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

My congratulations to Rachel Arsenis and her team of Year 9 students who have produced this 2007 School Magazine. Rachel and her team have really captured the year at Parkwood Secondary College. Once again our Swimming and Athletics carnivals feature prominently, as do our camps and excursions. On the sporting field Parkwood continues to excel. We compete in Interschool competition in Maroondah Zone, against Norwood, Ringwood, Heathmont, Maroondah and Croydon Secondary Colleges. In recognition of our small size compared to the other schools it was decided to introduce a "Per Capita Shield". In 2007 Parkwood won this Shield, as it has done since its inception. 
MIDDLE SCHOOL REPORT

On the excursion front, things have really been happening this year!

In April, Mr Andy Hicks and I accompanied 13 VCE Studio Art students to Sydney for three days. We took in the sights, explored a range of art spaces, including the Art Gallery of NSW, the Museum of Modern Art and the Brett Whiteley Gallery and we had THE best time! The team got to enjoy hostel living and developed their navigational skills directing us around the busy city. FOOD FABULOUS FOOD!



It was with sadness that we said goodbye to Ms Carvell at the end of last year. The foods department is a much quieter place with her gone and students and staff alike are feeling her loss. However, life must go on!

The aim of the Food Technology department is to equip young people with the skills and knowledge to be able to produce great food, as well as learning vital knowledge about the importance of eating healthy and nutritious food. Our faculty prides itself on providing an excellent introduction to food: what it is; different cooking techniques; tasty recipes for young people; and, what we should be eating to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Some of the fabulous culinary delights produced across the year levels in 2007 included:

Year 7:

Pizzas, mini quiches, jacket potatoes and Vietnamese coleslaw, mini sausage rolls, scones with jam and cream, macaroni cheese, spaghetti bolognaise, and everybody's favourite, choc chip muffins.

Chicken burritos, coconut lemon syrup muffins, fried rice, rocky road trees, chocolate patty cakes, stir fried beef,

Skewered chicken with satay sauce, carrot muffins, chocolate dipped melting moments, san choy bow, vegetarian dim sims, sticky date pudding, rice paper rolls, apple strudel, and individually designed and decorated gingerbread

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REPORT

We are now into the second and final year of our laptop program. Both Year 9 and Year 10 classes use these laptops regularly in most classes. When the Year 9 and 10 classes do not require their laptops, other year levels make use of them. Having one hundred laptops makes it now very much easier for the other year levels to make use of our two computer laboratories and the full class sets of Thin Client workstations in the Library and Room 5. The Visual Arts area also has a "Pod" of twelve workstations with colour printers and scanners.

Year 7 and 8 students are working their way through the ICT Skill Tasks they have been set. By the end of Year 8 they will all have been exposed to:

+ email, internet and the College's Learning Management System called Moodle (Modular Object Oriented Developmental Learning Environment). Students are also made aware of the safety issues involved in using email, internet and mobile phones.

+ File Management, including the organization of their digital portfolio folders in their Home Directories, using USB sticks to back-up their work

+ Spreadsheet work in Mathematics together with the use of Mathletics via the Internet

→ Multimedia including the use of digital still and video cameras and the use of Digital Video Editing Software to produce videos which are then published internally on students web sites.

Our Learning Management System (Moodle) is being used by more and more teachers in the delivery of their curriculum. This system is accessible from our web page http://www.parkwood.vic.edu.au/ or directly using http://www.parkwood.vic.edu. moodle.parkwood.vic.edu.au. Teachers upload assignments and worksheets to Moodle which students can access from home or at school. If a student misses a class, they can go to Moodle and find out what they have missed. Students can upload their completed tasks to Moodle for the teacher to mark. The teacher will then post the mark and comments on Moodle for the student (and parents) to access. Parents should ask their children to demonstrate Moodle to them from their internet access at home.

The Video Conferencing Project involving the Maroondah Coalition of schools is also making steady progress. We have successfully connected Parkwood with Norwood and Maroondah using our Video Conferencing equipment, including the exchange of digital data via our electronic whiteboards. The next step is to make use of this system with actual classes. This we are hoping to do in 2008.

