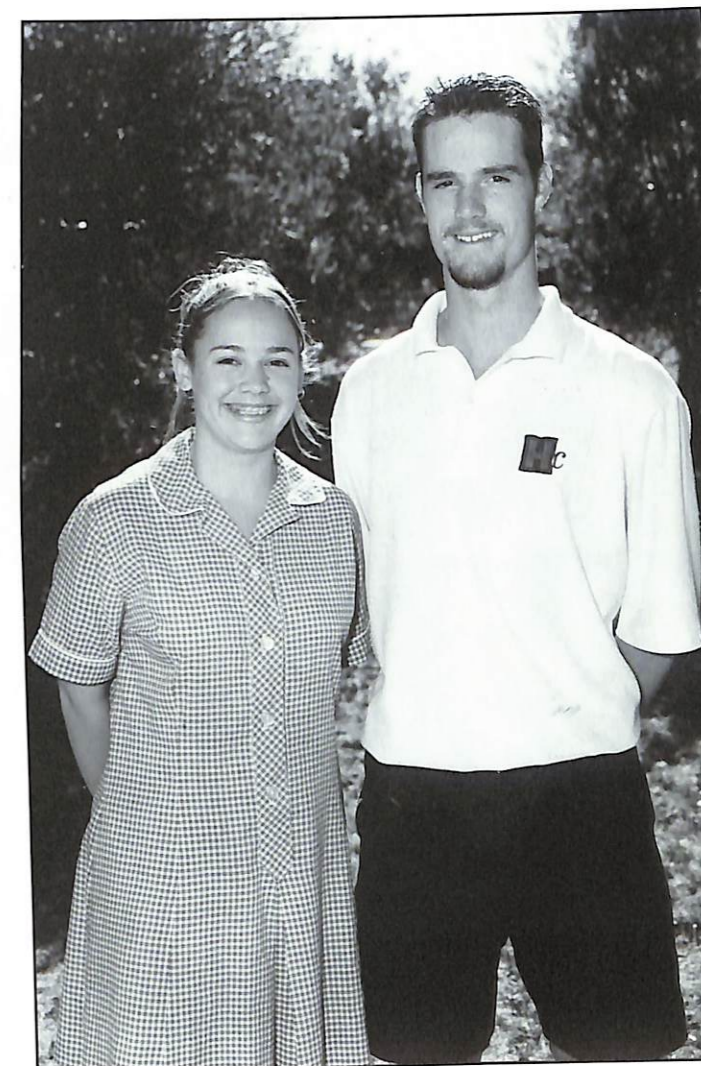

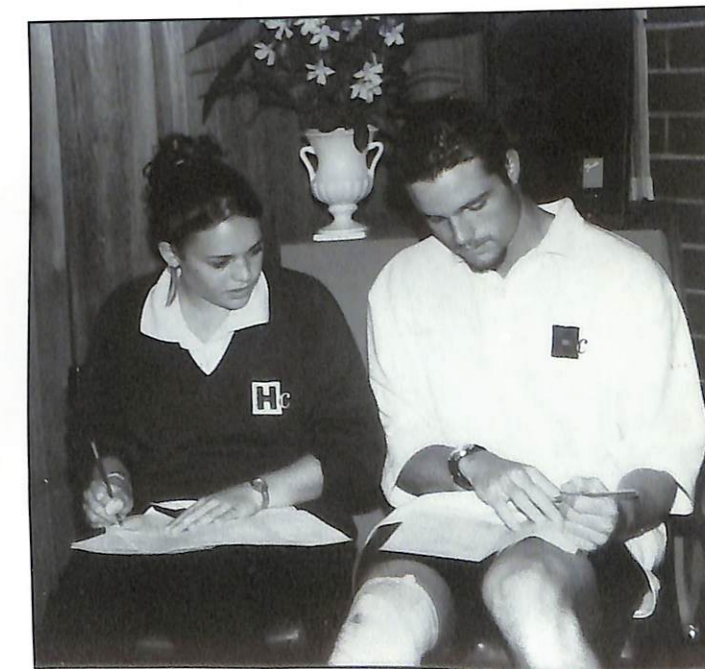

## Magazine 2001 