2009 has been a highly successful year for Parkwood's Student Leadership Team. We had 40 student leaders throughout the school, as College Captains, House Sports Captains, Captains and Arts Captains.

There are many activites leaders have organised throughout the year.

Thanks to the fast action of our senior leaders, the school community was invited to donate both money and clothing for the victims of the Black Saturday fires. The response was overwhelming, with students and parents flooding the office with boxes of clothes and other necessities. Special thanks go to Rhianna Stewart and Kate Medcalf, among others, who gave hours of their spare time to collect, box, label and deliver the donations to the community collection points. Their passion and community spirit was typical of our students and families and they helped us all feel proud to be at Parkwood.

Our college captains also helped to run the Student Leadership/Year 7 camp, with the dual focus of welcoming and getting to know the new Year 7 students, and building the team of new leaders and getting focussed on some of the key goals the students wanted to achieve in 2009. These goals included re-invigorating the student initiated Four Quarters Cup system, holding an Arts Night again and improving the community spirit of the sports carnivals.

These goals were achieved with great success during the year, starting with dress up competitions, house colour cup cake selling and live music at the swimming sports.

Congratulations also need to go to Maggie Marshall and Samantha Morley, two of our Year 10 leaders who attended the World Vision Global Leadership Conference. They returned full of ideas and motivation to educate and involve the wider student body in doing something about poverty. They brought about the highest ever student participation in the 40 Hour Famine, which raised over \$1000 of sponsorship for World Vision.

Another strong reflection of our students' concern for global justice is their commitment to sponsoringClaudine, a new World Vision Child from Rwanda. A freedress day was held early in the year to cover Parkwood's commitment to Claudine for 2009. The leaders will hold another early next year, so that their contribution to Claudine's community and education continues reliably.

In addition to these outstanding interests, our leaders regularly ran whole school assemblies, building on their/ public speaking skills. The arts captains made sure there was always music, interesting visuals and often a band playing, which makes assemblies much more interesting for all involved. They also instigated having all students sit in their house groups, to further their aim of strengthening the house system, with banners proudly placed at the back of each house section.




# MAROONDAH EDUCATION COALITION -A LEARNING NETWORK



## 2009 SPORT REPORT

It has once again been a school year filled with numerous opportunities for our students to test their skills against students from neighbouring schools and beyond. We have entered an ever

increasing number of teams in the Maroondah District competitions and despite being the smallest of the six schools in the group, we have achieved some very good results. We retained the Per Capita trophies in Athletics, Swimming and Cross Country which acknowledged that we were the best performed school per head of population in the Maroondah district. We also managed to win five team competitions, which meant that they progressed to represent the Maroondah group in the Eastern Zone competition.

The successful teams were: Year 8 Girls Softball, Year 7/8 Boys Netball, Year 9/10 Boys Netball, Year 11/12 Boys Baseball Year 11/12 Boys Hockey.

I would like to make special mention of this last group of boys as a majority of the team have played Hockey throughout their time at Parkwood and with a number of them in Year 12 this year. It was pleasing that they were successful the Maroondah competition and then went on to perform very well at Eastern Zone level where they won one of their games and lost only narrowly to much bigger schools (Vermont and Camberwell) in their other two games. Well done, boys!

In addition to these teams, we also had students progressing onto Eastern Zone competition in a number of individual activities that will be detailed below.

Milne House was successful this year in the school Swimming competition held early in Term 1. Milne's success can be attributed to having the highest level of participation, as well as their non competitors assisting with various duties that needed to be carried out during the day, for which they received points for their house.

Two girls who have represented the college extremely well in swimming since coming to the school are sisters in Year 12 and 10 respectively, Rachel and Kimberley McDonald. The girls were once again very dominant in the events that they needed to win in order to qualify for the State Championships. Both girls swam two events in these championships, with Rachel winning the State title in the 18-20 Female 50m. Breastroke in record time and finishing 2nd in the Open Female 100m Breastroke.

In the process, she qualified to swim in the Commonwealth Games trials next year in both of these events. A great effort! Kim also performed well to finish 2nd in both the 16 year old 5om. backstroke and butterfly, results that she should be very proud of.

