# Mayor's Message



As we head towards 2000, it is important to take the time to reflect on the past year and look towards the coming year.

1999 has been a year of great achievement by Council for the Maroondah community. It has been one where my fellow Councillors and staff have once again shown their commitment to the people of this City.

In a significant milestone, Council's policy to pay off its accumulated debt from Capital Works programs, will see Council loan debt free before Christmas, 1999.

We have also seen many successful funding submissions, from which many members of the Maroondah community continue to benefit. In particular, we were successful in receiving an additional \$1.215 million for the Maroondah Federation Estate, making a total subsidy of over \$3.2 million for this \$4.3 million project. We also received increased funding for our Home and Community Care programs.

We have also seen greater efficiencies across many areas of Council, allowing a greater provision of service. We are continually striving to improve on our already high standards.

Now, we, as a Council and as a community, look to the future and share in its hope and opportunities.

Some immediate bright lights on the horizon are the construction of the Maroondah Federation Estate, the Maroondah Festival in February, the election of a new Maroondah City Council in March, the Winter Arts Program in July and our regular activities for community participation throughout the year.

I'm sure I speak for my fellow Councillors when I say that we look forward to sharing in the future of our wonderful City of Maroondah.

## Another LINC to the Web

More Maroondah residents will be able to learn about the Internet with the relocation of the LINC community-based Internet training and access centre from Ringwood Plaza to the Arrabri Community Centre in Bayswater North.

The LINC project (Learning Information Network & Community Service) is an initiative of Maroondah City Council, launched with a \$100,000 grant from the Victorian Government's *Skills.net* program.

Chair of the Maroondah Health Planning Network, Cr Peter Gurr, said the relocation of the LINC program to Bayswater North would enable access to the information age for more of the local community.

"The move to Arrabri Community Centre comes in response to a feasibility study conducted at the Centre in July which highlighted the local community's need for computers and Internet access and skills training," Cr Gurr said.

"The focus for LINC is on those who don't have access to the Internet - such as the unemployed, the disabled, the elderly, and even some small business operators," he said.

LINC has 12 networked multimedia computers available to the community.

Maroondah residents may have visited a local Small Business Expo at Eastland Shopping Centre on 22 October.

The Expo was jointly organised by Council, the Eastern Business Network, and the Business Enterprise Centre of Swinburne University of Technology TAFE Division.

Local small businesses were able to display their products and services, exposing their businesses to a much larger market.

Participating businesses showcased beauty, health and cleaning products, naturopathy services, promotional and fundraising products, secretarial services, mortgage brokers, health & safety services, web design products, and physiotherapy, remedial, relaxation, stretching and exercise services.

# Have your say

Recent surveys have shown that Maroondah residents consider waste collection services as the most important services provided by Council.

Council has recently prepared a Waste Management Strategy which aims to reduce the amount of domestic waste going to landfill and encourage a greater level of recycling and composting.

Waste collection services in Maroondah are currently provided under a number of different contracts. When the current domestic waste and recycling collection contracts expire in April 2001, Council proposes to standardise the service and introduce the following initiatives:

### Domestic Rubbish

All Maroondah residents will have the option of choosing either an 80 or a 120 litre mobile garbage bin for domestic waste. Residents who choose an 80 litre bin will receive a reduction in their garbage rate (currently estimated to be \$20 per year).

### Green Waste

All Maroondah residents will have a four weekly collection of green waste. The green waste collection is for bundled branches and prunings as well as for grass clippings and leaves in resident supplied bins.

### Hard Waste

Hard waste will continue to be collected six monthly.

### Recycling

Council is considering options for the recycling services and invites residents to comment on the following two options under consideration:

#### Option 1:

*Weekly collection of recyclables using a 50 litre black crate and a weekly collection of paper and cardboard left bundled on the nature strip.*

#### Option 2:

*A fortnightly collection using a split 240 litre mobile garbage bin for both paper and recyclables.*

Council will select one of these options based on feedback from the community.

