Principal's Report:

Continuous improvement has been the focus of all the planning and development that has taken place during 2001. The desire for the achievement of better learning outcomes for all students has driven the college community to review and evaluate current practices and procedures in relation to both curriculum and co-curricula structures, continue to support areas of best practice and extend this to all other areas of the college.

Our work with three of our local feeder primary schools has continued during 2001 with great enthusiasm and commitment. The collaborative approach established via two very important research projects, namely "The Middle Years Research and Development Project (MYRAD) and the Science in School Research Project (SIS)" has established the gateway for other joint projects to take place. As an example, a shadowing program is currently in place where Parkwood staff work very close with primary school colleagues in a reciprocal classroom observation and team teaching effort as a way of addressing some of the issues related to Year 6 to Year 7 transition.

The Curriculum Links network which began between Parkwood and these feeder primary schools as a way of sharing curriculum practices and establishing an avenue for joint curriculum development and implementation strategies, has been the envy of a number of other schools in the area. This network has now extended to include a larger number of schools.

The recommendations derived from MYRAD have been taken seriously across the cluster schools. As a result, Parkwood conducted a review of both the curriculum content and curriculum structure. After a great deal of analysis, research and thought a new model in line with the MYRAD recommendations was drafted and presented to the college community. It was received with overwhelming support. A restructuring and redevelopment of our Years 7 to 10 curriculum has taken place for implementation in 2002. Further to this, our plans for next year include an expansion of our sport and music programs.

Our strong relationship with the other secondary colleges in the Eastland Cluster continued across the year with Parkwood offering and teaching the Certificate II in Hospitality Operations in conjunction with Swinburne University (TAFE). In 2002 the VET in School offerings across the cluster will be even more extensive.

The establishment of the "Artist in Residence" program has brought a new level of enthusiasm across a large number of students and classes. Cherry Manders' work with the students has seen the establishment of a beautiful memorial garden, the development of the two courtyards inside the administration block and the implementation of a large number of projects across various areas of the curriculum. One such project has been "Turning Japanese". Cherry designed this project as a support to the Japanese LOTE program. This project supplemented the students' learning of Japanese language through an appreciation of Japanese culture.

The Mentor program has provided invaluable support to the college. This continues to offer another dimension to the learning process for a number of our students. The relationships, which have been established between the mentors and their students, cannot be easily described. They most certainly have developed into invaluable partnerships. Our volunteers, be they mentors or library support personnel continue to be highly valued members of our community and I thank them for their commitment and dedication.

Student health and well being continues to be a key focus of the college. The Student Services area was enhanced during 2001 with the appointment of a Chaplain. Warren Turner's (Wazza) presence in the college has most certainly provided another avenue for students to gain support and guidance as required. His excellent work has also provided great help and support for the staff.

Parkwood Day was once again a great success. The theme of "Mind Matters" offered the perfect opportunity for our young people to address the area of mental health and to embark on the exploration of behaviours, which support or hinder sound mental health. The opportunity for some excellent guest speakers and workshop presenters was coupled with some highly challenging fun activities. An important aspect of the day was to ensure that our young people were well informed about the availability and method of access of local community resources. Parkwood Day was well supported by students, parents, staff and community groups such as Maroondah City Church.

The College Production was once again overwhelmingly positive with a large number of the student population being involved in some way. Our Junior School and Middle School debaters experienced great success in both local and regional competitions. The Lions Youth of the Year Quest resulted in excellent outcomes for the College. Sarah Haythorne (College Captain), Matthew McMahon (College Vice-Captain), Daniel Rose (Year 12) and Emilea Ardolic (Year 11) were all finalists. Matthew was awarded first place in the Ringwood competition

and was then a contestant in the Regional finals. Sarah was awarded best speaker in the Ringwood competition whilst Daniel and Emilea were awarded second and third place respectively in the Warrandyte competition.

There has been a continuous upgrade of college facilities including the provision of a Year 12 Study Centre comprising of a common room space, quiet study area and computer suite. Upgrade of the computer area establishing a workspace for the IT technicians and an extension of the cabling works which began in 2000. Provision of air conditioning in relocatable classrooms as we'l as in "C-Block" (the area most affected during the very hot summer months) and extensive works across all areas of the college through the provision of ramps enabling equity of access to classrooms and specialist areas for all students.

Re-carpeting in both the Computer Centre and Resource Centre was achieved with the minimum of fuss during the second term break. All of the above has provided a much more comfortable environment for teaching and learning to take place.