Our students are really very lucky indeed to have access to so much ICT equipment here and Parkwood is very fortunate to have so many of its teachers happy to extend their computer technology skills so that they can use this equipment to enhance the delivery of their subject matter. Students certainly enjoy using the equipment and seem to get much more satisfaction when challenged to incorporate their ICT skills in non-ICT subjects.





MATHS REPORT







This is the first year in which students used "Mathletics" as part of the curriculum. It has been very popular with the students. Students are often seen using "Mathletics" in the computer rooms during lunch time. They can earn bronze, silver or gold certificates depending on their use of the program. So far our students have received a total of 1064 awards this year in Mathletics. During the Maths and Spelling Challenge, 52 participation awards were awarded, 2 Bronzed Bees (Jon Kennedy and Aidan Rowley) and 1 Golden Guru to Amanda McNamara.

As of next year, the expectation is that all the students will have this software for use both at school and at home. All evidence shows that those students who regularly play against the computer or other students from around the world show a marked improvement in their mental arithmetic.

This year saw the students enter a variety of competitions, starting with the Melbourne University-BHP Billiton competition. JAPAN TRIP 2007

What a fantastic experience! Twelve terrific Parkwood people flew to Japan on September 20th, meeting at Tullamarine Airport at 4.30am! That says it all. Every member of the team put in 100% every minute of the 11 days we were in Japan.

On arrival at Narita Airport we obtained our precious Japan Railpasses and plunged into the intricate Tokyo rail system. Snuggled down into our Tokyo International Hostel bunks, we marveled at our first day in Nihon! The next day, Disneyland beckoned while we booked all our Shinkansen rides at the massive Tokyo Station next morning. WOW! Everyone scattered to line up for their selected norimono (rides) and we met every 2 hours under some shady trees near Adventureland. Fireworks and the nighttime parade finished off a spectacular day.

The Shinkansen Hikari was all it was rumoured to be: fast, smooth and luxurious. Kyoto is a much smaller and more ancient city, surrounded by mountains. We spent three nights in the Station Seiki Ryokan sleeping on futon on tatami matting and relishing a delicious breakfast brought up to our rooms each morning by our host, Ohe san, setting us up for vigorous exploration of this beautiful city.

Nara, the oldest capital of Japan, is a short train ride from Kyoto. A huge bronze Buddha sits in the largest wooden structure in the world, called the Todaiji. 

PERFORMING ARTS & MUSIC REPORT

2007 has been another busy year for the Performing Arts/Music department. Consistently throughout the vear we have had students working on items, aiming to present a performance to the rest of class at the end of each semester. We have had compulsory classes in Year 7 and 8 and elective classes in both Year 9 and 10. The Year 7s have listened to, performed, mimed, interpreted music, sung, acted, drawn, played instruments and filmed their way through a variety of topics. We have seen drama work consisting of cricket matches, fashion parades, restaurants, carnivals, nursery rhymes and talent quests. The students have added costumes, props, sound effects, backing music, lighting and anything else they can think of for their plays. It has been great to see the students use their imaginations to the extent that they have this year - they have really come up with some very good performances.

The Year 8s this year have broken up into small groups, aiming to perform at the end of each semester. These students have worked in acoustic guitar groups, piano/keyboard groups and drumming groups. They have been involved in dancing - even an aerobic dance group! Within these small groups some students have taken on the role of a teacher - taking a few students and working with them. Jake Stephens 8B and Ashley Peter-Budge 8A have both become drum 'teachers' this year and have had some good results! Classes 8C and 8B have both had a rock band emerge. These boys have been full of enthusiasm and dedication - some only took up the instrument when they came to this class. Their determination to form a group and their commitment to weekly rehearsals paid off when they did their performances.

