Principal's Article



This being my last contribution to "Horizon", rather than commenting on our achievements over the past year as has been the case with previous editions or using this as a forum to communicate a heart felt thank you to various people who helped and supported me over the year, I would like to focus on the students, my view of hope for the future and the contribution which Parkwood Secondary College has had in preparing the young people in our care to take charge and shape their own future.

At a time of gloom and doom with all that seems to be currently happening in our global community, it can become very easy for us to lose all hope and to sit back in complacency. We can allow ourselves to fall into the trap of living with dissatisfaction about everything. We are continuously presented through the media with challenging views on the current state of play in a number of areas of our existence. Acts of terrorism, global wars, power struggles, vast injustice around the world, unemployment etc. are increasingly being made part of our daily lives. Our sense of community and personal safety is consistently being questioned and things are being portrayed in such a way that it becomes easy for us to just give up and succumb to a sense of hopelessness.

This is most certainly not what I want to see our young people leaving Parkwood with.

Let's turn things around and look at things from a very different perspective. Parkwood Secondary College is producing well-adjusted, positive young people who will be an asset to our local, wider and global communities. They are young people who will be better prepared in the face of adversity and change. They will be resilient and will have the skills to tackle most things that confront them.

Reflecting back at my own experiences and taking the simple example of career paths and employment options. Today's young people are able to deal with the issues on hand in a much better way than we did at their age or perhaps even today. I remember thinking about what I want to do when I left school. This

involved thinking of a profession that I saw myself in for the whole of my working life. I never even thought that there might be various pathways for me to explore or to even think that I may want to be involved in more than one profession. Of course the argument that always comes up is that there was a greater sense of job security and therefore people did not have to think about a variety of jobs. This may even be true. However, we need to ask the following questions. "For how many people has security stifled their creativity, their happiness, their sense of adventure and perhaps even their sense of fun?" "How many people go to work each day working towards their only goal of retirement purely because they fear losing the level of security to which they have become accustomed?" "How often do we ignore the opportunity to 'Seize The Day'?"

Whilst our young people may be moving into uncharted waters, they have been skilled to work with change and if I may be so bold as to say, even welcome it in various facets of their lives. They are the people who will be planning to experience a number of areas of work by choice whilst knowing that some of the jobs that some of them may end up in have not as yet been invented. This generation will approach the future from a very different paradigm to what we have been used to and it is our task to ensure that we understand where they are coming from.

At our recent "Back to School Day" it was heart warming to hear a group of past students talk about the ways in which their lives were shaping. The things that they had already experienced and what they were hoping to experience in the future. A Physiotherapist currently studying Social Work, a Clerk now a Racing Car Driver, a Graphic Designer now running his own business, a Sports Star now an Occupational Therapist and the list can go on and on.

Parkwood Secondary College has helped mould these young people. Their teachers and the support personnel have most certainly contributed to their development. They are obviously resilient, not only able to cope with change but to look at it as a welcomed friend and most certainly these young people are able to seize every opportunity that comes their way.

This is what Parkwood Secondary College is about and this is how we as a community measure our achievements.

I invite each and every one of you to look forward with hope and a commitment to take charge of what we do to support our young people as they move into their future with skills, resilience, positivity and the ability to embrace change.

In closing I congratulate you all for your contribution not only as a College but also as a whole community, a community that is very much in touch with our global partners.

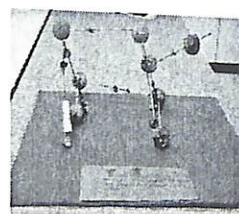

© Make an electromagnet by coiling some electrical wire around a large nail. Attach the ends of the wire to a battery. Now try to pick up some paper clips.

Parkwood's Family Science Night attracted many students and parents. Participants worked through scientific experiments and demonstrations.

