The School Committee wrote to the Education Department following the meeting held on the 7th of May 1940 requesting that 1½ acres (0.6 hectares) be set aside to plant pine trees as a school endowment plantation. During the 1930's, many schools throughout Victoria saw the planting of pine plantations as the answer to their financial problems, the idea was to plant pine trees and harvest them when they were mature in an estimated 25 years time and sell the timber to the mills. Unfortunately, by the time the trees were suitable for harvesting the cost of felling and transporting them to a mill meant it was no longer a viable proposition.

At the June 1940 meeting, the Headmaster Mr Isaac reported the children had raised an amount of 3 pounds (\$6) towards the Comforts Fund. The Comforts Fund was formed to raise money to provide Australians in the armed services with additional clothing and amenities which were not on service issue. The older girls used to knit balaclavas, socks, scarves and mittens which were sent to troops overseas.

It was usual for the person who knitted the item to enclose their name and address with it when it was packed up. One pupil, Wilma Hussey received a reply from a soldier in the British Army and the families have corresponded for the 45 years since. Wilma and her husband met the soldier (now a grandfather) and his family for the first time when they were in England on a trip in 1984.



The Warrandyte School Committee thought to have been taken in the late 1930's. At the same time, Mr Isaac, the Headmaster, told the meeting that the school children had raised 17 pounds and two pence as a result of a bazaar that they had organized, an incredible effort, as this would have represented something like five weeks wages for an average working person. Unfortunately there is no record of the purpose for which the money was raised, although there is no doubt that it was raised for one of the patriotic war funds which existed at the time.

Mr Isaac told the committee at the April 1942 meeting that the Council had started the work of digging the Air Raid Shelters and work was expected to be completed within a few days. The air raid shelters were open trenches approximately 8 feet deep and 2 feet 6 inches wide with a bend every 10 feet so as to reduce the effect of bomb blast. At the same meeting, plans were made for an official opening ceremony to mark the installation of the wireless and the connection of electricity to the school. Mr Everard, MLA, was invited to attend.

The school received instructions from the Government to remove the board containing the name and number of the school. This was a policy carried out throughout Australia when all road signs, names, and names of towns were removed to confuse the enemy in the event of invasion. It certainly made road travel interesting as a couple of teenage boys discovered when they rode their push bikes up to Yarrawonga one Easter (no lightweight multi gear machines in those days). They got there finally by navigating from one wheat silo to the next in the flat featureless plains north of the Great Divide.

The school committee wrote to the football club asking for a football as purchase of sporting goods was impossible due to the war. The football club were unable to help but Mr Frank Adams produced an old cover, the school had a bladder and Mr Crawshaw, an active committee member undertook to fix up the football and so the school got its football.

The wireless "toning" had been a subject of much discussion and some four months after the official opening Mr Griffith who had built the wireless finally adjusted the set.

At the August meeting of 1942 the matter of insurance was raised and the three items listed to be insured were the wireless set valued at 35 pounds, a sewing machine 20 pounds and a silver shield 5 pounds. The silver shield was the Gould Shield which Warrandyte won on four occasions, swimming against other schools in the district, in the next year's insurance coverage, the Gould Shield was deleted as it was no longer held by Warrandyte.

The Mothers Club's suggestion of a combined effort to raise money in September was discussed and Mr Crawshaw was deputised to explain to Mrs Crawshaw in her capacity as Secretary of the Mothers Club that owing to the school committee running a public appeal for funds for a flag and flagpole during the month of September that it was not advisable to run another function.

The Christmas treat for 1942 was cancelled due to the National Security regulations.

At the first meeting held in 1943 it was decided to abandon the Autumn Show due to the uncertain times and at a special meeting held on the 20th of February, Mr Crawshaw and Mr Betton both tendered their resignations from the Committee as they had both been called up for military service.

Messers. John Lithgow and Elmos were elected licensing megistrates for the present year.

### ANDERSON'S CREEK POLICE COURT

### Tueday, Jani 2016.

(Before Mr. Hare, P.M., and Mr. W. Hutchinson, J.P.)

Police v. Thomas Rich.—Drunk. Defendant pleaded guilty. Fined 5s or 3 days'. The fine was paid. Constable Aroold v. H. Stiggan's,

Constable Aroold v. H. Stiggants, sen.—Drunk and disorderly. Defendant did not appear. Fined £4 or 3 days' imprisonment.

