The following letters were read From the Education Department:

The President and Committee.

Gentlemen,

We beg to report that we visited the School on the evenings of 12th and 16th September. Owing to end of term the classes were not up to full strength. Work was proceeding with customary diligence, and we were afforded every facility by the Principals and Staff.

We desire to make the following recommendations:-

- across passage between Offices and Art School. This will add greatly to comfort and convenience of staff and students. It will also provide greater security to the establishment, as well as personal safety to the staff and students.
- to conducting visitors to our School over the establishment. The hours of his attendance for that purpose to be publicly advertised, and thus encourage a larger flow of visitors and effective description of the many educational activities of our School.
