


Claim of the Waterloo Mining Co., Golden Point, Ballarat [artist unknown]

Following the extensive gold rushes of the 1850s Ballarat's minina moved to deep underground leads requiring massive machinery (often steam-powered). Qualified miners were much sought after, leading to a meeting of the Ballarat Mining Board in 1869 at which it was decided to establish A School of Mines. Australia's first technical education institution.



Harrie Wood moved the motion to establish a School of Mines at Ballarat.




Judge Warrington Rogers

Sir Redmond Barry [Chief Justice of Victoria] was elected first President, Judge Rogers [Mining Court of Ballarat] as Vice President, with Somerville Learmonth [squatter] and Rivett Henry Bland [Port Phillip Mine Manager] as trustees.

The Constitution stated: The primary object of the School is to impart instruction in the various branches of science relating to mining, mine management, mine surveying, and mine engineering.

commenced in the Classes former Circuit Court House in Lydiard Street with 21 students enrolling **1871**. in Initially subjects were offered in Mining Engineering, Chemistry, Assaying and Mining Surveying. In 1910 the name changed to Ballarat School of Mines and Industries reflecting the growth of trade subjects.

As the Ballarat School of Mines continued to grow, wider ranging courses were established. Over the years proof of the School's standard of the reflected education was by enrolments from around the world, and continual calls upon the School for skilled help to supply mine managers, engineers, assayers, and geologists, even from as far-off as South Africa. fields Many famous mining around the world were established by SMB Associates such as William Corbould.

In **1998** the Ballarat School of Mines (a TAFE College including Ararat TAFE) and the Wimmera Institute of TAFE were incorporated into the University of Ballarat.