We had two other students qualify for the Eastern Zone championships by winning their events at the Maroondah competition. Sarah Kerr was successful in the 15/16 Female Diving, whilst Dylan Fantin won the 18-20 Boys 50m Breastroke.

All students from Years 7-10 took part in the school Cross Country in early May, with the top ten finishers from each age group then representing the school. The Maroondah competition took place at H.E.Parker Reserve in Heathmont and a total of seven students qualified for the Eastern Zone competition at Yarra Glen Racecourse. 














































## **GREAT VICTORIAN BIKE RIDE**


## ARTS TECHNOLOGY REPORT














## PERFORMING ARTS REPORT

## YEAR 10 SCIENCE

Year 10 students of one class went to an excursion to Mars at Victorian Space Centre in Strathmore on during term 4 with Mr. Singh and Mrs. Gulyas. Students experienced the life and duties of the astronauts and the mission control officers. They enjoyed various roles like engineer, physicist, chemist and biologist during their visit. They collected some samples from the surface of Mars and brought them to the laboratory to study the radioactivity and their chemical composition.

Year 12 Biology students and Mrs Hobday visited Box Hill TAFE to undertake practical experience in Biotechnology and Genetic Engineering. Box Hill Institute has teamed up with a Melbourne-based biotechnology flower company called Florigene, which uses genetic manipulation techniques to create novel flowers for the global flower industry. Our Parkwood Biology students tested various flowers for suspected illegal piracy and in doing so help Florigene protect their business.



Year 12 Brain Dissection

The students used various genetic technologies to detect piracy in some flowers. They manipulated DNA in such a way as to amplify (or replicate) DNA samples taken from the real flowers and the suspected pirated flowers. This technique is known as PCR (Polymerase Chain Reaction). The second technique (Gel Electrophoresis) allowed the students to load their DNA samples into a gel, which was supplied with an electric current. This technique allows DNA fragments of different length to be separated. Finally the samples were viewed under UV light and this proved that the samples the students were working with were indeed pirated flowers! It was an

## YEAR 12 PSYCHOLOGY

The students participated in a range of learning activities with some of the more extreme activities being brain and eye dissections!! In amongst all of the books, notes and dissections however, we managed to get out in the city

for our Visual Perception tour. We were blessed with excellent weather as the students set out on their journey. The day was based around looking at Visual Perception principles and how they can be applied in real situations. We looked at how Gestalt Principles were used in logos, advertisements, signage and even shop windows in and around our city. This area of study also focuses on Visual Illusions, so whilst in the city, we had some fun trying to create our own visual illusions as well! The final activity for the day was in at the National Gallery of Victoria - the Ian Potter Centre - in Federation Square. During this activity we looked closely at many of the artworks and investigated what Visual Perception principles were being used and how it

## YEAR 12 PHYSICS

Students from Parkwood, Maroondah and Croydon Secondary Colleges accompanied Mr Singh to visit the CSIRO Science Education Centre at Highett. Students performed experiments on Structures and Materials, which is one of the detail studies in the Unit 3 Course. Students found the strength of given materials and investigated the effect of heat on materials properties, fracture of composite materials and the truss behaviour of building materials. It was a very interesting and successful excursion.

The same students later accompanied Mr Singh, Hazlett and Mrs. Hobday to visit the Australian



University on 11th September, 2009. Students were

shown the various components of the Synchrotron and they performed three experiments on Photoelectric Effect, Bragg's Diffraction and Spectrometry to study the

energy levels of some atoms. The exposure of the students to such a great machine was very important for their future career as well as for their VCE detailed study on Australian Synchrotron.

## YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY

On Friday 27th February Year 12 Chemistry students from Parkwood and Maroondah went to Monash University Clayton as part of the teaching and assessment program for the Year 12 VCE Chemistry course.

The purpose of the excursion was to allow students to use quite sophisticated instruments that are usually too expensive for schools to purchase.

The experiments that were carried out included the analysis of soy sauce for the presence of sodium, the analysis of an iron tablet for the amount of iron it contained, the determination of the alcohol levels in samples of red and white wine and the determination of the amount of caffeine in Coke Zero®.