Committee

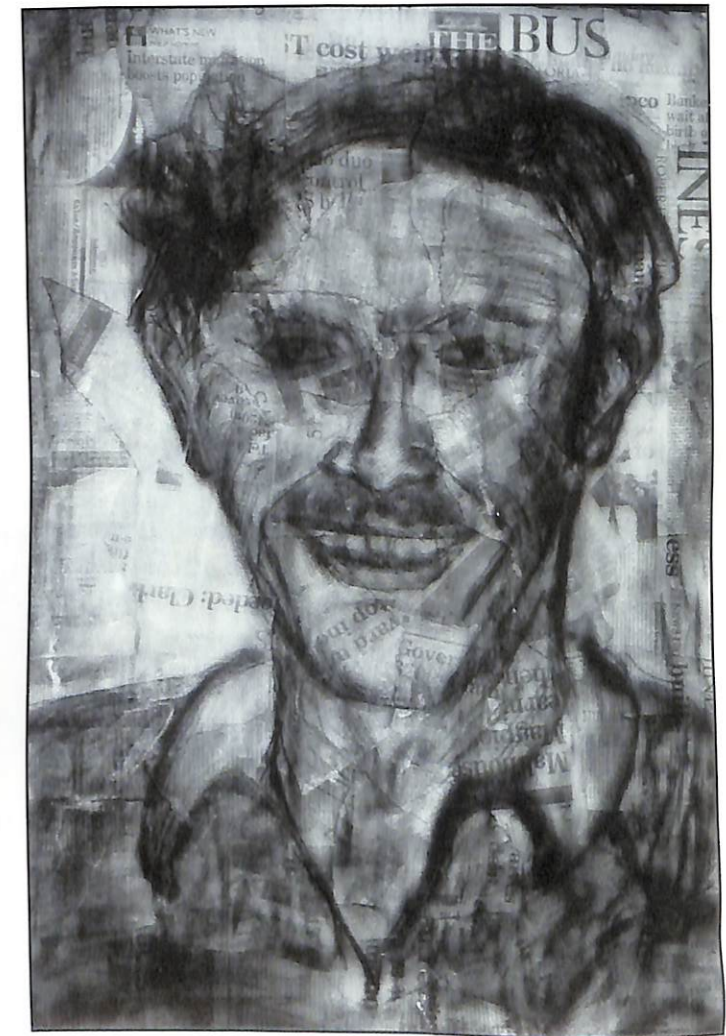

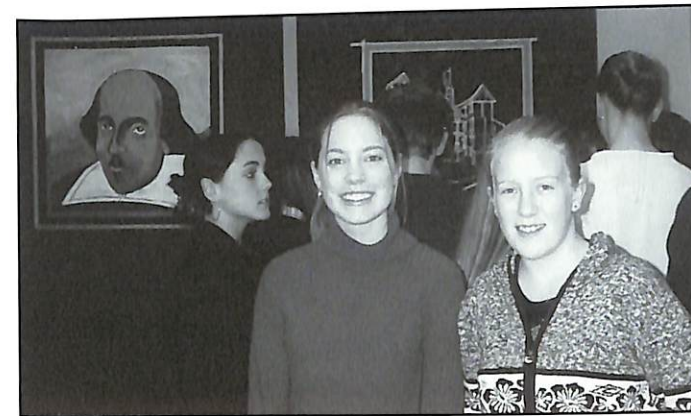
### Summer!