John Chatty v. Richard Lee.—Insulting behaviour. Fined £2, or 3 day's imprisonment. £1 was paid and a month allowed for the balance.

Constable Arnold proceeded against Richard Lee and John Chatty for causing a breach of the peace by fighting, &c. Fined 5s each or 3 days' imprisonment.

Wm. Unwin v. Troyreould.—Debt. Case dismissed.

Thomas Gould applied for a further extension of time to pay a fine previously imposed on him. A week was was allowed.

Messrs. J. Bell and Wm. Hutchinson were appointed licensing magistrates for the year 1883.


## FROM THE ARCHIVES

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### FUTURE OF THE MUSEUM

Despite continuing discussions with the Warrandyte Community Centre joint working party regarding the allocation of space in the new Community Centre for a museum, a satisfactory solution has still not been reached. At the time of writing, the Society has been allocated 20 square metres for an office in the Centre. This allowance is not adequate for our purposes and discussions are continuing.

The Society gained some valuable publicity in the "Doncaster and Templestowe News" on 30 August 1989.

Her other interests were in the arts and crafts. I do not think she painted, but certainly she had knowledge of this form of art and over the years acquired a considerable collection of paintings as well as other forms of arts and crafts. She was an entrepreneur in these fields as well as patron, particularly in her encouragement of young artists. Her friendship with Clara Southern would have been a great stimulus in this, and before her marriage she frequently visited Warrandyte and stayed with her. Clara was the reason why Connie, Alec and Bunty eventually came to live here.

My next memory of meeting Connie was some years later when, with my parents, we visited Connie, Alec and small daughter Bunty at their charming home set in spacious grounds situated in the then comparatively underdeveloped suburb of Beaumaris, where they lived for a number of years.

Alec was a real estate agent and had his own agency Smith-Nicholson Pty Ltd, in Queen Street, Melbourne, and this was one of the major and successful businesses of its type in Melbourne. This provided them with a good income and they lived the typical life of well-to-do dwellers in the then outer suburban areas, with tennis, tennis parties, golf and entertaining. Connie was able to maintain her cultural interests in Melbourne. Then, as it did to so many families, came the financial disaster as a result of the "Great Depression" of the Thirties. By selling their Beaumaris home and using all their financial assets, Alec was able to meet all his business commitments, but this left them without home or finances. Clara Southern, always Auntie Clara to Bunty, came to the rescue and in 1930 they moved into one of the small cottages she owned, and she helped support them in many ways through the difficult few years afterwards. Many sacrifices had to be made, and this included the planned entry of Bunty to Fintons School which had to be cancelled, and her education thereafter was undertaken at State Schools. They were still unable to send her to Koornong School when that started up at Warrandyte in the early part of the Second World War years, and which she has always regretted.

Although the family financial situation did improve gradually over the years, it never regained the same standing as in the Beaumaris time. Alec did war work at Fisherman's Bend and afterwards became a valuer or assessor for the shire councils in the Gippsland district, work which he continued long after the usual retirement age. Alec died at the age of 98, and was active up to the last few years of his life.

Because of his profession, Alec had a keen eye for bargains in real estate and acquired properties, houses and land, or land in the Warrandyte area, and later in the Dromana district. Throughout their married life, Alec and Connie were continually buying new homes, selling those they lived in, buying land and building homes.

Bunty married Gordon McKenzie who at some stage was a member staff at the Rehabilitation Centre at Mt. Martha and this prompted the Smith family to move from Warrandyte to the Peninsula area. They all ived a sort of nomadic life moving from home to home as they sold and acquired new properties, Connie and Alec living in one, Bunty and Gordon in another, swapping homes or living together in one as the changes in properties were made during the years. It was sometimes difficult when planning to visit Connie and Alec, to know in which of the houses they were living at the time.



### Clara Southern (1861-1940)

She was a pioneer amongst Australian women painters. She studied at the National Gallery School during 1883-85 under George Folingsby and Frederick McCubbin and worked with the other painters of the Heidelberg School.

She started the Warrandyte Artists' Camp where Penleigh Boyd, Harold Herbert, Louis McCubbin and Frank Crozier worked. Her style of painting was similar to that of Frederick McCubbin. She lived in a cottage called "Blyth Bank" which used to be the second one on the left on Research Road on "The Hill".