"The new system is designed to help us reduce our waste by providing a smaller garbage bin option together with expanded recycling services," Maroondah Mayor Cr Maureen Naylor said.

"It will also bring all areas of Maroondah under the one waste management system and reduce the number of contractors providing services," she said.

# Maroondah Federation Estate

Construction has commenced at the Maroondah Federation Estate, at the site of the former Ringwood Primary School, in Greenwood Avenue, Ringwood.

Maroondah Mayor, Cr Maureen Naylor said building began after details were confirmed for Council's purchase of the former school site from the Department of Education.

"We are very excited that work has already begun. Council is very conscious of keeping disruptions in the immediate vicinity of the site to a minimum," she said, "We have established hours of work for our builders and we will also have security guards working throughout the construction phase," Cr Naylor said.

She said the Steering Committee responsible for keeping the project on track was working to ensure the project was completed by January, 2001.

"Our Steering Committee and various sub-committees have been working with members of the community, local residents, architects, landscapers and heritage consultants to ensure the Federation Estate is completed on time and on budget," she said.

"The Steering Committee is also planning a

couple of open days next year to show the community how work is progressing on the project," she added.

The project will include two facilities on the one site; a lifestyle centre and a cultural arts centre.

The new lifestyle facility will be purpose built for the use of community groups, with a major focus on older adults and people of non-English speaking backgrounds. The culture and arts centre will be a place of learning, work and creativity, catering for both amateur and professional artists.

The Maroondah Federation Estate is jointly funded by Council, the Victorian Government's Community Support Fund and the Federal Government Department of Communication, Information Technology and the Arts.

"Our winners highlighted some very different views of Maroondah and given their quality, I think this is why they were chosen as worthy of prizes," she said.

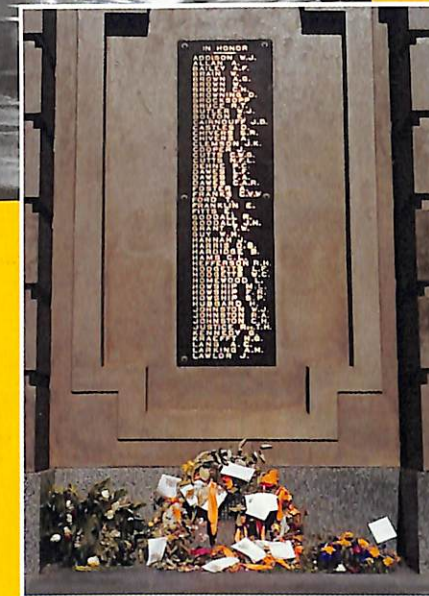
The judges awarded first prize of a new Pentax camera (value \$600) to Dean Jones for his shot of Main Street Croydon, titled *Maroondah at night*.

## Weeding out the weeds

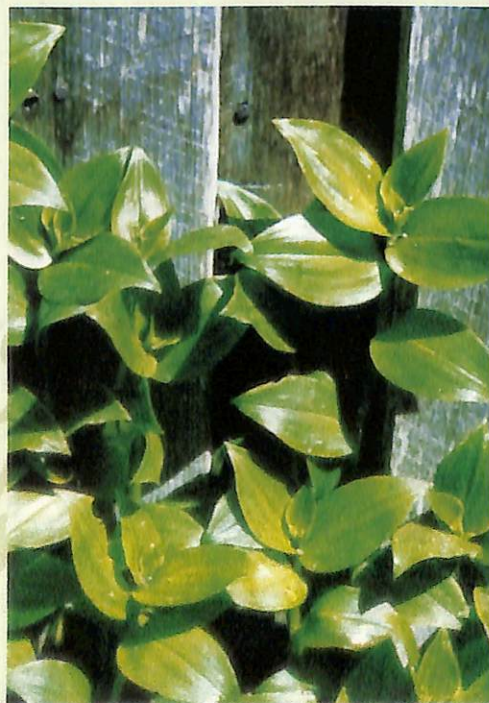
Many people are not aware that weeds and weed invasion is one of the most serious and expensive land degradation problems in Australia. Weeds cost Victorian agriculture around \$360 million each year and cause significant environmental and ecological damage.

