OPENING FESTIVITIES.

Wednesday, August 6th, will be a reu-letter day in the history of East Ringwood, as that was the day on which the new brick State school was officially opened by Mr. W. H. Everard, who was accompanied by Mr. Beltheras, chief inspector, and Mr. Henderson, district inspector.

The opening festivities, which did credit to the residents, and especially the ladies, who provided a feast fit for a prince, and was witnessed by a large number of parents, children and numerous visitors. Mr. J. Hann had charge of the proceedings, and he made an excellent director of ceremonies.

The new school is a fine brick structure, replete with every modern convenience, stands on four acres of land enclosed with a substantial fence, and is built to accommodate 120 children. At present the attendance averages 60. Owing to the sympathy of the residents basket balls and poles have been provided for the girls, and a new football for the boys. The school has also been pre-

sented with a flagpole and flag.

OPENING CEREMONY.

The opening ceremony was performed by Mr. W. H. Everard, M.L.A., in the open air at the eastern entrance.

Mr. Hann introduced Mr. Everard, who, he said, had done a lot for his constituency, this being the third school he had got for Ringwood since he had been their representative.

Mr. Everard, on rising to speak, was received with applause. He congratulated them on the fine, commodious building which had cost, without furnishings, £2207, and with the furniture the cost would be fully £2500. He considered it right that he should mention the help that had been given by Sir Alexander Peacock when he was Minister of Education, and to whom they were indebted for the present building. In addressing his remarks to the children he said, "This is your school and your ground, and you must regard it as such by ornamenting it with trees to beautify the whole school." They had also been very fortunate in having such an able and competent teacher as Mr. Whittle appointed to take charge of the school. Before unfurling the flag he would call upon Mr. Beltheras, chief inspector, and Mr. Henderson, district inspector, to address them.

Mr. Beltheras said the department had done its best to give them an up-to-date, modern school. He urged them to take good care of it and to keep the building clean and not to destroy the desks and seats. He was pleased to see so many parents present, and especially the little ones. In conclusion he hoped they would do all they could for the honor and glory of their country.

Mr. Henderson, in his address said the children were the trustees of the school and grounds, which carried with it more responsibility than if they were its owners. He congratulated them on having such a capable teacher as Mr. Whittle appointed to take charge of the school.

Mr. Everard then unfurled the flag, which was saluted by the children, after which all joined in singing the National Anthem. Three cheers for the flag brought this part of the ceremony to a close.

A GRACEFUL ACT.

The chairman said before going inside he had a pleasant duty to perform. Since Mr. Everard had represented them in the State Parliament he had done so much for them that they had decided to present him with a small token of their appreciation. He then presented Mr. Everard with a gold medal, suitably inscribed, which would remind him in the years to come of the pleasing ceremony he had that day performed.

Mr. Everard made a touching and feeling reply. He would treasure the memento as long as he lived. It would always remind him of what he had tried to do, and be an incentive for him to go one better in the future. He regarded it as emblematical of the "right hand of fellowship."

Mrs. Everard was presented with a nice bunch of flowers by Louisa Pearce.

This part of the ceremony came to a close by Mr. Everard kicking a minor point with the new football, but on having another try scored a goal.

The gathering was then entertained by the ladies, who provided sumptuous feast, fit for a prince. The chair was occupied by Mr. Hann, who was supported on the right by Mr. Everard and on the left by Mr. Beltheras, chief inspector, and Mr. Henderson, district inspector. After the toast of the King had been drunk with musical honors, the chairman proposed "The State Parliament," coupled with the name of Mr. Everard. The chairman highly eulogised the services rendered to the electorate by Mr. Everard, and said he could not understand how anyone in Ringwood could vote against him. He said the committee had tried to get Mr. Lemmon, Minister of Education, to perform the opening ceremony, but the press of official business had necessitated the Minister's attendance at Parliament that afternoon. The toast was drank in a bumper.

Mr. Everard, in replying, said he was pleased to be present, but he was not going to make another speech. He had done his best to get Mr. Lemmon to attend, but as there was a Cabinet meeting the Minister could not come. He gave a resume of the doings of the State Parliament before and after the election. The sooner Parliament got back to the old Liberal program the better it would be for the State. As regards education, every boy and girl should be given a fair chance. He did not care much who conducted the policy of the Government, so long as good and wise legislation was enacted. He was deeply grateful to them for the manner in which they had supported him at the last election.

Local Government was proposed by Mr. Muiland.

Cr. Mackinlay responded. He apologised for the absence of Cr. Miles. He congratulated them on the splendid school that had been erected, for which they were much indebted to the labors of Mr. Lindsay. He referred to the great benefits of education.

Cr. Mackinlay proposed the health of Mr. Beltheras, chief inspector, and Mr. Henderson, district inspector. He said he was pleased to see those gentlemen present.

Mr. Beltheras said he was pleased to see so many fathers and mothers present, and also the children. He enlarged on what the department was doing in the way of providing education for the rising generation, and eulogised the work done by the "Mothers' Club."

Mr. Henderson thanked them for inviting him and his wife to attend. He gave an interesting address on what was being done for sub-normal children, and the attention that was being paid to the domestic arts, and in conclusion said they were fortunate in having such an experienced teacher as Mr. Whittle appointed to the school.

