












PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The year 2000 brought with it a number of challenges. Moving into the position of Principal after having been the Assistant Principal of the College for the previous two years was filled with both excitement and at the same time with some reservation. However, in taking over the role so well executed by my predecessor, I have been allowed to lead the College Community towards a new direction based on a vision strongly linked to continuous improvement.

To this end and with the support of the students, the staff, the college council and the college community and through the work of the Parkwood Community Association (PCA) a number of initiatives have been implemented throughout this year some of which will continue into 2001.

The close links that were previously established with our local feeder primary school were strengthened through the College's success in being selected to be part of the Middle Years Research and Development Project (MYRAD). I wish to thank Trish Prentice and Joanne Paterson, our College representatives, for their work in the coordination of the project, the results of which have been a major part of our triennial review and the development of the College's new direction for the next three years through the College Charter. The collaborative approach established with Croydon Hills Primary School, Park Orchards Primary School and Warranwood Primary School has provided the basis for our success in being awarded a Science in Schools Research Project grant for 2001. We look forward to working closely with these schools in future years.

A number of very positive student centred activities have allowed the College to make it's mark on the community. The establishment of "Parkwood Day" as a celebration of student "Health and Well Being" was well received by the student body as well as the community at large. This coupled with "Mental Health Week", the individual Key Learning Area celebrations across a number of designated weeks and a number of Community Evening Forums" have reflected the determination of the College to focus on the students as the core business of this learning community. Many thanks to Ann Adam, Sandy DeBortoli, Ann Camps, Dot Henwood and the four Heads of learning and their support staff for the work they did in planning for a number of these events.

The continuation of such programs as the year 11 study camp and the year 12 study days have provided a firm base in the area of study skills in order to support students to rise to the challenge of both the VCE and the Vet in Schools programs. Further to this, the establishment of preparatory classes for the study of Mathematics in 2001, which ran in December 2000 and the provision of bridging programs for all VCE studies to be carried out during the extended vacation aim to support student progress and achievement even more.

The provision of the Year 12 Study Centre comprising of a study room, a common room and a computer suite was achieved through the support of the College Council and the PCA. The establishment of this more positive learning environment aims to further enhance student learning outcomes.

The College has undertaken a major review of a number of its policies. The revised documents will form the guiding principles under which the college will operate. Together with the new College Charter these policies will provide a clear direction towards achieving our vision.

Our students and staff have performed admirably both within and outside of the classroom arena. A number of students have achieved excellent results in a variety of nationally run competitions including, English, Maths and Science. One of our year 11 students has been awarded a "Science Fellowship" which he will take up over the Christmas break. He will be working with a Science Mentor through the Australian Serum Laboratories.

The College Production, was a real success thanks to the commitment and dedication of students, staff and parents. Close to half of the student body was involved in bringing this performance to fruition. As well as performing on stage, students were involved in making the sets and the costumes and were responsible for the sound, lighting, makeup and being members of the back stage crew. Our College band conducted by Mrs. Janet Street performed brilliantly in their delivery of the musical score. The

Performing Arts students put on a number of performances throughout the year and our year 8 debating team under the guidance of Ms. Joanne Paterson won the cluster series of debates and hence represented the cluster in the regional challenge.

One of the highlights of this year's events was the visit to the College of a number of students from Shoyo High School in Japan. The college community had a great deal of responsibility towards the success of the program seeing that our visitors were billeted with college families for the two and a half weeks of their stay. All involved had a great time and a great deal was gained by all from the experience. Many thanks to Mrs. Brenda Lorden and Mrs. Dot Henwood for the work they did in the organisation of the program. We are currently planning a reciprocal visit to Japan in April 2001.

As a member of the Eastland cluster for the provision of Vet in Schools programs, the College delivered the Certificate II in Hospitality Operations as well as the Enhancement Program in Hospitality for a number of our students as well as students from a number of our neighbouring secondary colleges. We value the partnership established with Croydon Secondary College, Heathmont College, Maroondah Secondary College, Norwood Secondary College and Ringwood Secondary College and hence we will continue to offer both hospitality programs in 2001 as well as take advantage of the programs delivered in each of the other schools. The expansion of Vet provision across the cluster is currently being addressed and Parkwood has a pivotal role in its success.

