5. Advised that the President of the Mechanics Institute be communicated with as to the Staff of the School having access to the Library of the Institute: it would be beneficial to make these Institutions of mutual assistance to each other.

6. Also, suggested that the Library of the School be added to by the periodical literature relating to Engineering, Electricity, &c.

7. Lastly, that consideration be given to the fact that many gentlemen had given time and assistance to the School in the past, whom it would be advantageous to permanently connect with the School, e.g. as Hon. Members of the Council, by which strength would accrue, and the Councils be composed of gentlemen both willing and able to attend meetings. Mr. Flude's name was particularly referred to.

The Vice-Presidents proposals were favorably discussed and it was resolved to give them hearty support

An application by Mr. J. (Saghoru) Conynus for the countenance of the School in his proposal to conduct classes in Phonography was read and considered. It was thought that every care should be taken to prevent anything interfering with the teaching of subjects included in the Curriculum

at the same time, it might be allowed to Mr. Conynus to have classes here if no expense or inconvenience attended them