Year 9 and 10 are both elective music classes. Here the students got into groups with the aim of presenting items to the rest of the class. This year we had two rock bands, a keyboard group and various vocal groups. Students have accompanied the vocal groups on acoustic guitars. The music that they performed ranged from The Phantom of the Opera, through to the latest chart hits. Once again, the students' willingness to help each other and their ability to work as groups meant that they came up with some good performances.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC

This has also been a busy area this year. We have been able to offer tuition on woodwind instruments, and although it is developing slowly, we hope that this area will grow. We never have trouble getting budding rock quitarists but the classical instruments are slower to catch on. Students this year have been able to have lessons on a variety of instruments, thanks to our Instrumental staff—Mr Kemp, Mr Forward and Mr Abbott. We offered tuition this year on drums, electric guitar, bass guitar, acoustic guitar, piano, keyboard, flute, clarinet, alto saxophone, tenor saxophone, trumpet and digital music. We have endeavoured to start an 'ensemble' this year, with the woodwind and brass students. We have also added some Year 8 electric guitars and a Year 8 drummer. Hopefully this group will continue to grow, so in the future we will have a concert band.

I would like to thank Mr Kemp, Mr Forward and Mr Abbott for the work that they have done with the instrumental students this year. I would also like to thank the instrumental music students who have regularly come to lessons and practised! Thanks to everyone who has worked towards presenting a polished performance, whether in the classroom, or within the instrumental program.

SCIENCE REPORT

Year 12 Biology students visited Box Hill TAFE to undertake practical experience in Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology. Box Hill Institute has teamed up with Florigene, a Melbourne-based biotechnology flower company that uses genetic manipulation techniques to create novel flowers for the global flower industry. Our Parkwood students used various genetic technologies to detect piracy in some flowers. They manipulated DNA in such a way as to amplify (or replicate) DNA samples taken from the real flowers and the suspected pirated flowers. This technique is known as Polymerase Chain Reaction. The second technique (Gel Electrophoresis) allowed the students to load their DNA samples into a gel, which was supplied with an electric current. This technique allows DNA fragments of different length to be separated. The final step was to view the sample under an ultraviolet light.....and this proved that some of the samples the students were working with were indeed pirated flowers!



Year 11 Biology students investigated aspects of Animal Behaviour at the Royal Melbourne Zoo. Students worked in pairs to study different types of behaviours exhibited by many different animals. *Some questions asked were "Why do they behave in that way?" and "Why is their behaviour so important to their survival?" A great day was had by all!

Year 12 Psychology students visited the city to investigate Visual Perception principles and how they can be applied in real situations. They looked at how Gestalt Principles are used in logos, advertisements, signage and even shop windows in and around the city. This area of study also focuses on Visual Illusions, so whilst in the city, we had some fun trying to create our own visual illusions as well! The final activity for the day was at the National Gallery of Victoria (the Ian Potter Centre) in Federation Square. During this activity we looked at many of the artworks and investigated the Visual Perception principles being used and how they affected what we saw in each painting. The Excursion was a great way to put the students' study into practice, and we had fun doing it! It was definitely one

of the highlights of Unit 3 Psychology.



Year 12 Chemistry students visited Loy Yang power station at Morwell in the Latrobe Valley. Here we learned about electricity generation from the displays and watched a video explaining the principles of geosequestration of carbon dioxide waste. Next it was time for our tour of the open cut coal mine and power station. After a hair raising trip down into the pit where our bus morphed into a 4WD and we seemed to be descending into the world's biggest hole in the ground, we were able to see the huge excavators used to dig brown coal. On our trip we also saw gigantic cooling towers, coal hoppers, boiler furnaces, an electrostatic precipitator and electricity generating turbines. The final part of our tour was to visit the laboratory where the emissions from the power station are monitored and the composition of the water used in the boiler condensers is carefully manipulated to minimise corrosion.