Groups of students carried out different analyses and learned how to use equipment including Atomic Absorption spectrophotometers, both Gas

and high performance Liquid chromatographs and a UV - visible spectrophotometer. All these instruments are routinely used in analytical chemistry in industries as diverse as those that produce food, beverages, and pharmaceuticals wines.

These students also spent a day at "Powerworks" later in the

Year. Located at Yallourn in the Latrobe Valley, Powerworks is an education centre set up by the coal industry to help students understand the process of power generation using Coal as a fuel. We toured the vast open cut coal mine that supplies the Loy Yang B Power Station, toured the power Station and the station and station and were given a guided tour of the laboratory that services the power station by the chief chemist. We saw the mast the methods employed to maximise the efficiency of the energy conversion from coal to electricity while reducing Pollution. We were all impressed by the huge scale of the operations which help supply up to 40% of Victoria's electric power.

## FOOD FABULOUS FOOD

The aim of the Food Technology department is to equip young people with the skills and knowledge to be able to produce great food, as well as learning vital knowledge about the importance of eating healthy and nutritious food. Our faculty prides itself on providing an excellent introduction to food: what it is; different cooking techniques; tasty recipes for young people; and, what we should be eating to maintain a healthy lifestyle.

Some of the fabulous culinary delights produced across the year levels in 2009 include:



Pizzas, mini quiches, jacket potatoes and Vietnamese coleslaw, mini sausage rolls, scones with jam and cream, macaroni cheese. spaghetti bolognaise, and everybody's favourite choc chip muffins.

## Year 8:

Chicken burritos, coconut lemon syrup muffins, fried rice, rocky road trees, chocolate patty cakes, stir fried beef, and individualdesigned and decorated butter cakes.

Skewered chicken with satay sauce, carrot muffins, chocolate dipped melting moments, san choy bow, vegetarian dim sims, sticky date pudding, rice paper rolls, apple strudel, and individually designed and decorated gingerbread

Chicken with mustard sauce, profiterols, decorated sponge cakes, shortbread, yummy blackberry jam, chicken and bacon pies, and traditional risotto. Students also have the chance to include many of their own choices

## Year 12:

The Year 12 Food Technology students worked hard all year, and between outcomes and their major folio task they didn't seem to have time to enjoy the simply joy of cooking. However, an excursion to

the Langham Hotel did put a temporary halt to the grind. The students and teachers were treated to a tour of the five star hotel and then sat down to a sumptuous buffet lunch of seafood, duck, handmade pasta and all the desserts imaginable. It was a slow trip home with full bellies!

The major assessment task for the year is a folio. Within their folio's the students had to produce five to eight items, include four complex cooking processes, three preserving techniques and two products that can be compared with a commercial equivalent.

Several students produced excellent folios, the themes varied from "Cupid's Birthday", "Lemon", "St Valentines Day", and "Disney Princesses" to Chinese and Japanese themes. Claire Garlepp chose "A Traditional Wedding" as her theme (See more detail on this in our Student Work pages)

All of the students find the folio section of the V.C.E Food Technology course a challenge; however, they continue to impress me with their skills and willingness to attempt new cooking techniques and when all the hard work is over, they can all sit back and be very proud of themselves. Well done everybody!































































## YEAR 8

LETTER HOME by Christie Woodland, Year 9

Dear Madeline & the kids.

Life in the trenches is hard. We have to get up before dawn otherwise we can't move around the front-line due to the risk of enemy sniper. Dylan got shell shock and is now back home. It's not better now, in the summer. Lice, rats and flies are everywhere. And the smell is terrible. The toilets are over-flowing; we barely get to wash at all. Not to mention half of the men smoke, the sandbags are rotting and the smell of poison gas is everywhere.

Animals are everywhere. The rats are the size of cats. Lice are also a never-ending problem, they breed in our clothes. We have to be careful though, because lice cause Trench Fever. I haven't gotten it yet, thank-god. It's not good when men get it, because they have to recover for 12 weeks and we can not afford to have fewer men.

