






Worker bees only live 4-6 weeks but the QUEEN can live for 4





A WORKER THE QUEEN - A DRONE

DRONES are males who don't work. The fastest flying DRONE mates with the QUEEN and then dies. Because they don't work, when winter comes the drones are driven from the hive to die.



Up to 25,000 bees can
live in a SWARM. Most
bees are workers. They* Keep the hive clean,
* make honey from pollen
and nector, and store it
in cells in the comb.

* Nurses' feed the babies.


* Scouts' look for Pollen
and nectar.

* feed the QUEEN with
Royal Jelly from their heads.

The eggs are laid in special cells. The larva are fed first with ROYAL Jelly and then with honey by the nurses.




Bees have 3 small single eyes and 2 large COMPOUND eyes which are like 12,000 single eyes. They let the bee see all ways at once.



When young bees come out of the hive for the first time, they face it while flying in ever widening circles to know how it looks from all angles.



Even from 12 KM away bees know exactly where their hive is and fly in a straight line towards it.



When a scout' finds nectar it returns to the hive and DANCES on a comb. This dance shows the other bees exactly where to find the nectar. They can smell what kind of nectar to look for.

When a scout' A ROUND dance finds nectar shows that the it returns to nectar is within the hive and pool metres of the DANCES on a hive and will be comb. This easy to find.



A WAGGLE dance tells bees the nector is up to 1½ Km's away. The speed and direction of the dance shows exactly where the nector is, and how to get there.



The helmeted honeyeater is truly a Victorian bird. However, much clearing for farming and recreation has meant that this bird is now found in only one or two small areas of south-east Victoria. Thus, this species of honeyeater is in danger of disappearing (extinction). Most honeyeaters feed on nectar from flowers, but they also eat insects. The helmeted honeyeater lays two pale pink eggs marked with red.




MAILBOX
