Special Meeting of Finance Committee
held on Friday 5th March 1926 at 7.45 pm.
To discuss Centralization of Art Teachers
Training Centre from Ballarat to
Melbourne.

The President drew attention to the
notice which appeared in The Education
Gazette and Teacher's Aid and viewed
with some alarm the Minister's decision
to train teachers at the Workingmen's
College Melbourne. Applications had
been called, in the February issue for
six nominated courses. It was
held that this work had been succes-
fully carried out at this school for
years past and any alteration, should
provide for a continuance of the work
here on the same basis as applied
in the Melbourne school.

Mr. Smith pointed out the many
advantages that were open to local
candidates at our own school and
claimed that the large number of
teachers & others who had received
their Art training in Ballarat, and
now occupied positions in the various
schools, was the best indication of
the successful work carried out by