Many other things have taken place throughout this year, too many for me to mention in this short article. However, it is imperative to understand that all of this was achieved through community spirit. The collaborative approach across all sectors of our college community is fundamental for our continued success. I take this opportunity to thank the students, the staff, the parents, the College Council and its committees the Parkwood Community Association and all the community groups who have supported us throughout 2001. I look forward to working with all of you in the new year.

Ravishing you looked today. Yet your cuteness will always stay Amusing you were always to me. Noble, more with each day.


Racing was your dream. Yes you loved to ride your bikes. Always one to enjoy ones edf. Nothing was 'I might'.

MY FRIEND RYAN EVANS

I met Ryan on the grade 6 orientation day. In the afternoon, the group had to go to C1 for a class with Mrs. Adams. As the group lined up to go in the classroom, Mrs. Adams asked us to say hello to each other. I turned around and I saw Ryan at the back of the queue all by himself with no one to talk to. I went over to talk to Ryan and say hello. I looked on his nametag and it also said "RYAN". When I said hello, I knew that this friendship chain that Ryan and I had was never going to fade away. When we went into the classroom, I asked Ryan if he wanted to go and sit next to me. He kindly said yes and we sat next to each other for pretty much all the rest of the day. When lunch came along, all of the students had a barbecue. Ryan disappeared into the queue to get a sausage. He came back with 2 sausages! I asked him why do you have two sausages and he said that he had bought me one. I knew for sure that this friendship was never going to end.

After the first few days of school came, Ryan and I became really good friends. We exchanged telephone numbers to organize days where we could go over to each other's house. The day came when I was to go over to Ryan's house after school one day and to "chill with him for a while" He showed me his 2 motor bikes at the time and the Sony Playstation. When I saw him open the cupboard I was so amazed of all the games he had.

I was in most of Ryan's classes. We were going to be in food class together, which brings back memories of Ryan burning the custard in food class in year 7. This day, we went in the classroom all happy and bubbly and we was going to have cooking period 6. Ryan and I got all the ingredients for the custard and went away to our benches and started to cook. When it was Ryan's turn at the stove, he said to me "Ryan, watch this." Ryan had put the stove on full ball. All of a sudden Mrs. Harris screams "RYAN NO!" that's when all of the custard had boiled over the pot and gotten onto the cooktop. The pot was such a pain in the end because the custard had burnt onto the sides.

Just a few days into the school holidays, Ryan invited me over and I went over to sleep the night. Whenever I used to go over to his house, we always played the Playstation. We always played GTA and 007 - Tomorrow never dies, we played DRIVER 1. Ryan put in an "order" to get DRIVER 2. He waited for so long for that game and then he only had it for a short time. Ryan had one of those Humungus big televisions. I had never seen "007 The world is not enough" so he showed me the movie on DVD. Whenever I went over we

would always have a plate of NACHOS of Ryan's secret recipe. I always liked going over to Ryan's house because we always had lots of fun.

Just before Ryan's accident, about 2-3 days before, Ryan, Helen and Noel took me into the city to look at the boats and to go up and down the river for boat cruises. That day was the last that I saw Ryan up until the funeral where I saw him in the coffin.

I still remember hearing the terrible news. I was awoken early in the morning by my mum. She told me that Ryan was in an accident. I told her to leave me alone because it was an early Saturday morning and I thought it was a joke to get me up and dressed. But as I woke up properly and my eyes adjusted to my bedroom light, it got serious and I was so shocked and I didn't know what to think. Later on that day I went to my mums work for support. I was in the waiting room when it hit me that there was gonna be no more daily telephone chats, no more seeing him at school, no more going out places and no more RYAN. I then lost it totally I burst into tears, when I didn't want to cry anymore I went over to the window in the kitchen and stared at the traffic overlooking Kent Avenue. Mum then told me to ring Ryan's mum, Helen because there was something that she wanted to ask me. I rang her on the fax machine in the office area. She answered the telephone upset and stressed. She asked me to give a speech at Ryan's funeral. I said I would do anything for Ryan.

So that whole day I was pretty down and depressed and I wanted nothing but the world to end. As the funeral came closer, I didn't know what I was going to say. Mum helped me by writing some for me because I was lost.

I borrowed my Grandad's suit and I used my choir tie.

Once at the funeral I heard my name said and I got really nervous about the speech. So when I went up there I remembered what my Nan said about staying calm. So I undertook the task by being calm and remembering Ryan and not loosing it again, even in the saddest part, the end. After the service, we said goodbye to Helen and Noel and made our way to the car. When we got home it was hard to adjust to normal life.

We still keep in touch with Helen and Noel.