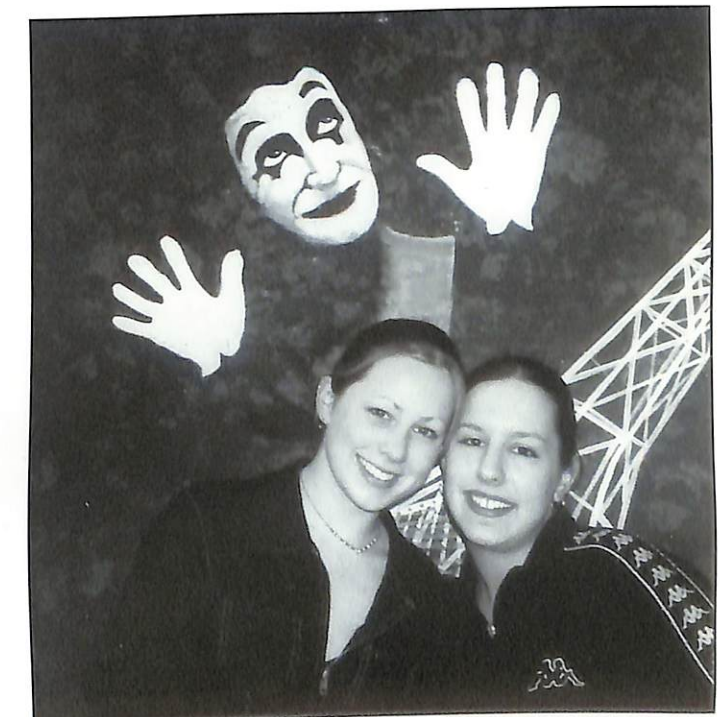
### The Man who walked down the road

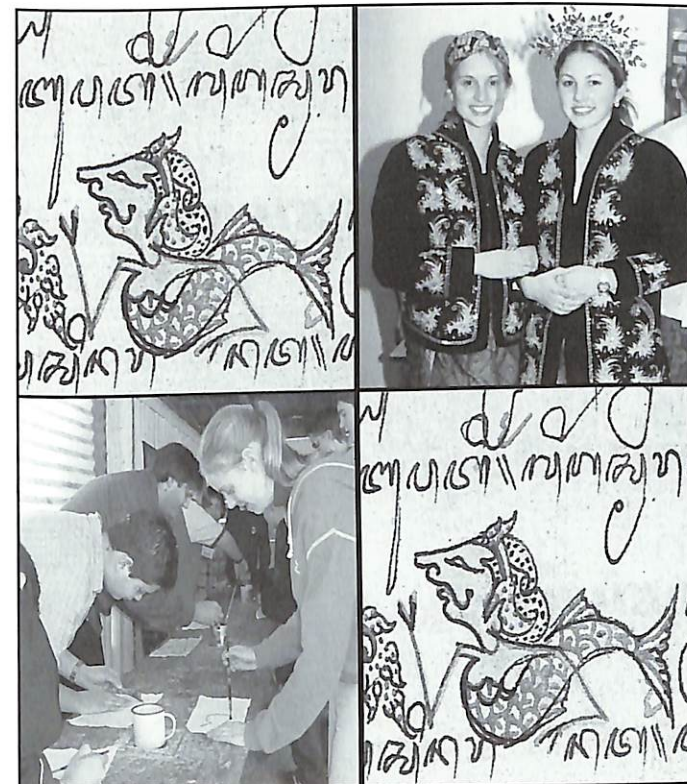

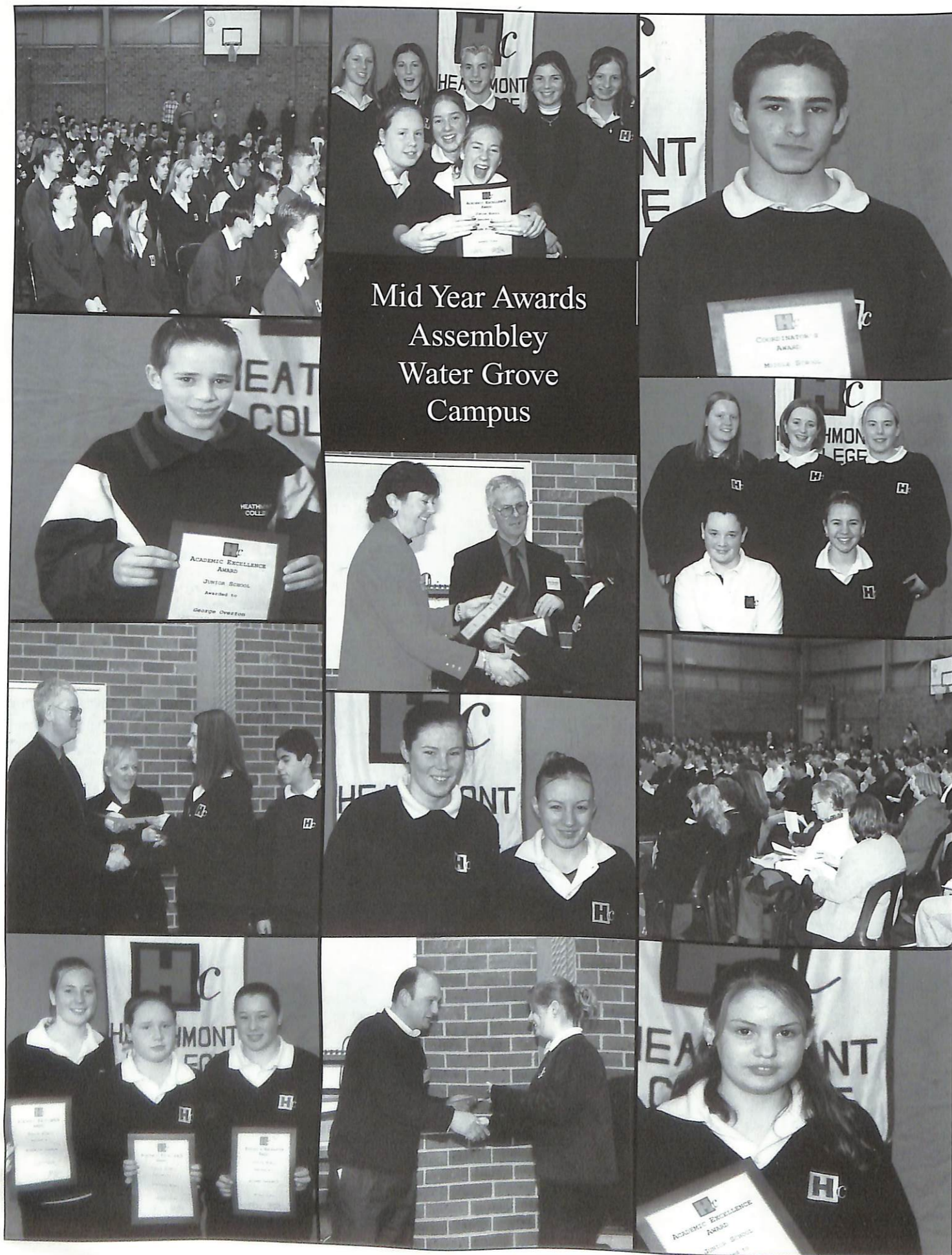

It has been a challenging and rewarding year in the Middle School. There have been academic and sporting highlights throughout the year. Below are a few of the activities the Middle School was involved in that were rewarding for both students and staff.

Early second term Year 9's headed off to Camp Howqua on the Howqua River, twenty minutes from Mansfield. The weather was magnificent which enabled us to be involved in all of the outdoor activities, which included horse riding, canoeing, grass skiing, high ropes and bush cooking. The Awards Evening was an opportunity for students to dress up as a famous media personality and Camp Awards were presented to those who had contributed to the 'atmosphere' of the camp. The Year 10 ski camp at Mount Bulla was another camping highlight. After having to be delayed for several weeks due to poor snow cover, the camp was held in early September and received some of the best conditions for the season. Thank you to all of the staff, who organized, ran and supervised these camps. These camps are extremely important in providing opportunities where students can relate to one another away from the formal school setting and many new and strong relationships are formed between students and staff.

During Term 3 a Health Day was designed specially for the Year 9 students. The day provided forums for students to discuss issues that affect them in an open and supportive environment. Outside facilitators were brought into the College to run workshops on topics including 'Partying Safe, Body Image and Masculinity'. The positive reactions to the day were overwhelming with students wanting a similar day organized for next year. The opportunity for students to discuss issues which are often considered to be 'taboo', empowered the students with knowledge so that they can make positive and informed decisions. Overall the day was a great success and something the Middle School teachers and students are proud to have been a part of.

It has been an extremely busy year in the Middle School Leadership. From the outset, students had been representing their peers in an active way in fortnightly Middle School Management meetings. For example, Form Captains, House Captains and other interested parties have introduced lunchtime sporting activities; they instituted and ran the College talent quest, which exposed a wealth of talent in our student ranks and worked consistently through a range of issues that have concerned themselves and their peers. Goal posts for the oval have been purchased as a result of Middle School action.

Earlier this year nearly a dozen of our brightest and strongest girls attended the Australis 'Self-Made Girl' holiday seminars to hear successful women speaking about their business and professional acumen. Two student leaders represented the College in Ballarat at a student driven state school leadership program. In association with Student Welfare, many students have been able to attend student leadership camps and have found these to be empowering experiences.

During and up until August, Theatre Studies students of year 10 worked tirelessly to prepare and perform the dramatic and controversial Blackrock with assistance from senior Theatre Studies students. This play raised powerful issues relevant to our teenagers and also tied in with themes explored in the Year 9 Health Day.

