How to Attract Native Birds to Your Garden

Suggestions for feeding birds

Bird Pudding

A mixture of scraps including bread, bird seed, apple cores, breakfast cereal etc. held together with melted dripping set in a container. Use a long string with button attached, like a wick down the centre.

Bird feeder recipes

Nectar Liquid — Dissolve 450g brown sugar in 568 ml of water. When putting out small quantities, break it down with one part of



heavy syrup to two parts of water. Refrigerate balance. 2 to 3 drops of infant vitamin concentrate may be added. This mixture may ferment in summer, small quantities put out every 2 or 3 days will overcome this problem. Containers should be thoroughly cleaned when replenishing mixture.

Solid Food Mix — Mix equal parts of dripping, sugar, rolled oats and brose meal or dried ground peas.

Suet



Birds will enjoy suet hung up in an onion bas Water

All birds enjoy fresh drinking water, and a small pool or shallow dish to bathe in throughout the year.

Seed

Parrot seed sometimes attracts native parrots if you are lucky enough to have them in your area.

Meat

Scraps of meat (and cheese) are welcomed by Magpies, Kookaburras and Butcher-birds if they live close to your home.




Bird Maze

This bird lives in the city amongst the tall buildings. Can you help the bird find her nest?



Bindstreaking Here is an easy and enjoyable way of learning about birds. It involves watching them in the wild and

recording their movements and activities. Birdstreaking can be done alone or in groups of two or three.



Birdstreaking

Step 1 Choose a place where birds live. Even in cities there are drains and vacant lots where birds are active. Make an outline of the main shapes (hills, trees, water) in your observation area. Leave lots of room for the sky. Don't draw in outlines for the 100 m. directly in front of where you will sit. Sit in the same place each time.

Step 2 Make copies of your outline. Each streaker will need a copy and you will need at least 5 extra copies. Each streaker should attach their outline copy to something solid (i.e. clipboard). Sticky tape a sheet of plastic over the outline. With a watch and felt pens, you are ready to Birdstreak!

Places Where Birds Live

Draw a side view of a bush hillside for your wall. Make it as long as you like.

Place a different colour pin for each bird exactly where you saw it. From: Swamps and Streams

Step 3 Proceed quietly to your observation area. Once there you must not speak or make any noise that will frighten the birds. Record the date and the time you begin birdstreaking. Make each session about 15-20 minutes. As you see a bird moving in the observation area, mark its movements on the plastic sheet. Mark its starting point with an \bullet its direction of flight with an \rightarrow and where it disappeared with an X.

If you know what sort of bird it was, mark its flight path with abbreviations (i.e. Magpie — M, Sparrow — Sp).

If the bird was unknown try to identify it later using a bird book.

If you observe birds eating, drinking or interacting with each other, record this.

Step 4 At school or at home, place the plastic sheets of each streaker together to get an overall-picture of bird activity. Now that you can talk, share what you have observed about birds.

Step 5 Make more visits to your observation site at different times of the day. Stay the same length of time each visit. Observe how the different time of day affects bird activity.

Step 6 At the end of your birdstreaking, report on your activities. Outline the method you used, what you observed and what you have discovered about birds from your observations.

Birdstreaking techniques can also be used with butterflies, dragonflies and bats.






