Visiting Committee's Report.

Alexander said that an inspection of
the old Court House, Woodclaring and
Motor Mechanics had been carried
out by Mr Callow and himself on Tuesday
19th July.

They found that the large room in the
Court House was excellent for practical
work and must be the envy of other schools.
The enclosed type of light fittings
were dirty and the refrigeration units
were very old and decrepit. They
suggested that an approach be made
to the manufacturers of this type of
equipment for the acquisition of modern
units. They thought that the open air
was rather hazardous and that the
matter of fire fighting appliances ought
to be examined. The light fittings
were not up-to-date which was not a
good advertisement for an electrical
department. They also noticed that the
landing in front of the survey room had
been painted with grey paving paint and
was very slippery. Paint was flaking
off the walls in the survey room.

Motor Mechanics Hut.

This building was very cold and cheerless.
The floor at the recently built annex
was a very poor job. There also they
felt that the matter of fire fighting appliances
ought to be examined. Two foam extinguishers
were available but were not readily
accessible. Much valuable equipment

20-7-55 was stored in this building, mainly in wooden
cupboards which could easily be broken into
through the unlined fibro plaster walls.
The Woodclaring Hut was in good condition and
much more comfortable than the Motor Mechanics
Hut. There also they felt that there
was a risk of burglary as the wool
stock was visible through the side
windows. They suggested that blinds
be installed and drawn after classes
finish. It was noted that the Court
House and the fence in Lydiard Street
had not yet been painted.