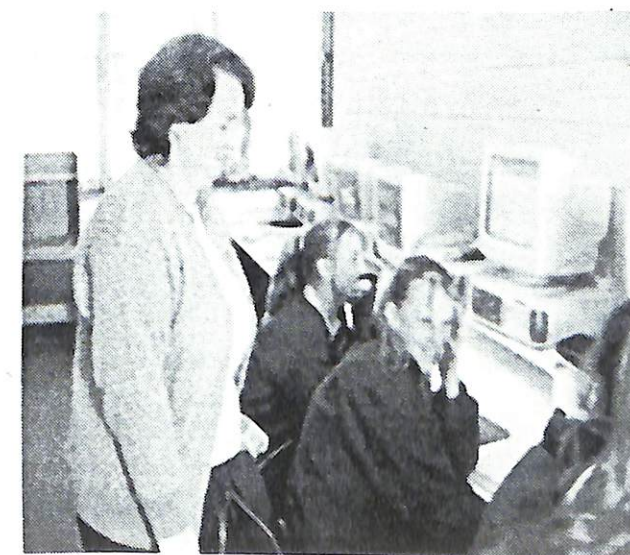
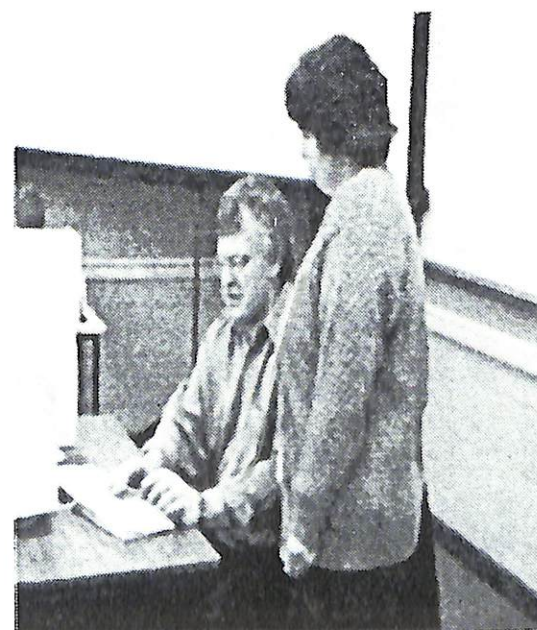
Sose News for 2002

A NIGHT OUT ON THE TOWN

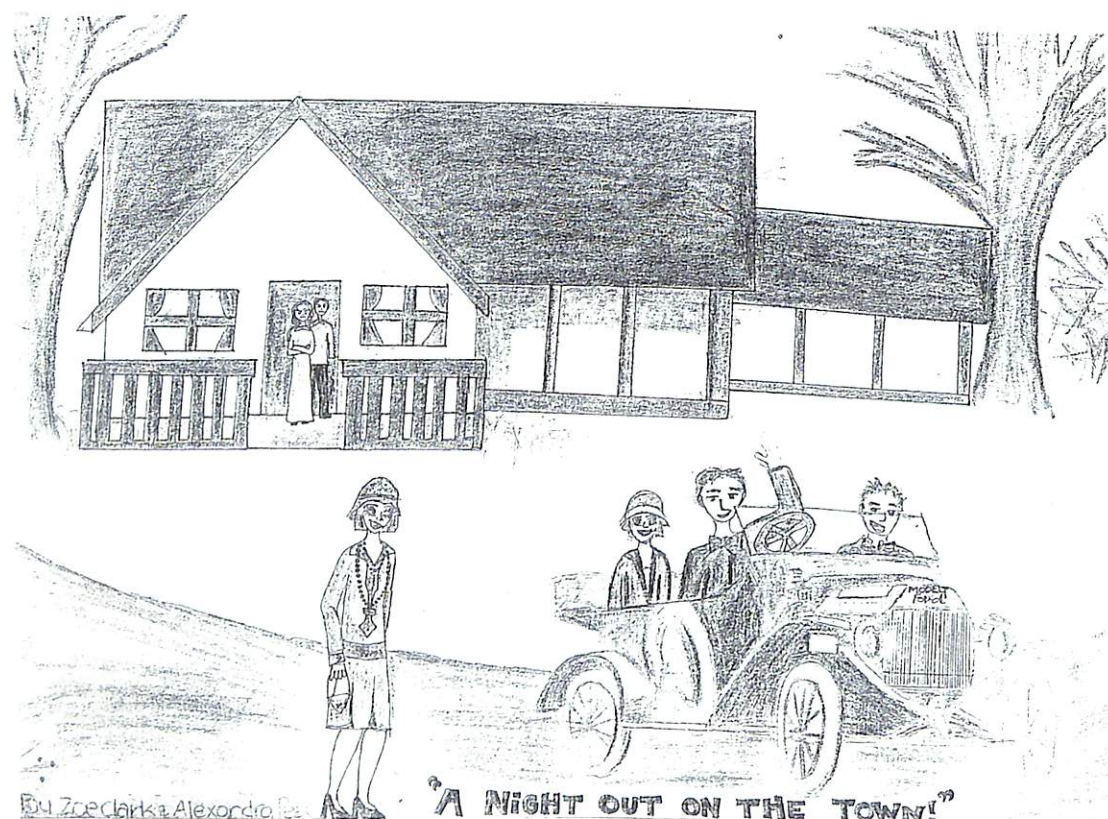
In the 1920's a lot of dramatic changes took place. These changes involved improvement in technology, transport, appliances and social behaviour. It was a time for some major adjustments.