Mr. Klech proposed the health of Mr. Whittle, who made a very appropriate and fitting reply.

The health of the chairman terminated a pleasant meeting, which will long be remembered in East Ringwood.

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SCHOOL BREAK-UP.

The break-up of the Ringwood East school was held on Wednesday, when the children and parents were entertained by the Mothers' Club. Each child in the infant room was given a Christmas stocking, whilst quantities of ice cream, sweets, etc., were served during the evening. Musical items were splendidly rendered by Edna Symes, Joy McAdam, Peggy Lord, Jean Maggs and Joan Sinclair, and several songs were given by the children of the infant room under Miss Callaghan. After supper the head teacher addressed the parents and children, and presented certificates won by the children at the recent examinations and also the prizes gained by them for spelling and attendance. Mr. Maher, in the course of an address, referred to the fact that he had taken charge of the Ringwood East school at the end of 1928. At the beginning of 1929 there were 50 pupils on the roll, and this number had since been increased to 99 at the end of this year. The work of the early part of the year was hindered by inadequate staffing. In April Miss Rutter joined as junior teacher, and Miss Callaghan began duty as assistant in July, and from then until the end of the year work proceeded smoothly. The result of the year's work was ample evidence that the teachers worked strenuously to raise the educational standard of the school. Merit certificates were gained by Edna Symes, Edna Hann, Bernice Maher, Fred Hodgkins and Lawrence Hobson. Pending in one subject are Lewis Maggs, Ronnie Maggs and Jean McPhee. Qualifying certificates were gained by Peter Williams, Charlie Smith, Alan Grimes, Lindsay Smith, Arthur Burke, Peggy Lord and Dorothy Hooker. The work throughout the infant room showed the greatest possible improvement, for this room through lack of sufficient staff had suffered greatly during the early months of the year. Miss Callaghan, with Miss Rutter, had done particularly well in that department. Owing to increased attendance a further addition will be made to the staff in the new year. He had been pleased to donate prizes for spelling throughout the year. Edna Symes won that for the senior division, Peter Williams in the 5th and 6th grades, and Jean Maggs the 3rd and 4th grades. These prizes have encouraged interest in the important subject of spelling, for no child who has attended this school throughout the year has failed in this subject at the examinations. Regular attendance prizes were won by Peter Williams (the gift of school committee) and Bernice Maher (gift of Mothers' Club). These two had not missed an attendance for the whole year. I wished to thank the school committee and Mothers' Club for

untiring efforts. Much outside work has been attended to by these organisations and the interior of the school likewise. Post primary education was receiving attention. As a result Edna Symes Edna Hann and Bernice Maher will proceed to the Girls' High School at East Camberwell, and Lewis Maggs and Lawrence Hobson are to go to the new High School at Box Hill. At the conclusion of Mr. Maher's address the teachers were made the recipients of several presents from the children.

The successful tenderer for the building of the school was Mr A. E. Weiland and of Cambridge and the contract price £2227. The school was opened by Mr W. H. Everard M.L.A. on 6th August 1924. Mr. Walter W. Whittle was the first head teacher. A further acre of land ^{adjoining} was obtained from Mrs T. J. Tennock in 1952. at a cost of £430.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

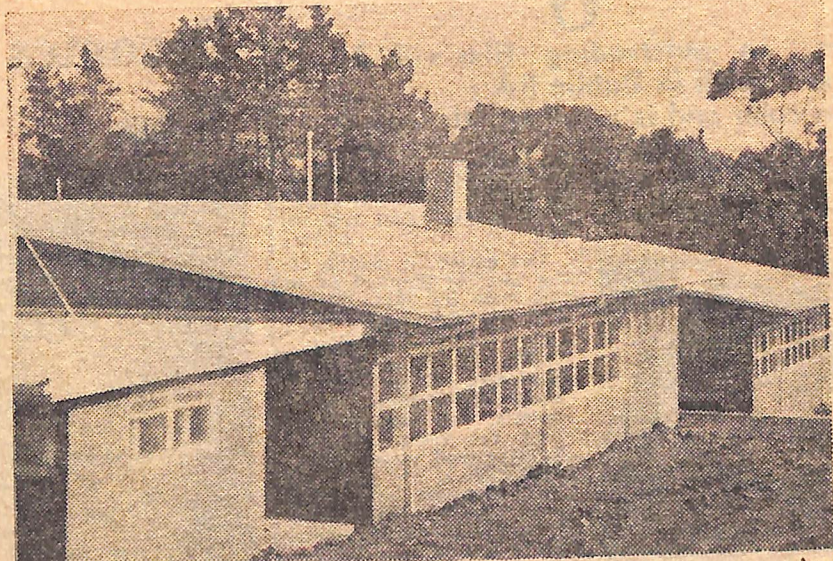

A further resolution that the trustees have a legal agreement drafted and that they be empowered to sign same on behalf of the people was also carried. This was moved by Mr. Krieger and seconded by Mr. Amos White.

Final site works around the eight-classroom buildings on the corner of Aurum and Felix Crescents are now under way.

Ringwood Council ("Eastern Post" July 15) decided at its last meeting — in response to local residents' requests — to ask the Education Department to rename the school Loughnan Hill.

One opening day the new school will take about 125 pupils from