Our food is terrible – we have bully beef every day. Tonight it's my turn to prepare meals for tomorrow. It's not that hard. Most men are happy just to eat the beef straight from the tin.

Battle is the hardest. I still remember my first day clear as a bell. We moved into the trenches, eager and willing. The hardest thing was going over the top, into no man's land. I knew they were out there – the enemies. It was terrifying to go over the top of the trench and face the hail of enemy bullets. It's a miracle most of us survived. But as time went on, the men started dying. Many men have shallow graves – perhaps they will never be found. I feel sorry for their families.

Yesterday I had to go on patrol in no man's land. While we were out there, we crossed paths with the enemy patrol. Because we can not afford to have handguns while we patrol, we either had to engage in hand to hand combat or quickly hurry on our way. There was a few harsh words exchanged before one of them attacked me. I was quickly to react, pulling out a knife I keep hidden in my belt buckle. I stabbed him, but only in the shoulder so he could escape. We then parted ways.

The trenches are in atrocious conditions. The bottom of the trench is filled with water. The worst part about that is some of the men get trench foot. It's a disease where the foot becomes gangrenous and in most cases the feet have to be amputated.

I can not write to you much longer because it's almost dawn and I have duties to attend to. I miss you and I love you very much. I will be home soon in one

piece, I promise.



Thanks but No Thanks, By Renata Paton, Year 9

The cartoon, 'Thanks but No Thanks', is a cartoon drawn to depict what happened in the 1898 Referendum on Australia becoming a nation, and what the reactions were of each individual state. In this cartoon you see the six colonies, represented as people. They're all lining up at a voting booth, besides Western Australia and Queensland, who are standing on the other side of the poll booth, looking around in disinterest. Victoria is giving a thumb up to Tasmania, while South Australia waits patiently to make his vote. Meanwhile, New South Wales is at the back of the line, looking at his voting paper with indecision, not being very sure if he's going to vote yes or no.

The characters in the center of this picture are Victoria and Tasmania. They're both looking very happy, giving each other a thumbs up. The reason behind them looking so pleased, is because in the 1898 ref-



erendum, both states voted a rather solid yes for Federation (Victoria was 82%, Tasmania 81%). These two are the ones that are most for federations, possibly because they have a strong sense of Nationality, or because they want a share of the power that goes with the joint control. The fact of the mater is, these guys are very for Federation.

Now we go to the opposite end of the spectrum, as we look at Western Australia and Queensland. These two are what the cartoon is named after, with the looks on their faces and their body attitude giving off a very 'Thanks, but no thanks' vibe.

In the first referendum, Western Australia was the only colony to flat out refuse. The Western Australia government did not want Federation, for a few reasons. For one, they'd only had absolute freedom of choice for about ten years. They didn't want to give that up after such a sort amount of time. Also, since Perth, the capital of Western Australia, was so far away from every other capital city, they knew they'd be left out of many important choices. They know the Australian capital would be in either Melbourne or Sydney, and it would take a fair while to reach either of those places, by letter or person. Isolation was almost imminent.

Now, Queensland, who's standing next to WA, is looking away, sniffing in distaint at all the other colonies Voting for federation. If you take a good look at him, you'll notice little black men crawling all over him.

These These represent the Kanaka's, the black Island workers who make their little pay in the sugar cane fields. Queensland has, like Western Australia, boycotted the referendum, because if Australia Federates, the White Australia Policy will come into effect. Thus, Queensland will loose a majority of its workers, not just in the in the sugar cane fields. Queensland doesn't want to loose money, so they just turn their back and don't

Now in the middle of this are South Australia and New South Wales. South Australia's just standing around, looking rather blank, but in his hands you can see he is holding a yes vote. When South Australia Voted in the referendum, their vote was rather unbiased. They didn't have much of a reason to vote against it, no power struggle, no isolation. There weren't many reasons to vote for it either. Perhaps it Was just their Nationality, or the idea of having a say in Australia's future as a whole. But the fact still stands, being that South Australia did vote yes for Federation, despite reason and motive.