The year 10 students who chose to be included in the FOCUS program this year have completed a course that included core subjects English Literacy, Sose, Mathematics, Science, PE and an elective program. In the first semester the majority of the group were involved in the TAFE program at Box Hill, or in the Hospitality course run by

the Shrublands Box Hill. In the second semester these students took up work experience one day per week (Wednesday) in most cases the work being related to the Tafe program completed. In this program students were able to gain the necessary skills to continue with Year 11 Traineeship program in 2002 or in some cases mainstream VCE. One of the highlights our students often mention is the High Challenge Camp 2001 run by the Victorian Police for secondary school students at risk and incoming police recruits. This gave the Focus students the opportunity to work with the police recruits on life skills and in the process they were able to get leadership training. All students who took part came away with valuable learning experiences and were of the opinion that the camp was a very worthwhile activity.

The German and Indonesian Exchanges were highly successful with all students involved being wonderful ambassadors for the College and Australia. The experiences that students gain from exchanges such as this, especially during this current time of international unrest, brings the world a little closer to them and enables them to see that cultural and racial differences can be resolved with understanding and intolerance of diversity.

Our thanks to Tony Grayden and Deborah Harman for their support and valuable assistance they have given to the Middle School Team and the Middle School students. A thank you also to the Middle School teachers who have provided valuable and challenging learning experiences for the students in Year 9 and Year 10 during 2001.

Gina married in 1999, has a baby daughter Aneka and has been teaching English at Heathmont this year

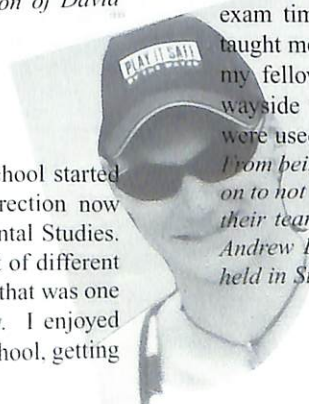


Michael Smith

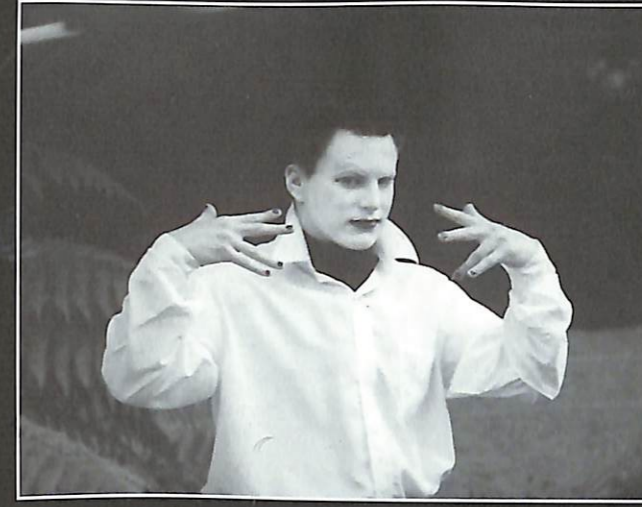

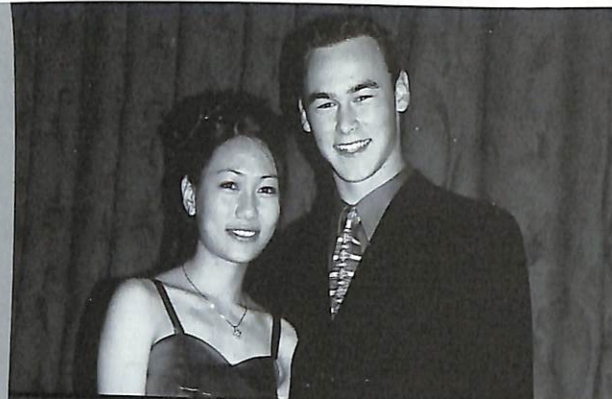

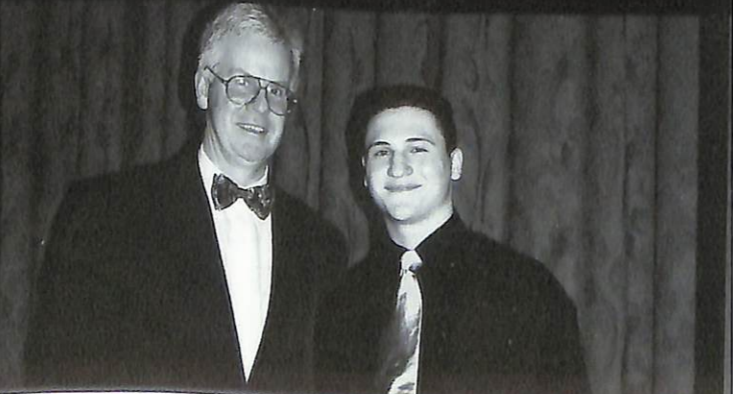

SENIOR SUB SCHOOL REPORT

2001 has been a really busy year for the Senior Sub School. The year got off to a flying start with study skills days for both Year 11 and Year 12 students. All Year 12 students then had the opportunity to attend 'Higher Learning 2001 Symposium' organized by Reach Youth where a number 'Australia's most inspiring people' challenged students to:

- Take responsibility
- Perform under pressure
- Express their raw talent and passion
- To be part of the big picture

This set the scene for the Year 12 cohort for the year and as a group they decided to make 2001 their year and to take every opportunity to be involved. This was immediately reflected in the College Swimming sports with record high participation levels that led to the sports being an overwhelming success.

One new initiative this year was the introduction of a Managed Individual Pathway (MIPs) project where each student has an individual plan and pathway to achieve their desired outcome. The aim of the program was to empower students to achieve their goals by providing ongoing support to each individual student. A number of pilot programs were introduced under the MIPs banner and several will become part of the normal program for all students in 2002

Even though this was their home, they had Chilean blood running through their veins, with equal excitement at the prospects of seeing this fairy-tale land. For Patrick, my dad, this trip wasn't only a holiday but a business trip to create valuable contacts for his career, to move the family forward and seek out our opportunities for a permanent stay. As for me, this was a trip of discovery. I had few vivid memories of Chile as a small, mischievous toddler, playing in the streets till dark and creating extra work for my young parents. Those hard times were not a part of my memories. The very fact that I was going to see my country sent an electric buzz down my spine. It was all too much to take in at 12 years old.

Having said our goodbyes to our friends and family, we passed customs officers in a flash and boarded the plane with exhilarating anticipation. This was our ticket to new experiences, excitement, discovery and a taste of South American culture.

Finally after 15 hours of anguish, heartache and stiff bodies, we left the dry airport of Easter Island and steadily approached our final destination. Then came the final descent. The seatbelt strapped around my waist could hardly contain my butterflies. We all intently looked out the pale window, surveying the land below. The commanding mountains of the Andes were my first icons when I thought of Chile, standing majestically along their never-ending path, like the backbone of a giant. The descent revealed the detailed dryness of the foot of the mountains with very few trees, almost like a desert. This was all new to me. My eyes came to meet the strange-looking airport. Dry and distant lands, stretching around this shiny, dark, fortress. I saw the flag flapping violently in the wind, with the big white star and red, blue and white colours. I knew this had to be home. The loud touchdown of the wheels signalled the end of our long flight and the dry spell of

silence was soon quenched with the refreshing claps of the passengers. I could tell right there and then I was going to experience a totally different culture.

