Inspectors' Report.

C. C. M. Hutchison, in commenting on a section of the Annual Report of the Technical School Inspector,

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said that the meaning of this particular section was not very clear and although he ~~did~~ not desire to submit a motion he would like to see the Education Department asked to submit the matter in clearer terms. He stated that during the month of November each year a survey was made by himself and the local Head Teachers of the facilities available in the matter of Post Primary education and the aptitude of children who would complete a year in the sixth grade that year. This survey formed the basis for recommendations to parents and although the parents often made decisions contrary to the recommendations, the fact remained that the Ballarat district could provide annually more boys than the Junior Technical School could take. To make a selection the Head Master of the Junior Technical School held an Entrance Examination and, whilst this examination was a fair one, it was, in his opinion, unfair to the teachers who had already advised the parents to send their boys to the Junior Technical School, because a large percentage of those who fail to pass this examination are too old the following year, irrespective of whether they could then pass the examination or not.

The only solution of the problem appeared to be an enlargement of the Junior Technical School and if that was found impracticable, then it might be possible to take Senior classes in some of the Senior classrooms. He felt that objections would be raised to this course both by the junior and senior staff, and rightly