Finally, poor New South Wales at the end, looking very confused as he stares at his voting paper with the No ticked. New South Wales vote was a tricky one. They'd set a minimum yes vote of 80,000, and if they didn't and the New South Wales public did vote 74. For didn't and the New didn't make this number, their vote was a no. Even though the New South Wales public did vote 71,595 Yes votes (52%), this was not enough to get them over the line, seeing as they didn't reach the minimum. Yes limit. This is why New South Wales seems so confused and torn by voting no for Federation.

'Thanks But No Thanks' shows the separation of opinions when it came to deciding about Federation for Australia. It's also a comic that shows the general reaction from all six of the former colonies.



Somali Child Soldiers: Script for a Radio Presentation

Somalia is hell. Since 1991 Somalia has been at war with itself, extremist religious groups plague the barely governed land and constantly threaten to over throw the government. Although some areas are still in control of the government, these areas are laden with poverty and corruption. No one really knows how many people have died so far; some estimate between three hundred and four hundred thousand and alarm is now spreading widely across the world over the issue of children being recruited as soldiers. Some child soldiers have been as young as eight years old.


As if being a child in Somalia wasn't hard enough; struggling with a lack of clean food and water, harsh poverty and political violence, now Somali children are being recruited as child soldiers more than ever. An estimated three hundred thousand Somali children have been taken away from their homes and trained as soldiers. In the past few years, it has become common place for Somali children to be recruited into nonstate militia groups. Some children are brainwashed, drugged or paid a large amount of money to do so.

In Somalia, using children under the age of 15 is strictly prohibited under international human rights law. However, due to a lack of police or governing forces in many areas of Somalia, extremist militia groups are able to recruit thousands of children without detection.

These children are often abducted in broad daylight, walking home from school or playing in the street. They are then put into training camps and told they will be killed or bashed if they try to escape or disobey orders. They are often punished for the smallest of offences such as being sick or exhausted and can be bashed by up to three people at a time.

The issue of child soldiers is not limited to Somalia, nor is it limited to terrorist militia groups. Currently, over fifty countries have governments or terrorist groups recruiting children under the age of 18. A solid statistic on the amount of child soldiers worldwide is virtually impossible, considering how small the possibility in the amount of child soldiers worldwide is virtually impossible. sibility is of conducting an accurate census in many of these third world countries.

The recruitment of child soldiers needs to stop, and the world needs to wake up to these issues or else it Will never stop. According to the United Nation's Children's Rights Protocol, every child has the right to play. However, these child soldiers are being refused their right to play. Instead they're being forced to do the distance of the dirty work of adults and kill each other.






## **VOLUNTEERING**

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

achieve their goals set at the beginning of their VCE journey. Year 11 students all jumped into their first year of VCE, they have been working hard from day one, getting used to the new work load that comes with VCE and honing their study skills in preparation for a stellar Year 12 in 2010. The Year 10 students have been enjoying their first year of the senior school in preparation for their first year of VCE, although many of the Year 10 students have already had a taste of VCE as approximately 50% of our current year 10's are already studying a VCE subject.

Year 12 students began the year with a MEC Study Day at Swinburne University in Lilydale, which set the tone for the rest of the year. If they hadn't realised it beforehand, they certainly knew that the year was going to be one of hard work and dedication to their studies. As the year progressed they moved towards making more adult decisions for their future, gaining driving licences and partying at everyone's 18th birthdays. Their final days at Parkwood were celebrated with two dress-up days: back to pre-school and a future visit to the nursing home. In aid of this, the Year 10's were given the opportunity to do two weeks of Work Experience and in Semester One they studied Careers. Year 10 students have worked extremely hard this year and as 50% of the year group have now already completed one VCE unit the future for this cohort does look promising.

The Year 10 students also took the opportunity to participate in some exciting camps; these included the Bogong Ski Camp, the Japan Tour and The Great Victorian Bike Ride. They topped off a successful year with an extremely enjoyable evening at their Year 10 formal. The Year 10 students have achieved some outstanding results this year and a large number of them have pursued successful leadership roles in the school. I want to congratulate this year group on a successful year and look forward to working with most of them in their first year of VCE.










## YEAR 11 BUSINESS MANAGEMENT








YEAR 12 2009 THE LAST WEEK
