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## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Once again the start of our year was marked by an outstandingly successful Swimming Carnival. The Carnival always presents an opportunity to set the tone for the year's activities at Parkwood.

My hope is, as always, that everyone will set their goal as "responsible productivity". Within this aim falls many sub-headings: year 7 students making a successful transition to secondary school, year 12 students achieving their personal best in their final year of secondary schooling, for some individuals overcoming unexpected hardship in a supportive and inclusive environment.



Overall my impression is that we have had a very successful and productive year for all at Parkwood.

Our School Council continues to govern with common sense, insight and an eye to the future. Our staff remains committed to the unique program the school offers (Aiming High comes immediately to mind) and the students demonstrate (not least through their voluntary participation in Homework Club) that they are listening to us and making the effort necessary for success.

Over the year there are some notable events worthy of particular mention:

Our Presentation ball in 2008 was our biggest ever and the first staged at Heidelberg etc. It is important to acknowledge two of our parents, Susan Muller and Heather Wittingslow who worked tirelessly to ensure the success of this event. That they are prepared to organise the event again for 2009 is testament to their commitment to the school.

The contribution of \$137,000 from the Commonwealth Government in funding this program is appreciated and acknowledged.

We started as Norwood, Parkwood, Ringwood Secondary Colleges and Croydon Community School with a vision that doing things together, rather than competing, would add value to all of our students. Next year Heathmont Secondary College and Croydon Secondary College will join the Coalition.

We already have extensive joint staff professional development activities, a joint induction program at year 12, shared VCE revision classes through the year and a common commitment to sustaining new technologies as part of our ongoing commitment to all students.

In 2009 we hope to introduce an MEC orchestra and MEC choirs that will allow our musically interested and inclined students to participate at the highest level, irrespective of the school they attend day to day.

#### Careers

# IT/MULTIMEDIA REPORT

We started the year with some new Dell machines which appeared in D2 and in the Arts block. These machines gave us extra power to complete the increasingly demanding multimedia work the students are now creating. We are now in the final year of the laptop program and we have had to say goodbye to half our much loved laptops. They will be sorely missed as all the students have made very good use of them during the period of the program. When the year 9 and 10 classes are not using the laptops the other classes in the school book them for use. Consequently the laptops are in constant demand. We will be replacing these in the coming year.

Year 7 have been working their way through the ICT skills they have been set. By the end of the year they should be able to use Word, email, Internet and the college's learning management system Moodle. They should also be able to back up their work on USB keys and create digital portfolios on their own web site on our Intranet. They have also been involved in a joint project about community with the year 7s from Wedderburn college. This has included using photography to create presentations about their community. It has also given the students an opportunity to use our video conferencing system to meet the students from Wedderburn.

Year 8 students have created stop motion and Flash animations. They have also extended their photography and Photoshop skills. As I write this some of their photography is on display in the library. Excellent work, although I may be a little biased.

Years 9 and 10 have started to create games using Flash, Scratch and Alice. (the last two programs are available as a free download from the internet)

Senior students in the VET multimediasped through the work creating stunning portfolios.

# FOOD FABULOUS FOOD

The aim of the Food Technology department is to equip young people with the skills and knowledge to be able to produce great food, as well as learning vital knowledge about the importance of eating healthy and nutritious food. Our faculty prides itself on providing an excellent introduction to food: what it is; different cooking techniques; tasty recipes for young people; and, what we should be eating to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Some of the fabulous culinary delights produced across the year levels in 2008 include:

Year 7: Pizzas, mini quiches, jacket potatoes and Vietnamese coleslaw, mini sausage rolls, scones with jam and cream, macaroni cheese, spaghetti bolognaise, and everybody's favourite choc chip muffins.

Year 8: Chicken burritos, coconut lemon syrup muffins, fried rice, rocky road trees, chocolate patty cakes, stir fried beef, and individually designed and decorated butter cakes.

# MATHS REPORT

This year the Mathematics faculty has continued to improve student learning by implementing greater use of technology into the curriculum. In particular we have developed our use of the software package Mathletics. This software package allows teachers to create and control tasks set for classes or individual students. It is accessible at home via the internet and automatically keeps records of student performance which has become part of our assessment processes.

