

Our job is to support and challenge that group of people while at the same time making sure we have the capacity to turn back and reach out for those who fall behind, lose confidence or simply lose their way.

Our biggest challenge is to ensure our students work hard, enjoy their work, and enjoy the benefits that hard work brings. In 2004, through the development of our new School Charter, we will further develop and implement our emphasis on communications (especially the use of communications technology) and literacy. Being

literate is the most important aspect of a young person's education as it allows them to understand and interpret the world and make their own informal judgements and decisions.

We help our students work hard, enjoy the work and enjoy the benefits that hard work brings."

Students will also be expected to be fully involved in the schools co-curricular program including performance, sport, music, debating, film-making and the schools leadership development program.

Our students perform compete argue record interpret participate" In 2004 the Challenge program is being extended from year 9 to years 7 and 9. Philosophy is being introduced at year 9 and the year 9 Aiming High Program will be further developed. This program allows students to work outside the traditional classroom environment and emphasises the development of independent learning, teamwork, increased self-esteem, responsibility and creativity. Choir is being introduced in years 7 and 8.

Next year an Honour Board recognising the achievement of past students and identifying past school captains will be hung in the foyer of the school's General Office.

Parkwood is enjoying a period of renewal and growth and will continue to do so next year.

My task is to ensure this translates into a brighter and better present and a brighter and better future for all of Parkwood's students.