There is also significant damage done by weeds in Maroondah, which are introduced into our home gardens and eventually spread to our parks and reserves, putting at risk our indigenous species. Climbers and creepers such as English Ivy and Wandering Jew are particularly dominant within Maroondah.

To combat the spread of pest plants and weeds, the Maroondah and Knox City Councils have developed a guide to identifying and eradicating environmental weeds.

The Pest Plants guide details treatments for eradicating various common weeds. Copies of the guide are available from Council's three Service Centres, listed on the back page of this Focus.

## Doggy business

Council officers will be patrolling all areas of the City in coming months to ensure that Maroondah residents clean up their dog's droppings while walking their dog.

Owners who do not clean up after their dog, face fines of up to \$100 per offence.

Council's Local Law No. 2 makes it illegal for dogs, and other animals, to foul Council property and public places.

"Our parks and gardens are for the use of everyone - so it makes sense that all residents leave parks and gardens the way they found them," Maroondah Mayor Cr Maureen Naylor said.

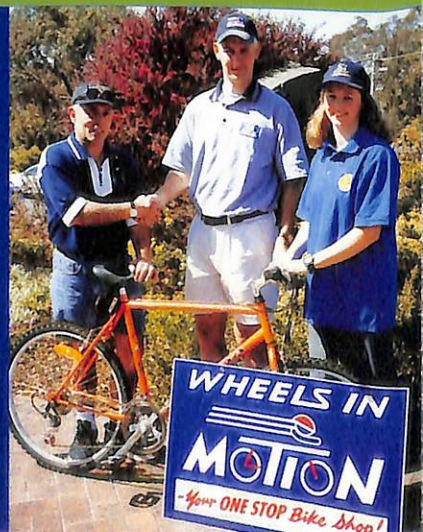
"The Council can provide Excel Pet Easy Scoops, which can be used to scoop up their pet's droppings. Dog owners can carry these bags with them when they walk their pet, and take the droppings home with them," she said.

"Dog owners must empty the droppings into a compost bin or bury them in their garden. This type of waste is not for disposal in domestic rubbish bins," Cr Naylor said.

## Council as your advocate

Many residents may not be aware of the role Council plays in supporting the Maroondah community.

In addition to Councillors representing Maroondah's interests on regional and state committees, Council acts as a community advocate in matters affecting planning and neighbourhood amenity, such as the recent lopping of canopy trees in Bonnie View Road, Croydon.

Council also works with State and Federal Government departments to obtain funding for specific projects, such as the Maroondah Federation Estate and the Maroondah Festival and on-going programs, such as Home and Community Care programs and business development programs.

In particular, all Councils in Victoria apply for funding for Home and Community Care (HACC), from a limited pool of money. HACC services provide community based services to frail older people, those with a disability and their carers in order to increase independent living, maintain their quality of life and prevent inappropriate admission to residential care.

Maroondah Mayor, Cr Maureen Naylor said Council is looking to the future and the anticipated needs of those requiring assistance in coming years.

"Over the past few years, Council has been actively seeking solutions for bridging the gap between anticipated needs and real funding. It's imperative that we see a greater focus on funding for many essential services, especially home care," Cr Naylor said.

"Council has a progressive outlook and will continue to advocate for all sections of the Maroondah community, to ensure we continue to care, grow and prosper," she finished.

## Leading the field

The Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) has recently announced that Maroondah Council has ranked fifth in year 2000 (Y2K) readiness out of the 78 municipalities and 17 regional libraries throughout the State.

This achievement is largely due to Council's efficient Information Technology roll-out and the upgrade of computer systems and network.

Upgrades allow for the continuous improvement of the systems currently in use and also helps to protect Council from problems associated with the Millennium Bug.