SCIENCE REPORT

Year 11 Chemistry students conducted field experiments at Eco Link in Bacchus Marsh. Eco Link is a government run education centre, which facilitates practical sessions that utilise its own wetland system. This system filters storm water from the surrounding areas. The aim of the day was to undertake tests on water quality. Water tests conducted included pH, turbidity, temperature and dissolved oxygen tests, as well as tests for phosphates and nitrates in the water. The water sampled included Melbourne tap water, commercial and Werribee drinking water, rain water and the water outlet and inlet pools/wetland system at the Eco Link Centre. The day also enabled the students to use Atomic Mass Spectroscopy to test the concentration of sodium in the various water samples. Although the bus trip there and back was really long, we all had a very good day. By Russell Smith (11A)

<u>VCE Physics</u> students visited Luna Park to attend 'Physics Day' organised by the Australian Institute of Physics. The excursion was aimed at relating different rides to various Physics Principles. The students had a lot of fun learning new concepts with practical applications in Motion and Movement. Students were given worksheets to complete and also a data logger to record the data on site for various rides. Overall it was a very interesting experience.

Year 10 Science students undertook studies in different areas towards the end of the year. Mrs Hobday's and Mr Scott's classes completed a unit on Forensic Science that culminated with a visit from CSIRO. They participated in a program called "Forensic Frenzy". Students assumed the role of forensic scientists to solve a crime using facial identification, chromatography techniques, fingerprints, soil analysis, dental X-rays, blood stains, ballistics, DNA analysis, fabrics and fibres. Mr Singh's and Ms Gulyas' classes visited the Victoria Space Science Education Centre as part of the module on Space and Geology. At the Space Centre the students participated in a simulated walk on the "Martian surface" and gathered geological data. They also experienced "working" in "Mission Control". In the afternoon they used a "state of the art" laboratory to analyse their specimens. A" space lunch" was provided. The students had previously undergone a rigorous training period where each student was given a specific role to be performed on the day. The students shared and explained the results to other class members.

Year 7 Science students visited the Zoo and had a visit from "Snakebusters" where they had some close encounters with some of our Australian reptiles.


HUMANITIES REPORT

The Humanities Key Learning Area has had a huge year for 2007. A major feature of our Humanities work this year has been the use of laptops in our Year 7 and 8 programs to assist students in their organization and production of their work. We are becoming more adept at using digital technology to document and support our research and discovery learning, especially research and webquests. Students are learning to use MOODLE (an in house MSN system) to organise and submit their course work.

Our Excursion program is a major feature of our 'on-the-job' learning. In Term 2, the Year 7 students went to the Rialto for a bird's eye view of the City of Melbourne as part of their Geography work. The Rialto viewing platform on the 54th floor gave students a 360 degree panoramic view of the city. It was a beautiful day and the views in all directions were spectacular, especially over the new Southern Cross Station and developing Docklands.

On the same day, the Year 7s went to the State Library where they viewed a photographic exhibition of early Melbourne, and a cluster of extraordinary artifacts, including Ned Kelly's armour and gun. The Year 7s were fascinated with the exhibition and the stories told by the Library curator. They were also taken on a tour through the various sections of the State Library and demonstrated particular interest in the genealogical research section, as well as the interactive multimedia section open to the public. In Term 3 they studied the purpose of ZOOS, habitats and animal classification on an all-day excursion to the Melbourne Zoo.

The Year 10s have had a very busy year. Most of the Year 10s went on a two week work experience program after intensive preparation in the Careers classes in Semester 1. Many have found success in part time jobs as a result of the assessments that they have received upon completion of their work experience. All students must complete Occupational Health and Safety modules online before undertaking Work Experience.

On 30th October, Year 10 students were very fortunate to be involved in a presentation on Human Rights by Kate Ceberano in her role as Human Rights Ambassador for Youth for Human Rights. This was the culmination of their study of human rights issues in both English and Civics.

Fieldwork has been a major part of our Senior Geography classes this year, and during the trips an extensive number of photographs were taken, for senior and middle school students' video technology projects. The Business Management students have also had another successful year. This term, one of their highlights was a visit to Carlton & United Brewery.



CAREERS, VET & VCAL



It's been an extremely busy year in the Careers Room so far. Almost all Year 10's have completed Work Experience in many and varied fields. The success of this program depends entirely on the work students are willing to put into identifying areas of interest and then seeking Work Experience. We look at it as the start to their searching for the correct career pathway for them. They need to source employment, make phone calls, complete CV's, present for interviews if required and finally complete all the relevant paper work to enable them to participate in the programme and achieve the benefits.

