Business Auditor's Report.

out of The President read the letter forwarded  
minutes by the Principal to the Education  
Department in reply to the points  
raised by the Auditor in his report  
on the accounts of 1947 and the  
Registrar reported that letters had been

No duty early in November and the matter  
would be fully discussed then. In the mean-  
time steps were being taken to obtain  
the names and addresses of all boys  
in grades 6, 7 and 8 in Ballarat and  
district. Mr. Lyall said that a  
recent survey had shown that 120  
pupils in grade 6 would have to proceed  
to post-primary schools in 1950.

Mr. Beasland reported that he had  
inspected the Junior school gardens and  
grounds and the Pabney Department  
Mr. Savage was to inspect the Junior  
Technical school but in the absence  
of a report on that section he could  
only assume that something unforeseen  
had prevented Mr. Savage from doing so.  
In one bay of the junior bicycle shed  
he found the floor to be in a broken  
and dangerous condition. The recently  
recently flanged girders at the side  
and rear of the Pabney building  
were a big improvement but some  
clearing of grass and rubbish was  
required. <sup>It was also applied to the footpath outside.</sup> The rubbish bin near  
the engineering shop looked rather  
unsightly and he recommended that  
a movable front piece of sheet iron  
be provided. In the triangular area  
at the rear of the Dressmaking building  
he noticed an accumulation of rubbish.
