23-9-47 Visit of Mr. F. Everett, Chief Architect

Present: The President, Mr J. Sippell (Chair), Vice Presidents Mrs T. A. Farr and Mr J. Bealand, the Hon. Treasurer Mr L. Lederman, Mrs A. W. Lynch, Mr C. H. Hutchinson, Mr W. Nicholson, Mr J. Smail, Mr G. Savage, Mr A. E. Storr, Mr F. Everett and the Acting Principal, Mr R. W. Richards.

The President extended a warm welcome to Mr Everett and said that the School Council was very keen to see a start made on the long range plan which had been approved by the Education Department and recommended as an urgent post-war requirement. The Council was of the opinion that a new building on the old Court House site to provide accommodation for the Electrical Department, a ~~Chemistry~~ Chemistry Department and an Engineering Drawing Department was the logical first step.

Mr Everett produced a rough plan which showed an administrative block where the ~~present~~ gate gates are and a semi-circular row of buildings stretching from the old Court House to the Junior Technical School and separated from the administrative block by gardens and lawns.

Mr Everett said that to his mind the site was ideal for such a plan which had many advantages and had been adopted