SCIENCE EXCURSIONS IN 2001
In 2001, Science classes have attended various excursions and incursions which were related to topics covered in class at the time. They included:

The Year 12 Biology class attended a Genetic Engineering Technologies excursion at CSIRO. Students were able to manipulate DNA using gel electrophoresis and transforming bacteria.



SOSE HIGHLIGHTS - 2001

Once again the year has been a very busy and challenging one. Some of the highlights include:

Excursions in 2002

Excursions are an important part of the SOSE curriculum and students participated in a number of activities during the year. These excursions provide the students with an opportunity to conduct field work in relation to the range of topics studied in the classroom therefore extending their knowledge and understanding.

During Semester 1 the VCE Legal studies students spent a day at the Magistrates' Court. They participated in a mock court case and they all enjoyed the experience.

The VCE Geography classes were involved in three excursions this year. Fieldwork was undertaken at Lillydale Lake, the coastal Beaches of Port Phillip Bay and in the Melbourne Central Business District, inner and middle suburban areas of Kew and Collingwood.

During Term 3 one of the Year 7 classes participated in an integrated curriculum unit on the Zoo. A successful initiative developed as a result of the Middle Years Research and Development project and involved the following Key Learning areas: SOSE, Science, Maths and English. Finally as part of the Year 7 program all students will visit the Zoo in December.

Students in Year 10 who studied Civics and Citizenship visited the Australian Electoral Commission and Parliament House in Melbourne as part of the unit. While the Year 12 students were provided with the opportunity to see the big end of town when they visited BHP where they gained an insight into the world of big business.

Regional Initiatives

Another exciting initiative occurred in May when Parkwood Secondary College hosted the Regional Student convention on the topic of Mandatory Sentencing. More that 60 VCE students from across the Eastern Metropolitan Region attended on the day. Ari Freiberg, Professor of Criminology, Melbourne University and Phillip Barresi, Federal Member for Deakin were the keynote speakers providing all of the participants with stimulating and challenging ideas on the issue.

SOSE Week

This year marked the Centenary of Federation, an important celebration in our nation's history. Federation was one of the themes of SOSE week held during second semester.

Activities occurred throughout the week. A large number of students participated in the Federation and the Geography quizzes. So that you can test your knowledge we have included some of the questions from the Federation quiz.

There was, as is the case in any business, a mixed level of success but it did enable them to experience the impact that competition can have on your sales. (The Year 10 students operated their stalls on different days where they were given the opportunity to understand the impact of a monopoly.) All profits were donated to charity.

JAPAN TRIP 2001

As we checked in through the international gates at Norita Airport in Tokyo it hit us- we were excited, exhausted and had headaches due to a lack of sleep. We had so much to do that all we ate was a quick lunch of Mickey Mouse shaped hamburgers! "Space Mountain" was so good that during the big parade, we went on again and again, and again... because the waiting time had dropped from 50 minutes to 5!

The next few days were a blur of temples as we explored Nara and Kyoto. We couldn't believe our eyes when we saw the bronze Buddha in Narra- it was so big that we weren't even as tall as the platform it was sitting on!

Amongst all the paper cranes in the Hiroshima Peace Park, we learnt a lot about the history of the bombing at the Memorial Museum. For lunch that day we found our way to "Mitchans Okonomiyaki"- a little restaurant recommended by Mr. Maile from his time in Japan. We were glad we took the time to go-it was delicious!

The next morning we were off to Himeji Nishi High School. We all began to wonder what it was going to be like, and some of us were a little nervous about the prospect of homestay that night. When we walked through the gates, all you could see was a big sporting ground on your left- most of it taken up by baseball, and the big old school building on your right. Their classrooms seemed really old fashioned, with wooden chairs and desks. We all felt like stars as we walked around the corridors with everyone looking at us and saying "Hello!". We now realized what it must have been like for them at Parkwood. We got a tour of the school and got to going to a lot of the classrooms- most of which seemed really boring, and then went to Himeji Castle with the students. At the school assembly (just for us) we got led on to the stage to sit in front of a student body a little bigger than Parkwood, but it was only students for years 10,11 and 12. Matthew and I had to get up and make speeches. I thought I was going to feel a bit intimidated in front of all to see people but when I got up there it felt amazing to be speaking to them in Japanese and having them understand me!

