




























Editor's Report

Principal's Report

Term 2 - Net Sports

This unit is for students to apply basic motor skills to a game situation. Students began to understand how to successfully participate in various net sports, by learning and applying various strategies of both movement on the court and shot placement. This knowledge and skills will allow students great success whilst participating in a variety of net sports.

Term 4 - Sport around the world

Students participated in a variety of sports that have originated from countries around the world and formed a major part of the countries culture

Year 10

Term 1 - Skill Acquisition

Students applied some basic concepts of skill acquisition to a variety of sports. They learnt the difference between open and closed skills. The focus is on practical learning at all times.

Term 2 - Safety and First aid in the community

This term students learnt about Safety and first aid in the community. They have learnt about basic first aid and CPR skills, as well as self defence classes.

Term 3 - Personal Training

Students had to perform a fitness assessment and develop their own personal fitness program. They also went on excursions to gyms and other local facilities to improve and maintain their fitness.

Term 4 - Sports Coaching

The year 10's used their knowledge gained from over the year, particularly skills acquisition and developed a personal coaching program for their peers in a particular sport.











SOSE Faculty

The SOSE faculty has had a very busy year in 2005. The major features of our SOSE work this year has been the incorporation of digital technology to document and support our research, and discovery learning involved with Webquests, investigation of specific topics based around computer research.

However, we have been out and about as well. Firstly, in term 2, the year 7's were taken to the Rialto for a birds' eye reconnaissance of the city of Melbourne as part of their Geography work. The Rialto viewing platform on the 54th floor, allows for a 360 degree panoramic view of the city. It was a beautiful day and the views in all directions were spectacular.

They then went to the State Library where they viewed a photographic exhibition of early Melbourne, and a cluster of extraordinary artefacts including Ned Kelly's armour and gun. The year 7's were fascinated with the exhibition and the stories told by the Library curator. They were also taken on a tour through the various sections of the State Library and demonstrated particular interest in the genealogical research section, as well as the interactive multimedia section open to the public. In term 3 they studied the purpose of Zoos, culminating in an all day excursion to the Melbourne Zoo.

The year 10's have had a very busy year as well. Firstly, most of the year 10s went on a two week work experience program after intensive preparation in the Careers classes in Semester 1. In semester 2, as part of Civics, they went to the Australian Electoral Centre, to study voting systems for the House of Representatives and the Senate, and to learn more about Federation and Australian Government. After lunch, they went to the Immigration Museum to investigate the issue of refugees, asylum seekers and immigrants. Students were very impressed by both the exhibition and the film they saw there.

The year 12 Legal Studies class visited the County Court, where they were lucky enough to witness a kidnapping case. They found it particularly interesting because the jury was asked to leave temporarily after a vigorous argument between the Prosecution and the Defence barristers. Science 2005

Applied Environmental Projects in Year 7

Throughout the course of 2005, a select group of Year 7 boys has been steadily redeveloping the environment surrounding the school. The "Enviro Group", that is, Michael Wilson, Daniel Summers and Dylan Stephenson, have been busily identifying and removing known environmental weeds from the lake area, concentrating on malicious exotics such as *Pinus radiata* (Monterey Pine), *Rubus fruticosus* (Blackberry), *Hedera helix* (English Ivy) and *Pittosporum undulatum* (Sweet Pittosporum). With the main aim of improving the water quality in the lake, and rehabilitating the surrounding bushland, this group, under the guidance of Mr

Scott, is ensuring the continuity of the green belt through the City of Maroondah.

Many indigenous, and several endangered, species of plant have been identified in the work site, and many native species of animals, including tawny frogmouths, rainbow skinks, pelicans, antechinus, water rats, Pacific black ducks, and cockatoos, have been spotted living near the lake. The 'Enviro Group', through its hard work and dedication to improving the environmental quality of the region, is helping to ensure that these important

parts of our society can continue to live and survive in our community.

Maths in 2005

10 Million Challenge - MATHLETICS

Students in Years 7 – 10 were registered for the first time this year to take part in answering 10 million arithmetic questions in Numeracy Week, on-line from either school or at home. Each student was given a password and login number, and then they could choose to play either against the computer or against students from other schools from all over Australia. As many basic arithmetic (+, -, x and÷) questions had to be answered in one minute, with competitors able to see their progress against their opponent on the screen, as the minute passed. Maths classes were heard to be cheering, with a lot of students displaying "white line fever". Lots of fun was had by all and Parkwood students will again be registered next year.

Competitions

Each year students are encouraged to enter the BHP-Billiton Melbourne University Maths Competition, targeting high achieving students, and the Westpac Maths competition, which most students are encouraged to enter, in order to improve exam techniques.

In the Melbourne University Competition, we had two participants (Cameron Jackson of yr 10 and Harley Bevan of yr 8). Both students will be receiving participation certificates. Awards range from participation through to high distinction certificates in both competitions. Achieving higher than that results in cash prizes and medals. To achieve this level, a student would at the very least be in the top 1% of all students in both Victoria and Australia.

Module 2







"This was the best experience they've ever had!"



YĖARO 9 BOGONG EXPERIENCE

Bogong Outdoor Educational Camp is a camp in the Bogong Plains, roughly a 6 hour drive from Parkwood. We wish all the best for this year's Year Eight cohort as they take the next step towards their futures!








Teachers, students and parents have all seen the students grow into young adults. To our extremely successful Year Tens we wish you all very good luck for your future.







The word "Debutante," comes from the French word "debuter", meaning, "to lead off". For thousands of young Australian woman, the society debut remains an important rite of passage.

Traditionally the "coming out" of a young woman represented a change in her status from child to adult and her "introduction" to society. This introduction not only marked her transition to adulthood but also her availability for marriage.
