



The year kicked off in full swing with our two new Year 7 classes attending the Year 7 Orientation Camp in their second week of secondary schooling, it was very brave of them, but well worth it in the end! The camp was held at Camp Adanac in Yarra Junction and was once again successfully run alongside the Student Leadership Camp. During the camp Year 7 students took part in lots of fun activities such as canoeing, flying fox, trampolining, archery, raft building, water slide, mountain bike riding, ropes course and even a mini swimming carnival. The student leaders demonstrated excellent leadership skills in running most of the activities as well as supporting the students in the early stages of their transition. The activities and camp overall helped the students form friendships that will remain strong into the future.

After camp the students were introduced to secondary school life by their home group teachers who gave tours, allocated lockers and prepared them for their classes. Parents were introduced to the college and each other at two transition evenings; 'Switching on in Year 7' held early in Term 1 with a focus on ICT as well as 'Succeeding in Year 7', held towards the end of the first semester of secondary school with a focus on study skills and an insight into what the students had been up to in their first semester of secondary school. 






### Sustainability and Environment

This year the Sustainability and Environment module looked at two key areas: Landcare and Sustainable Living. We visited CERES (Community Environment Park) in Brunswick to gain an insight into sustainable living and how it can be implemented by individual's, small groups and whole communities to create a more sustainable future. This helped the students form ideas for their negotiated projects on sustainable living practices. We then visited the Artecycle Exhibit in Moonee Ponds. This art exhibition was useful for our students as all artwork was made from recycled or reclaimed materials. This assisted the students in the design and construction of their own Recycled Art projects as part of their assessment. Within the Landcare unit, we formed a strong partnership with Maroondah City Council and were able to take part in community environment projects such as tree planting and Landcare sessions. The students planted over 2000 plants in the local community and took part in weeding and cleaning sessions of the local waterway on the Parkwood Site. Students demonstrated a high level of work ethic, cooperation and responsibility whilst out in the community representing Parkwood and completing all projects successfully. 

# 'TOWARDS A WHITE AUSTRLIA' Caroon Analysis



The cartoon 'Towards a White Australia' was published by the Bulletin in 1895. This cartoon was published prior to Australian federation, and was trying to get Australians to vote for federation so that one single immigration policy would be enforced. In this cartoon there is a white boy sitting on a box in the middle of the ocean being threatened by a scary looking Chinaman. It depicts that outsiders coming into our country are dangerous, and that we would do the right thing for our country by preventing them entry.

In this cartoon the boy is sitting on a box that says 'Australia for the Australians'. This phrase represents the 'White Australia Policy'. The 'WAP' was introduced in 1901 due to three main reasons. The majority of Australian felt that they were superior to any other race, and that we should keep our country free of them. Non-Australians such as Kanakas were also taking Australian jobs. This was because the employers could pay the Kanakas very low amounts of money to work, opposed to Australians who would have demanded a better wage. The third reason for the White Australia Policy was that Australia felt threatened by an Asian Invasion. During the gold-Australia Policy was that Australia felt uncatefied by all Asian invasion. During the gold rush, many Asians (mainly Chinese) came to Australia in search of gold and wealth.

Australians thought that the Asians would overrun our jobs and possibly even take the Australians thought that the Asians would overful our jobs and possibly even take the country from us. The 'WAP' was enforced through the implementation of two acts, the first being the Immigration Restriction Act. This Act stated that all foreigners wishing to migrate to Australia must first pass a 50-word dictation test in any European language. The seconds Act introduced was the Pacific Islander Labourer Act. It stated that no more Kanakas could enter Australia after 1904, and that all Kanakas must leave the country by 1906, except those enter Australia atter 1904, and that all Kanakas must leave the country by 1906, except those born in Australia. Aboriginal Australians did not exist to the government, and they were therefore excluded from the 'WAP'. They were shot on sight. The box in the cartoon is in country, Great Britain. Australia was half a world away from them, and it would take British forces a long hoat ride to come and aid us. There is a boy sitting on the box, and he represents young Australia. He is portrayed as being a white, innocent, vulnerable boy riding on the White Australia Policy. He is being threatened by a scary Asian man trying to climb onto the box as well. This cartoon is supposed to make the viewers feel sympathetic for the boy as he has no way of defending supposed to make the viewers leer sympathetic for the boy as ne has no way or detending himself. This is another reference to the feeling of isolation that Australia had at the time.