The College staff has been involved in an extensive program of professional development including such areas as the New VCE, CSFII, innovative curriculum delivery, managing difficult behaviours and addressing issues to do with the education of both girls and boys. We are currently reviewing our Middle School structure and program with the aim of implementing some of the recommendations of the MYRAD project as well as addressing further the specific learning needs of both girls and boys through the provision of a more engaging learning environment.

One of the things we can be proud of as a College is the establishment of stronger links with community organisations. Throughout 2000 these organisations have supported our students, our families and our staff in a variety of ways.

KYM Employment Services, through the job pathways program has provided invaluable careers support through counselling, the provision of training programs aimed at preparing students for the workforce, and on some occasions keying students into apprenticeships. Our Careers Co-ordinator Mrs. Sharyn Price has done a wonderful job in co-ordinating her work with that carried out by KYM.

The Regional Extended Family Service (REFS) has provided a variety of leadership and support programs for our middle school students.

Youth Focus through the City of Maroondah has provided some financial grants that have allowed our Student Welfare Co-ordinator to provide further support in specific areas which otherwise may not have been possible.

The Maroondah City Church has strongly supported the implementation of Parkwood Day as well as having provided a series of guest speakers such as the phenomenal "Reggie Dabbs" as well as a number of rock bands for student entertainment. We look forward to building even closer links with these organisations in 2001 and aim to expand on these through such things as the "Volunteers in Schools" program as well as establishing further links with local industry.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all the staff, the students and the community for their support throughout this year and for the hard work and commitment with which they tackled all the challenges. Furthermore, I wish to acknowledge the work of the College Council and its committees in setting clear directions throughout 2000. I look forward to working with you all in 2001.



12:40pm: Not much lunchtime left!





2000 has been a wonderful year for LOTE at Parkwood!! Through the Department of Education, Employment and Training we received a **LOTE GRANT** of \$2670. We have purchased a new TV, VCR and trolley for showing LOTE videos. The faculty has also purchased Indonesian dictionaries, Japanese books and videos. We will also be acquiring a computer and programs for LOTE.

Publicity for the LOTE faculty has been boosted with several articles being published in the local press about our activities.

All LOTE students had the opportunity to sit for the **AUSTRALIAN LANGUAGE CERTIFICATE**, a graded test available throughout Australia and Oceania. There were many **EXCURSIONS** also taking place throughout the year. Mrs Adams took her Year 9 Indonesian students to the Indonesian restaurant 'Nelayan' for lunch. Year 10 Japanese students went to a 'Year 10 Japanese Extravaganza' at Monash University in July, rubbing shoulders with 1500 students from all over Victoria. Mrs Lorden and her son Hillary also went to Japan in April, and planned for the first Parkwood trip to Japan, to hopefully go ahead next year. And of course, Parkwood again hosted Japanese students from Shoyo Senior High School.

LOTE WEEK was held from August 14th-18th and we thoroughly enjoyed Balinese dancers from Luther College, an Indonesian self defence demonstration called 'Pentjac Silat' and drumming on the 'Kendang'. Pentijac Silat was performed by Mrs Bachinsar's sons, Michael and David, and his girlfriend, Megan Phelps. The Balinese dancers were Mr Bachinsar's Year 7 students at Luther. Our other visitor was the Pentjac Silat instructor and leader Mr Lesley Irawan. The drumming performed, called the Kendang Pentjac, is a specially designed musical instrument for performing Silat, where the body movements are in harmony with the rhythm. We were excited to have so many students interested in viewing these demonstrations and thank all those involved very much for their time and effort. In 2000 we have had Japanese classes in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10, Indonesian classes in Years 7, 8 and 9 and a German class. In 2001 we hope to expand Japanese to Year 11 and Indonesian into Year 10.

