Visiting Committee's Report.

Mr. Lynch, stated that from observations and
 inquiries he had made it appeared that the
 Dressmaking classes were training girls principally
 for dressmakers and not for positions in mills
 whereas there was a large demand for trained
 girls in the various local mills. The Art Principal
 in reply stated that Mr. Lynch's opinion had
 had eight girls from the school but from his
 experience most of the girls that attended the
 school preferred to go to the local shops
 and factories as dressmakers or into the service
 as teachers rather than to go to mills.

It was resolved that Mrs Small, Lynch and
 the Art Principal confer regarding the
 advisability of forming a class for girls desirous
 of obtaining employment as mill hands.