### Jo Sweatman (1872-1956)

She studied at Melbourne National Gallery School at different times between 1890-98 under the tutorship of Bernard Hall and Frederick McCubbin. She was a member of the Australian Artists Association in 1912. She painted extensively in the Warrandyte district and built her own cottage in 1910 next to Clara Southern's over the bridge off Research Road overlooking the Yarra and Warrandyte. She was a great conservationist for her time and lived in Warrandyte for 54 years. As a point of interest, the house on that side close to the Bridge was owned and lived in by the Misses Everard, well-known identities of the Warrandyte of that era, and whose brother was the parliamentary member for the area. Other artists who lived in the Research Road area, but were probably here at an earlier stage or did not mingle were Emily Smith, Agnes Kirkwood and Herbert Rose. Adrian Lawlor, art critic and painter, came to live in Warrandyte and built a home uphill from Jo Sweatman's house. During the lean post-depression years, about 1934, Connie and Adrian aided their respective incomes by collaborating in a commercial flower growing enterprise on land at Selby Avenue, and Bunty used to walk there after school to give a helping hand, although the trip usually involved a visit to see Frank Crozier.

In the early decades of the century, many artists visited Warrandyte on painting trips, staying at the Selby Guest House, owned and managed as well as the farm, by Daisy Hawkes, a famous Warrandyte identity. NOTE: I hope someone will write or has written a story of the Hawkes family - Daisy, Violet and Dorothy.

Amongst those who stayed at Selby were Harold Herbest, Ola Cohn, Kath and Bill Dargie, and the young Reg Preston, giving him his first introduction to Warrandyte. They would have visited Clara Southern, and I am sure Connie would have met them there, but whether or not they visited Connie and Alec's home at a later stage I do not know.

Connie was particularly interested in the then "Modern School" of painting and was friendly with Sunday and John Reed. Those who have followed the development of the arts in Australia would know of the great contribution made by the Reeds in that era of painting. Connie knew most of the artists of that time, in part through her association with Clara Southern. She made her own considerable contribution with encouragement for the young painters; for example, she helped man John Perceval's first one man show of paintings at a gallery in Collins Street near Royal Arcade. Perhaps her major single effort was in organising an exhibition of paintings in 1938 held in the Penleigh Boyd studio, where the Smith family was then living. Sadly, not many months later the studio was destroyed by bushfire, including all their personal possessions, as well as works of art, and crafts. She assisted in the manning of a number of other exhibitions and encouraged friends and acquaintances to visit these shows.

Frequent visitors to the Smith home or homes in Warrandyte were local artists Ambrose Hallam, Harry de Hartog, and as mentioned before, Frank Crozier, Arnold Shore, Adrian Lawlor, and Jock Frater who walked over from Eltham. During the following years, and as they came to live in Warrandyte, many others joined the throng of visitors. Marie (Pitt) and Harry Hudson, Reg Preston (potter and sculptor), Nutter Buzzacott, Danila Vassilieff (painter and sculptor), Jim Wigley, Murray Young and Tim Nicholls. Sam Atyeo certainly visited often, but I am not sure if he ever lived in Warrandyte close to the time that Smiths left Warrandyte, so although they met and visited Connie, their acquaintanceship was not of a long duration. Other artists came to live in Warrandyte - Wally Manders, Laurie Coles, Henry Hoyle and others, but although they would have known one another I do not know if they visited the Smith's home.


Visitors from nearby districts and other areas included many well-known names in the art world. Connie and Moya Dyring were close friends and saw one another frequently until Moya left to live in France.






After some weeks of searching, Louis Michel discovered gold bearing quartz at Anderson's Creek. They showed these samples to Lieutenant Governor LaTrobe who was unimpressed, as there was no means available for extracting the gold from the quartz at that time.

Louis Michel went back to Anderson's Creek with another party, where after a further search they found alluvial gold. The area and the gold samples were shown to the Gold Committee. Louis Michel received 1,000 pounds from the Victorian Government as the "first publishers of the discovery of a gold field in Victoria."

While Warrandyte was never to match some of the other fields, it was the first gold field and also one of the longest producing gold areas with the last mine closing down in 1912.

Louis Michel did not stay long on the Victoria gold field as he was the ninth man at Buninyong, had a claim on the fabulous Golden Point at Ballarat and then bottomed on good gold at Golden Gully, Bendigo.

