Further Grant in Aid

An account for £300 had been passed to the Treasury on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst for payment. Mr Pope M.L.A. had been asked to see the Minister of Mines with a view of securing the balance of the £500. It was suggested that steps be taken without loss of time, i.e. before the Estimates 1874-5 be passed to endeavor to secure a grant commensurate with the growing importance of the school.