"Most of these new systems and software needed to be in place for the new financial year," Maroondah Councillor Les Willmott said.

"I believe the results for Maroondah reflect the wisdom in dedicating resources to our upgrade and Y2K readiness - we are in a very good position for the year 2000," he added.

## Showcase does great business

Members of Maroondah's Business Advisory Board aim to hold an International Business Showcase in 2000, following the success of this year's event at the Karralyka Centre.

Board Chair and Maroondah Councillor Joe Cossari said, "The International Business Showcase was a fantastic success. The whole day provided business owners and operators with ways to expand their businesses into overseas markets".

The day consisted of a Business Breakfast for 160 people, a networking function for 150 people; two seminars on doing business in Asia and Europe, attracting over 100 people and numerous business displays.

This year's showcase was an initiative of the Board and was organised by Council in conjunction with representatives from the Ringwood and Croydon Chambers of Commerce and Industry.

"I think many business operators and owners went away with a greater knowledge and appreciation for pushing into new markets overseas. It was also very useful for business to learn what type of support is available from the State and Federal Governments, and what issues they may come up against," Cr Cossari said.

## Preparing your home

There is no better time than now to review your home emergency equipment and supplies, in preparation for the coming summer and new year celebrations.

As many Victorians learnt from the gas crisis in September 1998, accidents and disasters can happen at anytime, or anywhere, and without any reason.

"Preparing now is the best way to limit the impact of accidents on you, your family and your property," Maroondah Councillor Neil Rose said.

"By preparing, you can save yourself a lot of inconvenience when an accident occurs. For some people, it's as simple as having a torch and a well-stocked first aid kit in the car, whereas for others, it's a case of having enough non-perishable food and water at their convenience," he said.

"Particularly for people who suffer from medical conditions, it's a case of making sure they have enough medication on them," he added.

Councillor Rose provided a checklist for residents to use when planning for emergencies or accidents, which includes the following tips:

- Keep your car's petrol tank above half full.
- In case the power fails, plan to use alternative cooking methods.
- Have extra blankets, coats, hats, and gloves to keep warm.
- Have plenty of flashlights and extra batteries on hand.
- Do not use candles for emergency lighting.
- Make sure your first aid kit is fully stocked.
- Have plenty of non-perishable foods available and a manual can opener.
- Examine your smoke alarms on a regular basis. If you have smoke alarms that are hard-wired into your home's electrical system (most newer ones are), check to see if they have battery back-ups.
- At the end of daylight saving, replace batteries in all smoke alarms as a general fire safety precaution.
- Keep a battery-operated radio or television if needed in an emergency.

## Get ready for the Maroondah Festival 2000

Festival organisers are currently developing activities for the 2000 Maroondah Festival and predict that it will be bigger and better than ever before!

The Festival, to be held on Sunday 20 February, 2000, will once again be jam packed full of entertainment offering percussion workshops and parade, craft markets, international cuisine, a youth component known as D-Rail, inline skating displays and competitions, live bands, circus skills workshops, street performers, expos galore, children's rides/activities and plenty more to keep the entire family entertained.

The booklet is a handy colourful guide to help residents and visitors choose a dining venue within the City.

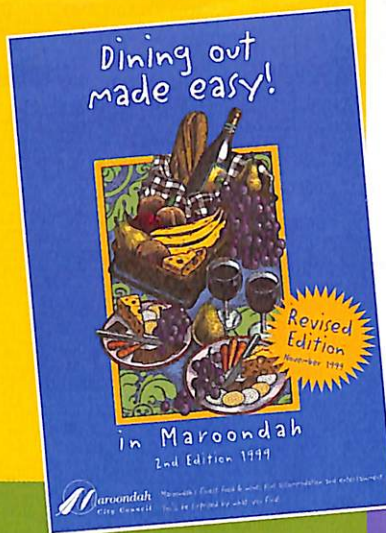