Louis Michel returned to the hotel business and in March 1853 became the licensee of the Ship Inn at Williamstown which he vacated by June 1856.

He next became licensee of the Duke of Wellington Hotel at the corner of Russell and Flinders Street until 1877 when he sold out.

After he sold the Duke of Wellington Hotel he became rate collector and valuer for the ward of Victoria at the City Council. Louis Michel held prominent positions in the Orange Lodge and the Freemasons for many years.

Louis Michel died at the age of 79 years leaving a grown-up family, all of whom married.

A number of architects, a profession which required an interest knowledge of the arts and crafts, lived or still live in Warrandy had connections here. Amongst these were Robin Boyd, son of Penle Boyd, who spent much of his childhood here, and as mentioned previously, Fritz Janeba. Others included John Hipwell with wife Betty, Doug Shannon and wife Jess; while Bob and Jean Eggleston spen a great deal of time in Warrandyte.

Bob Eggleston was one of my brother Gerard's best friends from University days and spent much time with our family. He married Jean McLaughlin who had lived with her parents in Panton Hills and, during the war years when Bob was in the Air Force stationed in Canada, Jean lived in Warrandyte sharing a house with Marie Hudson. All knew Connie and Alec and visited them often.


Other visitors to the Smith home who were interested in the arts but were involved primarily in the literary scene, were Clem and Nina Christensen, Robert Close, Alan Marshall and Clive and Janet Neild, founders of the Koornong School in Warrandyte. Alec owned the property which the Neilds bought in order to build and establish the school, and this was the start to a long association. Connie was very involved in the setting up of the school and in giving support to it over the years that it was in operation. A special mention should be made of Lex Goydner, another woman of strong personality who lived in Warrandyte and visited the Smiths.

Connie and Alec loved company and were very hospitable, and their occasional parties, held in the large downstairs studio were always crowded to capacity and beyond. A roaring fire in the big fireplace, music ranging from classical to jazz, a roar of voices in discussion or argument, some dancing and song, provided an unforgettable atmosphere. Alec, a genial host pouring out endless drinks, and Connie, darting about like a busy sparrow, cooking vast quantities of food over the open fire and joining in the discussion, always with a cigarette dangling from her lips, created warmth and cheer. During the war years, when grog was hard to get, everyone brought a bottle or two, and regardless of its type, these were poured into a large pot, probably some dilutant added, then ladled out into glasses or mugs. As might be expected it was a very potent mix and rapidly loosened tongues or released any inhibitions guests may have had. The noise was tremendous and echoed up and down the valley, but fortunately that area of Warrandyte was sparsely populated in those days.

Connie had a great "loaves and fishes" capacity and if anyone dropped in unexpectedly, she could achieve a tasty meal from what appeared to be a withered stick or two of celery, a few tomatoes, odds and ends from house or garden with, usually a pasta base.

She had a genius for creating an unusual and interesting atmosphere and decor in whatever type of house they moved into during their nomadic life. This was helped by her considerable collection of paintings, pottery, sculpture, and other art or craft pieces.

Bunty would be present in the early stages of the parties, viewing the antics of her elders with a tolerant eye, but then slip quietly away up to bed, but whether to sleep because of the noise is a matter of conjecture. Bunty's tolerance probably came from living in two worlds, daytime at state primary school in the company of the children of the more conventionally minded residents of the district, and after school hours in the company of the less conventional or bohemian adults. This has stood her in good stead throughout her life and she is still the same Bunty we all knew and loved.



Frank Crozier (1883 - 1948) He was a war artist during the First World War and did illustrations for the "Anzac Book". He studied at the Melbourne National Gallery School in 1907 and won their student prize for that year for landscape and drawing.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTES:**

1. The grant of a permit under the National Security (Building Operations) Regulations does not relieve the holder from the responsibility of obtaining any approval or consent required by any law of a State or Local Government Authority, and application should be made for any necessary approval or consent as required under any such law. It should be noted, however, that Regulation 15 of the National Security (Building Operations) Regulations provides that no notice given or order made by or on behalf of any local governing authority or public utility undertaking or any officer thereof, or by any Court of a State or Territory of the Commonwealth, requiring the commencement or continuance of any building operation shall be enforceable to the extent to which it is inconsistent with the refusal of a permit under the Regulations or with any condition or limitation in a permit.