SHOYO SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL VISIT 2000

This year we were lucky enough to host 2 boys, 16 girls and 2 teachers for 17 days. They came from Shoyo Senior High school in Takasago in Hyogo ken in Japan. They studied English with Heather and Kerry, joined the Japanese classes for origami, photos and chatting to our students, and they went on four wonderful excursions organized by Mrs. Henwood. They visited Healsville Sanctuary; Menzies Creek Primary School, Melbourne; Queen Vic Market, Daimaru, Southbank, the Port of Melbourne and enjoyed a Yarra River cruise. There was a barbecue at Sugarloaf Reservoir, and finally a lovely farewell party at school, when each student performed a different act. Our Home Economics experts provided a massive and delectable smorgasbord for 120 people. The fabulous host families looked after the host students with typical generosity, and we thank them all very much. Parkwood is planning to go to Japan for the first time in 2001, and we hope to visit Shoyo Senior High School during that trip.
















SOSE FACULTY - 2000

Year 7 Geography students also had an enjoyable day on their Melbourne City excursion and IMAX film.

Next year will bring several changes to the SOSE curriculum with Civics and Citizenship being offered for the first time to all Year 10 students. New units will also be offered in the middle school, including Slavery, Civil Rights, Contemporary Aboriginal History and Polar Regions.

- 2/3 Cup Cocoa 1 1/2 Cups Icing Sugar

250 Copha

- 1. Combine dry ingredients in a bowl.
- 2. Melt copha in a saucepan (on low heat) then pour over dry ingredients mix well.
- 3. Spoon mixture into paper patty cases.
- 4. Refrigerate until set.

Sedimentary rocks commonly form when particles of sediment, such as sand, soil and rock particles of different sizes (dry ingredients) are cemented together (copha). In time the mixture hardens and forms rock.

Did you know...

Approximately 50% if the average household's garbage is made up of food scraps and garden waste. An alternative to putting these items into the garbage (which goes into landfill) is to consider starting a compost heap. Compost is also great for the garden – it helps improve plant growth, increases the nutrients in the soil and improves plants' ability to resist disease.


Music News








SCIENCE EXCURSIONS IN 2000

On the third of March, the Year 12
Chemisty students started the excursion crucade. They went to Monash
Univeristy to complete experiments using modern instrumental analysis, namely Gas Liquid Chromatography, Visible Spectroscopy, Atomic
Absorption Spectroscopy and High
Performance Liquid
Chromatography. The students were able to use the specialised equipment, thus helping them to understand the function and operation of the apparatus.



Year 11 Biology students visited the Zoo where they studied the diet and dentition (tooth patterns) of many animals. They also had an enjoyable time examining animal skulls and dodging the ever territorial behaviour of the male lions.

Year 7 students also visited the Zoo where they studied animal diversity and classification.



CONGRATULATIONS

One of the many success stories in the Science area has been the awarding of a Science Fellowship Award to Michael Napl of Year 11. During the Christmas break he will have the privilege of working with one of Australia's science research teams.

Another successful application was the Science in Schools Research Project which was awarded to Parkwood SC and Croydon Hills PS. In 2001the two schools will be working in close collaboration on the following focuses: improved teaching and leraning practices, curriculum development and better integration of the primary and secondary schools.

PSYCHOLOGY

Thirty Parkwood students undertook VCE Psychology studies this year, including a number of students from the Challenge program. The students had the opportunity to have a close look at many aspects of human beings - from the nervous system (brain and spinal cord) to intelligence. normal and abnormal behaviour, sleep. memory and learning. One of the highlights of the year was an experiment that the Year 12 students conducted, using Year 7 students as their subjects. The experiment aimed to find out the most effective way of retrieving information from memory, using a set of nonsense syllables (made up three letter words). As a result of the experiment many students gained practical strategies that they could use to help them to remember information they needed to know for their


Our sporting teams have been competing in the Maroondah District competitions throughout the year. Students have been representing the Collage at all year levels and in a wide range of individual and team







without her.




