
Student Representative Council The S.R.C. was formed at the beginning of Term 3. The council

During the 1970's, the housing developments in North Ringwood, Warranwood and Park Orchards saw Norwood High School bursting at the seams as it took students from as far as Warrandyte. Warrandyte High opened in 1978 and Parkwood followed suit in 1979. In that year, there were no permanent buildings, just portables in paddocks. The only intake was at Year 7. Our first principal was John Teasdale, after whom the gym is now named. John stayed with us until 1985





People like Stacey Miriklis who has been a careers advisor for many years and a "mother hen" to many stressed students; Brenda Lorden who was always happy and taught Japanese and Geography; Ann Adams our wonderful Student Welfare Co-ordinator who always thinks of everyone other than herself; Paul Sayers, an outstanding Geography teacher and long term house co-ordinator. Cheryl Kempton taught here for over 10 years, fostering literature, dance and debating. She left us with a huge hole when she moved on. The Djoneff brothers, Peter and George; both retired in the last 10 years. Apart from being Collingwood supporters, these men were outstanding Maths and Science teachers. Andy Hicks retired in 2011 after 30 years at the school.
