthy of note. The local papers covered our results with game descriptions by my old mate, J.D. The Sun Easterly also gave us good mention throughout the season, including what some people viewed with suspicion, the finals coverage.

Whilst we never appear to be satisfied with the coverage given to our League, we must also realise that it is a dual participation venture between the Clubs and the Media. All too often we hear of criticism levelled at the local newspapers, but how many of those who criticize bother to contact the local papers with news stories.

If we want coverage on the News Media we must be prepared to also participate. Far too often the Newspapers have to contact the office for information about certain clubs and their players. It appears to be the standard acceptance by many today that they should help us but we are too busy to be bothered with them. I believe that what is required by all is a little consideration of the other fellows' difficulties.

This year like those that have passed have seen some activity by the newspapers but very little by the clubs themselves. One of the amazing things this year was the lack of coverage given by the local press to their very own Award. I refer to the Leading Goal Kicking Awards in each Division. This information was given to the papers weekly but rarely, if ever, did it receive coverage. Likewise the Bill Patterson Motors Awards went unrecorded throughout the year. Both of these awards were most keenly sought after which was evidenced by the number of telephone calls each week to the office seeking information as to the leaders, etc.

To the A.B.C. who broadcast our 1st Division 1st XVIII scores each week, we can but say 'thank you'. Again this year, this section came in for their share of criticism for not covering all games. I can only add - "if your club does not supply the information on time, what can we or the A.B.C. do". To get maximum coverage we must supply full and accurate information and I am afraid that this was not always possible. It is amazing the number of people who want everything complete after the deadline for information but are most reluctant to chip in and help.

For the coverage given to our League, we are most grateful and with tongue in cheek we hope it is bigger and better next year.

To Halls Sporting Publicity, the publishers of our Football Record, we are indebted to you and your printers for yours and their participation. Like the local newspapers, you no doubt are secure in the knowledge that club participation is most difficult.

Whilst we continue to boast that we are the greatest League in Australia, we must never lose sight of the fact that we are but one of the organisations who regularly organise sport and for

that reason alone, we should be grateful for any coverage gained in the media. We can, like the farmer, only reap from what we sow.

It is a self help programme, one which only returns our investments. If we fail to invest we must surely fail to receive; if we are not prepared to contribute we have not only failed ourselves but the many thousands of supporters who are eager to learn of our achievements.