After school, we went off in our pairs, or alone (like me), to go home with our host families. It felt strange from the moment I sat in the car and was told to take my seat belt off – you don't have to wear them in Japan! But I found myself in a beautiful house that was bigger than my own, which was not what I was expecting, and with a really nice family. We all met up at the school the next morning with lots of stories to tell and got to go to class with our host student for the first period. I ended up nearly falling asleep in a Japanese class. There was a boy in front of me that was asleep on his desk! Most of my friends had a more interesting morning though, some watching Kendo in a P.E. class or contributing to an English class.

As we left for Kansai Airport later that day, we couldn't believe that our trip was nearly over and none of us wanted to go back home! We weren't looking forward to the ten-hour plane trip back to Sydney either. On the bus heading to Melbourne, we were all sick of traveling and just wanted to get back home to bed. But this was not going to happen because about 10 km out of Seymour, the bus ran out of diesel! By the time we had waited for some help to arrive, and then waited for some petrol to be brought to us, our expected 11pm arrival time had passed and so did midnight...until 4am when we finally pulled in to the Parkwood gates.

Despite the disastrous trip home, we all had the time of our lives and couldn't wait to tell our stories to our family and friends. Going to Japan was an unforgettable experience that we all loved so much, we all plan to go back in the near future.

If you ever get the opportunity to visit this weird but wonderful country, don't let it pass you by...

LANGUAGE (ENGLISH AND LOTE) FACULTY REPORT

This has been a busy year as far as the English Faculty is concerned. Many teachers have been experimenting with different teaching strategies and asking their students to extend their Learning Technology skills. Outside the class room, some students have been involved in the MS Reading Competition, while others have concerned themselves with various English Competitions. One important function of the English Faculty was the running of English Week, which asked students to participate in lunchtime activities that focused on the various skills taught in English. These included such events as: an Original Poetry Competition, Debating and Public Speaking Workshops, On Your Soapbox - Persuasive Speech Competition, Harry Potter Trivial Pursuit Competition and of course the highlight of the week's celebrations; a Staff v. Students Debate -"That teachers are out of touch." The debate created a great deal of interest amongst the students, who not only challenged the staff to a further debate, but they also showed a desire to develop combined student and staff debating teams. It all augurs well for the future. In Year 7, students were involved in a Pilot testing project known as AIM (Achievement Improvement Monitor), which included students from a number of selected Primary and Secondary Schools. Both pen and paper and on-line testing, were part of the scheme. The results from these tests will enable teachers of Years 6 and 7, to better equip their students, in relation to improving their literacy standards in the future. In Years 7 and 8, a number of students represented the college in an Inter-Schools Debating Competition against Luther College, Norwood Secondary College and Croydon Secondary College, thus continuing an annual activity that looks like being maintained well into the future. In Year 9, four students were lucky enough to be selected to represent Parkwood in the annual Students' Parliament at Parliament House. The students were given a topic and were asked to prepare a short presentation in relation to it. They were also told to devise a number of questions in relation to another school's topic. It was a great opportunity for the students to learn Parliamentary protocol and to compare their debating skills to those of other schools, both state and private. Finally, we were also fortunate to gain the assistance of Mrs Thelma Leonard, who worked with selected individual students, in order to help them improve their Literacy skills.

In the LOTE Faculty, the teaching of Japanese and Indonesian, are an important part of the college's curriculum and like the English Faculty, there have been some memorable moments. In Japanese, an Origami Club which met at lunchtime, once a week, was introduced and a "Turning Japanese" project was initiated, which introduced students to the full experience of the Orient, from eating suishi with chopsticks to dressing up as a geisha. The college was also awarded a Japanese Teaching Assistant (Sumie Matsuzaki), who visited each Friday to teach both VCE and junior classes in Japanese language and culture. Once again, the college played host to 21 students from Himeji Nishi Senior High School, as part of our annual Japanese exchange program and after the faculty was awarded a \$6000 grant by the Department of Education, Employment and Training (DEET), 10 excited and enthusiastic Year 9 and 10 students, were able to visit Japan, accompanied by Mrs Henwood and Mr Sicari.

During the year, Indonesian students were involved in an **Indonesian Day**, where they celebrated all things Indonesian, by making colourful masks, kites and puppets. They also received a visit from *Sarjana Bumi*, who introduced them to Indonesian musical instrutments and Indonesian toys. Students have enjoyed a further taste of Indonesia, by dressing up in traditional Indonesian costumes, which represented each of the main islands that help make up Indonesia. Finally, with the help of a \$1000 grant from DEET, students have been researching Indonesian in their new library collection and improving their Learning Technologies skills at the same time. In 2002, there will no doubt be new challenges and the further unveiling of the many and diverse talents of our students, in relation to the very industrious Language (English and LOTE) Faculty.
