Visiting Committee's Report. Mr. Jones reported
that he and Mr. Sutton had inspected
several parts of the school on the
previous Monday night. They found
considerable improvement in the
appearance of the grounds and felt
that the previous untidy appearance
was mainly due to shortage of labour.
In the Carpentry, Blacksmithing and
Machine Shops they found everything in
order and a keen lot of students
hand at work. The report was received