2. The word "cost", in this permit, has the meaning given to it in the Regulations, that is:-

"'cost' in relation to any building operation, includes wages paid or due to permanent or temporary employees, sums paid or due to contractors or sub-contractors, and the fair value of all materials used in connexion with the building operation, including provisional and prime cost items, fixtures and installations incidental to the building operation (whether acquired for the purpose of the building operation in the course of which they are used or otherwise) and the fair value of all services rendered in connexion with the building operation, but does not include the time or labour of the person for whom the building operation is carried out, unless it is within the business of that person to carry out that building operation and the time or labour is expended by him on the building operation within ordinary business hours."

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## HISTORY OF WARRANDYTE STATE PARK

Prior to the declara n of the ndyte State Park in 1975, Crown Land in and around Warrandyte was managed by a wide range of authorities including the former Forests Commission, several Committees of Management and the former Lands Department. In addition several parcels of land (e.g. Black Flat and Jumping Creek Reserves) were held under permissive occupancies by scouting groups. In all there were approximately 300 hectares in various public reserves and Crown Land.

In August 1968 an Interim Committee was established by several local organisations to explore ways in which the outstanding natural attributes of Warrandyte could be preserved for the interest and enjoyment of future generations. This led to a proposal for a Warrandyte State Park of some 320 hectares (Interim Committee for a Proposed Warrandyte State Park, 1969).

Warrandyte State Park was eventually declared in 1975 under Schedule Three of the National Parks Act. The Park at that time comprised three separate Crown Land Reserves; Pound Bend, Jumping Creek and Black Flat (part) totalling 135 hectares. These reserves were interconnected by a narrow strip of Yarra River frontage for which the National Parks Advisory Council was appointed the Committee of Management.

## The streets where we live HARRIS GULLY ROAD

Harris Gully Road was named after William and Phoebe Harris who lived in a house in the Gully on the East side of what is now Harris Gully Road. The house was destroyed during the 1939 fires as were the Cherry Plum trees that surrounded it. The land was used to grow crops and it is believed that the Harris family used bullocks to plough the land. The original house was of Wattle and Daub construction.

At the time of her death Phoebe was aged 75, she had previously been married to a man by the name of Halliday. They had three children, Abraham, Phoebe, who predeceased her mother, and Benjamin.

Phoebe was 36 when she married William Harris and they had two children, William and Phoebe, both of whom died before their mother. Ben, who lived with his mother, died the same year. At this time there is no record of William's death. Ben and his mother are buried in the same grave at the Anderson's Creek Cemetary. They died in 1893.

Harris Gully Road was a fair weather only dirt track which the Aumann family used as a short cut to Warrandyte. During the war the army used it to train their truck drivers, a purpose for which it was ideal as it was much steeper than it is now because the road level was raised considerably when it was sealed in recent years. The Austin Car Club also completed their rallied there for many years.

Harris Gully Road was constructed as a Fire Access Road following representation by the Warrandyte Rural Fire Brigade Group in the 1960's as part of their strategic plan for the area. Even as a fire access road it was definitely a four-wheel drive track for most of the year and even then the crossing over Harris Gully was risky.

The road was upgraded and the surface gravelled which was to cause a major problem for the surrounding orchards due to the dust from the road which covered the fruit trees, as the traffic increased continually until the road was finally sealed.

#### OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE CALEDONIA MINE. WARRANDYTE

Wednesday last being the official opening day of the Caledonia mine, the main street in Warrandyte township was tastefully decorated in honor of the occasion as distinguished personages were expected, such as the Governor and the Premier, but owing to more urgent engagements they were unable to visit the district. Besides cabs and coaches, a huge motor bus conveyed many shareholders and visitors to the mine, including Hons. E. H. Cameron, Minister for Public Works, and Ed. Miller, M.L.C., Chairman of Directors of the Caledonia Co. Punctually to the advertised hour of the opening, 2.30, before a large gathering, the engine was set into motion and Mrs. Fritsch, wife of Mr. A. Fritsch, one of the Caledonia directors, broke a bottle of champagne on the fly-wheel and christened the "Good Queen Bess," engine and declared the Caledonia plant open, wishing the Company every success, amidst tremendous cheering.