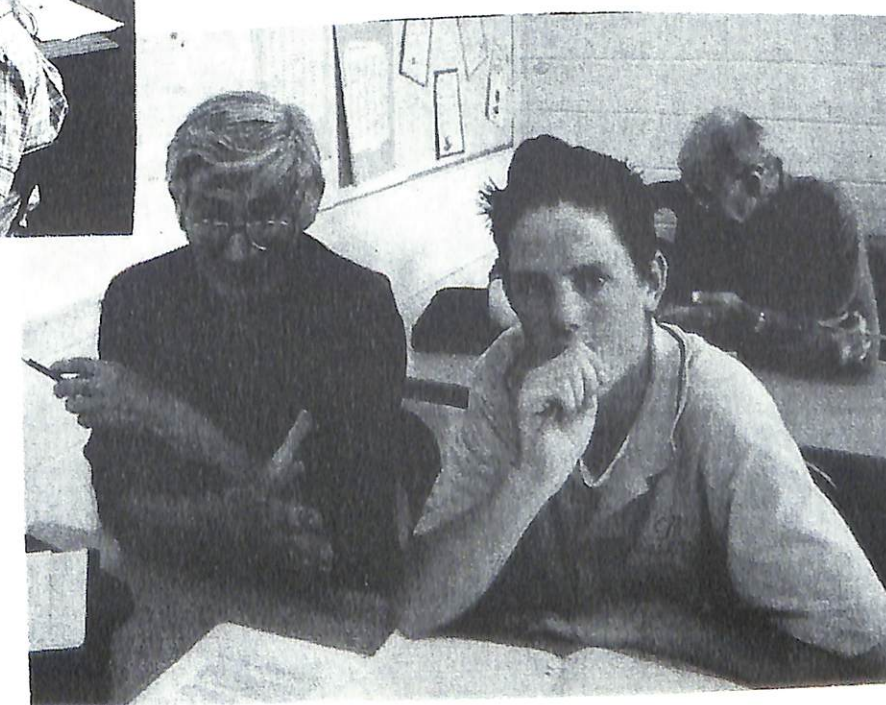

June says... "Being a mentor is the most rewarding feeling!"

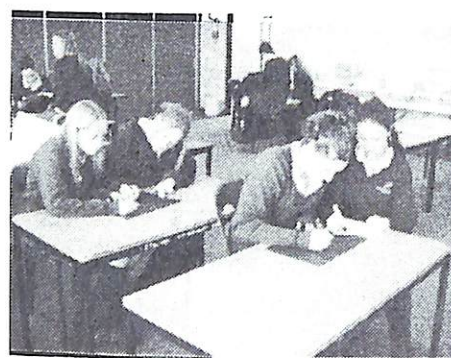


Aiming High 2002

Throughout the school year, year 9 students have participated in the Aiming High program. This program features 4 separate classes (based on a topic such as sport or community projects) and changes completely each term.

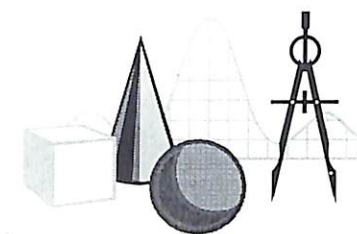
As year 9's, we have been lucky to be the first year to participate and it has been a great success. We are given 6 periods each week (the whole day), on Tuesday to take part in a preferred class, which is selected at the beginning of the year. When several year 9's were interviewed about the benefits of Aiming High to them, they replied that it taught them more relevant skills than normal classes have to offer. "It's much better because you're learning life skills and get to plan excursions"



We talked to one of the main creators of the program, Ms Beardall. "A recent MYRAD report sent out showed that year 9's got quite sick of school and so we looked at different ways to make it interesting." She said. "Different schools tried different things with year 9's".



