

That arrangements be made with Mr. Garbutt M.A. or failing that, the Administrative Council deal with the matter.

The Vice President referring to an omission in the minutes of the 20<sup>th</sup> July last respecting Mr. Barnard, said that he had failed to learn from Mr. Barnard altho' he had put the question to him, as to his position, whether he considered himself a paid officer or not: this occurred some time since, and he was still in doubt also that Mr. Barnard had never tendered any resignation to him.

Mr. Barnard having briefly replied, and expressed an opinion that under all the circumstances of the case, it might be in the interests of the School that he should resign rather than risk the loss of Mr. Oddie's valuable services as Vice-President, ~~regretting however that ought had occurred, on the one hand to lead the Vice-President to act as he had done, and on the other to prevent him (Mr. Barnard) continuing his connection with the Institution.~~

It was resolved that this meeting be adjourned for one week, to allow this resignation to be reduced to writing before being dealt with and the previous minutes to be completed by the addition of the minutes of Mr. Barnard's meeting of 20 July 1881.