The machinery is an up-to-date plant of 4 engines and battery of 10 head, and is built on concrete piers and splendully arranged in position, the whole being under the supervision of the engineer at one time, being on the one floor. The winding engine is a link motion 10in. cylinder with 4ft. drum, while the pumping and battery engines are loose eccentric with 16in. cylinder and 3ft. stroke. The battery is an up-to-date automatic self-fewler. with 1050lb. stamps fitted with a concentrating Wilfley table and two new boilers 26ft. long by 6ft 6in high of the Jackass type. The whole plant cost about £3,500.

About 50 gentlemon were subsequently invited to attend a sumptuous banquet held in a marquee erected close to the mine. Here Host Fritsch. satisfied all present by the able manner in which matters were arranged and carried out. As soon as the inner man had been pleased, the various toasts of the day were honoured and drunk.

Mr Miller first proposed the toast of "The King." This was enthusiastically drunk.

The next toast was "The State Parliament," coupled with the name of Hon. E. H. Cameron. In proposing this Mr Miller remarked on the splendid work which the Ministry was: doing, including the Land question. Anti-Gambling and Liquor bills, and mentioned that the Premier with his colleagues were working day and night to further advance the interests of the State. (Cheers.)

14 CEPTEREER 1906 MINING

Mr E. H. Cameron, on rising, was heartily applauded, and thanked Mr Miller and all present for the manner in which the toast was proposed. He apologised for the unavoidable absence of Mr M'Leod, Minister of Mines. He stated that the country owed its prosperity not only to the wonderful seasons but also to the head of the State, Mr Bent, the Premier; for the able way in which he managed tho finances, due to the Premier's cautious-He hoped that all present ness. would carefully peruse the Premier's. budget speech of the previous night, as Parliament was nearing its end. He said that the people should set aside all petty differences in selectingtheir members for Parliament. It. mattered not, he said, whether a man was a protectionist or a freetrader as: long as he went into the House with a view of furthering the interests of the people. (Applause.) In continuing he stated that the Government was encouraging the mining industry with grants for development, batteries, and boring, and trusted they would set aside a larger sum each year, as he felt sure the State would be aiding an industry that was building up the State and would disclose more mines. of the Caledonia stamp throughout Victoria. Mr Cameron then became reminiscent, speaking of thevery early days of the field, viz., 1855\_ He stated that a very large number of people were then on the field and things went on very well, remarking that there no Judkinses at that time. There were four crushing plants at that. time, but owing to the idea being prevalent that the gold did not live down the field sank into oblivion again, but he was indeed pleased to say that the Caledonia had dispersed all those ideas. He then complimented the Company-

on having such an able man as M:-Miller at the head of affairs, remarking that he was a splendid financier, and that the success of the district was due to him and the man that introduced him to it, viz., Mr W. Schlichting, manager, South Caledonia. Ho trusted that the miners in the district would always agree and work peacefully hand in hand with their employers, as without capital labour was no good and vice versa. (Cheers.)

Mr Ed. Miller, in returning thanks, stated that the mine, although caller the parent mine, was by no means so. as work was only commenced in June. 1904, and that with a paid up capital of £1696 17s 6d, no other company tohis knowledge having such a record. had developed into its present condition. 3075 tons of stone had been crushed for 5208 oza, valued at £20,910, enabling £8,625 being paid in dividends, carry on active development and equip the mine with its present up-to-date plant. He hoped that Government would, after making exhaustive enquiries, help many struggling companies to open up respective fields as this once neglected one. He stated that the Caledonia. Coy. had asked for assistance, but getting on to the gold in the meantime had been able to help themselves. He then asked Mr Schlichting to say a few words, as he was the man who in the first place had opened up the listrict by persuading him (Mr. Miller) to put his money into the Caledonia.

Caledonia. Mr Schlichting spoke on the permanency of the work to a depth, and and that the only difficulty was that there was too much surface scratching; he advised sinking to a depth. The toast of "The Engineer" was proposed by Captain Williams of the Arthur's Creek G. M. Coy. He stated that mining men generally criticised each other's work, but he could find no fault with the plant of the Caledonia, which reflected great credit on Mr Merrin, in responding, stated that although the engineer was responsible in a way for the work be engineer was responsible in a way for the work the credit must be given to the mine manager and bis able staff for fixing the plant, as the various parts of machinery came from different parts of the country and this needed great skill in joining. Mr Cottell then proposed "Success to the Mine," health of the Chairman of the Board of Directors, and health of Mr. Till (mine manager), and Mr. Dickenson (legal manager). Mr. Dickenson, in responding, said

Mr. Dickenson, in responding, said that only for the splendid shareholders in the Company and the able financing of Mr. Miller the mine would surely have been closed down.