The program had been created last year when Mrs Morelli and former principal Mr Sicari had brought up the idea of doing something different with the year 9 curriculum. It had been focused on creating more valuable and responsible members of the community. The only problem was that it had been different to most usual classes and students were not used to setting term goals for the class and taking responsibility in what they wanted to learn. "It was difficult teaching in a new way that was not traditional." Ms Beardall said.

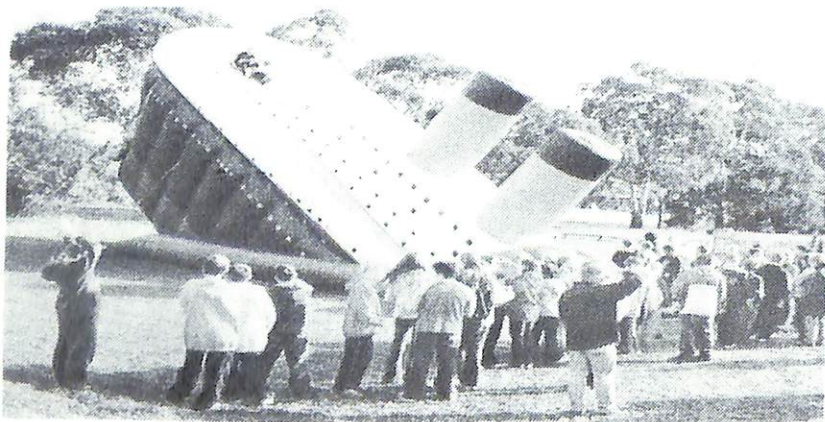
Parkwood Day was a great success thanks to all the people that put their hard work into making it possible for all the students.

Our Artist in Residence, Cherry Manders suggested the idea of students working on a Medieval theme for the Arts Courtyard. Students were keen and interested. They began by researching visual imagery such as illustrations of dragons and castles and then considered the space in which to develop in 2d and 3d artworks. Students formed small groups and worked on sculptural forms. This consisted of drawing, sketching ideas, building out of clay, found bricks, concrete, chicken wire and mural painting. Students were left with a great sense of achievement, culminating in a presentation night of medieval madness!

- Exploring Materials
The introduction of Exploring Materials at Year 7 was well received. Interview with Miss McCormack

Director/Choreographer of the 2002 production 'Charades':

1. Why did you choose the musical production of 'Charades'?

'Charades' is an Australian created musical. We brought the rights from the company 'Play On Words', a company based in Victoria. It was a perfect choice for a school production, due to the musical being full of colourful characters, references of Melbourne and Australia, and of course the humour involved.

2. Describe the audition process?

We had a fabulous turn out for auditions, the best ever! Students from all different age groups came along early in term one, to sing and perform a short script. It was especially encouraging to see so many Year 7 students getting so involved so early in their first year at high school. The decision making process was difficult for both Mr Barron and myself. We had so many wonderful singers and actors to choose from. We did the best we could, by considering the roles we had to fill and our talented student population.

3. Was it hard choosing the right people for the right roles?

The rehearsal process was long and intensive, but all the hard work paid off. Students came to Sunday and Thursday afternoon rehearsals for weeks on end. We had a wonderful show to present to our audience, and the smooth show was credit to the hard work from performers, as well as the students and teachers who made up our great back stage crew, lighting crew, makeup, front of house, set building team.

4. Who came up with the designs for the production?

One thing that was different from other years was running a Year 10 Stagecraft class in term one. This was a really bonus, since they began working on all aspects of the production early on in the year. They chose an aspect of the production that they were responsible for researching, designing and then creating sets, props, costumes, makeup and lighting plans. It was hard work, but like all creative work in the arts the immense feeling of satisfaction after the show 'Charades' made it all worthwhile.

5. Were you ever involved in productions as a kid?

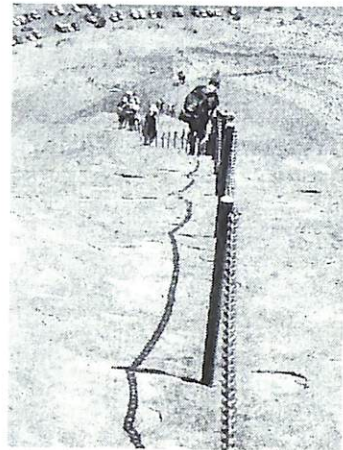