VET (Vocational Education Training), is the hands on study of a particular work place area that may lead into a traineeship, apprenticeship or further study within the student's chosen field. Most students, who are interested, start with a specific VET subject in Year 11 but some of our students have actually begun VET courses in Year 10. VET subjects include Community and Outdoor Recreation, Community Services, Dance, Equine Studies, Viticulture, Music and of course Multimedia and Hospitality, both of which run at our school. The other courses are run at various secondary colleges or TAFEs in our area. It is the perfect way to enjoy a Wednesday afternoon and it will contribute to your VCE results.

VCAL (Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning), was anew course run at Parkwood in 2007. We all learnt a lot in the beginning, from the original concept development, through to the implementation of the many big-picture ideas that were developed. It was a challenge to ALL who were involved. All students were required to demonstrate competency in over 200 areas of their education. The course included a city camp that all participants enjoyed, as well as several projects with a whole-school focus, including environmental works, concreting, construction projects and the planning, locating, building and maintaining of a garden bed using water from tanks catching the rain from the Gym. Due to the success of this year's VCAL program many of our students have found full time employment or full time apprenticeships. Unfortunately this, and the fact that not enough students selected VCAL as their option for 2008, has meant that we are unable to operate a separate VCAL class next year. VCAL, for 2008, will be operating within the VCE program so that students who have already started the program can complete it.

Overall all the students have been a pleasure to work with and they have done a fantastic job at representing our College.






























We have also had the opportunity for leaders to run general school assemblies, which has been great public speaking experience for all involved!



AIMING HIGH 2007

Landcare: Mr Scott

The Landcare module of Aiming High was designed to introduce students to some of the environmental issues currently facing many areas in Victoria, beginning with the lake at the bottom of the school property. At this site, students re-shaped the entry point of the inlet water, creating a series of "Frog Bogs", and landscaped the site to ensure both ecological and aesthetic appeal. Students developed skills in land management (weed removal, pest species identification, landscaping and revegetation), communication with environmental authority groups (Parks Victoria) and active volunteer groups (Conservation Volunteers Australia), leadership, initiative, teamwork and co-operation.

During the completion of this module, students had the opportunity to qualify for the Certificate 1 in Active Volunteering, attend a hands-on, community-based camp working with members of the public to restore and repair areas of environmental damage in regional Victoria, and reap the rewards of many hours of hard labor in difficult working conditions to restore a small region of damaged land to an ecologically sustainable condition.



Discovering Your Community: Mr Ballagh and Mrs Recinos

This module was all about discovering your community. It was so popular this year that it was run for two classes. The aim of this module was not only for the students to familiarise themselves with the City, but to also expose the students to local, city, and global issues. Students formed groups to carry out a global issue project. They then carried out their research on their issue in the week they spent in the city. Before they spent the week in the city they went on two trials. On the first excursion they went on the Golden Mile city walk, from the Immigration Museum to the Royal Exhibition Centre. On the second excursion students worked on their survey questions. Throughout the week spent at the City Centre, students were involved in many experiences. They visited SYN 90.7 FM, had a visit from Reach, completed a scavenger hunt, had a fitness session at Fitness First, visited Urban Seed, had a tour of the Lexus Centre and visited the Queen Victoria Market.



What did you enjoy this year? Interschool sports What was the best thing this year? Tasmania camp. What are your favourite subjects? Sport and Indonesian.
























Year Nine is a very eventful and exciting year, as it is the year that students start electives and the Aiming High Program.

Always write down the teachers' notes!



What has been the best part of Year 11 so far? Kaitlin and Emily: The Presentation Ball.


What has been the most challenging thing this year? Kaitlin and Emily: Exams.

What have you gained out of this year, and how will it help you in the future? Kaitlin: Good teachers which will help for my classes next year. Emily: Good teachers and the careers meetings.


What is your favourite subject this year and why?