Mr. Till, the mine manager, who was received with great applause, thanked all present for their hearty toast and stated that the success of the mine was due to the able Board and Legal Manager working hand and hand with him. He-had every confidence in the mine and koked for-ward to a prosperous future when the reaf was cut in the No. 3 level

A spiendid cake of gold weighing 324 ozs, for the fortnight's crushing, was exhibited and much admired by all present.

After singing "God save the King," a most enjoy-able afternoon was brought to a close.

Mr Walsh always supplied the wood for the balls and those concerned would help themselves to the bakery woodheap. On one occasion they had just got the fire going nicely when Mrs. Walsh arrived in a panic and asked them what part of the woodheap they had taken the wood from. It seemed that for some time Jim had been losing wood from the stack during the night and to discourage the borrower and brighten up his fire somewhat, Jim had placed detonators in some of the more conveniently placed pieces of wood. However, all was well as Jim had warned the person who got the wood where to take it from.

The first set of Debutantes to be presented at a Lilac Time Ball was in 1946 when eight young ladies and their partners were presented to Mrs. R. G. Menzies, later to become Dame Patty Menzies.

As clothes rationing was still in force it was a credit to the families of those who took part that they were dressed so well and it meant that many other members of the community gave up some of their precious clothing coupons to make the evening a success.

The Lilac Time Ball was revived by the Historical Society on the 40th Anniversary of the 1946 Debutante Ball and it was enjoyed by all who attended, including a number of former members of the early debutante sets. Jack Stringer and Wilma Bence (nee Hussey), now both grandparents, were the only two from the 1946 debutant set present.

Following the successful balls in 1986, 1988 and 1989, it looks as though the Lilac Time Ball is set to become once more a part of Warrandyte's social life.

At the annual meeting in 1965 a motion was carried to alter the annual meeting of the Auxiliary from February to April, as February was usually very hot and the first meeting for the year of the Hospital Board was also held in February which made it difficult to obtain a speaker or chairman for the Warrandyte Meeting.

On 29th September 1975, members visited the hospital on the occasion of the endowment of a bed in the name of Mrs. Hussey, in recognition of more than 40 years service to the Auxiliary. Each year since then she visited the hospital on Mother's Day with a gift for the mother occupying the bed which had been named in her honour.

Other members to have beds endowed in their names are:-Miss V. Hawkes, Miss M. Houston, Mrs E. Retchford (nee Till), and Mrs R. Smith. In each case the Warrandyte Auxiliary has raised \$1000 to cover the cost of each one.

The annual meeting held at the home of Mrs. Docking on 15th April, 1980 was very special as the Auxiliary celebrated its golden anniversary, with Mrs Prytz and Mrs Paul from the Royal Women's Hospital in attendance. The Mayor of Doncaster and Templestowe, Mrs M. Seedsman, was present, as were the wives of Councillors Scott and Mulcahy, together with a number of other guests and 15 members of the Auxiliary.

Mrs B. Schult, a past president, was the guest speaker and told the assembly of the early days of the Auxiliary. Mrs Prytz conveyed the hospital's thanks to the members for their continued support over the past 50 years, and thanked Mrs B. Peake for her contribution to the Auxiliary during her years in office before making a presentation to her of a silver dish and a card on behalf of the Auxiliary members.

Over the years, Bonnie Peake has filled all three office positions in the Auxiliary. She became Secretary in 1941, a position she held until 1954. She became Treasurer for 5 years and was then President for 18 years. In all Bonnie has held office for a remarkable 36 years.

## EXTRACTS FROM The Evelyn Observer

### Was this Warrandyte's first fatal car accident?

The Evelyn Observer dated 5 June 1908 recorded a fatal accident at Warrandyte when a car driven by Mr Arthur Holmes of Ascot Vale knocked down a small boy.

The boy survived the accident, but died later following an operation at St. Vincent's Hospital the same afternoon.

