The Vice-President drew attention to the necessity of a day-class for students of mechanical drawing and on the motion of Mr. Bickett seconded by Mr. Williams it was resolved that Prof. Krause who had expressed his willingness to undertake the duty should have the conduct of the day-class in this subject.

A memorandum from Prof. Smith respecting the light in the new building was read and after an inspection had been made by the Council it was decided that the architect be consulted with reference thereto.

It was resolved that future meetings ^{of the full Council} be convened at 5 o'clock instead of 4.30 p.m.

Mr. J. J. Jones moved and Mr. Martell seconded "That Mr. Berry be instructed to devote four days in every week from 10 o'clock a.m. till 1 o'clock p.m. to canvass the town and suburbs for the purpose of obtaining subscriptions to The School of Mines; - and further that Mr. Berry be ordered to keep a diary in which to enter the results of each day's canvass, and that it be laid before the Council at their several meetings." Carried.

On the motion of Mr. Martell seconded by Mr. Bickett a cordial vote of thanks was accorded to the Vice-President for his exertions on behalf of The School while in Melbourne recently on deputation business.

Meeting of Education Committee 5 P.M. Tuesday April 29th 1884 - Present Mr. F. J. Martell and E. J. Rosenblum, members of Committee. - With reference to the Senior and Junior Scholarships proposed to be established in connection with The School it was resolved to recommend the following suggestions for adoption by the Council, viz. -

That Candidates for competitive examinations for Scholarships must have been in the Institution at least one year and shown themselves to be earnest and faithful Students.

That for a Student to be admitted as a Candidate for the senior scholarship it shall be a sine qua non that he has obtained The School's Certificate of Competency in Inorganic Chemistry.

That Candidates for the Junior Scholarship must likewise have passed the examinations prescribed for a second stage Certificate in Chemistry.

That the first examinations for these Scholarships be holden in the month of February 1885.

That the Professors be invited to submit for approval of the Council an assigned number representing the maximum value viewed in relation to the importance of the subjects taught at The School.

A candidate failing to obtain 75% of the maximum value attached to any one subject shall not be allotted any marks whatever in that subject.

That with a view to determining what Students should be admitted to or excluded from competition at the examinations for the Senior and Junior Scholarships respectively, the Professors be invited to furnish a definition