Many of the faculty have been using another package MOODLE to distribute notes and information and we are in some cases giving families access to student test and assignment results online (This practice is still in the trial stages).

Other faculties besides mathematics are also developing their use of MOODLE and it is likely to become a bigger part of the College program over time. MOODLE allows the downloading of assignments and the submission of student work and receipt of marks via the internet.

The faculty has also been greatly helped by the introduction of AIM testing on a more regular basis which will assist our reporting to VELS in the future.

As is usually the case we had a number of students participating in mathematics competitions, for example the Westpac and others. We have some students in the top 10% of the state based on their performances in these competitions.

We have also been able to spend time further developing our curriculum and providing professional development for our teachers for which we must thank the College administration for providing the faculty with more time for these tasks to be undertaken.

# SCIENCE REPORT

#### **SCIENCE HIGH-LIGHTS:**

<u>9C Science students</u> participated in water sampling with Mr Scott on the Yarra River. At a variety of test points, including the Botanical Gardens, Westerfolds Park and the Warrandyte Township, the students assessed and compared the current levels of dissolved oxygen, temperature and pH. Students sampled and tested the water at each site, and then recorded and compared their results to those gathered by other testing bodies such as Melbourne Water, before a final report was submitted for assessment.

Year 10 students were offered the opportunity to attend 'Insights into Biomedical Research Day' during June at GTAC (Gene technology Access Centre). Six eager students (Liam Christianson, Emily Dillon, Cassie Doyle, Tiana Evans, James Marshall and Sarah Rasmussen) and Mrs Hobday were given the opportunity to do some experiments relevant to medical research under the guidance of a scientist mentor, who was a PhD student from the local research precinct. In the afternoon, they heard about careers in medical science from Walter and Eliza Hall Institute scientists at different stages of their career.

As part of the <u>'Traffic Safety Essentials' unit in Year 10 Science, Mrs Hobday's</u> class had the opportunity to hear from Russell Smith of Year 12. Russell, who volunteers for the CFA, gave this Year 10 class excellent insight into his role in the CFA. In particular, he discussed the types of road crashes he has attended with the CFA, as well as common elements to road crashes that involve young people. Russell also discussed road crash sites and statistics in the immediate area. Russell's presentation was informative and it certainly sent out an important message to young drivers using our roads.

Year 11 Psychology students were introduced by Miss Urbano into the field of Psychology and the research method process. Students conducted experiments both in and out of class focusing on following the correct process and obtaining valid data with which to draw conclusions from. One of the more entertaining topics of research was where the students had to investigate whether jokes were funnier when told in a group or individually. This was quite a fun and engaging way to explore the area of behaviour in groups as well as practising the research method process. Unit 2 Psychology looked into the Nervous System including its structure and function. Students created some amazing 3D models and posters of neurons. This unit also involved an intensive study into Mental Health awareness and disorders.







Year 11 Biology students investigated aspects of living things including cellular function and many body systems. The course involved many practical activities including several dissections. Students also investigated how organisms respond to change via nervous, hormonal and behavioural responses and adaptations. The final aspect of the course was an exploration of ecosystems and the ways in which organisms interact with each other and their environments.

Year 12 Biology students and Mrs Hobday visited Box Hill TAFE to undertake practical experience in Biotechnology and Genetic Engineering. Box Hill Institute has teamed up with a Melbourne-based biotechnology flower company called *Florigene*, which uses genetic manipulation techniques to create novel flowers for the global flower industry. Our Parkwood Biology students tested various flowers for suspected illegal piracy and in doing so help *Florigene* protect their business.

The students used various genetic technologies to detect piracy in some flowers. They manipulated DNA in such a way as to amplify (or replicate) DNA samples taken from the real flowers and the suspected pirated flowers. This technique is known as PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction). The second technique (Gel Electrophoresis) allowed the students to load their DNA samples into a gel, which was supplied with an electric current. This technique allows DNA fragments of different length to be separated. Finally the samples were viewed under UV light and this proved that the samples the students were working with were indeed pirated flowers! It was an exciting and fun day for all!

