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PRINCIPAL'S ARTICLE 'NEW HORIZONS'

This is my fifth and final contribution to the Annual Magazine of Parkwood Secondary College. In 2000 I will move to another school, another set of challenges.

As I reflect at the end of 1999 over the past year I feel, as I have had in each of the past four years, that the college is steadily moving forward, constantly seeking improvement. There are no challenges that this community is not prepared to meet and to adapt to. The core ethos in the college community has been again to work in the best interests of the students.

The past year has seen the college further consolidate its position. An enrolment level of 500 was achieved for the first time in nine years. This sets a very firm foundation to move on to the next level of 600 over the next few years. The goal will be to maintain and control the growth and retain that special sense of 'smallness'.

The year 1999 has been characterised as one of innovation across a number of areas. Without doubt, and as in the past, the computer technology area continues to blossom. We are leaders in the district. Innovative links have been established with local primary schools, particularly Warranwood Primary School. Who would have thought some years ago that we would see Parkwood Secondary College students working in primary classrooms with young children? New programs such as the Challenge Program were introduced and success has been seen. New areas such as Dance were promoted this year. Special support programs aimed to enhance the education of boys were introduced. Funding to support programs was gained through the work of staff.

Classroom programs at Parkwood continue to be of the highest quality. The Year 7 program, whilst similar to other schools, has its own specialties and continues to attract large numbers of students to the college. Continuous efforts have been made to make the Middle School Elective Program even better. Greater access to VCE for Year 10 students was introduced in 1999. Our VCE program retains breadth, depth and continuity and is excellent for a college of this size. We are again delighted with the excellent results gained by the VCE students.

For the first time in many years special theme weeks were introduced e.g. Science Week, Arts Week, PE Week etc. These involved the staff and students in special partnerships. Of particular note were the 'business initiatives' of students in Business Management. We saw stalls/businesses being run almost daily in the college during terms three and four – lolly stalls, popcorn, hotdogs, and the like. The students obviously enjoyed their involvement in these ventures. It has also been pleasing to note the sporting achievements of students during the year. One very notable outcome was the higher participation level in sports such as swimming, athletics etc.

Other special highlights that come to mind are things such as the College Production. This year "Wolfstock" was performed over three nights to packed houses. The presentation was excellent and a tribute to the work of a very large number of students and staff. I vividly remember being asked to be the 'judge' in a mock trial performed by the Legal Studies class. These students had done a huge amount of preparation and performed in front of a large audience. A term four highlight was the visit to the college by a troupe of African drummers

and singers. This group certainly involved our students and was a great bonus to our own dance students who picked up many skills.


The college has once again been served especially well by its key leaders — Council, Parent Group, Staff, Student Leaders. Council worked cohesively and dealt with many 'hot' issues such as Self-Governance. This team of parents, teachers and students was able to produce results and direction in the best interests of the whole college community and has been a pleasure to work with. The Parkwood Community Association once again supported the college operations, particularly with its fund-raising. During term four alone some \$10,000 was passed over to the council with the money to be spent on things such as sporting equipment/uniforms, woodwork equipment etc. Without doubt the teaching staff has put in superb efforts in working with the students. Staff has been well supported during the year in the enhancement of their teaching and learning skills and 1999 saw the first residential staff professional development conference at Healesville. Our college captains, Robert Chellew and Jessica Salmon, along with the other student leaders have acquitted themselves well in providing leadership and representation for the student body. Students in the college have been consistently recognised for the their contributions — at college assemblies, house meetings and the Annual Awards Night.

The year 2000 will see Parkwood students in a new uniform. The presentation of the college will be further enhanced with new signage throughout the college. This work will build on the \$500,000 that has been spent during 1999 in refurbishment works.

I want to conclude by thanking the parent and staff body for their support for the college during the year. A very good learning atmosphere exists in this college. I want to thank the team who has put in many hours preparing this Annual Magazine. The new millennium will bring its special challenges - the direction of the new government was unknown at the time of writing; the college will be under new leadership at various levels; the college will continue to grow; the need to find ways to encourage students to adopt a true love for learning will continue; technology will both serve the college and frustrate it (never enough, not always working, not always state of the art) etc etc. Nevertheless with the spirit of support that pervades the community these and other issues can be effectively dealt with.

I wish all those connected with the college success in the future. I want to thank the huge number of people who have worked to make Parkwood and successful place. I want to thank the vast number of members of the college community who have supported me in my work here. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time at Parkwood Secondary College and I will be sad to leave.

ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S ARTICLE 'ADDRESSING THE CHALLENGES'

Working for continuous improvement has been the focus for Parkwood Secondary College throughout 1999. This is a direction, which most certainly will continue into the new millennium.