The boy, Duke Emanuel Michael Doyle was the son of a Warrandyte miner and was aged seven at the time of his death.

Duke was walking along the road with his mother when he left her to whip behind a wagon, a common practise in those days when small boys delighted in hitching a ride by hanging onto the back of a passing horse-drawn vehicle. Adding spice to the free ride was the need to remain hidden from the driver, some of whom were not adverse to using their whip to discourage the freeloaders.

When the wagon was about ½ mile on the Melbourne side of Warrandyte, Duke ran out from behind the wagon into the path of the car coming the other way. Duke was knocked down and finished up under the car which had pulled up in its own length, the only apparent injury being a cut on the head.

Duke was semi-conscious when pulled from under the car and Mr Holmes drove him to a doctor's surgery in Heidelberg.

The doctor's examination found that there were no fractures but about an hour later, Duke was seized with convulsions. Mr. Holmes who had waited with them, drove Duke and the doctor to St. Vincents Hospital where he was operated on to relieve the pressure of blood on his brain. Despite the operation, Duke died some half hour later.


At the subsequent inquest, evidence showed that Duke had run out with his head down from behind a hawkers wagon and struck the car. No blame whatsoever was attached to the driver.

The December 21, 1917 edition of the Evelyn Observer carried the following brief article:-

Two young soldiers from Warrandyte have distinguished themselves abroad, both of them having been decorated for bravery in the field. The soldiers were Lance Corporal H .E. Sloan M.M. (Military Medal) who was classified as a driver, and E. C. Schneider.

The article doesn't make mention of the decoration the men received nor does it make clear whether H. E. Sloan had already won the M.M. and received another decoration.

The Sloan and Schneider names are both part of Warrandyte history - perhaps some of our members could supply further information.



## **Book** Review

Bruce Bence's long awaited book entitled "Fire" has now been published and is available for sale. The book costs \$10.00 and is a soft covered paperback with coloured card covers. The book contains many maps and photographs which have never been published before.

The book tells the story of the Warrandyte community's fight against bush fires since first settlement to the present time. It is written in Bruce's inimitable style with plenty of anecdotes and amusing stories from the past.

The book is thoroughly recommended for everyone interested in the history of Warrandyte and is available through the Society or at the Citizens' Advice Bureau.



The 1954 Debutantes' Return Ball was the first fund raising effort by the newly formed Warrandyte Junior Royal Women's Auxiliary. The Junior Auxiliary was formed at the instigation of Marj Reynolds who trained the 1954 Debutante Set who were presented at the Lilac Time Ball.

The first function that the Auxiliary ran was the Return Ball held in the Warrandyte Hall on Saturday, 15th January 1955. Other functions were organized during the years that they operated and they assisted in staffing the telephones for the 3AW Radio appeal on Mother's Day for two years.




The Junior Auxiliary at that time had 15 members, ranging in age from 15 to 21 years.

Blair to Miss Harrist Belzer, eldest daughter of the late Mr. Philip Belzer. took place in St. Peter's Church of England. What made the affair more interesting was the fact that both bride and bridegroom were born at the Creek and is the first marriage of the kind. 

# GOLD MINING IN WARRANDYTE IN 1859 - 1860

Perusal of the Mining Surveyors reports for 1859 and 1860 makes fascinating reading and reveals a surprising amount of detail on the gold mining activities in Warrandyte at that time. The mining Surveyor for the St Andrews Division, of which Warrandyte was a part, was James Murphy. He was required to submit a monthly report on mining activities within his Division. This article describes the major activities that were being conducted at that time.




### FOURTH HILL TUNNEL


In May 1859 Messrs William Moore and Patrick Gerraghty applied under the leasing regulations for a claim 600 yards by 200 yards of quartz ground on the Fourth Hill. They intended to run adits into the hill from gullies on either side to intersect the numerous quartz veins that were to exist in Fourth hill. The lease was granted in July 1859 and tunnelling operations commenced. The report noted that the strata of the rock stood almost vertically and that it was intended to blast as much as possible. It also notes that this operation was the first substatial quartz mining operation to be undertaken in the St Andrews Division.

By August 1859 the work was proceeding very well with the open cutting at the entrance to the mine completed together with some of the tunnel. A tramway had been constructed along the length of the work for the



Afternon tea will be availabel as well as ice cream and soft drinks and a number of novelty stalls are also on the agenda.