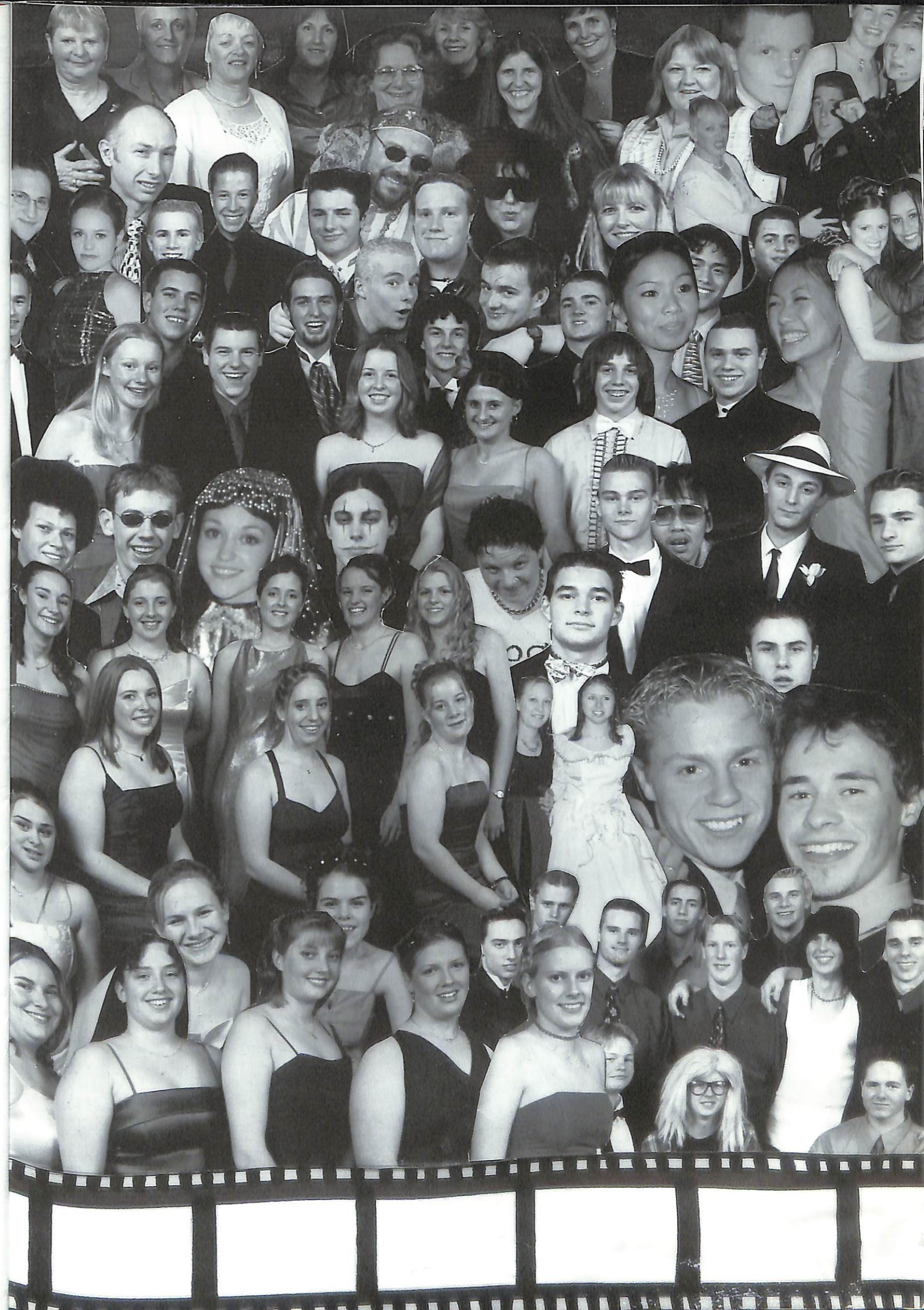

My life is on a nose-dive now, all because of that piece of paper, so materialistic yet so powerful. Who would have thought, or even contemplated that the western world could be changed all in the space of a few hours, on that Wednesday in Sept 2 years ago.

I remember that day well. Perhaps not because of the attacks but the ripple effect created by them. I must have been one of the last people to hear about these, as I prefer to keep my self as far as I could from the media. But there was school. I was in my final year, on the home straight and sitting nicely. I arrived to find that the morning buzz was a lot more active than usual and I knew something was up. Once I knew the full details and the shock value had subsided, I began to get a picture of just how bad people can be.

It was bad enough having gung-ho, hick Americans throwing their weight around without everyone else joining in. It was certainly not a time for rational thought as all of a sudden everyone was an expert on the situation and had become overnight racists. Most off them didn't even know where Afghanistan was.

And that's why I'm here. Going now express to the Middle East as a part of the second wave. Originally, it was going to be special task forces, and special opps teams going in. Now look at it. Trumped up to this bloody world war. I suppose that's how the First World War started. One guy gets it and it's on for the young and the clinically insane. I can see it ending up as a religious war, the crusades part 2! That would be just my luck. I'm an atheist and I'll get pigeonholed as a born again. We may as well just go back to the middle-ages. I suppose that seems what everyone always says about years gone by. No matter how long the most boring, longest day seems, a year every year seems to just have gone so fast.

I miss people. Not necessarily friends and family, just people. Since being on the boat I have distanced myself from the others here with me, not deliberately, it just seems that way. I miss the hustle, the ambience, the buzz of a crowd, like that Wednesday morning two years ago. Three days ago I asked my CO if he ever got lonely. He said, "Only when I'm around people." I know how he feels, what he was on about.

There's a commotion all over the ship now. Not the kind I long for, more like a preparation for bad weather. This can only mean one thing: it's almost time. Time to get ready for the final waltz.

As the coastline draws nearer and nearer an eerie feeling flows through the men, all the goes were left behind and I knew we wouldn't survive this.