Year 12 Physics students (Sam Harries, Chris Scott and Tim Seabrook) accompanied Mr Singh to visit the CSIRO Science Education Centre at Highett. Students performed experiments on Structures and Materials, which is one of the detail studies in Unit 3 Course. Students found the strength of given materials and investigated the effect of heat on materials properties, fracture of composite materials and the truss behaviour of building materials. It was a very interesting and successful excursion.

Year 11 Chemistry students together with Mrs Hazlett and Mr Thomas visited Ecolinc, which is a purpose built environmental investigation facility. Here the students tested the quality of four water samples: the Ecolinc wetlands, the Werribee River, Melbourne tap water and bottled mineral water. Students used instruments and techniques similar to those used by water agencies to ensure that drinking water is safe and to monitor the health of river water to make sure it is suitable for use by irrigators, farmers and wildlife. Students conducted tests on water temperature, turbidity, pH, salinity, total dissolved solids, Students conducted tests on water temperature, turbidity, pH, salinity, total dissolved solids, dissolved oxygen and also measured phosphates and nitrate concentrations. They were also introduced to the use of an atomic absorption spectrometer as a tool for measuring metal ion concentrations and used it to determine the concentration of sodium ions in the water samples. The excursion allowed students to use sophisticated equipment and gave them an understanding of the techniques used to measure water quality.

The Humanities faculty has had another frenetic year. Not only have we completed some exciting units of study on the Ancient cultures of Egypt, Greece (home of the first Olympic games) and Rome, but also Medieval Societies with their Castles, Knights and the Black plague. We have examined Parliamentary Government in Australia and undertaken Career tests and Job research in preparation for Work Experience at year 10.

However Education doesn't only take place in the classroom. We have been out and about as well. Firstly, in term 2, the year 7s were taken to the Rialto for a birds' eye reconnaissance of the city of Melbourne as part of their Geography field work. The Rialto viewing platform on the 54th floor, allows for a 360 degree panoramic view of the city. It was a beautiful day and the views in all directions were spectacular.


On the same day, the Year 7s then went to the State library where they viewed a photographic exhibition of early Melbourne, and a cluster of extraordinary artefacts including Ned Kelly's armour and gun. The year 7s were fascinated with the exhibition and the stories told by the Library curator. They were also taken on a tour through the various sections of the State Library and demonstrated particular interest in the genealogical research section, as well as the interactive multimedia section open to the public. In term 4 they will study the purpose of ZOOS, by going on an all day excursion to one of Victoria's Zoos.

Year 8s went to the State library also to investigate Medieval illuminated manuscripts and participated in a workshop to learn about lettering and medieval forms of illustration

Students in years 10 & 11 went to Central Australia this year as part of our biennial tours program to study and participate in workshops about the culture and beliefs of indigenous people. We discovered that Australia is a vast continent, how straight and long the roads were, the responsibilities of indigenous teenagers in traditional society and how much they respect their elders. The weather was very warm 28 – 35degrees Celsius in the red centre. We walked around the Uluru, some 9 kms and observed the changing colours at sunrise and sunset and swam nearly everyday.

Fieldwork has been a major part of our Geography classes again this year. Throughout each excursion students extensively photographed the environment by way of recording changes and specific features under study. Year 12s went to Lilydale Lake for their fieldwork for VCE and year 10/11 went to Toolangi State forest.










## Sports and Fitness - Trent Hulm

### Landcare

The Landcare module of Aiming High is designed to introduce students to some of the environmental issues currently facing many areas in Victoria, beginning with the lake at the bottom of the school property. At this site, students will be removing many noxious and environmental weeds from the lake's edge, and landscaping the site to ensure both ecological and aesthetic appeal. During this module, students will attend a hands-on, community based camp, working with members of the public, to restore areas of environmental damage in regional Victoria, and reap the rewards of many hours of hard labour in difficult working conditions to restore a small region of damaged land to an ecologically sustainable condition.

For the first time, students in the Landcare module will this year be involved in researching and planning for a large community environmental education centre in the Eastern suburbs of Melbourne.