He represents Chinese immigration. At the time that this cartoon was has gigantic claws. He represents Chinese immigration. At the time that this cartoon was drawn, most Australians were against letting Chinese immigrants enter our country. They were afraid that more and more Asians would come to Australia and take our jobs and land. This feeling is depicted in the cartoon. There is not room for two people on the box; if the Asian man climbs on the box will tip, sending the boy into the raging seas. This element of Asian man climbs on the box will up, sending the boy into the raging seas. This element of the cartoon clearly sends the message that Chinese immigration should be avoided at all costs, and that if the 'WAP' is not enforced Australia will be lost to inferior foreigners.

The London Olympic Games will be remembered for many reasons: Australia's misfiring in the pool, Michael Phelps' retirement and Usain Bolt's domination. For me however, it will be remembered for so many more reasons.

After months of creating personal relationships and friendships with Oceania's National Olympic Committees and their athletes, I, along with ten other Maroondah Education Coalition students from Ringwood, Croydon, Norwood, Maroondah and Heathmont, travelled to London to report on the 15 Pacific nations competing at the Olympics. We were there in our role in the Reporters' Academy.

With such small nations like Norfolk Island, whose population is only 1,200 people, these countries are often overshadowed by the larger countries and neglected by major news organisations and it was our job to ensure that these athletes, all with incredible stories, got the coverage and publicity they deserved.

The Reporters' Academy's role, through its connections with Oceania, was to interview and give coverage to these athletes, both on National Olympic Committee websites and in the newspapers of the countries. As the first students to do anything of this magnitude, it was an exciting and new experience, but also a big experiment.

As each of us had been personally involved and responsible for talking to, and learning the personal stories of our athletes, it was an amazing experience to actually meet these people we knew so well. Learning the stories of athletes such as Maureen Tuimalealiifano from Samoa, who, in just nine months of learning the sport of archery, had qualified and competed at the Olympics. It was a privilege to ensure that her story was told to at least a small portion of the world.

Although the first few days bore little success for our Pacific athletes, just the experience and atmosphere was amazing. Working in the London Media Centre with world-class journalists, conducting interviews and attending press conferences for athletes such as Sally Pearson and Michael Phelps, alongside media corporations such as NBC and the BBC was something none of us will ever forget.





While improving their general practical skills, Year 8 students focused on the development of their design skills. 

Following are some short articles on various activities completed in Junior Science classes this year.


## YEAR 7 HUMPTY DUMPTY

My younger siblings will go to junior school, and I am at middle school. I am a Balinese school girl, and this is how my day starts!


After our worship I gather my books and head off for school. The first part of my school day is the Flag Raising Ceremony.

My name is Sinta and I live on the island of Kalimantan. I am 12 years old and I live in a Dayak home which has many families living within it. Each family has a separate room to live in. I have a family of 6 including my 2 brothers, Adi who is 14 and Paku who is 16. I have a twin sister called Dita who is older than me by five minutes and I also have a Mum and Dad, who are farmers and grow rice to sell to the market.

When I was younger I lived in Jakarta with my family but our whole farm got flooded and we were struggling for money to live. So my parents said that they had found a comfortable home and a nice piece of land to live on. When I was 10 we moved to Calimenton and I moved to a confortable home and a nice piece of land to live on. Kalimantan and I moved to a school called Bina Cita Utama. Now our family is doing great with our farm. I help every day after school to make sure the crops are growing nicely and they are getting enough water. So every time I head down to the farm I have to carry a bucket of water, which we get from the pump up the road, to feed to the crops. So this means I have big muscles!

For dinner my family normally has fish and rice. After school I go home and get the fishing rod and head down to the lake to find some fish. Sometimes I get very annoyed because I can't find any fish so I start to panic that we won't have any dinner.

In my house there are over 250 people living in there. I love this because I have so many friends in my house. A lot of the time we head down to the river for a swim or we play soccer right outside our house. It has been a hard change in life moving house but it has been a good experience.
