The Prime Minister, Mr Fraser, will post Warrnambool's first commemorative envelopes at the Flagstaff Hill Maritime Village on Sunday.

The special envelopes — numbered one to 7000 as a limited edition — bear the Flagstaff Hill logo and will be stamped with the village's own postmark.

The postmark is a ship's steering wheel surrounding a lighthouse and a sailing ship and will be dated August 3 on the first day cover.

The envelopes have attracted interest from around Australia and administrative officer, Mr David Clarke, said yesterday more than 1000 applications had already been made.

Mr Clarke said the response had been incredible, especially since advertisements for the envelopes had so far only been placed in The Standard.

The first day cover envelopes cost 35 cents, including a 22 cent stamp featuring sailing ships of the Arctic, but already offers of \$10 have been made for the number one envelope.

He said the idea for the commemorative cover and postmark came jointly from Flagstaff Hill's project curator, Mr Ken Marshman, and Warrnambool postmaster, Mr Laurie Mogg.