Students and staff have been confronted with a number of challenges, which have been taken on board as opportunities to move closer towards our defined goal.

Staff professional development has been central to the development of effective programs, which better address the learning needs of students. The decision to work closely with our primary school colleagues has proven to be reciprocally beneficial to the learning of teachers as well as the students.

Learning and teaching remains a priority for professional development for the year 2000 and we look forward to expanding our work with local primary schools. We can most certainly learn a great deal from each other, see issues more clearly and work towards enhancing the transition of primary school students into the secondary setting.

The VCE Study Skills Camp, was a great success. Follow up was maintained through out the year. In particular, the year 12 students were interviewed and counselled on an individual basis as a means of ensuring that any issues were clarified early enough for them to gain the very best out of their study program. In 2000, the plan is to run a study skills camp for year 11 students and a workshop for year 12. It is also intended that some extensive work be done with the year 10 cohort.

Student leadership has also been a focus for 1999. In addition to the College's Student Leadership structure which provides opportunities for leadership across each of the sub-school areas, a number of "Leadership Skills" courses have been run with the collaboration and support of such community organisations as the Regional Extended Family Service in Ringwood. In particular, the Year 9 leadership program as a means of preparing students for key roles within the college (such as Peer Support and Student Mentor programs)

The Strategic Planning Team (a sub-group of the College Council) has addressed a number of topics this year and made a number of recommendations to Council. One such recommendation was the running of the Parent and Community forums as an opportunity for community members to have a say in the college or as a way of addressing and discussing issues pertaining to our youth (Jim Stynes Forum). The feedback from these forums has demonstrated them to be a real success. The Strategic Planning Team has already begun its work for the year 2000. Again providing an opportunity for bringing the community into the College.

The above are only a few examples of the excellent work, which has taken place within our College during 1999. In my second year here, I have been able to establish closer links with not only the students but also the parents and local community groups. I am proud to be part of the leadership team in a college, which is out of maintenance mode and where everyone works towards the achievement of common goals. We have been able to extend the Parkwood Community into the local primary

school arena and made ourselves known because of the excellent work we do. The challenges have been there and we have risen to the occasion.

From a personal perspective, I have also been confronted with the challenge of parenthood, and what a fantastic challenge it is (we are just starting to move away from the 3.00AM feeds). It has been a steep learning curve, which I am told will continue for many years to come.

On a final note, I wish to thank our Principal, Martin Culkin, whose vision, commitment and leadership, has placed Parkwood in the enviable position it currently enjoys. Personally, Martin has been my mentor and friend and I take this opportunity to wish him every success in the challenges facing him in his new position.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the staff, parents and the College Community for their support and for the hard work and the commitment they have made to the College over this last year. In particular, I wish to thank the students who in fact are Parkwood Secondary College. I look forward to working with them in 2000 to make Parkwood even a better place to learn in.


We looked at latest brain research to increase our understanding of teaching and learning methodologies that enhance student learning.

The residential in-service was only one part of the on-going commitment from staff to engage in a continual process of professional growth. Ultimately we are all part of the same learning journey.







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


... Science


HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The two major events in this area during the year have been **Physical Education Week October 15-19** and a camp for Year 9 and 10 girls to the **Bogong Outdoor Education Camp.** Both activities were conducted to encourage students to be involved in physical activity and promote the benefits of exercise.

Different activities were conducted during Physical Education Week, mostly at lunchtime. These ranged from a basketball shooting competition to a golf clinic and a staff versus VCE students netball game. The aim was to offer a variety of activities that enabled students from all year levels to participate. Overall, the response was excellent. A sports quiz, which required students to answer sixteen questions, was also conducted. Every student was given a list of the questions in their PE classes and it was up to them if they wished to take part. A number of correct answers were received with **Amanda Shanahan in Year 8** the winner after a draw was conducted.

Twenty girls from Year 9 and 10 were given the opportunity to spend a week at the Bogong Outdoor Education camp. Our girls shared the camp with students from Preston Girls College. The camp took place from November 1-5. The aims for the week were to provide an experience that offered activities to extend and motivate participants as well as assisting them to develop their ability to work as part of a team. The students participated in a range of activities, some of which they had never had the opportunity to participate in before. Activities covered included rockclimbing, abseiling, canoeing, orienteering and initiative activities. The consensus was that the activities were very successful and all who participated thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Thanks in particular to Ms Tsioutiouras, Ms Wilson and Ms Beardall for taking the camp and Mrs Goodger for her organisation of the camp.

DANCE & DRAMA





Students also participated in a lunch-time Raku-ware making session with their high lustre works to be fired a later date.


The Middle School Dance students enjoyed a wonderful experience with the African Dance and Drumming group "Wild Moves".

for more lopping.




HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ENGLISH FACULTY


